



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I want to wish everyone a safe and healthy Thanksgiving. With the pandemic still raging and stay-at-home orders being announced, it appears most of us will be celebrating this year with a small group of our family rather than the big, loud, boisterous celebrations of years past. I recall big feasts when I was young. Lots of aunts and uncles and what seemed to be all of the cousins gathered at one place. Then, after we all ate way too much food, it was time for the famous "Thanksgiving Nap". It seemed as though eight or ten of us cousins would all manage to fit on one couch and snooze until it was time to eat again! These days, not as many of us would fit on that couch. Although, it seems we still look forward to the snooze after we're done eating! Stay safe, everyone, and be thankful for your family, your friends and your health.

Tis the season for.....Branch Officer elections! The ATS Home Office is mailing out Branch Roster forms. Once your Branch has your new slate (or same slate) of Officers, please make sure that your local Branch Secretary completes the forms and mails them back to the office. This information is used by the Home Office for various mailings during the year. Did you know that the woman behind "Mary Had a Little Lamb" is considered to be responsible for Thanksgiving's recognition as a national holiday? Writer and editor Sarah Josepha Hale had written the children's poem, originally known as Mary's Lamb in 1830 and she helped found the American Ladies Magazine, which she used a platform to promote women's issues. Sarah was also the editor of Godey's Lady Book for more than 40 years, turning the magazine into one of the most influential periodicals in the country at that time. While at Godey's, she often wrote editorials and articles about the Thanksgiving holiday and lobbied state and federal officials to pass legislation creating a fixed, national day of thanks on the last Thursday of November. By 1854, more than 30 states and U.S. territories had a Thanksgiving celebration on the books. The concept of a national Thanksgiving did not originate with Sarah Hale. In fact, the idea had been around since the earliest days of the republic. In 1789, a newly inaugurated George Washington called for a national day of thanks to celebrate both the end of the war and the recent ratification of the U.S. Constitution. Both John Adams

and James Madison issued similar proclamations of their own. Thomas Jefferson did not, citing separation of church and state ideals and felt that the religious connotations surrounding Thanksgiving were out of place. No formal declarations were issued after 1815. The outbreak of the civil war did little to stop Sarah Hale's efforts to create such a holiday. She continued to write editorials on the subject, urging Americans to put aside sectional feelings and local incidents and rally around the unifying cause of Thanksgiving. The holiday continued, despite hostilities, in both the Union and the Confederacy. In 1861 and 1862, Confederate President Jefferson Davis issued Thanksgiving Day proclamations following Southern victories. President Abraham Lincoln called for a day of thanks in April of 1862 following various Union victories, and again in the summer of 1863 following the Battle of Gettysburg. Shortly after Lincoln's summer proclamation, Hale wrote to both President Lincoln and Secretary of State William Seward, once again urging them to declare a national Thanksgiving Day, stating that only the chief executive had the power to make the holiday "permanently an American custom and institution". Whether President Lincoln had it in mind to issue the proclamation before receiving Hale's letter is uncertain. But within a week of the letter, Secretary Seward drafted Lincoln's official proclamation fixing the national observation of Thanksgiving Day on the final Thursday in November, a move the two men hoped would help "heal the wounds of the nation". After more than three decades of lobbying, Sarah Josepha Hale (and the United States) had a national holiday, earning her the name the Mother of Thanksgiving.

The first 'Thanksgiving'

After the dark days of 1620, the Pilgrim's 1621 harvest festival was their first celebration of plenty. It has become a model for present day Thanksgiving feasts. Their festival is described in a letter by Edward Winslow to friends in England:

"Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together after we had gathered the fruit of our labors. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week. At which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and among them rest their greatest King Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five deer, which they brought to the plantation and bestowed on our governor, and upon the captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful as it was this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."



The case for masks:

Hospital finds decline in Covid with mask

A Boston hospital system has found that required masking has dramatically reduced Covid-19 infections among its 75,000 workers.

The 12-hospital system in Massachusetts, like many types of businesses, could not require social distancing of its employees. But the strict requirement for masking did show results, according to a study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

In March, before the masking requirement, Mass General Brigham found that positive tests for Covid-19 doubled every 3.6 days. The positivity rate rose from 0 percent to 21.3 percent during March.

On April 11, the hospital required all employees and patients to wear masks. From April 11 to 30, positive cases among employees decreased from 14.6 percent to 11.4 percent.

Meanwhile, in the state, new Covid cases rose. On March 1, Massachusetts had one case. On April 30, it had 1,940 cases. Yet, as cases rose in the state, they decreased among hospital workers, suggesting the decline in Covid cases took place at the hospital system before declines were seen in the state, according to conclusions reported in JAMA.

However, masking wasn't the only mitigation step the hospital required. It also restricted elective procedures and enforced social distancing where possible.

HISTORY OF TRANSYL-VANIA-HOLY LEAGUE

Our story of the Holy League and Michael the Brave continues in **Part 7 of the Series.**

No one was sure why Michael, a victor in so many battles fell victim to a faked retreat and abandoning his superior military position. Perhaps it was overconfidence or the need to gain a quick victory in order to address other potential points of external attack.

We will find out if Michael's unified Romanian state is broken and if it is the final blow to the original Holy League of principalities of Transylvania, Moldavia and Wallachia.

Michael (Mihai) had barely escaped across the Mures with his diminished troops of 7,000 men.

Michael had settled into the town of Guruslau. It was a normal day in Guruslau(Goroszio). The villagers were going about their business of buying and selling their meats, supplies and other wares. The church bells were ringing and people hustling and bustling in the streets. The calm was interrupted by artillery fire.

Meanwhile, Michael had

sent orders to the nobles to assemble men for his army. Michael had received information that Jan Zamoyski, the chancellor of the Polish/ Lithuanian common wealth, had assembled an army to attack Moldavia. marched into Moldavia with 17,000 troops. He brought with him, the dethroned brothers Simion and Ieremia Moliva, with the intention of overthrowing Michael's rule in Moldavia and Walachia. Many Moldavian nobles and peasants that were unhappy with the rule of Michael joined them. Their march was quick as they met little resistance from the Moldavia towns that had no fortifications to resist. Zamoyski's expelled Michael's officials in Iasi. Ieremia Moliva was installed as the commander of Moldavia in the northern part. Zamoyski continued his march through Southern Moldavia. The nobles joined his forces or they would have been stripped of their land and political power. Zamoyski entered Walachia and occupied Buzau, Moldavia. Michael decided to march against Zamoyski but had only been able to muster a force of 10,000 troops. Without any artillery and facing outnumbered forces of 2 to 1, Michael was defeated at the Battle of Bucov. Zamoyski continued to attack the retreating Michael. Zamoyski marched and took the town of Bucharest. Simion Moliva was put on the throne of Wallachia and ordered to pay a tribute to Zamoyski.

Michael spent the next month in Western Wallachia in an attempt to regain the throne of Wallachia. Michael and a lesser-assembled army crossed the river into Eastern Wallachia. At the Battle of Curtea de Arges, Michael was again defeated. This loss prevented him from taking an important strategic position. He lost many of his important commanders and prevented him from obtaining a position that allows three mountain passes into Transylvania. The most important nobles abandoned him and his troops scattered. Michael realizes he has no chance of retaking Wallachia on his own; he retreats and undertakes a treacherous travel to Vienna. He arrives in Vienna only to find that Emperor Rudolph will not even see him. Rudolph faces a quandary because his General Basta was meeting significant resistance in Transylvania. Rudolph now has to way his options. After a few weeks waiting in Vienna, the Transylvanian government revolts and forces Basta into exile. The Transylvanian nobleman decided to reinstate, Sigismund Bathory, who had given up his throne to his cousin. Sigismund turned his back on Rudolph and aligned himself with the Polish/Lithuanian Zamoyski. Michael followers were promptly persecuted across Transylvania. Starina Novak, one of Michael's outstanding commanders was captured, burned on a stake alive for two hours and then impaled on a stake while still alive. Rudolph reacts by giving Michael a large sum of money to build an army. Michael and Basta are told to put aside their differences. Quickly, Michael raises 10,000 troops and he joined by Basta that provides another 10,000 troops. Their combined troops march into Transylvania. Sigismund marches to meet them with 40,000 strong troops. Sigismund troops consisting of Hungarian nobleman, Moldavian, Cossack and Polish troops.

This brings us back to the

town of Guruslau where the

two armies meet to do battle.

Michael and Basta army

consisted of 20,000 troops

of Wallachian, Habsburg, Cossack and Serbian infantry and cavalry. The troops of Sigismund far outmatch in numbers, with 40,000 infantry and cavalry. The two sides exchange artillery fire with no significant advantage. Sigismund then signals a cavalry attack along the entire front line. As Michael had done in the past, he used the terrain to gain a military advantage. Sigismund had failed to notice there was a grassy incline in the battlefield. Michael realizes the significance and as the battle intensifies, Michael orders the troops to take up position at the top of grassy slope. Michael's troops use the advantage to repel the siege of the cavalry. Eventually, the shear numbers of Sigismund's army and the joining infantry cause significant losses to Michael's army. The armies are in a fierce standoff battle until the superior numbers of Sigismund's army tend to grind down Michael's army. ders his artillery to resume the cavalry's position and fire at will. Sigismund counters by ordering his artillery to fire and sending his infantry to confront Michael's advancing cavalry. Michael's quick advance catches the opposing troops spread out and overwhelms Sigismund's reserve infantry. Michael's cavalry trample the opposing infantry and gain substantial advantage. Sigismund's artillery troops see they are going to be overwhelmed and join the infantry in retreat. This leaves Michael's troops to attack from the rear. The surrounded Transylvanian troops began running for their lives. Having lost 10,000 men and the loss of all his artillery

Sigismund orders a complete retreat. Having won the battle Michael marches ahead to Cluj (Klausenburg.) He plants a flag in honor of his captain, Starina Novak who had been burned alive and then impaled.

Under orders of Rudolph, Michael was to continue on into Wallachia to retake the throne. This would be easier because loyalists had already overthrown Simion Moliva in Wallachia. However Michael wanted to separate himself from Basta and occupy Alba Iulia(Karlsburg), Transylvania as his princely seat. This was directly against the wishes of Emperor Rudolph.

Presidential turkey pardons include one masked varmint

In 1926, a thoughtful voter from Mississippi sent President Calvin Coolidge a treat for the White House Thanksgiving main dish: A live raccoon.

Although sender the claimed the meat was 'toothsome,' Coolidge refused to eat it and instead named the varmint Rebecca. The First Lady let the little bandit play in the bathtub with a bar of soap and fed it corn muffins.

Of course, sending live animals for the White House Thanksgiving dinner had been something of a tradition since the days of the Ulysses S. Grant administration in 1869. But people mostly sent turkeys.

It's not that no one ate raccoons. They absolutely did. Native Americans and enslaved African-Americans trapped and ate raccoons as a dietary staple. Entire farming regions from the Appalachians to the western frontier fed on abundant raccoons--critters that ate the crops and caused destruction.

In the South, the tradition of raccoon as an entree led to the breeding of coonhounds who could sniff out, find and chase their prey up a tree to be shot, a challenging pastime leading to a hearty dinner.

By the 1900s, raccoon preparation was in the pages of The Joy of Cooking.

Still, raccoon had the reputation of being 'slave food' or 'poor man's food' and quickly fell out of favor in urban areas.

Nonetheless, in rural areas to this day, raccoon shows up on the menu. In Delafield, Wisconsin and Gillet, Arkansas, raccoon dinners raise money for charity. They also test the local mettle for budding politicians. In 2014, GOP Rep. Rick Crawford told Roll Call, "They literally serve raccoon. And you're supposed to eat some. That's the tradition." Toothsome!

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It was unacceptable to Michael to rule over the potentially powerful kingdom of Transylvania. Rudolph put in motion a plot against Michael's life. On the morning of August 9th, 1601, Basta sent his men to Michael's camp. When Michael tried to defend himself he was struck down and his head was cut off. His body was left to lie in the fields for some time. His followers managed to bring his head back to Wallachia. His head was brought back to Targosviste(Tergowisch), Wallachia and placed in Dealu Monastery, where it remains today.

Michael's defeat was more of a political defeat than a military defeat. He tried to impose his Wallachia power over the principalities of Transylvania and Moldavia. This was against the ruling nobility and the neighboring political powers. This caused significant resistance and would eventually lead to his downfall. Michael used his military superiority to gain control and rule the three principalities. This caused considerable problems with the neighboring monarchies of the Hapsburgs, the Ottomans and the Polish/ Lithuanians. In the end, it was better for the Austrian and Polish monarchies to maintain the individual principalities of Transylvania, Moldavia and Wallachia, as opposed to a strong monarchy that would upset the surrounding monarchy powers. Additionally, it was practical to maintain Wallachia and Moldavia as buffers again the Ottoman Empire. The brief unification of Transylvania, Moldavia and Wallachia would go on to form what would become the national identity of Romania. This ends the power of what once were the Holy League of Transylvania, Moldavia and Wallachia. A unification of the principalities and their power that serves as a prelude to Romania.

I enjoyed the very interesting history of the Holy League and the history of how the powerful monarchies in the area ruled over the individual principalities and feared the unification of what would eventually become Romania.
