PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Things are opening up! Here in Ohio, almost all health department mandates are now gone. Hopefully wherever you are is the same. Still, be careful out there as the virus hasn't gone away yet.

It looks like our Branches that haven't been meeting are now starting to get together. Others are now planning local events or outings for the summer. Remember, your Branch needs you now more than ever. Please help them out when they call on you to volunteer at an event. Better yet, call and volunteer first without having to be asked!

Our first upcoming national event is ATS Family Day at Waldameer in Erie, PA. It will be held on Saturday, July 24th. The ATS has secured the same pavilion (Coaster #1) as in past years. Discounted tickets are now on sale through the ATS Home Office. The amusement park side has lots of rides for all ages and the water park area has plenty of wet activities. For those of you who do not wish to ride any of the rides or enter the water park, you do not need to purchase a ticket. You can walk around the park or visit with others at the pavilion. Coolers and picnic baskets are allowed to be brought into the park. The Youth Activities Committee will be playing bingo and will also have a drawing for prizes at the pavilion. Did you know that the current US Flag was designed by a 17-year-old Ohio student? When the American Revolutionary War started in April, 1775, most regiments fought under their own flags. A single flag had not been designed yet. In June, 1775 the Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia to create the Continental Army (a unified colonial fighting force) with the hopes of a more organized battle. This led to the creation of the first "American" flag, the Continental Colors. This original flag had 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner. Some thought this was way too similar to the British flag. George Washington realized that flying this flag was not a great confidence builder for the cause. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white" and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." Over 100 years later, in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson marked the anniversary of that decree by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day. In the 1950s, when it seemed certain that Alaska would be admitted into the Union, designers began retooling the American flag to add a 49th star to the existing 48.

Bob Heft, a 17-year-old Ohio student borrowed his mother's sewing machine, disassembled his family's 48-star flag and stitched on 50 stars in a proportional pattern. He handed his creation to his history teacher for a class project, explaining that he expected Hawaii would soon achieve statehood as well. The student sent the flag to his congressman, who presented it to President Eisenhower after both new states joined the Union. President Eisenhower selected Bob Heft's design. On July 4, 1960, President Eisenhower and the high school student watched together as the 50-star flag was raised for the first time. This year, on Flag Day, June 14th, proudly display your American flag and reflect on what our flag represents – freedom.

Container gardens add color, a touch of nature

Green-thumbed apartment and condo dwellers can get in touch with nature and add beauty to patios, balconies and window boxes. Container gardens can be beautiful.

Places that get full sun can be used to grow almost any flower or vegetable. Others are good for shade or partsun plants.

Almost any container with adequate drainage will do, but be sure it is large enough for what you want to grow. Small pots should contain just one plant. Large pots can hold groups that favor the same growing conditions.

A soil base works best for plants that will remain in their pots for a year or more. Containers require frequent watering, but adding moist granules composed of polymer to the soil will help. In dry spells, the granules release their water.

Because frequent watering can leach nutrients from the soil, plan to fertilize regularly.

Prevent heat exhaustion

The National Safety Council recommends that people who are working outside in hot weather or in non-air-conditioned environments should cool down with wet scarves around their necks. As the moisture evaporates, the body stays cooler.

Drinking enough water is very important. You can alternate water with a sports drink that contains electrolytes. The key is to drink enough so you never

get thirsty. If your urine is concentrated -- a dark color -- you need to drink more. Drink enough water so your urine is pale yellow.

When you are working outside, be sure to wear a hat and a lightweight, long-sleeved shirt with no T-shirt underneath.

Remember that caffeine and alcohol are dehydrating. Drink decaffeinated beverages, bottled water or sports drinks.



LIFE OF MARTIN LUTHER

One of the members of our Saxon Club Facebook Group, Rick Fleischer, got me interested in Martin Luther by posting the topic of 'Luther, a new free online course'by Dallas Theological Seminary. Also, I used a reference of Martin Luther from 'Encyclopedia of World Biography', in summarizing some points of Martin Luther's life. Additionally, I thought it would be interesting to share the story of Martin Luther as his teachings and doctrines would shape religious history for Germans, Saxons and the entire world. This will be a series of stories and this is PART 5.

As we ended **PART 4**, we learned that Luther gets his chance to be heard. This is just what he wants. He gets three debates. Does he slay/destroy his debaters? That is what we will find out in our **Part 5 of The Life of Luther** and the final part of this series.

Luther gets his chance to be heard. This is just what he wants. He gets three debates. Does he slay/destroy his debaters? Naturally, the good guy always wins? Wrong! Luther gets three (3) debates and he loses them all.



In Luther's first debate with John Eck, he loses the debate. Johann Maier von Eck was a German Scholastic theologian, a high-ranking member of the clergy (possibly a bishop) and major opponent to Martin Luther and the Reformation. While Luther loses the debate the problems for the Catholic Church begin. Luther begins to get acceptance and support from important catholic clergy. One of the first is Martin Bucer (Martin Butzer), a well-respected member of the Dominican Order. While Bucer was one of the initial supporters of Luther and the Reformation, many more of the catholic clergy would come to be supporters of Luther's Reformation movement. So, while he had lost the battle, he was beginning to win the war.

Luther debates at Heidelberg and loses there. And then in the final debate, which was not really a debate, occurs at Augsburg, is a threat to Luther. Close friends to Luther see that his challenges, while gaining supporters, are also gaining fierce adversaries to his teaching and ideas. They plead with Luther to just keep his mouth shut and not to stir up more controversy. The wealthiest person in the world, named Jakob Fugger, who owned mercury and copper mines in South America. He is tied deeply to the Catholic Church in Rome. Luther is brought into the office of Fugger. Fugger tries to approach Luther in a grandfatherly manner, saying we care for you and don't you know what you are doing to the church, thinking he can sway Luther's thinking on a humanistic level. Luther does not listen to his friends' pleas to keep quiet. A side note on Fugger, he would found the first low-income housing project in the world and it is still in existence today. It is in Augsburg. It is 132, 2 bedroom units development. Staying there has only 2 requirements: first is cost is \$.50 (yes fifty cents) a year, second is that every day you must say a mass for Jakob Fugger's soul and you could live there for fifty (50) cents a day, everything included. Luther does not listen to the pleas from Fug-

The Catholic Church is extremely concerned that Luther is gaining support and that he refuses to adhere to established catholic tradition, doctrines and teaching in many areas. The church reacts and gives him an ultimatum of 60 days to repent.

Enjoy the summer and the company of others again.





Only few remains are still preserved from the Gothic basilica of the 14th century and today's church bears the signs of the changes it underwent in the 15th century. The aisles were subject to multiple transformations: the southern arcades were demolished and the wall was heightened. Particularly interesting are the arcades preserved on the northern side featuring profiled columns and various capitals. In order to stand against attacks, the church was fortified: a defence floor was built above the chancel and a battlement walk on the bell tower. Moreover the assembly was surrounded by defence wall with a five-level gate tower. A community house was constructed later on in 1906 by using material left from the partial dismantling of the defence wall.

Place and surroundings

On the journey through the valley of Târnava Mare, just few miles east of Medias appears the fortified church of Brateiu, erected in the middle of the village. The bell tower is visible from far away and from its defense level one has a magnificent view of the surroundings.

After protecting for centuries the lives and the goods of the villagers, the fortified church is nowadays part of a training center, result of a successful cooperation between the Evangelical Church A.C. in Romania and the Evangelical

Church of Kurhessen Waldeck (in German language only). Starting with 2008 the craftsmen are trained here in various techniques to gain the skills necessary to properly repair the fortified churches.

At the western edge of the village towards Mediaş the copper-smiths from Brateiu present a shiny and rich offer: all kind of copper objects for various use.

Flag Day, June 14: Honoring our national symbol

The idea of an annual day to honor the U.S. flag is believed to have originated in 1885. B.J. Cigrand, a school teacher, arranged for the pupils in his Fredonia, Wisc., school to observe June 14 as "Flag Birthday." In many magazine and newspaper articles over the following years, Cigrand enthusiastically advocated the observance of June 14 as Flag Birthday, or Flag Day.

Gradually, the idea was adopted in other parts of the country. Inspired by decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day was officially established by a proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson in 1916. But it was not until August 3, 1949 that President Harry Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.

In his writing about the U.S. flag, Charles Evan Hughes said:

The flag is the symbol of our national unity, our national endeavor, our national aspiration.

It tells of the struggle for independence, of union preserved, of liberty and union one and inseparable, of the sacrifices of brave men and women to whom the ideals and honor of this nation have been dearer than life.

The first flag was adopted in 1777 and it had 13 stars and 13 stripes. It changed July 4, 1960 to accommodate 50 stars with the admission of Hawaii to the union.

There have been 27 different flags featuring the stars and stripes, changing as states were admitted to the union.

When the flag is folded in ceremony, it is folded into a triangle with 13 folds, each representing an idea. The folded flag represents the three-cornered hat, the kind worn by George Washington and others during the Revolutionary War.

Interestingly, Flag Day falls in June, as does Father's Day. The 10th fold is a tribute to fathers who give their sons and daughters to defend the country. The 9th fold represents women, honoring their character traits of faith, love, loyalty and devotion.

took his 3,000 students from Wittenberg University and burned canonical books in a bonfire. Luther did have a flare for the dramatics. Luther throws a bull (figure) into the fire and the students' cheer. Then Luther writes a reply to the bull of the Antichrist.' Obviously, there was no misunderstanding on what Luther thought about the request to repent. After this reply Luther is excommunicated. Then he is called before Charles V, the emperor of the Holy Roman Empire. A confidant of Luther's realizes if he is called to Rome that Luther will never return. So his confidant negotiates a meeting in the alternate location of Worms, a more neutral location. At the Diet of Worms, the emperor asks Luther 2 questions:

- Do you recant all the errors in your writings?
- Who are you to go against 1,500 years of the teaching of the church?

Luther replies to the first question with a tactful response of I will recant of any errors in my writings that are contrary to Holy Scripturebasically what he is saying yes I will recant of any errors in my writings that go against Holy Scripture, but since I have no errors against the Holy Scripture the question is really meaningless, in brief terms, I am not going to do it.

The answer to the second question posed to be more perplexing. Luther did not have an answer. Luther stalled by saying if you give me a day I will have an answer and reply to that question. The next day Luther comes back and has a response. Luther says, "There is no 1,500 years of the church, because our teachers have contradicted themselves, and further states my conscience is bound to the Word of God, from the Word of God, it is neither right nor safe to deny one's conscience, here I stand, so help me God." The result of the comments and the Diet of Worms is that Luther is an enemy of the church and treasonous of the state, he is a criminal.

Luther did not leave Worms. He stays there 10 more days. The church and the state cannot figure out what to do with him, because they have threatened him and he would not change his position. So the emperor and church come up with a solution. All along they thought Luther was just seeking the fame, greed and listen to anything.

Luther's response was that he limelight, and was without true conviction. So they offer him a promotion, they offer him to become a cardinal. This incensed Luther even more, as he felt he was further justified that the church was corrupt.

On the way back to Wittenberg, the head and founder of the pope and titles it, 'Against the University of Wittenberg, knows that Luther is as good as dead. So he comes up with a scheme. He arranges a capture of Luther. He has a student spread a rumor that Luther is dead. Soldiers take him to a castle at Eisenach (Wartburg Castle). For 9 months, Luther is hidden in the castle. They give him an assumed name of Knight Junker Jorg. While holed up in the castle, Luther translates the New Testament to German in seven weeks. Luther considered all the dialects of Germany and came up with words that would best translate to all Germans. Later he translates the entire Old Testament in 34 weeks. Luther spends his time organizing his movement, the Reformation. During those 9 months, Luther would write 'On the Bondage of the Will.' The basis of this writing is that no one can achieve salvation or redemption through their own will power, that salvation is the product of God unilaterally changing a person's heart and turning them to good.

> There was much chaos in Wittenburg. Followers of Luther had differing views and ideas of how to continue the process of the Reformation. Some of the followers were radical in their ideas and other could not continue to convince followers of the confirmation. Martin Luther decided it was necessary to come out of hiding and implement the ideas, framework and organization of the Reformation that he had developed in while in seclusion at Wartburg Castle.

Martin Luther and the Refunless you can convince me ormation would implement a movement that would change Germany, Europe and the entire world. The Reformation impacted Transylvanian Saxons. Because Transylvanian Saxons still had strong ties through trading and heritage exchange with their German roots, the Reformation spread quickly to Transylvania and resulted in an extensive religious transformation of the Saxons. 
