



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It's ATS Scholarship application time! Inside this issue of the Volksblatt are the instructions to receive an application. The deadline to request an ATS Scholarship Application is March 15th. The deadline for the return of the completed ATS Scholarship Application is April 15th. For the High School senior application, two parts need to be returned: the student portion and the High School Guidance Counselor portion. Both parts must be returned to the ATS Home Office by the deadline. For those students in their second or third year of college, they can apply for the Undergraduate Continuing Academic Scholarship Grant. This official application only has one part. These students will need to submit a college transcript with their application. I think it's wonderful that the ATS can offer so many scholarships to its young members. Some of these were from individual donors, some were from our Branches, and some were created by the ATS. This is just one of the many benefits of membership in the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons.

A new annual scholarship has been created and will be awarded for the first time this year. The ATS Board of Directors voted to create a new \$1,000 Undergraduate Continuing Academic Scholarship grant in honor of Joan Miller-Malue. As you know, Joan retired in 2020 after almost 50 years of serving the ATS. This is a well-deserved honor and the Board was happy to set this in motion. Joan, thank you again for all of your years of dedication and service to the ATS!

Did you know the first face on the \$1 dollar bill was not George Washington? The first face to appear on this currency was Salmon P. Chase. The first \$1 bill was issued during the Civil War in 1862. Chase was the Secretary of the Treasury at that time and was also the designer of the country's first bank notes. (Previously, Chase has been Ohio's governor from 1856 to 1860.) George Washington first appeared on the \$1 bill in 1869. During the colonial era, physical money was quite scarce in the American Colonies. The economy instead operated on a barter system using goods as payment for services. It was during the early 19th century that the slang term "buck" began being used. Henry Howe, an American author and traveler, wrote of his time on the Ohio frontier where "a muskrat skin was equal to a quarter of a dollar; a raccoon skin, a third of a dollar; a doe skin, a half dollar; and a buck skin, 'the almighty dollar'". Thus, when referring to the price of something, many people referred to it as a "buck". This slang term is still used

today. During the Civil War, the United States government funded its war effort by printing new forms of currency. It was at this time that the first official paper currency was created. The federal government even printed fractional notes during this time because the metal normally used to make coins was needed for the war. It was also at this time that the first \$1 bill was issued. The money printed during this time period became known as "greenbacks" due not only to its color, but mostly because it was not backed by anything. The government simply said it had worth, but could not offer a secure financial backing. This meant that the government had to closely control the printing of paper currency and also find a way to prevent counterfeiting. The U.S. Secret Service was formed at this time to deal with counterfeiters. The design of the \$1 bill changed quite a lot until 1963 when the bill that we recognize today was first created. And remember, it only takes 300 of those "bucks" to start an ATS Annuity! Until next time....

Tax tips for the year

January can be misunderstood when it comes to taxes: You can do a lot more than wait for 1099s and W-2s. There's even time to make adjustments to your 2020 numbers.

With a little planning, you can position yourself to be super organized and maybe even snag some late deductions. Consider these tips from TurboTax and others:

• Get your paperwork together. A tax checklist can help immensely--your CPA can provide one or you can find one online. Gather records and receipts and find your forms. A little time spent organizing now will help things move faster later.

• Itemize your tax deductions. January is a good time to scrutinize this list before vou feel a deadline crunch. If you are self-employed, own a home or live in a high-tax area, you might find that you'll save a lot by itemizing rather than taking the standard deduction. TurboTax says itemizing is worth it when your qualified expenses add up to more than \$12,400 for most singles and \$24,800 for most married couples filing jointly. These include items like mortgage interest, charitable donations and a portion of medical expenses.

• Contribute to retirement accounts. The deadline to contribute to a traditional IRA is April 15. A deductible contribution can help lower your tax bill, but check with your CPA whether yours is deductible or not, and whether it makes sense for you to make a concerted effort. A Roth IRA contribution won't lower your tax bill but may still be a good financial decision, for example.

Students push back against cheating software

Educators are fighting cheating with software, but students are fighting back.

Online learning and testtaking have opened new doors for the ancient art of cheating. To fight it, some schools require students to take tests over webcam while professors or teaching assistants observe. But according to TechDirt, a growing number of institutions are using anti-cheating software instead, which uses a mix of human proctors and algorithms to spot what they classify as signs of cheating.

These online proctoring companies use webcams, microphones and algorithms to monitor eye and head movements. background noise, mouse movements, scrolling and keystrokes. The software flags suspicious behavior for instructor review. Even something as simple as multiple users taking the test on the same network, connectivity issues or too much background noise can be flagged, according to the Washington Post.

Meanwhile, the popularity of online proctoring software continues to grow. According to EdSurge, the online proctoring company

Proctorio is partnering with McGraw-Hill and other textbook publishers to include its software with courseware, meaning that even homework may be tracked for cheating in the future.

As the software has gained popularity during the COVID-19 pandemic, students say that it violates privacy and causes intense stress for test-takers, according to the Washington Post. And according to NBC News, students have little recourse when penalized for things beyond their control, like interruptions or unconscious behaviors, such as reading out loud. The anxiety they experience while trying to satisfy the software's demands, they say, is too much.

According to the Electronic Freedom Foundation, dozens of petitions are circulating at colleges and universities to abandon platforms like Honorlock, Proctorio, ProctorU and Respondus. And some schools are receptive to the complaints -- The City University of New York recently decided that professors cannot require students to use online proctoring software.

It matters not where you were born, or where you live, but what's in your HEART. Be Proud to be Transylvanian Saxon!

Lack of rural broadband access hurts American students

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic changed the way that much of the world goes to work and school, rural Americans were less likely to have access to broadband internet service. According to the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) Eighth Broadband Progress Report, nearly a quarter of Americans who live in rural areas--about 14.5 million people--lack access. In tribal areas, nearly one-third of the population lacks access. The benefits of broadband access are well-established. In a webinar for the Council on Food, Agricultural and Resource Economics, Federal Reserve Bank economist Alex Marre pointed out that broadband access is linked to higher wages, lower unemployment, more population growth and higher home values. According to the Pew Charitable Trusts Broadband Initiative, the COVID-19 pandemic has forced disparities in access to the forefront and highlighted the need for universal broadband access.

Lack of broadband access in rural areas particularly hurts America's children. According to the Pew Charitable Trusts Broadband Initiative, an estimated 15 to 16 million elementary and secondary students do not nave adequate internet access or digital devices at home to support online learning. At present, 12 states are seeking to alleviate this burden on families by using Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) dollars to help students purchase internet-enabled devices, wireless hotspots, or both. According to a Common Sense Media report, issued during the summer of 2020, about 50 million children have engaged in remote learning as a result of the pandemic. Even in states with the smallest disparities, about one in four students lacked adequate internet access. In states with the largest divides, half of students lacked access.



Axente Sever / Frauendorf




The Evangelical church in Axente Sever is an important witness of the hard times the region had to bare. Therefore not only the ring wall was strengthened for defensive purposes, but the church building itself was also fortified. The massive tower between hall and chancel, dating back to the 14th century has a parapet walk on the highest level and on the first and second floors simple, elongated loopholes that end as a niche towards the interior. Both the chancel and the nave were heightened with defence levels with loopholes. The arches built between the reinforced buttresses on the western facade support the defence level. A portcullis, whose guiding slides are still visible today, protected the western portal. Along the outer wall there are partially preserved and reconstructed storage rooms which are used as guest rooms today.

Place and surroundings

The fortified church of Axente Sever was not only the religious center of the settlement over the centuries, but also a secure place to deposit valuable goods. In the numerous storage buildings in the precincts of the castle wall, rooms were assigned to each family from the village for storing grain, meat and other food. Corn was not stored on farms, but brought directly to the fortification after harvest to protect it from possible attackers. A special procedure was the storage of the bacon in the so-called bacon towers, which were opened to families only on Sundays after church service. To ensure that no one was serving from a different piece of ba-




con, each family scratched an individual sign on the freshly cut edges. The storage rooms have been transformed into guestrooms in recent years so that today visitors can sleep inside the mighty walls. In addition, a museum was set up to report on the history of the village and the fortified church.




