SAXONS AFTER WORLD WAR II

In February 1942, respectively in May 1943, Germany concluded agreements with Hungary, respectively with Romania, following which the Germans who were fit for military service, although Hungarian citizens (in Northern Transylvania, entered the composition of the Hungarian state through the Second Vienna Award) or Romanian citizens (in Southern Transylvania, remaining part of Romania), could be incorporated into the regular German military units, into the Waffen-SS and into warproducing enterprises or into the Organisation Todt. As a result of these agreements, approximately 95% of the members of the German ethnic group who were fit for military service (Transylvanian Saxons and Banat Swabians) voluntarily enrolled into the Waffen-SS units (approximately 63,000 people), with several thousand serving in the special units of the SS Security Service (SD-Sonderkommandos), of which at least 2000 ethnic Germans were enrolled in the concentration camps (KZ-Wachkompanien), of which at least 55% served in extermination camps, predominantly in Auschwitz and Lublin. About 15% of the Romanian ethnic Germans who served in the Waffen-SS died in the war, with only a few thousand survivors returning to Romania.

When Romania signed a peace treaty with the Soviets in 1944, the German military began withdrawing the Saxons from Transylvania; this operation was most thorough with the Saxons of the Nösnerland. Around 100,000 Germans fled before the Soviet Red Army, but Romania did not conduct the expulsion of Germans, as did neighboring countries at war's end. However, more than 70,000 Germans from Romania were arrested by the Soviet Army and sent to labor camps in Ukraine for alleged cooperation with Germany.

Because they are considered Auslandsdeutsche ("Germans abroad") by the German government, the Saxons have the right to German citizenship. Numerous Saxons have immigrated to Germany, especially after the fall of the Eastern Bloc in 1989, and are represented by the Association of Transylvanian Saxons in Germany.

Due to this emigration from Romania the population of Saxons is dwindling. At the same time, especially after Romania's accession into NATO and the EU, many Transylvanian Saxons are returning from Germany, reclaiming property lost to the former Communist regime and/or starting up small and medium-sized enterprises. The Saxons remaining in Romania are represented by the Democratic Forum of Germans in Romania, the political party that gave Romania its fifth president, Klaus Iohannis.

"Dear, do I take Holly or Jolly with food?"

In Drabenderhöhe wurde der Evakuierung der Nordsiebenbürger Sachsen vor 75 Jahren gedacht

Mit einer eindrucksvollen Gedenkfeier erinnerten die Stadt Wiehl, die Kreisgruppen Drabenderhöhe und Wiehl-Bielstein sowie der Deutsch-Siebenbürgisch-Rumänische Freundeskreis Wiehl-Bistritz am 5. November im Kulturhaus Drabenderhöhe-Siebenbürgen an die Evakuierung von rund 36 000 Siebenbürger Sachsen im September 1944.

Mit dem Lied "Santichklok" (Sonntagsglocke) eröffnete der Honterus-Chor unter Leitung von Regine Melzer den Abend der Erinnerungen, der auch vom Blasorchester unter Leitung von Jürgen Poschner mitgestaltet wurde. Die Kreisvorsitzenden Anita Gutt und Horst Kessmann begrüßten neben vielen Ehrengästen auch Zeitzeugen, die die Flucht vor 75 Jahren als Kinder erlebten. Dazu gehörten unter anderen Susanne Kräutner, Maria Kirscher, Stefan Poschner, Maria Hartig, Maria Lörinz, Christine Lezanska. Man könne sich heute kaum noch vorstellen, wie die Menschen das überstanden haben, sagte Kessmann. Er appellierte an die jungen Menschen, "das Gedenken aufrecht zu erhalten".

Ein besonderer Gruß und Glückwünsche gingen an Rainer Lehni, der einige Tage zuvor beim Verbandstag zum neuen Bundesvorsitzenden gewählt wurde. Zu seinen ersten Amtshandlungen gehörte der Besuch in Drabenderhöhe. Die Ereignisse vor 75 Jahren seien Beginn einer geschichtlichen Zäsur gewesen mit Flucht, Deportation und dem Ende einer Jahrhunderte alten Geschichte, die mit der Ausreisewelle nach der Wende 1989 noch viele schmerzvolle Erfahrungen beinhalten sollte, sagte Lehni. Er betonte, dass in Nordrhein-Westfalen (Herten, Oberhausen, Setterich, Drabenderhöhe) der höchste Anteil an Siebenbürger Sachsen lebe und "diese weiter mit unserer alten Heimat verbunden sind". Aber, man müsse heute "unsere Traditionen nach Siebenbürgen zurücktragen, weil da kaum noch Landsleute leben".

"Es war, als würde uns das Herz zerbrechen, und uns überfiel zum ersten Mal das Gefühl, heimatlos zu sein", zitierte Wiehls Bürgermeister Ulrich Stücker aus dem Buch "Vergessene Fährten" von Oliver Klöck und Norbert Wallet den damaligen Bürgermeister von Burghalle, Georg Poschner, als er einen letzten Blick von der Budakerhöhe auf sein Dorf zurückwarf. Man könne nur erahnen, mit welchen Emotionen die Menschen die Flucht ins Ungewisse begannen. Dabei seien sie nie weinerlich gewesen, sondern hätten mit Mut, Zuversicht und Hoffnung in die Zukunft geblickt. Heute seien die Siebenbürger mit ihren Traditionen Bereicherung und fester Bestandteil von Wiehl geworden.

Die Hoffnung auf eine baldige Rückkehr habe die Menschen am Leben gehalten, sagte Horst Göbbel aus Nürnberg, der am 2. Oktober 1944 in einem Viehwaggon in Ungarn mit seiner Zwillingsschwester Maria das Licht der Welt erblickte. Maria starb im Alter von acht Monaten. "Manchmal denke ich, ich lebe für sie mit." Als Gastreferent widmete er sich dem Thema "Gedenken mit Zuversicht", beschäftigte sich nur teilweise mit der Flucht 1944. Den Historiker beschäftigte vielmehr die Frage, "was man tue und wie man damit umgehe". Die Ereignisse vor 75 Jahren seien ein einschneidendes historisches Ereignis gewesen und Erinnerungen seien notwendig, aber man müsse auch nach vorne sehen. Er erinnerte an Robert Gassner, der sich während der NS-Zeit im Krieg "nicht nur mit Ruhm bekleckert habe",

aber sich bei der Evakuierung für seine Landsleute stark gemacht und sich vor über 60 Jahren für den Bau der Drabenderhöher Siedlung federführend eingesetzt habe. Dass es die Siebenbürger noch gebe, habe seiner Meinung nach auch damit zu tun, dass sie mit Arbeit, Standhaftigkeit und im Glauben weiter gemacht, auch wenn sie tief am Boden gelegen hätten.

Menschen, die auch heute aus ihrer Heimat flüchten müssten, verdienten Respekt und Solidarität, betonten verschiedene Redner bei der Gedenkfeier, denn es sei für alle ein Aufbruch ins Ungewisse. Dr. Hans Georg Franchy, Vorsitzender des Freundeskreises Wiehl-Bistritz, erinnerte eindringlich daran, dass auch die Siebenbürger damals in Österreich und Deutschland nicht bei jedem willkommen gewesen seien, obwohl "wir deutsch sprachen". Sein Dank ging an Ovidiu Cretu, rumänischer Bürgermeister von Bistritz, der sich mit großem Engagement für die Kultur und Tradition der Siebenbürger einsetze.

"Jedes Jahr im September wandern meine Gedanken nach Botsch", mit diesen Worten begann die 92-jährige Susanna Kräutner ihr Gedicht, in dem sie die Flucht beschreibt, die sie als 17-Jährige mit dem Ochsenkarren erlebte. Sie erhielt ebenso viel Beifall wie der Honterus-Chor und das Blasorchester, die Zeugnis von der lebendigen siebenbürgischen Kultur gaben.

Americans still love Christmas


