Since 1960 Schloss Horneck has housed the Siebenbürger Museum, Siebenbürger the Library and Archive, the Siebenbürger-Institut and is the base for many Saxon organizations. A seniors home is also located on the property. Last September the Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland purchased the property for one million Euro.



Donations were received from individuals and organizations to help fund the purchase of the property. The purchase of Schloss Horneck gives the Siebenbürger Saxons throughout the world a central location where Saxon artifacts, books and other historical documents can be collected and stored to preserve our ethnic history for many years.

There is great news from Germany for the Transylvanian Saxon culture center in Germany, Schloss Horneck. The **Budget Committee of the German Bundestag in its meeting** of November 10, 2016 has granted 1.9 million Euros to assist in renovations of Schloss Horneck, home of the Siebenbürger Museum, Library and Archives, that will assist in new functionality of the facilities by modernizing it for meeting place for new exhibitions, concerts, lectures, etc. We can be grateful for the efforts of Dr. Bernd Fabritius, Chairman of the Federation of Transylvanian Saxons. Dr. Fabritius is a member of the German Bundestag since 2013 and currently serves as the Chairman of the Federation of Expellees (BdV).

Transylvanian Saxon Trivia: A communist government took over Romania in March of 1945. King Michael of Hohenzollern had to leave the country in December 1947. The economy was placed under state control. Private and religious schools were dissolved. First steps were taken to socialize agriculture. Approximately 60,000 Saxon farmers lost their farms during the agricultural reform. They had to leave their farms and only received them back totally dilapidated in the mid 1950's. In cities, industries and banks were placed under state control as well as the dissolution of tradesmen and merchants associations. Their homes changed ownership. The Saxons were specifically excluded from the promised rights for minorities in 1945 and were not allowed to vote. Following the Potsdam Agreement, there was a mass expulsion of Germans from Eastern Europe, the Saxons in Romania were the only German community not subjected to this atrocity.

To our membership and friends, I send my warmest wishes for a Happy, Healthy, and Productive New Year! Let's share our Saxon Gemütlichkeit with one another and throughout our communities.

Three questions to identify fake debt collectors

Debt collection scammers abound and can cause massive problems once they get you to pay them or reveal personal information.

But you can identify an actual debt collector with three simple questions, according to the simple dollar. com:

1 What is the name, address, and phone number of the company you are calling from?

They ought to be able to tell you that, after all. Once answered, tell them to send you a validation notice. Don't discuss the bill.

2 What is the name and address of the debtor you are trying to reach?

Legitimate debt collectors will know that If the information they give is wrong, do not correct them Tell them to send a validation notice to the address on file. Then hang up.

3 What are the last four digits of the debtor's social security number?

Trick question. Legit debt collectors won't answer this because it violates the law.

High-fat equals low fat?

The more fat in a child's milk, the lower the child's body mass and the


higher the vitamin D levels.

So say researchers at the University of Toronto whosestudy, published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition,

found that,

instead of getting fatter drinking highfat milk, kids actually showed lower body mass.

Another striking finding was that kids who drank whole milk had higher vitamin D levels, suggesting that the vitamin is better absorbed with fat.



Making your resolutions successful!

Two words sum up New Year's Resolutions: Faith and Gym.

According to LifeWay Research, a 2015 study show that 57 percent of Americans made a health resolution while 52 percent made a faith resolution.

Those top two topics lead five categories of New Year's resolutions.

About 43 percent of respondents in the telephone survey, cited use of time as an important resolution. That was followed closely by improving relationships with family (42 percent) and working on finances (37 percent). One third of respondents wanted to improve a relationship with a friend.

If you are one of the 75 percent of people who have failed to follow a resolution, you might want to reframe and readjust your new year vow.

According to Christine Koh and Asha Dornfest, authors of Edit Your Life podcast, try using a different word for resolution. Try thinking of your resolutions as intentions or directions about where you will take the year. If you think of them that way, then you may find yourself broadening your aims. Instead of vowing 'run one mile a day,' maybe what you really want to do is spend 30 minutes in dedicated exercise.

No matter what your goals,

If you want to exercise, but you never have actually done it, maybe your resolution should be to just put on your exercise clothes at a specific time every day. Or just exercise for five minutes. That easy vow will get you started.

Dornfest recommends you get a confidant to talk with you about pursuing your resolutions. The same person might not be perfect for all your resolutions, though.

Koh advises building failure into resolutions. Hey, you are never going to be perfect. If or when you slip up, how will you address the problem? Build in a 'start again' plan.

Implant may solve paralysis

Partially paralyzed Rhesus monkeys can now walk, thanks to a brain implant. The device is designed to send messages from the brain to an implant in the monkeys' spines, positioned at the eighth spot to control the monkeys' affected legs.

According to a study published in "Nature," the monkeys were able to walk on a treadmill six days after the start of the experiment.

Researchers say it could be possible to see clinical testing on humans in the near future.

Kirchenburgen begehrt bei Kulturreisenden

Rumänien und speziell Siebenbürgen liegen 2016 im Trend der Kulturreisenden. Das hat seine Ursache in der gespannten politischen Weltlage, aber auch in der stetigen Professionalisierung der Bewerbung der Kirchenburgen und deren Angebot vor Ort. Dazu hat das Projekt "Entdecke die Seele Siebenbürgens" der Evangelischen Kirche A.B. in Rumänien, in dem sich in den letzten fünf Jahren immer mehr Kirchen und Burgen zusammengeschlossen haben, wesentlich beigetragen. In der Saison 2016 präsentierten sich 51 Kirchen und Kirchenburgen gemeinsam in diesem Projekt, für 2017 haben sich weitere sechs angemeldet.

Dass die Kirchenburgen bei Kulturreisenden hoch im Kurs stehen, lässt sich am Ende der diesjährigen Saison mit Ziffern belegen. Wurden in 2015 rund 530000 Besuche in den Kirchenburgen in Siebenbürgen gezählt, so wurde 2016 die Marke von 652000 Besuchen erreicht. Das ist eine Steigerung von gut 22 Prozent gegenüber dem Vorjahr. Diese Verdichtung der Saison ist auch jenseits der Ziffern spürbar, da aus vielen Quellen die Meldung kommt, dass der Kirchenburgenbesuch unabhängiger von der Sommersaison geworden ist. Und das ist eine gute Nachricht, da sie die Voraussetzung dafür ist, das Personal konstant beschäftigen zu können. Sicher gibt es innerhalb der Kirchenburgenlandschaft große Unterschiede. Auf der einen Seite fallen die großen Stadtkirchen, allen voran die Schwarze Kirche Kronstadt und die Stadtpfarrkirche Hermannstadt, stark ins Gewicht. Andererseits gibt es Kirchenburgen, die im ganzen Jahr keine hundert Besucher haben. Diese Feststellungen beziehen sich auf den Besuch der 51 Kirchen und Burgen, die sich unter dem Leitsatz "Entdecke die Seele Siebenbürgens" zusammengeschlossen haben. Zu der Landschaft gehören weitere 110 Kirchenburgen, die aber nur sporadisch geöffnet sind und diese Trendaussagen kaum ändern. Bei der Zählung der Besucher handelt es sich lediglich um die touristischen Besucher und nicht um die Teilnehmer an Veranstaltungen, Gottesdiensten und Konzerten, die man noch hinzu addieren könnte.

Von April bis Oktober 2016 wurden folgende mittelalterlichen, evangelischen Kirchen und Kirchenburgen am meisten besucht: 1. Schwarze Kirche Kronstadt (211042), 2. Stadtpfarrkirche Hermannstadt (98850), 3. Kirchenburg Tart-



lau (56115), 4. Kirchenburg Birthälm (55798), 5. Bergkirche Schäßburg (45576), 6. Kirchenburg Deutsch-Weißkirch (30771), 7. Kirchenburg Honigberg (25005), 8. Klosterkirche Schäßburg (20982), 9. Kirchenburg Michelsberg (16981). Alle anderen liegen unter 10000 Besuchern.

Mit dem Kirchenburgenpass, genannt Transilvania Card, wurden in der Saison 2016 rund 16500 Besuche gemacht, was bedeutet, dass 2,5% der Besucher dieses Instrument genutzt haben. Es zeichnet sich auch ab, dass der Anteil der Besucher aus dem Inland wächst und der Anteil der deutschspra-

chigen ausländischen Besucher abnimmt. Die Besucherzahlen aus Polen, Israel, England und Japan nehmen hingegen stark zu. Für ihren Einsatz, um die Kirchenburgen sichtbarer zu machen und sie den Interessenten näher zu bringen, sei allen implizierten Mitarbeiter gedankt. Nun gilt es, die Saison 2017 vorzubereiten.

Cabbage-sausage casserole brings luck for the New Year



Tradition has long held, especially in the southern United States, that cabbage should be eaten for good luck on New Year's Day.

But, in fact, cabbage and other greens are worldwide choices for luck and prosperity for the new year.

Cabbage (and another New Year favorite, black-eyed peas) was a great boon in the southern U.S. after the Civil War when food was scarce. A late, cold-friendly crop, it could be harvested right into January.

But you find cabbage pop up in other cultures, too. The German tradition of eating New Year sauerkraut (pickled cabbage) is one of the most famous.

This lovely New Year's day dish goes well with pork roast or black-eyed peas and ham. You can serve this dish with a sprinkling of your favorite shredded cheese and a nice warm crusty bread.

New Year's Day Cabbage Casserole

- 1 pound of sausage 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 large head of cabbage, chopped

- 1 can of cream of chicken
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
 - 1/8 teaspoon white pepper 1 teaspoon salt

Generously grease a 10X10 or 13X9 casserole and set aside. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a large pan, over medium heat, brown sausage until almost completely cooked through. Add the onion and continue to saute for about five minutes, or until the onions begin to turn translucent.

Add cabbage to the mixture, a little at a time if necessary, and saute 5-7 minutes or just until it begins to wilt and reduce. Add the cream of chicken soup, crushed red pepper flakes, white pepper and salt, stirring to incorporate throughout the whole dish and continue cooking for about two minutes.

Transfer entire mixture into the casserole dish, cover tightly with heavy foil and bake for one hour. Remove from oven, stir to mix everything, as there is a thick sauce that is made during the bake time, and allow to cool for 10 minutes before serving. Serves 6-8.

Prepare one day at a time as follows:


