Klaus Johannis, fellow Transylvanian Saxon and the current President of Romania, was recently honored with the International Charlemagne Prize. The sponsors of the prize, the City of Aachen in Germany, refer to Charlemagne as the "Founder of Western Culture" and assert that under his reign, the City of Aachen was once the spiritual and political center of the whole of what is now Western Europe. The award sponsors assert that the list of Charlemagne Prize winners reflects the history of the European process of unification. They promote that the prize is not only an expression of gratitude for lasting service for the unity of Europe, but also an encouragement and an expression of hopes and expectations directed towards their future. The prize has been awarded each year since 1950. Traditionally, it is given to the recipient on Ascension Day in a ceremony in the town hall of Aachen. However, due to the pandemic, the ceremony originally scheduled for May 21, 2020, took place on October 2, 2021. The President of the European Council **Charles Michel presented President Klaus Johannis** the award. The judges describe Johannis as an important "bridge-builder" between Europe's east and west. They stated Johannis has taken steps to fight corruption while promoting the separation of powers, rule of law, and the common idea of a European future. President Johannis was born in Hermannstadt. He was a high school physics teacher in Sibiu/Hermannstadt. He was elected as Mayor in his hometown in 2000 in a landslide victory with over 70% of the votes. He was re-elected as Mayor in 2004, 2008, and 2012 with over 75% of the votes each time. In 2014. Johannis was elected as the President of Romania. He was re-elected in another landslide victory at the polls in 2019. I join Transylvanian Saxons around the world in congratulating Klaus Johannis for receiving the Charlemagne Prize.



More is better when it comes to how many servings of fruits and vegetables to eat each day, according to Harvard Medical School. Researchers analyzed health self-reported and diet information from dozens of studies that included millions of subjects, comparing participants who reporting eating five servings of fruits and vegetables each day with participants who ate only two. The results are eyeopening -- people who ate five servings faced decreased risk of death from heart disease or stroke, cancer or respiratory disease, and a decreased overall risk of death from any cause.




RULERS OF TRANSY-VANIA

So as we left you the principalities and counties were split up with claims from King Ferdinand (Habsburg), Hans (John) Sigismund widowed Queen Isabella and ultimately the Ottomans, whose only interest in the territories was to collect annual tribute from the principalities. Suleiman (Ottomans) invaded Hungary under the pretext of protecting John Sigismund from Ferdinand. Buda, the capital of Hungary, fell to the Ottomans without opposition in 1541, but Suleiman allowed the widow queen, Isabella, to retain the territory east of the river Tisza on John Sigismund's behalf. Isabella and John Sigismund moved to Lippa (now Lipova in German/Romania). Before long, they took up residence in Gyulafehérvár in Transylvania (Alba Iulia/Karlsburg/Carlburg German name in Romania). We really don't need a study to tell us that a thankful person is just plain nicer to be around that one who is critical and displeased with everything. But that study exists anyway.

In 2003, Robert A. Emmons of the University of California, and Michael E. McCullough of the Universitiy of Miami conducted three experiments on the effect of a grateful outlook. They concluded: Results suggest that a conscious focus on blessings may have emotional and interpersonal benefits.

The lore of our own Thanksgiving Day, seasonally criticized by the critics, does offer some genuine lessons in the practice of



gratefulness. The pilgrims in 1620 didn't have all that much to be grateful for. They were oppressed in England and had to leave the country. Then they sailed for the New World, where they had to literally build themselves a place to live. Half of them died the first year.

For the Pilgrims, there was plenty of hardship and death in the past, with plenty more to come that they didn't yet know about. But they did manage to set aside a day in gratitude for their hard-won harvest.

That is the thing about gratitude -- it is always about the present. You can't know what will happen tomorrow. But right now, if you have to clean up your house, be grateful for the house. If you have to make dinner, be grateful for the food.

So happy Thanksgiving right now to you and yours. Be grateful.

Zeiden / Codlea



The bell tower dominates the fortified church in Codlea. Its walls reach a thickness of 5m after having undergone several construction phases. The church was built during the 13th century and was transformed into a Gothic single-nave church two centuries later. The first Ottoman invasion convinced the villagers of the necessity of a good defensive system. Thus an 8m high and 2m thick defence wall equipped with embrasure and machicolation surrounded the church. Granaries were also constructed in its interior, and so not only the lives of the residents were protected, but also their goods.

The interior of the church is dominated by the painted panelled ceiling, which was constructed at the beginning of the 18th century and consists of 252 panels. Also impressive is the 1783 organ, one of the most valuable instruments in Transylvania built by the craftsman Prause of Silenzia and decorated by the artist Oelhan.

Place and surroundings

From the newly refurbished square in Codlea one can admire the fortified church and picture its centuries-old history. One can try to imagine how this picturesque appearance might look 400 years ago, when Prince Gabriel Báthory besieged the castle. He promised at that time to spare the lives of the inhabitants and the warriors who came for helping from Braşov, if they would voluntarily surrender. However he never kept his promise. The defenders of the fortification were killed and the castle was occupied.

But soon the situation changed one more time due to an inhabitant of Codlea, named Thomas Göbel. First he tried to exit the gates with two wine pots. He was stopped and

the wine was confiscated. Apparently angry he went away, but appeared shortly thereafter with other two full cans. Under laughter the wine was again confiscated. What Báthory's soldiers did not knew, was that the wine contained sleeping powder. Therefore it was possible for the people of Codlea to reclaim fast their fortification. Göbel has been named a hero and as reward he was freed for his lifetime of paying taxes.



Some foods can actually leave you hungry after consuming them.


According to Aurora Health, these foods can cause a rapid drop in blood sugar, which can lead to hunger.

was administered by his father's treasurer, George Martinuzzi, who sought to reunite Hungary under the rule of Ferdinand. Martinuzzi forced Isabella to renounce her son's title in exchange for two Silesian duchess' kingdoms and 140,000 florins in 1551. John Sigismund and his mother settled in Poland, but she continued to negotiate for John Sigismund's restoration with Ferdinand's enemies.

Ferdinand was unable to protect eastern Hungary against the Ottomans. At Suleiman's urging, the Transylvanian Diet in 1556 persuaded John Sigismund and his mother to return to Transylvania, where she ruled her son's kingdom until her death in 1559. Awealthy lord, Melchior Balassa, rebelled against John Sigismund in late 1561, and Ferdinand gained control of most counties outside Transylvania. The Székely people, whose liberties had been restricted in the 1550s, also rose up against John Sigismund, but he crushed the rebellion. During the ensuing war against the Habsburgs, the Ottomans supported John Sigismund, and he paid homage to Suleiman in Zemun in 1566. The 1568 Treaty of Adrianople concluded the war, confirming John Sigismund in the eastern territories of the medieval Kingdom of Hungary (Transylvania). The Ottoman Empire still maintains control of Transylvania by its being a vassal of the Ottoman Empire.

John Sigismund initiated a series of theological debates among the representatives of the agreeing theological schools of the Reformation in 1560s. He converted from Catholicism to Lutheranism in 1562, and from Lutheranism to Calvinism in 1564. Around five years later, he accepted the views of the Anti-Trinitarian views (rejects the views of the Trinity of God). He would become the only Unitarian Monarch in History. John would abandon his title as elected King of Hungary. John would consider himself to be the 'Prince of Transylvania' and Lord of parts of the Kingdom of Hungary. John Sigismund would die childless in 1571.

John Sigismund would be succeeded by Stephen Bathory, Prince of Transylvania and King of Poland. Stephen would serve as Comonarch with his wife, Anna Jagiellon. While the ruling over the principalities by Ferdinand and Stephen Bathory would remain the same for a while, and the principalities would still be vassals of the Ottoman Empire, paying tribute and plunder during Ottoman raids, there was a new individual rising into power, stature and authority. This individual would shake the entire arrangement between the three controlling factions. In the next series, we will explore this disruptive individual and his impact over the ruling and control of the three provinces, particularly Transylvania.
