together for church service followed by the Kundgebung and afternoon festivities. The ATS Board of Directors are encouraging our members to take part in this special annual event that recognizes our Transylvanian Saxon culture. It is a celebration that we should all be proud of taking part in and help in supporting our cultural groups that represent our heritage.

Transylvanian Saxon Trivia: The Transylvanian Saxons had great skills and abilities to build stone fortresses which brought them several special privileges, including administrative autonomy that in a Europe that was ruled by monarchies, was unrivaled. Among other privileges, they had their own judges that were able to apply capital judgements when compared to other nationalities that were subordinated to a royal judge. This right was portrayed in the citadel's architecture, with four turrets adorning the roof of the citadel's church tower, such as in Mediasch, or the defensive clock tower in Schässburg or one of the main entrances of medieval Kronstadt, the Ecaterina Gate which was built in 1559 and the only original city gate to have survived. When I saw this gate on my visit to Kronstadt, I thought that it reminded me of the entrance to Disney castle. I was told that during the Saxon rule of the 13th to 17th century Romanians were forbidden from owning property inside the fortress

walls and such they settled outside the wall in the neighborhood named Scheii Brasovului. Though at that time there were four city gates, Romanians could only enter the town at certain times and had to pay a toll at this gate for the privilege of selling their produce inside the citadel. Along with the largely Hungarian-Transylvanian nobility and the Szeklers, the Transylvanian Saxons were members of the Unio Trium Nationum (or 'Union of the Three Nations'), which was a charter signed in 1438. This agreement preserved a considerable degree of political rights for the three aforementioned groups but excluded the largely Hungarian and Romanian peasantry from political life in the principality.

Skin Cancer 101

For decades, we've passed on the baby oil in favor of slathering on sunblock. The public health campaigns that warned of the dangers of skin cancer were effective, though some questions still remain.

How does one develop skin cancer and why is it so serious?

According to skincancer.org, most skin cancers are associated with ultraviolet (UV) rays from the sun and tanning beds, with UV damage causing DNA damage to skin cells. This triggers mutations or genetic defects that lead the skin cells to multiply rapidly and form malignant tumors.

However, certain skin cancers are caused by other factors like genetics or other environmental influences and may even occur on parts of the body that are rarely exposed to the sun. Darker-skinned people are more susceptible to acral lentiginous melanoma (ALM), an especially virulent form of melanoma that typically appears on the palms of the hands and soles of the feet, according to the site.

More people are diagnosed with skin cancer each year in the U.S. than all other cancers combined, with about 90 percent of nonmelanoma skin cancers associated with exposure to UV from the sun. Basal cell carcinoma is the most common form of skin cancer (4.3 million cases diagnosed in the U.S. each year), with squamous cell carcinoma second (more than 1 million cases).

The website says an estimated 192,310 cases of melanoma will be diagnosed in the U.S. in 2019. Melanoma is particularly dangerous because it is more likely to spread to other parts of the body if not caught early. The good news is that all types of skin cancer are quite treatable if caught early, so prevention and detection are key. In addition to checking your body for signs of abnormalities, most health professionals advise the use of a sunscreen with SPF of 15 or higher and to limit your exposure to direct sunlight between 10 a.m.
