## Saving versus spending, American-style

When times are tough, people are more likely to save or at least spend less.

In 1944, during World War II, the personal savings rate -- defined as the ratio of personal savings in the country to disposable personal income -- was about 25.5 percent, according to the Mercatus Center at George Mason University. Compare that to the low point of personal savings for Americans in July 2005, when Americans saved a comparatively measly 2.2 percent of their income, according to the United States Bureau of Economic Analysis.

After the recession in 2007, savings rates creeped up to 7 percent in 2010.

Personal savings skyrocketed during the COVID-19 pandemic, when Americans had less to do and fewer places to go, according to NextAdvisor. In the first month after the March 2020 lockdown, savings soared to 33 percent, but then dipped to about 13 percent the next month, where it has remained with some ups and downs.

The way people spend money has also changed.

One big area: housing costs. According to CNBC, the median home value in 1940 was about \$30,600, in today's dollars. The median home value in 2020 was \$280,000. The average home size has gone up, too, from 983 square feet in 1950 to 2,480 square feet in 2011, according to the Guardian. So while homes are much more expensive than they used to be, Americans also want almost triple the space.

We fill those bigger houses with stuff, too. According to Forbes, we consume twice as many material goods today as 50 years ago. The Bureau of Economic Analysis found that in 2017, Americans spent twice as much on consumer goods like jewelry, watches, books, luggage, telephones and related communications equipment, as we did in 2002.

The psychology of buying is simple. We buy stuff because it is available and it feels good, according to Psychology Today. Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons

And now a tribute to Three Sisters.

My mother, Walburga Katharina (Simon) Spack came to the United States in January 1948 and arrived in New York City in the middle of a snowstorm. She left behind in Germany her widowed father, four brothers, and her two sisters, twins Marianne and Anneliese. She married my father, John F. Spack, on January 31, 1948, in a private ceremony performed by Rev. John Baumann of **Emmanuel Lutheran Church** in the parsonage on North Union Avenue in Salem.

My mom and dad raised their family of six that included my brothers Art and John Fred Jr., my sister Marita, and me, while offering to help her siblings come to the United States. The twins were the only siblings who made the move. First Aunt Marianne and Uncle Clem (Vogt) and their oldest boy, Rolf, arrived and settled in Salem. They did not have the best experience on their trip and my mom decided when Aunt Anneliese was coming, that she would make the trip with them.

I was not even two years old in 1956 when my mom left me in the care of my Aunt Marianne to go to Germany her "Mama" and she always dearly. was a mother figure to me

from that time on.

My mom sailed on the SS United States across the Atlantic along with my Aunt Anneliese, her husband Uncle Paul (Rothbrust), and their boys Herman, Joseph, and Anton (Tony). Tony was a baby and my mom would tell him that she "carried him across the ocean." Aunt Anneliese was already expecting her daughter, Gisela, when they arrived and their family grew to include Paul Jr, John and James, while Aunt Marianne's family grew to include Richard, Robert and Caroline.

The three sisters' families were very close growing up and were often at each other's homes and spent holidays together. I always enjoyed listening to my mom and her sister converse in their German dialect and they were all so full of love for all of us cousins. The sisters were the best cooks and I enjoyed our meals together.

Special occasions included get-togethers with other German families who all became "aunt" and "uncle" even if not related. With dad's Saxon roots, the gatherings included many Saxon immigrants from Germany and Transylvania as well.

As my dad was an ATS deputy, of course ATS policies were written and the sisters were members of Salem Branch 18. In their later years, the sisters and their spouses enjoyed going to the Salem Saxon Retirees.

Eventually the spouses passed away and the sisters' health began to decline, but they looked forward to seeing each other at the "Retirees." When the COVID pandemic hit, Aunt Marianne and Aunt Anneliese were in different healthcare facilities and mom was still able to be at home. where I also resided, but their get-togethers were limited.

Sadly, in June 2020 Aunt Marianne passed away; in February 2021 my mom passed away; and in May 2021 Aunt Anneliese passed away. To me, it was like losand bring her other sister and ing three mothers. 

#### Samuel Fleischer (1931-2021)

Samuel Fleischer, 89, died June 2, at Ascension Genesys Hospital in Grand Blanc, Michigan, of complications of Parkinson's Disease. His memorial service was held Tuesday, June 8, at Coats Funeral Home, Clarkston.

Samuel is survived by his wife, Susanna, Children Susanna (Raleigh )Wilburn, Rosina (fiancéTom Kleino) Murphy, Samuel M. (Julie) Fleischer, the late Ronald (Heidi) Fleischer, grandchildren Alexandra, Jennifer, Hannah, Samuel A. He was brother to Susanna Krautner, Maria Emrich, Johann (Mary Ann) Fleischer, Stefan Fleischer, Rosina (John) Mellin, and Katharina Moody.

Sam was born November 16, 1931 in Botsch, Siebenbuergen. Sam's parents were Samuel Fleischer and Susanna Hofgraeff.

During World War II the family was forced to flee ahead of the Russians. Sam, who was then thirteen, drove

one of the family wagons to Austria, staying in Kreis Sampoellen for five months. Then they had to flee again.

In 1955 the family immigrated to the United States, settling in Royal Oak, Michigan, where their sister Susanna Krautner lived. After five months they bought a house in Royal Oak.

Sam met his future wife, Susanna Karst, at a Saxon wedding in Columbus, Ohio. She was a childhood friend from Botsch. The couple married June 20, 1959 at St.

Peter Lutheran Church, Detroit, Michigan. Sam owned the superior Lawn Spray Service for 26 years until he retired at the age of 65.

If you are older, you may not have heard it for a while. If you are younger, you may never have heard it.


Either way, on July 4, find the The Stars & Stripes Forever and listen. You'll want to conduct the band with abandon and smash the cymbals.

It's a giant, jubilant march, with stirring lyrics which, for fun, you can also substitute for a duck song (Be

kind to your web-footed most distinct melody. friends...).

John Philip Sousa -- Marine, musician and band leader -- was returning to the United States from a vacation in Italy in 1896. It was Christmas Day and from the deck of an ocean liner, he heard the march in his head.

"Suddenly, I began to sense the rhythmic beat of a band playing within my brain," Sousa wrote in his autobiography Marching Along. "It kept on ceaselessly playing ... the imaginary band continued to unfold the same themes,



echoing and re-echoing the

of that music to paper while I was on the steamer, but when we reached shore I set down the measures that my brain-band had been playing for me, and not a note of it has ever changed," he wrote.

The song repeats distinct melodies in sections, called strains, using different instruments to repeat and lead. So the song begins with a hearty introduction by the horns with great smashing beats on drums, followed by the melody. Woodwinds repeat, and later, the famous response of the piccolos. The trombones thunder in with a bold counter melody. Then, the entire band plays together -- and, by then, we're all marching.

The 13th century late Romanesque pillar basilica was early prepared for battle by demolition of the side naves and fortification of the central nave and the tower by adding defence levels. The chancel was heightened in 1500 by adding a defence level with machicolations. The 1847 added tower marks the present image of the church. The interior impresses with its tall and narrow proportions, underlined by the two-story balcony on the northern side, erected between 1680 and 1775. The railings were painted by the Roessler family, grandfather and grandson. The fortification wall, originating in the 14th century was strengthen by four towers and had grain storage rooms on the inside.

#### Place and surroundings

In the hymn "Transylvania, sweet home" the verse "Transylvania, seabed of a flood long gone, a sea of grain now rests on the breast of heaven" is telling the story of the sea which once covered the region in Mesozoic times. The fortified church of Buneşti was built with marine sedimentary rocks as one can see from the fossils in the masonry. Residential houses of the same period were built with

timber. When the village was under attack, the inhabitants took refuge from the looters and arsonists inside the fireproof fortifications. In times of war the massive tower was also serving as a retreat for the priest. The walls are still decorated with words of solace, bearing witness to those terrible times. Priest Johannes Nösner wrote these faithful words while hiding in the room: "Hör! Hast vor eine gute Sach, aber's geht Von statt gemach, fahre getrost fort, nicht Verzag, es fällt kein alt eich auf ein Schlag." (Listen! You are on the right path, if the going is slow do not despair, no old oak is felled with one stroke). The highlighted letters in the original text are roman numbers, which add up to the year 1680.


