Membership in Local Branches is important. They need your help. Do you go to the Branch meetings? Do you volunteer to help out? Are you paying dues? With the ongoing pandemic, our Local Branches need your help more than ever. Some of your clubs pay rent whether you hold a meeting or not. Branches with clubhouses still have to pay the utilities and insurance premiums whether they are open or not. Don't wait for someone to ask you to help. Pick up the phone and call the officers and ask them how you can assist them. We're all in this together.

The ATS Board of Directors will be holding its quarterly meeting next weekend. We will be reviewing the financials of the organization, as well as our normal business procedures and strategies. The Trustees will be doing their audit the day before. I will report more on this in the next issue.

Please mark your calendar for the 2021 North American Heimattag that will be held in Salem, Ohio next summer. The dates are July 9, 10, & 11, 2021. Wow, something to look forward to! With all of the cancellations occurring this year, it will make getting together so much more meaningful next year. We encourage everyone to attend this wonderful event.

Did you know that most of our life insurance plans earn a dividend each year? A dividend on a life insurance policy is paid out to participating life policies when insurance companies earn excess profits after claims and operating costs are covered. The dividend is paid out on the anniversary date (the date the policy was purchased), generally starting the year after the dividend is earned. There are three ways to receive your ATS dividend. The first is Cash. Those of you on the Cash option receive a check for your dividend. The ATS doesn't automatically cut a check for these dividends unless it is over five dollars. This cash dividend can also be applied to your insurance premium. The second option is Savings or Dividends Left on Deposit. Dividends are deposited into your policy's cash value and earns interest. Depending on the amount of interest the accumulated dividends earn, this interest could be taxable and you would receive a 1099-INT form. The third and best option is to Purchase Additional Paid-up

Insurance. This option basically increases the face value of the policy. For example: a dividend of \$10 could purchase anywhere from \$15 to \$150 of additional insurance depending on your age, the type of policy, and the face value of your policy. Think how much insurance coverage you could have if you applied those dividends each year over your lifetime. If you wish to change your dividend option, contact the ATS Home Office.



Not just a-wishin'...Gone fishin'

A lot of people like to fish, but what they like best about it is catching one. The question is: When is the best time to do it?

The files of the Old Farmer's Almanac provide the following tips, though we give no guarantees:

- 1. An hour both before and after high tide and an hour before and after low tide are considered ideal. Both freshwater and saltwater fish are thought to feed at these times.
- 2. Just after sunrise, or as the Almanac puts it, "just after sunup for a spell."
- 3. When water is still or has just a ripple, fishing is better than when there is a wind.
- 4. When the moon is between new and full.
- 5. When the barometer is steady or on the rise.

- 6. When the breeze is from the west rather than north or east.

70 Jahre Charta der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen: BdV verabschiedet Deklaration

Anlässlich des 70. Jubiläums der Charta der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen, die am 5. August 1950 unterzeichnet und am Folgetag vor dem Neuen Schloss in Stuttgart verkündet wurde, hat das Präsidium des Bundes der Vertriebenen (BdV) die nachfolgende Deklaration verabschiedet.

Deklaration zum 70. Jubiläum der Charta der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen am 5. und 6. August 2020

Vor 70 Jahren, in einer Zeit großer sozialer und wirtschaftlicher Not, haben wir deutsche Vertriebene und Flüchtlinge mit unseren Verbänden die Charta der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen verfasst und verkündet. Darin setzten wir ganz bewusst ein national wie international sichtbares Zeichen gegen eine weitere Eskalation der katastrophalen Gewalt- und Unrechtsspirale. Diese hatte in der ersten Hälfte des 20. Jahrhunderts begonnen und mit dem von Deutschland ausgelösten Zweiten Weltkrieg, dem Holocaust sowie in der Folge mit Flucht und Vertreibung grausame zivilisatorische Tiefpunkte gefunden. Darin legten wir den Grundstein für die Linderung unserer größten Not und stellten uns die Mitwirkung am Wiederaufbau Deutschlands zur Aufgabe. Unsere selbst mitgestaltete Eingliederung in die Nachkriegsgesellschaft trug maßgeblich zur Sicherung des sozialen Friedens bei. Darin definierten wir das Recht auf die Heimat als ein von Gott der Menschheit geschenktes Recht und gaben sowohl unserem eigenen Einsatz gegen Flucht, Vertreibung, Deportation und Zwangsarbeit als auch dem internationalen Kampf gegen Flucht und Vertreibung eine menschenrechtliche Basis. Darin zeichneten wir eine der ersten modernen Visionen eines freien, geeinten und friedlichen Europas, in dem allein sich das Recht auf die Heimat für alle Menschen und Völker umsetzen lassen würde. Dieser europäischen Vision galt unser Einsatz von Beginn an.

Die Charta der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen wurde gleichsam zum "Grundgesetz" unserer Arbeit. In der Zeitlosigkeit ihrer Inhalte



hat sich diese Bedeutung bis heute erhalten. Daher bekennen wir uns auch 70 Jahre nach ihrer Entstehung zu ihren Grundsätzen und fordern:

1. Vertreibungen sind nach wie vor ein Weltproblem. Dem Recht auf die Heimat muss in Europa und weltweit auch durch strafbewehrte Vertreibungsverbote Geltung verschafft werden. Außerdem gilt es, verstärkt internationale Strategien zu entwickeln oder weiter zu fördern, die eine Verbesserung der Lebensbedingungen in ihrer Heimat heute bedrohter Menschen, Volksgruppen und Völker zum Ziel haben.

2. Die grenzüberschreitende verständigungspolitische Arbeit, die wir deut-Heimatvertriebene und Flüchtlinge, Aussiedler und Spätaussiedler, aber auch die deutschen Minderheiten in den Heimat- und Siedlungsgebieten leisten, trägt bis heute Früchte. Sie befördert den europäischen Einigungsprozess, wirkt friedens- und zukunftssichernd und hat die Vertriebenen ihrer Heimat wieder nähergebracht. Daher gilt es, politische Rahmenbedingungen so zu setzen, dass diese Arbeit fortgesetzt werden kann.

3. Zum Recht auf die Heimat bereits vertriebener Völker und Volksgruppen, also auch der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen und ihrer Nachkommen, aber auch von Volksgruppen,

die als Minderheiten in ihrer Heimat leben, gehören Möglichkeiten, des eigenen Schicksals zu gedenken und die eigene Geschichte zu bewahren sowie die sprachliche und kulturelle Identität zu pflegen und zu erhalten. Dazu bedarf es gesicherter Rechte und einer zukunftsfesten Förderung durch Auch die Heimatländer. Deutschland kann sich hier noch stärker engagieren.


4. Unterscheiden sich auch die Umstände, so ist doch die selbst mitgestaltete Eingliederung der deutschen Heimatvertriebenen, Aussiedler und Spätaussiedler eine Erfolgsgeschichte, die für Flüchtlinge und Migranten unserer Tage Vorbildcharakter haben sollte. Wo eine aktive Beteiligung an Integrationsprozessen gefordert wird und diese einhergeht mit der heute möglichen Unterstützung zur Traumabewältigung, kann der Weg in eine erfolgreiche Zukunft am Ankunfts- und Zufluchtsort geebnet werden.

In der Umsetzung dieser Forderungen sehen wir wichtige Voraussetzungen für die erfolgreiche Bewältigung der Folgen von Flucht und Vertreibung sowie für dauerhafte Stabilität und Frieden in Europa und in der Welt. 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Craving hugs? There is a genetic reason

People doing social distancing might suddenly feel a sort of skin hunger, a craving for human touch, the sort of thing that comes from a simple hug.

According to research published in Communication Monograph, the craving for touch involves both heredity and a psychological need for physical human interaction.

Floyd states the need for affection is different between men and women. About 45 percent of a woman's need for affection is driven by hereditary factors and 55 percent from environment, such as personal experiences. Men seem to be solely dependent on their environment.

So what can you do in quarantine?

- Use your memory. Think of a time in your life when you felt happy and connected to others. Try to imagine the scene, the colors, and the smells. Think of the people there and how you interacted. Use photos to help.
- Try an old movie for enjoyment and memories: Mary Poppins (1964), The Rocketeer (1991), Brown Sugar (2002), Coming to America (1988), Doc Hollywood (1991), Mrs Doubtfire (1993), Sister Act (1992), The Sound of Music (1965), Shrek (2001), The Princess Bride (1987), Singing in the Rain (1952).
- Try a bath with an aromatic oil.
- Try arranging a socially-distanced outdoor party with friends, with everyone talking from their own car, for example.

Alzen / Alţâna



The 13th century Romanesque basilica went through numerous transformations throughout its history: the original apse was replaced by the current Gothic polygonal chancel, the southern aisle received a Baroque vault, the central nave was covered with a late Gothic lierne vault in the 15th century. In the 19th century the bell tower with parapet walk was replaced by the current new Gothic one, built in the same time as the sacristy. The oval curtain wall was reinforced with an outer bailey and four defence towers located in the four cardinal points. The northern tower collapsed at the beginning of the 20th century and parts of the ring wall and storage rooms were demolished.

Place and surroundings

Alţâna has a famous history, whose tracks has materialized through time and is easy to notice in the fortified church. Dwelling on a mountain peak, close to heaven and its promised salvation, the church connects the earth and the sky. There is a stream near the village and its water whispers the story of a mysterious mill that used to be there in immemorial times. They say that strange sounds used to come from its attic and even from the depth of the dark stream water on New Year's Eve. The last miller, unaware of these terrifying secrets, rented the mill, only to run away and leave the evil



place in the very night between the years, scared to death by the terrible sounds he heard. By the next morning the mill had vanished completely, leaving behind only its name: even today the water stream is called "The Hollow of the Old Mill". The field where it used to lie is still called "at the old mill"

Tourism

Alţâna is home to a very unique interethnic museum: an extensive and well worth seeing collection of Romanian, Saxon and Hungarian cultural objects is displayed and invites visitors to an informative tour. If driving through the Valea Hârtibaciului everyone should stop by and include a visit to the museum to their travel itinerary.


