Schloss Horneck needs OUR help!

Since 1960 Schloss Horneck has housed the Siebenbürger Museum, the Siebenbürger Library and Archive, the Siebenbürger-Institut and is the base for many Saxon organizations. A seniors home is also located on the property. Last September the Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland purchased the property for one million Euro.



Donations were received from individuals and organizations to help fund the purchase of the property. The purchase of Schloss Horneck gives the Siebenbürger Saxons throughout the world a central location where Saxon artifacts, books and other historical documents can be collected and stored to preserve our ethnic history for many years.

with your family sharing precious memories and giving thanks for the good things in our lives. Transylvanian Saxon Trivia: We think of rocketry as a modern day idea. But it originated back in the 1500's. A Transylvanian Saxon military engineer, Conrad Haas, is a pioneer of rocket propulsion. He was born in Austria and was invited by Stephen Bathory, the grand prince of Transylvania to Hermannstadt to act as a weapons engineer. Between 1529 and 1569, he wrote a dissertation on rocket technology, involving the combination of fireworks and weapons technologies. He described and depicted rockets with two and three stages, talked about bundling of rockets, stabilizing fins and using liquid fuel. In a drawing, he showed a cylindrical housing at the top of a rocket which is probably the first drawing of a space station. How amazing that he wrote about such concepts at a time when these concepts did not exist!

Don't delay surgery after hip fracture

Delaying surgery after a hip fracture can seriously delay recovery, according to Scientific American Consumer Health.

Most surgeries to reposition the hip bone after fracture should occur within 24 to 48 hours after injury. Doctors may delay up to 72 hours if other health conditions must be stabilized.

Delaying surgery means longer immobility, which has

its own health consequences. Among them, blood clots in the legs or lungs, which are the leading cause of death post hip injury.

"Studies show that surgical repair performed in the first 24 to 48 hours after injury can reduce the risk of death within one year," according to the journal. "It's also associated with reduced pain and a shorter hospital stay."



Recognizing the Plymouth Thanksgiving: How the Pilgrims became

In American lore, Plymouth, Massachusetts, holds a singular place.

It's known as the site of the colony founded in 1620 by the Pilgrims, passengers on the iconic ship, the Mayflower, and host to the first Thanksgiving feast.

The town has not always been well known. The town and the Pilgrims who created it were largely forgotten for 200 years until December 22, 1820.

On that day, the great orator Daniel Webster traveled to Plymouth from Boston to take part in the bicentennial celebration of the Pilgrims' landing. So great was his speech that it became known as the "Plymouth oration."


Before 1,500 people seated on wooden benches in the meetinghouse, he said, in part: "We have come to this Rock to record here our homage for our Pilgrim Fathers; our sympathy in their sufferings; our gratitude for their labors, our admiration of their virtues; our veneration for their piety, and our attachment to those principles of civil and religious liberty...

"We listen to the chiefs in council ... We are filled with reverence and admiration for the mild dignity of Carver and Bradford, the decisive military air of Standish, the devout Brewster, the enterprising Allerton..."

Webster's oration started the elevation of the Pilgrims to the status of forefathers of the nation. At that time, the recently independent America needed an event and a place that rooted the country to its founding history.

They needed a founding location. Jamestown in Virginia was a candidate as was Plymouth in Massachusetts. Jamestown had an advantage because it was founded 13 years before the Pilgrims landed. But Plymouth offered a moral authority, thanks to the words of Daniel Webster.

Though the great Thanksgiving feast occurred 396 years ago, we still follow the Pilgrims' lead in being thankful for our blessings on Thanksgiving Day.

Annoying chip readers

Swiping a credit card just seems so much more efficient than sticking the card into a terminal and waiting. And waiting.

But the chip cards are actually more secure, credit companies say. The chip cards attempt to prevent fraud by generating a unique code for every transaction that can only be used once. So the cards are supposed to slow down criminals who steal a bunch of card data and then manufacture physical cards. Chips make the data much less useful. The cards also reduce the value of card skimming, where a device is placed on the card reader to steal data.

Chips do nothing for e-commerce fraud or a variety of other types of criminal activity.



Sachsentreffen 2017 in Transylvania

In early August, my nephew Nick and I joined 40 others on a trip of a lifetime. I had been to my parents homeland twice before. But seeing it again through older eyes, through my nephew's eyes and with my Uncle Arthur who was born in Transylvania made this trip an unforgettable experience.

After arriving in Bucharest, we did a walking tour of the city on our way to dinner at Caru cu Bere (the Beer Wagon), which opened in 1879. It was filled with so much wood carving and stained glass, it felt like dining in a museum. The next day we toured Bucharest by bus. My last two times in Transylvania were before the revolution in 1989 and to see the site of the revolution and the tribute to those who lost their lives for Romania's freedom was moving. Some of our fellow travellers relayed their experiences during that period of unrest. Our tour guide, Bogdan, relayed the historical account of the revolution and the meaning of the statues in Revolution Square. I remembered the lack of food and goods available for purchase on my earlier visits to Transylvania. The country is faring much better since before the revolution, but there still is room for economic improvement. Next we toured the Palace of the Parliament, the second largest building in the world with almost 4 million square feet, lots of marble, carved wood and empty rooms!

We arrived in Hermanstadt the day before the Sachsentreffen and the city was buzzing with preparation for the Heimattag celebration. Seating was set up outside the Evangelische Stadtpfarrkirche for the release of the documentary about Hermannstadt which

was shown on a giant screen that night. The Large Square was filled with tables and tents just waiting for thousands who would fill them over the next three days. The large stage and screen accommodated traditional Saxon dance performances, the speech by Romania's president and Transylvanian Saxon Klaus Johannis, and band performances at night. There was a parade of 62 groups from different cities that were dressed in Tracht. We met so many Saxons from around the world and singing "Siebenbuergen, Suesse Heimat", arm in arm, with so many brothers and sisters from different countries made me proud to be a Saxon.

Nick and I were fortunate enough to spend time with my father's nieces and nephew and their families who had travelled to the celebration from Germany. My father, John Ziegler, was born in Braller, which is about an hour outside of Hermannstadt. He was drafted into the army but his brothers remained in Braller until after the revolution. My cousins have been maintaining the family home as a summer retreat. It was so good to see them in person; this was the first time in forty years for me and for Nick, the first time he has met any of his relatives from my father's side of the family. They took us on an excursion to the Albota resort in the Carpathian Mountains to meet more of our relatives for dinner. And then we went to see the Saxon musical in Freck. We are resolved to stay in touch now.

The visit to the church in my mother's home town of Zuckmantel was heart warming. My mother is Maria Ziegler (Kramer Mitzi) who was born in 1929 and my grandparents

were Franz and Sara Kramer. The family fled from Zuckmantel in 1944. The village welcomed us with a church service, a recital by an organist from Germany and pastry and spirits to celebrate the event. The Youngstown Band was also there and added more beautiful music to the celebration. I am so grateful to Dietmar Wagner, Committee Chairman of Heimatorts Gemeinschaft Zuckmantel, who organized this reception for our visit. We heard from Dietmar about the efforts to preserve the churches and fortresses in Transylvania. He spoke about the efforts to restore the Altar with a replica print of the painting that was stolen from the church in Zuckmantel. It was good to see the altar whole again. This was also a special time for me since my Uncle Arthur and Aunt Jeannie were traveling with us. Knowing my mother and her siblings were all baptized in this church made this visit especially personal to me.

We travelled to many churches and fortresses, die Margarethen-kirche in Mediasch, die Evangelische Kirche in Bistritz, Kirchenburg Honigberg, Kirchenburg Tartlau and Schwarze Kirche in Kronstadt, the birthplace and castle of Dracula and Peles castle. Our tour guide gave historical color to the cities we visited and I learned so much more about my parents' homeland. But the personal connection to my relatives on this trip is what truly made this trip special.


I want to thank the National Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons for organizing this trip for us. It truly was a trip of a lifetime.

Aktuelles aus Schloss Horneck: Förderanträge eingereicht

Um die vom Deutschen Bundestag beschlossene Zuwendung für den Um- und Ausbau von Schloss Horneck zum Siebenbürgischen Kultur- und Begegnungszentrum entsprechend den Förderrichtlinien der Beauftragten der Bundesregierung für Kultur und Medien (BKM) zu erhalten, hat das "Projektteam" in den letzten Monaten mit vollem Einsatz gearbeitet. Nach der Abgabe des so genannten Formlosen Antrags, einschließlich eines realistischen Betriebskonzeptes für die nächsten 25 Jahre, wurden mehrere Gespräche mit den Verantwortlichen der verschiedenen am Projekt beteiligten Behörden und Institutionen geführt und die Planungsarbeiten intensiviert.


Am 19. September 2017 wurde der "große" Antrag auf Zuwendung bei der BKM und bei der mit der baufachlichen und finanziellen Begleitung beauftragte Oberfinanzdirektion Karlsruhe, Standort Freiburg/Br. (OFD), abgegeben, nicht weniger als 350 Seiten, einschließlich Tabellen zur Baukostenberechnung sowie den dazugehörigen Bauplänen. Ergänzt wurde dieser Antrag – in Zusammenarbeit mit dem Siebenbürgischen Museum Gundelsheim und dem Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Kulturrat (der das Siebenbürgen-Institut mit Bibliothek und Archiv verwaltet) – um eine detaillierte Raumbedarfsplanung, in der die derzeitige und vor allem die künftige Nutzung der einzelnen Räume auf Schloss Horneck erläutert worden ist. Diese Raumbedarfsplanung und die geplanten Umbauarbeiten wurden am 11. Oktober 2017 nochmals mit einem Vertreter der BKM vor Ort besprochen und präzisiert. Nach der Genehmigung des vorläufigen Maßnahmebeginns Ende August 2017 konnte die Ausarbeitung von Fachingenieurskonzepten für Heizung, Lüftung, Sanitär und Elektro in Auftrag gegeben

Oktober fertiggestellt; die Ausarbeitungen der Konzepte haben wir erst Mitte Oktober vollständig erhalten. Sie werden derzeit in die Gesamtplanung eingearbeitet, die dann Anfang November bei der OFD in Freiburg/Br. eingehend besprochen werden soll. Am 25. September 2017 wurde auch beim Landesamt für Denkmalpflege Baden-Württemberg (LAD) ein Antrag auf Förderung denkmalpflegerischer Maßnahmen auf Schloss Horneck gestellt. Teil dieses Antrags waren 108 so genannte Raumbücher mit der Beschreibung aller Arbeiten, die in den einzelnen Schlosszimmern durchzuführen sind, in einem Umfang von nicht weniger als 1 250 Seiten. 

Identifying Alzheimer's before symptoms

New tests to diagnose Alzheimer's disease are emerging, offering hope for new treatments and therapies.

According to the Alzheimer's Association, the memory disease is now the sixth leading cause of death in the United States, and more than 5 million people are currently living with the disease. In fact, for seniors, a third of all deaths stem from either Alzheimer's or another form of dementia. Although there is no cure in sight, for now, every effort is being made to find a way to diagnose and treat this growing threat.

According to The Wall Street Journal, there is support for a new approach to how Alzheimer's is identified in the population, and it could lead to dramatically earlier warnings of the disease and accelerate research. New approaches hope to discover the disease before symptoms ever present.

Like finding malignant cells in the body to find cancer or plaque buildup in the arteries for heart disease, the presence of amyloid and tau proteins could be the key to early identification. Previously, doctors could only see these proteins during an autopsy, but improved technology has allowed for these markers to be seen in living patients. These scans are sometimes used to rule out Alzheimer's in patients with various cognitive issues.

Critics of the method agree that the process works to identify amyloid proteins but argue that there is no definitive way to predict whether or not the patient will actually develop symptoms.

Another test involves recognition of smells. One of the first things to decline is the ability to smell, which is associated with the first cranial nerve, according to WebMD.

Researchers have found the ability to smell differs between nostrils in Alzheimer's patients but it is still too early to say definitively if this will be a diagnostic tool for Alzheimer's.

8 cups bread crumbs or small pieces of dry bread

- 1 cup celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon sage
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 2 eggs

1/2 pint fresh or canned oys-

Salt and pepper to taste

In a saucepan, cook celery and onion in butter or margarine until tender but not brown. Remove from heat. Stir in sage and several dashes of salt and

Place bread crumbs in a bowl and add the onion and celery mixture.

Whisk the eggs into the chicken broth and drizzle the liquid over the bread crumbs.

Drain liquid from the oysters. Use a scissors to snip ovsters into smaller bits then thoroughly stir the oysters into the bread mixture. The dressing can be stuffed into the cavity of the chicken or turkey or placed around it in a large baking pan or roaster.

Cook until the bird is done and the top of the dressing in the pan is brown and crisp. If the bird needs to be cooked longer, periodically baste the dressing with chicken broth or water to keep it from becoming

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
