PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We have set a deadline for the Saxon Memoirs stories. I've had a few people asking how much time they had left to wrap these up. The deadline is June 30th. So, get your pencils and keyboards in gear and get them finished and submitted. I want to thank everyone who has already submitted their stories. You've done a wonderful job!

The Board of Directors recently held its quarterly meeting. The financial statement for the year ending December 31, 2020 was reviewed. The assets of the ATS increased by approximately \$3.8 million for a total of \$98,107,283. Our bottom line was \$595,599 for the year. The Board also authorized the issuance of the annual Branch Sharing funds. By the time you read this, those checks will have been mailed to each of the Branches.

During the Board meeting, the decision was made to cancel the 2021 North American Heimattag which was to be held in Salem, Ohio in July. Even though the vaccine rollout is moving along, it's moving too slowly to justify planning the event. Our Saxons to the north in Canada have expressed that they most likely would not be able to attend. As of now, the border is still closed and appears to not have a reopening plan in place. It just wouldn't be a Heimattag without the Canadians. We will definitely have a big celebration once everyone can get together.

Last call for all high school seniors and college students who requested a scholarship application. The deadline to return those applications to the ATS Home Office is April 15th. Just a reminder, the high school seniors need to have one portion of their application completed by their guidance counselor. The Scholarship Committee will meet a few weeks after the deadline to determine the scholarship winners.

A LITTLE OF TRANSYLVANIAN PERSONAL HISTORY

I have tried to research our family tree but it has proven to be more of a difficult task, as my sister and me are the first ones born in the U.S. The rest of our family is either buried in Botsch or has immigrated to Austria and Germany. Accurate records are hard to find. Also, it appears as though Saxons are not big on DNA and Ancestry. com.

That being said, I did find a little family history on how we left Botsch and eventually ended up in America.

There are a couple of things I have found out in reading various family letters and documents. Grandma Maria and Grandpa George Sollner came to America twice. The first time they came was in 1914. Things were not working out how they expected, so they returned to Europe in 1920. After a couple of years, they figured out that Europe was not the answer either, so they returned to America. They returned on in October of 1923. It took them from October 6-9 to get back to America. I am assuming their accommodations were similar to the poorer people that were on the Titanic. The name of the ship was the America. The older son, George Sollner, did not return with them. There was an older sister of my mother, her name was Mary. She was born in 1914

and died in 1921. When my mom was born in 1922, they just named her Mary, too. Seems a little strange but things were different back then. Grandma Sollner's parents were Johann Fleischer who was my greatgrand father and his wife's name was Maria Moisch-Fleischer. He was born July 28, 1864 and died in October 9, 1950. She was born in 1870 (unsure of date) and died in 1934. She would be buried in Botsch. Johann is buried at Greenlawn (Columbus, Ohio) with Grandma Maria and Grandpa George Sollner.

I came across some interesting paperwork from Grandma Sollner. Her father Johann Fleischer, who was my great-grandfather, was driven out of Botsch by the Russians/Romanian communists after WWII in 1944. He went to Austria in 1944 and then eventually moved to the U.S. (1947) and stayed with Grandma Sollner. So the government (Romania/Russia) stole his home in Botsch, Transylvania. After WWII there was a government commission that was set up between the US government and the various governments of the eastern block that confiscated property from people. A fund was established where almost \$40,000,000 was set aside to compensate the individuals that had property confiscated. It was an interesting trail of correspondence that occurred. My mom helped Johann Fleischer, and then after his passing in October 9, 1950, Grandma Sollner file a claim. It was for a house/dwelling and 5 acres of established vineyard and small farm. Back in the late 1940's the property was valued at \$20,000, quite a bit back then. So, a claim a long year, we hope you was filed. Naturally, the claims were not going to be fully paid and the Russians would dispute and lie about the current value of the property. This claim proceeded for almost 20 years. Truly unbelievable, they were persistent enough to follow through with all of the filings and claims that occurred over that period of time, but they did. Their

reward for their effort was a settlement in 1967 or 1968 for \$2,800 plus interest. I researched what \$20,000 in the late 1940's would be worth by the time of settlement, in the late 60's, and it would have been worth around \$37,000. So, for their efforts they probably got \$.10 on the dollar, but they did get the satisfaction of having beaten the Romanian/ Russian communists and received a settlement. I found this interesting.

I am sure your families have similar stories, where your family left Transylvania and immigrated to the US directly or incurred some stops in Austria and Germany before coming to America. Saxons have a rich history in Transylvania and now in Europe, Canada and the US. It is important we preserve that history by telling the next generation about their history.

No stimulus check?

Individuals who never received economic impact payments can request a Recovery Rebate Credit. According to CNET, millions of Americans never got the first or second stimulus checks, possibly due to IRS error or missing money for dependents. Tax nonfilers, such as SSI or SSDI recipients, were also more likely to miss their payments.

To request your rebate, simply claim your full stimulus check amount as a Recovery Rebate Credit on your tax return. According to CNET, this credit combines stimulus money with your tax return, so you could receive a larger tax refund as a result or reduce your tax bill. Outstanding debts such as overdue child support payments could be deducted.

The fortified church in Bod went through difficult times, strongly affected by fire and earthquakes.

The Romanesque basilica with a bell tower built in the 13th century was partially destroyed by fire only two centuries later. Starting with the late 18th century, the events precipitated: the bell tower collapsed only to be rebuilt nine years later. But after three years the church was massively destroyed by an earthquake, together with its fortification wall. The polygonal wall with outer bailey and defence towers was almost completely dismantled after this episode.

Today in Bod one can admire the church built in 1806, whose tower damaged by the earthquake in 1977 was subsequently stabilized. The interior of the church houses the altar from



1869, which forms a whole together with the organ built in 1816. Original bells, dating back to Catholic times were destroyed when the tower collapsed. One bell that escaped the damages of war and further two bells made of bronze in 1922 accompany the Sunday service today.

Place and surroundings

Although the inhabitants of the village Bod have endured many strokes of fate over the centuries, they never gave up. Thus their eventful history can be nowadays traced on the church in the centre of the village.

After the village was first mentioned in the 14th century, the number of devastating attacks increased: only between 1421 and 1658 the village has been set aflame and burned almost completely at least 5 times. During the same period the villagers were forced to participate in building the fortification of the town of Braşov and also to contribute with construction materials.

Between 1718 and 1719 the plague caused around 500 victims in Bod. In 1779 floods caused major damage, closely followed by two earthquakes (1790-1802) that caused new destructions. To all these two major fires in 1844 and 1867 are added, which affected extensive ares of the village.

However the villagers have repeatedly rebuilt and repaired the church. In recent years the building underwent significant repairs due to the involvement of the Federal German Government and of the Saxons emigrated from Bod.
