Did you know that in order to realign the Roman calendar with the sun, Julius Caesar had to add 90 extra days to the year 46 B.C. when he introduced his new Julian calendar? Throughout ancient times, civilizations around the world developed increasingly sophisticated calendars, typically pinning the first day of the year to an agricultural or astronomical event. For instance, in Egypt, the year began with the annual flooding of the Nile, which coincided with the rising of the star Sirius. The first day of the Chinese New Year occurred with the second new moon after the winter solstice. The early Roman calendar consisted of 10 months and 304 days, with each new year beginning at the vernal equinox. A later king, Numa Pompilius, is credited with adding the months of Januarius and Februarius. Over the centuries, the calendar fell out of sync with the sun, and in 46 B.C. the emperor Julius Caesar decided to solve the problem by consulting with the most prominent astronomers and mathematicians of his time. He introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the more modern Gregorian calendar that most countries around the world use today. As part of his reform, Caesar instituted January 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honor the month's namesake, Janus, the Roman god of beginnings, whose two faces allowed him to look back into the past and forward into the future. Romans celebrated by offering sacrifices to Janus, exchanging gifts, decorating their homes with laurel branches and attending raucous parties. In medieval Europe, Christian leaders temporarily replaced January 1 as the first of the year with days carrying more religious significance, such as December 25 (Jesus' birth date) and March 25 (the Feast of the Annunciation). Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January 1 as New Year's Day in 1582. Until next time....

Low-carb diet? That New Year's Eve party could be dangerous

If you are on a low-carb diet and plan to drink at a New Year's party, here's some advice you may not hear often: Eat carbs.

The fact is that on a lowcarb diet, you are intentionally depleting glycogen and since that high-priority nutrient isn't there, alcohol metabolism will speed up. According to Carb Manager, on a low-carb diet, you might find yourself drunk on half as much alcohol.

So it is best to eat all those carbs you haven't enjoyed for a while before a New Year's Eve party. Eat some bread and pasta before the party. Yes, you won't be in fat-burning mode any more, and, yes, you will be officially off your diet. But chances are that you won't unwittingly get too drunk too fast.

No one should drink on an empty stomach

If you plan to drink, make sure you eat a good dinner that includes bread, pasta, beans, or other carbohydrate-dense foods.

A standard drink has about 14 grams of alcohol. That equals a small glass of wine, a regular beer, or 1.5 ounces of spirits.

Every person's body absorbs that standard drink in a different way, depending on body size and age, with people who larger and older absorbing it slowest.

That means young and small people feel the alcohol quickest. That can be dangerous. Food slows down the absorption of alcohol. Alcohol quickly moves from your mouth to nearly every part of the body. The stomach, bloodstream, liver, kidneys, brain, lungs and skin are all affected by alcohol, according to Healthline. About 20 percent of a alcoholic drink is absorbed by the stomach into the blood. The rest goes to the small intestine, where food makes the biggest difference and can slow down absorption.

Michael Gierscher † 1941-2020

Michael Gierscher was born in the village of Schorsten, Romania in 1941 to Transylvanian Saxon parents who were farmers. Michael's father served in WWII and was killed in the war, and his mother was taken away to a forced labor camp in Russia. Michael lived with his grandmother and attended school through the eighth grade.

Michael emigrated to Cleveland, Ohio in 1965, sponsored by his mother and stepfather, Regina and Andreas Groffner. He married his childhood friend Regina Hihn (who was also a Transylvanian Saxon born in Schorsten) in 1968, adopted Regina's daughter Malwine, and had 2 sons (Michael, Jr. and Martin) with Regina.

Michael worked as a tool and die maker for many years, and owned his own successful business - Albion Machine & Tool Co., Inc. – which was his pride and joy. Michael and his family lived in the Cleveland area for his entire life. Michael sold his business in 2007 and retired in 2012.

Michael was President of the Cleveland Saxon Dance Group for approximately 15 years and tirelessly promoted the Saxon culture in the Cleveland area. He organized numerous cultural exchanges with the Donauschwaben and Schuhplattler dance groups at their respective clubs. Through his efforts, the Cleveland Saxon Dance Group performed at numerous Saxon Heimattags in Cleveland, Detroit, Salem, and Canada, as well as cultural festivals at other venues such as the Polynesian Garden Center in



Hawaii and Epcot Center in Walt Disney World, Florida. Michael also assisted his lifelong friends Stefan Bell and Steve Bencic numerous times in organizing the annual Cleveland Oktoberfest.

Michael was a lifelong member of Branch 1 of the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons and was an active member of the Eintracht Hermania choir for many years. He also served on the Board of Directors for the Cleveland Sachsenheim for approximately 5 years.

MichaelcontractedCOVID-19 and peacefully passed away on December 9, 2020 at age 79, leaving Regina, his spouse of 52 years; 3 children: Malwine (Edmund), Michael, Jr. (Cheryl) and Martin (Theresa); and 9 grandchildren: Erik, Kevin and Alex Kauntz; Audra, Cecilia, Isaak and Charles Gierscher, and Katherine and Emily Gierscher. He enjoyed spending time with his family and grandchildren.

His family will miss him dearly. Michael was laid to rest at Sunset Memorial Park on December 14, 2020 following a private funeral service.

adjustment (COLA) for 2021: 1.3 percent, one of the lowest increases in the program's history, according to CNBC. The increase affects benefits for more than 64 million recipients, according to Forbes. That means that the average retiree receiving \$1,519.07 per month will see an increase of about \$0.65 per day, or a little more than \$237 per year, according to the Greensboro News & Record.

adjustment to the maximum earnings subject to the Social Security tax. Americans will pay the 6.2 percent Social Security tax on all earnings up to \$142,800, a 3.7 percent increase over the previous maximum of \$137,700.

If you receive Social Security benefits and continue to work, you will be able to earn up to \$50,520 in 2021, up from \$48,600. For every \$3 you earn over the limit,

tor in Medicare Part B and Part D premiums. According to an interview in Forbes, Mary Johnson, a policy analyst with the Senior Citizens League says that the increase is disappointingly low compared to 2019's 2.8 percent increase.

The 1.3 percent increase is the third lowest in the last decade, ranking higher than 0.3 percent in 2017 and no increase in 2016. The highest increase of the past decade was 2011, with a 3.6 percent increase.

CHRISTMAS:

Celebration, Legends and Stories

There are so many stories, Saxon and others, that I would like share some of them with you. I have heard the stories of Kris Kringle, putting brightly shined shoes out for placing gifts in them, stockings, gifts of oranges, tangerines, not putting up the Christmas Tree (der Tannenbaum, der Weihnachtsbaum, der Christbaum) until Christmas Eve, ribbon candy, special chocolates, etc. Here are some of the traditions and how they came about. They may not be exactly how you celebrated but they may touch on some of your memories.

Who was this Kris Kringle, St. Nicholas, Santa Claus, Father Christmas, Sinterklass, ChristKind, etc. and how did he become part of the Christmas celebration?

Saint Nicholas was a Bishop who lived in the fourth century. He was a rich man, as his parents died when he was young and left him a lot of money. He was a very kind and enjoyed helping the poor and needy by giving them secret gifts to the people that were in need. In addition, there are many legends about St. Nicholas and it is not known if they are all truth or myth.

One famous story of St. Nicholas explains how the custom of hanging stockings, to put presents in them, first came about. There was a poor man who had three daughters. He was so poor that he did not have the money to offer as a dowry (this is the money paid to a bridegroom by the bride's parents on the wedding day). This is probably how the Bride's parents even today, foot expensive bill for weddings. So, one night Nicholas, knowing the situation, became a secret donor. Nicholas would drop a bag of gold down the chimney and into the house. This would enable the oldest daughter to have a dowry and be able to get married. Rumor has it that the gold was dropped into a stocking that had been hung by the

fire to dry. Again, this happened for the second daughter. The father, curious of what was happening, hid by the fire every evening until he caught Nicholas dropping a bag of gold. Nicholas would beg the man not to tell anyone what he had done because he wanted his good will and gesture to remain anonymous. The father could not keep this kind gesture secret and it became known to everyone. So after that whenever someone received a secret gift, it was thought that it had come from Nicholas. Because of his kindness, Nicholas was made a Saint. I am sure that all fathers of brides today would love to have a St. Nicholas help them out with the huge costs of weddings. I remember a TV show when I was young, called "The Millionaire." A wealthy man would anonymously gift one million dollar, tax free, to an individual. The only restriction was that he could not divulge how he came about receiving the money. If he did he would have to repay the money back to the donor. Nicholas should have had the father sign a document like this. The Millionaire sounds like a variation of the story of Nicholas.

St. Nicholas was not just kind to children only, but to also to sailors. There's a story of some sailors that were caught in a bad storm. The storm was raging around them and everyone was terrified that their ship would be sunk by the tremendous waves battering the ship. They prayed to St. Nicholas to help them. St. Nicholas ordered the sea to be calm, the storm died away, and they were able to sail their ship safely to port. This sounds very familiar to Jesus calming the seas during the storm but in this scenario St. Nicholas gets credit from the sailors.

Was St. Nicholas real? Yes, he definitely was real. Unfortunately, the story does not end well for St. Nicholas. St. Nicholas was exiled and later put into prison during the persecution of Christians by the Roman Emperor Diocletian. No one knows when he died, but it was on December 6th, in either 345 or 352. In 1087, some Italian merchant sailors stole his bones from Turkey. The bones are now kept in the church named after him in the Italian port of Bari. On St. Nicholas day (December 6tH), sailors of Bari still carry his statue from the cathedral out to sea, so that he can bless the waters and give them safe voyages throughout the year. So is it just coincidence that on December 6th, the same day St. Nicholas died, that there is a celebration of the Feast of St. Nicholas occurs in parts of Europe. On the preceding evening, December 5th, Krampus Night or Krampusnacht, the wicked hairy devil appears on the streets. Sometimes St. Nicholas

accompanies him and sometimes he appears on his own. Saint Nicholas on his visits is only concerned with the good children while Krampusnacht (Krampus) is responsible for the bad children. Nicholas gives nice gifts to the good children, while Krampus provides coal and Ruten bundles (birch branches) that he uses to swat the bad children. If that is not scary enough for bad children to be worried about, the picture of Krampus should be. He is described as "half-goat, half-demon, hairy, cloven hooves, long pointed tongue and fangs." And, if that still doesn't scare the bad children, Krampus has a large bag and possibly cart, that he would put the bad children in, to be taken away for drowning, to be eaten or taken to hell. Well if that had been added to the story of naughty or nice lists you wouldn't have had to tell me to be good a second time. I am glad they kept that celebration in Europe.

Ațel / Hetzeldorf

The importance of the village of Atel in the Middle Age results from its Gothic basilica which was built in several phases, boasting a transept, a sacristy, and a western tower. The impressive stone carvings on the pillars of the middle nave originate from the first building phase in 1380, while the rich decorated western portal might have been added in the second building phase at the beginning of the 15th century, when the fortification wall was built. In 1499 the third building phase was completed with the construction of the vaults above the naves, the heightening of the chancel and the building of the upper floors on the tower. Inside the church, beside the magnificent capitals of the pillars one can admire, the late Gothic sedilia and the finely crafted portal of the sacristy are very remarkable. The chancel boasts a pew with carvings and inlay work dating back to 1516.

Place and surroundings

Johannes Klatt, better known as Hansi, has been for many decades the castle guardian of Atel. He rings the bells three times every day. His job is particularly hard if one of the villagers dies. The bells have to be rung for a full hour, which is strenuous work, while the bell ropes in the tower will pull Hansi up and down. If a storm is approaching he will rush to the tower and ring the bells until the threatening clouds have passed. In his way Hansi is protecting the village from many dangers.Once in a while he will climb the steep wooden stairs to the top of the tower, passing Gothic windows, which were bricked up many years ago when Atel was still threatened by the socalled "runners" and "burners". From the height of the defense platform he will let his eyes wander over the red and brown roofs of the village, then follow the bends of the road, which disappears between the vineyards to the north. No enemies are to be seen nowadays, only tourists from time to time.
