PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

Please remember to support your local Branch or clubhouse if they are open for business. Some are open on a full-time basis while others are open a couple days a week. They need our continued support to survive this ongoing pandemic.

A reminder for our members who are high school seniors and college students: the deadline to request a scholarship application is March 15th. The completed applications must be received in the ATS Home Office by April 15th. We've had quite a few requests received so far as well as completed applications returned. We don't want any eligible members to miss out on this wonderful opportunity. Scholarships are just one of many benefits that the ATS offers its members.

Did you know that March is Women's History Month? It is a celebration of women's contributions to history, culture, and society and is observed annually in the month of March in the United States. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation and declared the week of March 8 as National Women's History week. Congress followed this up the next year by establishing a national celebration. In 1987, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March. Years ago, when I was on the Board of Directors of the YWCA in Alliance, one of our projects was to donate books to the local school libraries during the month of March. The books were either written by influential women or about them.

Some well-known and not-so-well-known women in American history include: Susan B. Anthony (suffragist), Elizabeth Blackwell (first woman to graduate from medical school and become a doctor in the United States - 1849), Mary Walton (inventor who was awarded two patents for pollution-reducing devices – 1879 & 1881), Mary Anderson (inventor of the windshield wiper blade - 1903), Jeannette Rankin of Montana (first woman elected to Congress as a member of the House of Representatives - Nov, 1916), Amelia Earhart (first woman and second pilot ever to fly solo nonstop across the Atlantic – May, 1932), Frances Perkins (first woman Cabinet member in the U.S. and served as FDR's Secretary of Labor - 1933 to 1945), Virginia Apgar (American physician and inventor of the Apgar Score, assessing the health of newborns to combat infant mortality - 1952), Rosa Parks (launched civil rights movement – Dec, 1955), Sandra Day O'Connor (first woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court -July, 1981), and Sally Ride (first American woman in space - June, 1983). And of course, the recent election of Kamala Harris as the Vice President of the United States. Remember, though, you don't need to be an important person in history. Just be important to your family and friends.

How to say no

An old adage says that the most successful people aren't those who say yes most often, but those who say no.

It makes sense: "No" is a means of prioritizing one's time (or even money), deciding where it's best spent and with whom. Yet "no" can be really difficult in a culture that seems to value those who add to their plates instead of lighten

And while some people will advise you that "No is a complete sentence" -- meaning, we don't always need a grand excuse, explanation, or disclaimers -it's still a good idea to be polite. So how can we get in the habit of politely declining requests that come our way?

Here are some tips:

- · Keep it clear and concise. You want to avoid being hounded, and the people asking likely want to avoid being the hounder.
- Avoid the silent treatment. Have you ever wished someone would have just said no rather than avoiding you? Yeah, that stinks. Don't be that person.
- Offer an alternative. In business, this can mean a referral elsewhere. At work, it can be a suggestion for how to get something done another way. In your personal life, perhaps another day or location is better.
- Set ground rules for yourself in advance. It's easier to say no when you've established boundaries for yourself and don't have to take each decision on a caseby-case basis. For example, you might decide that you always work out first thing in the morning -- so your calendar is already blocked off and you've mentally committed yourself to something.
- Say thank you. This isn't a must, but it's often appreciated. A thank you for the offer, the opportunity, for thinking of you, etc. -- followed by a polite decline.

RELIGIOUS HISTORY TRANSYLVANIA

So Why Are So Many Transylvanian Saxons Lutheran-Part 3?

There were many different groups that helped to determine or could have determined the religious beliefs of the people of Transylvania. We have the Ottoman Empire (Islam), Holy Roman Catholic Empire, Martin Luther, the Calvinist-Unitarian Movement and influence of Germany.

The next area of interest in the Lutheran religion and the Calvin/Unitarian movements and doctrines.

Transylvania and other neighboring areas had been Roman Catholic for more than five hundred years.

The Reformation was in full motion. Martin Luther challenged the centuries old Catholic Church. Why was the Reformation so popular? Martin Luther recognized that many people disliked the widespread corruption within the church and were eager for reform.

Martin Luther's criticisms struck a nerve and poor German peasants took up arms against their wealthy landowners. Known as the Peasant War, this revolt was unorganized and lacked strong leadership. The government armies quickly crushed the uprising. Martin Luther did not support the uprising as he said they were

doing this only for economic gain. As a result, Luther lost the support of some of the social reformers.

Regardless, Luther's ideas became popular with the German princes. Luther did not believe that the church should own property. Also, he thought that rulers should appoint clergy members. Luther favored a more powerful role for rulers and weaker church authority. Many German princes who wanted freedom from the Pope's authority favored Protestantism. There was a war between Catholic and Protestant princes. In 1555, a compromise called the Peace of Augsburg was reached. The compromise would let Protestant princes to decide which religion would be allowed in their governing area. This would open the door for the Reformation, which would eventually spread across many areas including Transylvania.

In addition, to Luther's criticism of the corruption of the Catholic Church he promoted several premises in essays. In Paul's letter to the Romans, Luther said 'The path to God is through faith alone, forgiveness was not something the church could grant, nor was it something individuals could achieve on their own." Instead, it was given by God to each person who accepted God. This theory became known as "justification by faith", meaning that a person could be made good by their faith and acceptance of God.

So that was that, and Lutherans would now replace the Catholic Church in many places and especially Transylvania, or would they?

Reformation opened the door for many ideas and religious beliefs.

Some of the other ideas, religions or beliefs that followed, as parts of the reformation were Unitarianism and Calvinism.

Calvinism.
Calvinism was a religious movement that began with John Calvin. Calvin's movement was a religious movement that followed the teachings of the Bible but also followed the idea of Predestination. In his belief, he did not believe that all people were created equal. He believed that some are preordained to eternal life and others are destined to eternal damnation. In other

words whatever happens to you in life does not affect which way you go because you are already predestined for eternal life or eternal damnation. Calvinism is a religious movement that follows Calvin and his teachings as much as God.

Unitarianism has a dramatically different theory about religion. Unitarianism is a theological movement based on the belief that the God in Christianity is one entity, as opposed to the Trinity of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. They believed that Jesus was inspired by God in his moral teachings, and an example of the better life all could lead, but he was not a deity or God incarnate. Another area where Unitarianism differed was the infallibility of the teachings of the Bible. They believed they could achieve forgiveness through the way they lived versus as a gift that was bestowed by God only. Additionally, area that created a stir was that they believed a denial that prayer should be addressed to Christ.

For years there would be differences in theology, practices and beliefs between the religious groups. Some of the differences to be noted were the beliefs by Luther that the Lord's Supper was to be taken literally that you were receiving the body and blood of Christ versus or just spiritually as a symbol as Calvin would teach. The teaching of Calvinism spread into to Hungary and threatened to spread to Transylvania.

There were many religious leaders on all sides that promoted their beliefs and would try to sway the masses to follow their theology, doctrines and teachings. There would be requests to have synods where the differing opinions could be presented in debates, in order to sway individuals to follow each other's religious position.

The division and bickering between the religious factions caused a serious crisis. In 1568, John Sigismund, Unitarian King of Transylvania, granted religious freedom to Catholics, Lutherans, the Reformed Church (Calvinism) and Unitarians. In 1571, the Transylvanian Diet gave constitutional recognition to all four religions. Sigismund's successor, Stephen Bathory, forbid further changes in doctrine from beliefs held during Sigismund's reign.

Martin Luther and Lutheranism would prevail with Transylvanian Saxons after all the bickering and fight-


The Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons is looking for members to share their family's personal story of life in Transylvania and their journey to America.



The other religions would still exist but the Saxons overwhelmingly adopted Lutheranism.

Above the previous Romanesque construction, a Gothic hall church with polygonal chancel was erected in the first half of the 15th century. No tower was added to the church, but the hall was heightened by half its size and covered with a lierne vault. Above the chancel that boasts its groin vault, three massive defence levels and a timber frame parapet walk were built. In the 15th and 16th century the church was protected by a wall and several defensive towers, of which only the southern tower, serving both as a gate and a bell tower still exists. Later the town hall was even located here. The defensive systems of the chancel were dismantled in the 19th century and replaced by a high-hipped roof. On the western facade the probably Romanesque painted portal was exposed. The organ, the pulpit and the altar were set up in the second half of the 18th century and the pews and the tabernacle are Gothic. The sedilia with round arches originate from the Romanesque construction phase.

Place and surroundings

"The miracle of the fiery water", "The field of salt" or the "Strange crater" are just a few of the places worth seeing in Bazna. It is said that, long ago, a group of shepherds who were resting near a lake close to the village decided to withstand the freezing cold of the night by making a fire. But as the first spark of the shy fire shed its light on the tired faces of the men, the looks changed into perplexity and terror: a spark touched the water surface, and instead of drowning and dying it increased and spread out and, within a few seconds, the red water of the lake was caught up in waves of fire. This happening caused so much rumour that even the count Valentin Frank von Frankenstein presents it in his lyrical writings. Years later, the phenomenon could, of course, be scientifically explained: salty water contains inflammable gasses, which have made Bazna famous in our times. The bathing places with their physiotherapeutic springs, the natural environment, the fortified church, the park – all of them offer both peace and adventure, relaxation and activity, to suit the taste of each visitor.

Genealogy: How to solve that family puzzle

If you dig into your family history, you'll find surprises and some disappointments, but you'll have the satisfying feeling of knowing the people and places that make up your family history.

On the disappointing side, that family story about Grandma being Cherokee? It's almost certainly not true in any way, unless you are a tribal member now. But the surprises could be many. You may be a bricklayer and find out your greatgreat grandfather was also a bricklayer in 1850.

Genealogy is a great puzzle, but it is not as difficult as it may seem.

Most people can easily trace their ancestors to 1870 in census records, all available online. The 1890 census was mostly destroyed by fire, so that might be a hindrance, but many other records exist.

If you get earlier than 1850, the census just lists by name the head of household (usually male but not always) and no other members of the family.

When you hit snags, think broadly about where your family could be. Males in 1860 usually had something to do with the Civil War.



Search war records. Communities from the 1790s and earlier are almost certainly clustered on the East Coast to Virginia and to Georgia and other states in the South.

Some family lines are easier to trace than others. If your people were known to be Quakers, you will be lucky indeed, since the Quaker records list whole families for decades, and even include stories. The same is true of Mormons. Another example are the German families who traveled to the U.S. from Hungary around the 1900s. These records are very detailed and widely available. If you know your ancestors were here during the American Revolution, don't miss the records of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

A good genealogy program will let you easily add footnotes about where you found your information -- this will be crucial as your tree expands. Online sites are also helpful including ancestry.com and familyhistory.com
