Transylvanian Saxon

Trivia: It has been documented in various writings that the Saxons being a minority ethnic group in Romania has played a very important role in strengthening Romanian-German relations. According to a document written in 2017 by some Romanian scholars, Romanians have recognized the important contributions made by outstanding Saxons such as: Hermann Oberth (physicist); Franz Binder (explorer); Erich Bergel, Carl Fritsch and Wilhelm Georg Berger (musicians); Herman Fabini (architect); Stephan Ludwig Roth and **Ernst Wagner (historians)**; Franz Friedrich Fronius (biologist and ethnologist); Joseph Haltrich (ethnographer); Horst Klusch (chemist); Erwin Wittstock, Hans **Gerger and Oscar Pastior** (writers); Hans Otto Roth and Christian Tell (politicians); Hans Mattis Teutsch (painter), and others. The most famous Saxons were Johannes Honterus, hu-

manist, and Samuel von Brukenthal, politician and the current President of Romania Klaus Johannis. The Saxons are very much interested in documenting history and have written over 6,000 history works. In addition, the economic importance of the Saxon community, which in 1934 only represented 1.37% of the country's population, their investment in industry amounted to one-third of the Romanian state's budget that year. This is why attempts are being made to preserve the German spirit in Romania by promoting education in the German language, creating partnerships with towns and institutions from German=speaking countries. The strong work ethics and intellectual attributes of the Transylvanian Saxons has proven valuable to the advancement of Romania.

To the ATS membership and friends, I send my warmest wishes for a Happy, Healthy New Year! I thank you for your support and contributions this past year. In 2020, let us share Saxon Gemütlichkeit with one another and throughout our communities. Ich wünsche Ihnen ein gesundes und erfolgreiches neues Jahr.

Thankfully, there's no shortage of ideas online, and Epicurious is among those with dozens of suggestions. Next time you need some kid-friendly vegetarian options, consider these:

- Cauliflower-carrot cheesy tot: a variation on the tater tot that looks so similar, you just might fool 'em. Plus they're cheesy. Plus ketchup.
- Fresh corn quiche: a store-bought pie shell makes it easy, and the custard with fresh corn kernels makes it delicious.
- Flatbread caprese: cherry tomatoes and fresh mozzarella on a homemade or store-bought flatbread. Move over, kids.
- Jackfruit tacos: what fruit? When ripe, jackfruit resembles a mango or banana-type flavor. Unripe, some have described it as asparaguslike; scores of vegans apparently liken the unripe version to pulled pork, according to Epicurious. Regardless, try it in a taco shell with salsa and guacamole.
- Air fryer crispy herbed chickpeas: an addictively crunchy snack.

We all want to thank the ATS for their generous check. We are truly grateful for their thoughtfulness.


Now here is my New Year's resolution. I will get our report into the office ON TIME. I hope I do better with this resolution than I do with the one to diet.





Tips to keep your cat happy indoors

Whether it's for your cat's safety or for the neighborhood birds' safety, we have a number of reasons to keep our feline family members inside.

Trouble is, it can get boring indoors. And as much as cats like to sleep, they do need some playtime and mental stimulation. So what to do?

The Humane Society offers tips for keeping your cat happy inside:

- Start young. Kittens who grow up indoors are typically happy to stay inside.
- Screened porch. Let your cat onto a screened-in porch to get a feel for the great outdoors without the risk. If you are able, consider building a "catio," or a screenedin area dedicated solely to the kitties.
- Take a walk. It can take a bit of adjustment and training, but cats can be walked on a leash same as a dog can. But speaking of dogs, scout the neighborhood for threats before heading out.
- Window perches. Let your cat bliss out in a sunny window.
- Toys and playtime. Give them plenty of both and you won't have nearly as much trouble with your cats getting antsy (and destructive).
- Cat condos. Also called cat trees, they allow your cat some space to climb, play, and chill. Place it next to a window for even more interest.

Start the New Year with a survey of your fitness levels

These four numbers give you a snapshot of your health

With so much health advice in the news today, just thinking about what you should or should not be doing can be a dizzying prospect. Harvard doctors agree that health can be an overwhelming topic. But they say that if you have a handle on these four numbers, you can have a pretty good idea of where you stand and what to do about it.

1. Your body mass index (BMI). Many people are overweight and don't think they are. The health risks climb when you reach the overweight level. Here's what they mean:

Underweight is a BMI of less than 18.5, and normal weight is a BMI of 18.5 to 24.9.

Overweight is a BMI of 25 to 29.9, and obesity is a BMI of 30 or over. If your calculation shows more than 24.9, it's time to lose weight. To get a fast BMI rating, see nhlbisupport.com/bmi/bmi-calc.htm. Just enter your height and weight.

2. Your blood pressure. Ideally, it should be 120/80 or below. Starting at 115/75, the risk for heart attack, stroke, and other cardiovascular disease doubles with each increment of 20/10.

People with systolic blood pressure (the first number) of 120 to 139 or a diastolic of 80 to 90 are "prehypertensive." Changes in diet and activity patterns can help prevent cardiovascular disease at this level.

- 3. Your fasting glucose. If you have two fasting plasma glucose measurements of 126 mg/dL or greater, you have diabetes.
- 4. Your LDL cholesterol level. Your bad cholesterol reading should be below 100, but 70 is better. Diet, exercise, and medications like statins, or all three, can lower your LDL, reducing your heart disease risk by about a third.

DIE DEUTSCHE SEITE

Zeitzeugen berichten über den großen Treck von 1944

Beim Herannahen der Roten Armee im September 1944 erfolgte die Evakuierung der Siebenbürger Sachsen aus Nordsiebenbürgen sowie einiger angrenzenden Gemeinden aus Südsiebenbürgen. Etwa 36000 Menschen hatten die Flucht ergriffen, die sich in diesem Jahr zum 75. Mal jährt.

Es war die einzige, planmäßig und langfristig vorbereitete und organisierte Aussiedlung von Deutschen in den Kriegsjahren. Robert Gassner (1910-1990), vielen als "Vater der Siebenbürger Sachsen-Siedlung in Drabenderhöhe" bekannt, war einer der Treckführer und Organisatoren der Flucht. In Botsch wurde er unter anderem von Lehrer Richard Engler und Prediger Johann Hartig unterstützt.

Der Tag, an dem die siebenbürgische Bevölkerung ihre geliebten Dörfer und Häuser verlassen musste, spielte sich in den 34 Orten ähnlich ab: Eine Stunde, bevor sich der Treck in Bewegung setzte, wurde in einem letzten Gottesdienst um Gottes Geleit gebetet und unter Glockengeläut, das erst verklang als auch der letzte Wagen nicht mehr zu sehen war, zogen die Deutschen ins Ungewisse. Nur 48 Stunden vorher hatte die Bevölkerung genaue Angaben über den Verlauf der Evakuierung erhalten.

Botsch, 12. September 1944: Laut trommelnd läuft der Gemeindediener durch das Dorf. Er gibt bekannt, dass das Verlassen der Höfe zu erfolgen habe, weil "der Russe vor der Tür steht". Die Glocken der Kirche rufen zum Abschiedsgottesdienst, in dem schnell noch ein drei Wochen altes Baby getauft wird. Tränen und Verzweiflung der Menschen, die ihre Heimat verlassen mussten, haben sich tief in die Erinnerung von Susanna Kräutner (92) und ihrem Cousin Michael Hartig (89) eingebrannt.

"Es war ein unbeschreibliches Leid. Frauen und Kinder weinten. Die Älteren klammerten sich im Haus fest, wollten nicht weg. Brüllend laufen Kühe, Schweine und Schafe durch das Dorf. Die Bauern haben die Tiere rausgetrieben, damit sie in den Ställen nicht verhungern. Sie sollen sich ihr Futter auf den Feldern suchen. Überall auf den Straßen Militärfahrzeuge. Die damals 17-jährige Susanna und der 14-jährige Michael, deren Väter Johann und Michael Hartig Brüder waren, denken, es gehe nur, ,für einige Tage hoch in die Karpaten, um sich zu verstecken". Keiner ahnt, dass es für viele eine Flucht ohne Wiederkehr sein würde.

Das Nötigste wird auf Planwagen gepackt: Essen, Decken, Bekleidung. Susanna lenkt den Ochsenkarren, auf dem sie und ihre Mutter sitzen. "Ich kannte die Tiere von der Feldarbeit, konnte mit ihnen umgehen." Vater

Johann nimmt den Pferdewagen, auf dem der kranke Großvater gebettet wird. Unter Glockengeläut öffnen sich die Tore vor den Häusern. Wagen für Wagen – rund 600 – rollen auf die Straßen. Der Weg ins Ungewisse beginnt. Keiner ahnt, dass die Flucht über Ungarn nach Österreich geht und zwei Monate dauert. Völlig entkräftet erreichen die Botscher am 2. November das österreichische St. Pölten. Am nächsten Tag fällt Schnee. "Wir dankten Gott, dass wir ein Dach über dem Kopf hatten."

Wochen voller Leid und Qual liegen hinter den Menschen

Einige sterben, so wie der Großvater von Susanna und Michael. Die Strapazen der Flucht sind zu groß. Er wird bei Budapest begraben. Die meisten Frauen sind die weit über tausend Kilometer von Siebenbürgen nach Österreich zu Fuß gelaufen. Den Platz auf den Wagen haben sie den Alten, Gebrechlichen und kleinen Kindern überlassen. Die verzagten und gequälten Gesichter der Frauen sehen Kräutner und Hartig heute ebenso vor sich wie Wagen, die auseinander brechen, Pferde mit abgelaufenen Hufen und die wunden Klauen der Ochsen. "Und immer wieder Tiefflieger, vor denen wir uns verstecken müssen. Bei Dunkelheit darf kein Feuer brennen. Nachts schlafen die älteren Kinder und Männer auf Stroh unter den Wagen, Mütter mit Babys, Kleinkinder und Greise dürfen oben liegen.

Susanna Kräutner: "Nahe der Donau hieß es, die Russen sind schon hinter uns. Wenn sie uns einholen, treiben sie uns in den Fluss. Die Angst saß mir im Nacken und ich schlug unbarmherzig mit der Peitsche auf die armen Ochsen ein, die kaum noch laufen konnten. In meinem Kopf hämmerte es: "Lauft, lauft, lauft, wir müssen die Brücken passieren, bevor sie gesprengt werden." Ihr Flehen wird erhört. Bei Estergom überqueren sie die Donau. "Die Flucht war für uns Kinder in dem Alter eher ein Abenteuer", sagt Michael Hartig. Wir haben unterwegs die Felder geplündert, da gab es reichlich Obst, Gemüse und auch Mais für die Pferde. Abends suchten wir Feuerholz. Mein Vater war Metzger, schlachtete hier und da eine der mitgeführten Kühe, und verteilte das Fleisch an Familien."

"Wir mussten auf den eigenen Weinbergen als Knechte arbeiten"

Bei den österreichischen Bauern arbeiteten Susanna und Michael auf dem Feld, fühlen sich sicher und geborgen. Viele Siebenbürger haben den Wunsch, nach dem Krieg wieder zurück in die alte Heimat zu gehen, so auch die Eltern der damals 17-jährigen. "Das war ein Fehler. Als wir im Juni 1945 nach Botsch zurückkamen, erlebten wir eine böse Überraschung: In unseren Häusern lebten Rumänen, Sinti und Roma. Siebenbürgische Familien wurden aufgenommen, wenn sie sich verpflichteten für diese Leute zu arbeiten. "Wir mussten in unseren eigenen Weinbergen als Knechte arbeiten", erzählt Susanna Kräutner. Erst 1977 kann die Familie, "nach vielen Kämpfen" Siebenbürgen verlassen und findet in Drabenderhöhe eine neue Heimat. Erlebnisse und Erinnerungen verarbeitet die alte Dame bis heute in Gedichten und Geschichten, die auch veröffentlicht wurden.

Michael Hartig blieb in Österreich

"Ich habe in meinem Leben viel auf den Weg bringen dürfen, das ist ein schönes Gefühl", sagt Michael Hartig, der nach dem Krieg in Österreich blieb und im Rahmen der Bergbau-Aktion 1957 ins Ruhrgebiet nach Herten ging und 1967 nach Drabenderhöhe kam. Als Ingenieur arbeitete er unter anderen in Ländern wie Kenia, Madagaskar und Sudan. Von 1980 bis 1993 war er Leiter des Drabenderhöher Altenheims und 14 Jahre Mitglied des Presbyteriums. Er war Musiker mit Leib und Seele, spielte Flügelhorn und Trompete. 1972 übernahm er als Nachfolger von Robert Gassner das Dirigat über das Blasorchester Siebenbürgen-Drabenderhöhe. In den 90er Jahren sammelte er bei seinen Landsleuten weltweit Spenden für die Renovierung der Botscher Kirche und das Pfarrhaus.

Franchys gehörten zu den Familien, Kurt Franchy erlebte als Neun- die nach dem Krieg zurück nach Siebenbürgen müssen. Ein beschwerlicher Weg mit der hochschwangeren Mutter, zwei kleinen Geschwistern und den alten Großeltern. Hunger, Angst und Krankheit begleiten das Kind, und dennoch: "Als Großer" in der Familie sorgt er für Nahrung, bettelt bei Soldaten um etwas Milch für Hans Georg, der schwächlich und krank ist. Nach Monaten treffen sie in Bistritz ein, wohnen jetzt bei den Großeltern. Eine Woche nach Rückkehr wird ein kleiner Bruder geboren.
