ATS Third Vice President Randall B. Floyd Member of Branch 26 Merrillville, IN (incumbent)



Did you know the word April comes from the Latin Aprillis? No one knows how the month ended up with its name, but the Romans called it Aprillis. Some historians believe that it comes from the words aperire, meaning to open due to the season of flowers and trees beginning to open or apricus, meaning sunny as April is seen as the month of sun in the northern hemisphere. Another explanation for the name goes back to Aphrodite, the Greek goddess of love, beauty, and procreation. Etruscans (an ancient Italian civilization) knew her as Apru. Since the Romans inherited many Etruscan customs and myths, they celebrated the same goddess in April. April is the fourth month of the year, on the Gregorian calendar. It previously had been the fifth month in the Julian calendar. April used to have 29 days, until Julius Caesar added an extra day when he established the Julian calendar. April is also a good month to see meteor showers. The Lyrids meteor shower appears April 16 – 26th each year, with the peak generally occurring on April 22nd. The Eta Aquariids meteor shower starts in April with a peak around May 6th. Other showers appear in April, but not every year. Other notable April activities include George Washington being inaugurated as the first President of the United States on April 30, 1789. The Titanic hit that famous iceberg on April 15, 1912. On

What to do if you can't pay your taxes

Tax day is fast approaching and that means millions of Americans are busy assembling their tax returns. While many Americans look forward to refunds, some will find themselves sending payments to Uncle Sam. And, unfortunately, not everyone will have the money to pay their taxes.

The Internal Revenue Service reports that as of 2020, more than 11 million Americans owed back taxes. With more people relying on the so-called gig economy, earning money by giving rides through platforms like Uber or through making deliveries through Doordash, unpaid tax bills and delinquent payments may rise. That's because you have to pay taxes on such income, and often, it's not automatically withheld.

So what do you do if you can't pay your taxes? Two tips:

First, don't panic. While people get sent to jail over tax issues, it's typically due to tax fraud and serious, willful crimes. Americans can't be jailed simply because they're unable to pay their income taxes. But the IRS can make your life difficult, with steep fines, property liens and seizing your bank accounts.

Second, never ignore the problem. You still want to file your taxes on time even if you can't make your payments. Not filing your taxes is a crime and you could find yourself in legal trouble for not doing so. You'll also get hit with late filing fees. In some cases, you can set up monthly payment plans with the IRS. This way, you can pay your taxes in monthly installments. Payment plans will still incur fees and penalties, however.

If you can't pay your taxes, sometimes you can reach an agreement with the IRS to settle for a lesser amount. This is called "payment in compromise" and the IRS will closely review your income and financial situation before settling.

Get the most out of Easter ham with easy ham and beans

If you've got a pile of leftover ham after your Easter feast and you're not in the mood to eat ham sandwiches for a solid week, try a pot of ham and beans. This filling, flavorful dish reheats well, keeps in the refrigerator for several days and can be frozen to be eaten later. Don't be afraid to experiment with flavors or add in extra vegetables or meats that you want to use up.

Ingredients

1 pound dry great northern beans

About 6 ounces bacon, diced

1/2 pound (or more) cooked ham, diced

2 to 3 fresh sausage links (optional)

1 small onion, chopped

2 to 3 carrots, chopped

1 to 1-1/2 quarts of stock (use less for a thicker soup)

2 bay leaves

1/2 teaspoon pepper (or more to taste)

2 to 3 sprigs of fresh thyme (or about a teaspoon dried)

Scant 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice

Optional: 1/4 teaspoon (or more) cayenne pepper

Rinse dried beans, then soak overnight in salted water (at least eight hours). In a medium-hot pot or Dutch oven, render bacon and then remove as much fat as you want, but keep some. If you're adding sausage, drop sausages into hot fat and brown (leave them whole during the cooking process), then add onion and carrots. When the onions are translucent and the carrots have softened slightly, add the beans and diced ham and stir to distribute the rendered fat. Add stock and stir, then add spices. Heat until bubbling, then reduce heat, cover and simmer for 1 to 1-1/2 hours, or until beans are tender. Remove thyme sprigs, bay leaves and sausages. Slice the sausages and add back to the pot, discard the bay leaves and thyme. Add more pepper if desired -you likely won't need more salt. Serve hot.

Pet ownership keeps you smart and happy

Owning a pet for a long time keeps you sharper and happier, a study has found.

People who own pets seem to keep a sharper mind compared to non-pet owners, according to a new study from the American Academy of Neurology.

The study used data on more than 1,300 adults who participated in the University of Michigan's Health and Retirement Study and found that long-term pet ownership was the most beneficial, according to CNN. The key to reaping the highest benefit: ownership of five years or




more.

Animal companions don't necessarily have to be of the fluffy variety, either. While dogs and cats were the more prevalent pets in the study, people who owned birds, fish and reptiles saw benefits, too.

The study's authors say that they could only confirm an association, and more research is needed to establish a cause-and-effect relationship between pet ownership and better cognitive health. But the relationship between pet ownership and stress reduction has been well-established in numerous studies, and researchers believe that the physiological benefits of pet ownership, such as reduced blood pressure and lower cortisol levels, could impact cognitive health.

The study joins a growing body of evidence that supports what animal lovers have known all along: Pets just make life better.



HISTORY

This is a story about the Transylvanian Coat of Arms, which depicts seven towers, castles or fortifications. We will look at a little history before we get into Transylvanian Flag or Coat of Arms.

It is common knowledge that King Geza II invited German settlers that would later become known as Transylvanian Saxons, to Transylvania. These Saxons would be granted special status. They would form very strong communities of farmers, artisans, merchants and individuals with mining skills. King Andrew II of Hungary continued this tradition by providing territorial autonomy. We know there were ulterior motives in bringing in these German settlers, and it was not out of the kindness of the Hungarian Kings. The area was a frontier wasteland. The area was a constant path for invasions over the years by the Turkish, Tartars (Mongolian) and the Ottoman Empire. The Hungarians who controlled this territory were wary of the invading groups. The kings decided that Transylvania could serve as a buffer from these invading groups. So the primary motive was protection or first line of defense.

In order to serve as a defense, a series of towns would construct fortifications. Some legends state that seven Magyar Chieftains erected fortifications in this region. This brings us to the Transylvanian Coat of Arms, which depicts the Seven Towers or Fortifications. Also, it brings into the discussion the name, 'Siebenbürgen', which has been used to describe "Seven Towns" or "Seven Castles."

At one time, Transylvania had 300 fortified churches or castles. These structures served as fortresses against the invading groups.

This brings us to the Seven Towns that represent the

Towers or Castles in the Transylvanian Flag or Coat of Arms. The fortified towns that comprised the Seven Towns are:

Medwesch/Mediasch Nösnerland/Nösen/Bistritz Hermannstadt Klausenburg Kronstadt/Kruhnen Meinbach/Mühlbach Schassbrich/Schässburg

Klausenburg

On the site of the city was a pre-Roman settlement named Napoca. After the AD 106 Roman conquest of the area, the place was known as Municipium Aelium Hadrianum Napoca. Possible etymologies for Napoca or Napuca include the names of some Dacian tribes such as the Naparis or Napaei, the Greek term napos (νάπος), meaning "timbered valley" or "to flow, to swim, damp". The first written mention of the city's current name - as a Royal Borough - was in 1213 under the Medieval Latin name Castrum Clus and the German name Klause - Kluse (meaning "mountain pass" or "weir") or the valley that narrows or closes between hills just to the west of Cluj-Mănăștur. At the beginning of the middle Ages, two groups of buildings existed on the current site of the city: the wooden fortress at Abtsdorf and the civilian settlement developed around the current Museum Place in the city center. Although the precise date of the conquest of Transylvania by the Hungarians is not known, the earliest Hungarian artifacts found in the region are dated to the first half of the tenth century. In any case, after that time, the city became part of the Kingdom of Hungary. King Stephen I made the city the seat of the castle county, and King Saint Ladislaus I of Hungary founded the abbey of Cluj-Mănăștur (Kolozsmonostor), destroyed during the Tatar invasions in 1241 and 1285.

As for the civilian colony, a castle and a village were built to the northwest of the ancient Napoca no later than the late 12th century. This new village was settled by large groups of Transylvanian Saxons, encouraged during the reign of Crown Prince Stephen, Duke of Transylvania. The first reliable mention of the settlement dates from 1275, in a document of King Ladislaus IV of Hungary, when the village was granted to the Bishop of Transylvania. On 19 August 1316, during the rule of the new king, Charles I of Hungary, Klausenburg was granted the status of a city,

Zusammen mit dem Religionslehrer Konrad Klein haben wir das Bild zu deuten versucht. Überschrieben wird es ja mit "Beweinung und Grablegung Christi". Die Darstellung strahlt um den halbaufgerichteten Oberkörper des Leichnams Jesu eine bemerkenswerte Vielfarbigkeit aus. als handele es sich um ein feierliches gesellschaftliches Ereignis. Maria, die Mutter Jesu, mit weißem Kopftuch strahlt Helligkeit aus. Ihre rechte Hand zeigt segnend zum Kopf des Gekreuzigten. Leicht zurückversetzt an ihrer Seite ist Maria Magdalena, ebenfalls mit weißem Kopftuch, an dem Geschehen beteiligt. Im Hintergrund dürfte es Johannes, der Lieblingsjünger, sein, der mit der linken Hand zu Joseph von Arimathia weist, der im Begriff ist, den letzten Dienst am Leichnam Jesu zu verrichten. Das Gemälde zeichnet ein Geschehen von großer Ernsthaftigkeit, ohne dass es eine betonte Traurigkeit vermittelt. Es drückt in lebendigen Farben eher eine Übergangssituation aus, erfüllt von dem Glauben und der Hoffnung, dass der Tod nicht das letzte Wort haben wird, sondern die Auferstehung und das Leben, das der Welt am Ostermorgen verkündet wird.

Während ich diese Zeilen geschrieben habe, hat die Bundesversammlung einen neuen Bundespräsidenten, Pfarrer Joachim Gauck, gewählt. In mehreren Meinungsäußerungen wurde hoffnungsvoll auf seine christliche Werteorientierung hingewiesen. Outside weather permitting Plenty of eggs with games, snacks, and drinks after as a reward for the Saxons' contribution to the defeat of the rebellious Transylvanian voivode, Ladislaus Kán.

Many craft guilds were established in the second half of the 13th century, and a nobleman or aristocrat group based in commerce and craft production displaced the older landed elite in the town's leadership. Through the privilege granted by Sigismund of Luxembourg in 1405, the city opted out from the jurisdiction of voivodes, vice-voivodes and royal judges, and obtained the right to elect a twelvemember jury every year. In 1488, King Matthias Corvinus ordered that the city council, consisting of one hundred men-be half composed from the wealthy people, with craftsmen supplying the other half; together they would elect the chief judge and the jury. Meanwhile, an agreement was reached providing that half of the representatives on this city council were to be drawn from the Hungarian, half from the Saxon population, and that judicial offices were to be held on a rotating basis. In 1541, Klausenburg became part of the Eastern Hungarian Kingdom (that transformed to Principality of Transylvania in 1570), after the Ottoman Turks occupied the central part of the Kingdom of Hungary; a period of economic and cultural prosperity followed

The city is considered the unofficial capital of the historical province of Transylvania. From 1790 to 1848 and from 1861 to 1867, it was the official capital of the Grand Principality of Transylvania.

The nickname "treasure city" was acquired in the late 16th century, and refers to the wealth amassed by residents, including in the precious metals trade.

The city spreads out from St. Michael's Church built in the 14th century and named after the Archangel Michael, Klausenburg's patron saint.

The St. Michael's Church in Klausenburg has been the holly gathering sanctuary for a variety of different sects throughout its long history. For the first two centuries following the church's inception, the church belonged to the Catholic faith. During the years of 1545 to 1558, the church was of the Lutheran

denomination. From 1558 to 1566, the church became a Calvinist worship facility. In the years, 1566 to 1706, the church once again became home to a different affiliation, this time Unitarian.

While under the Unitarian leadership, the St. Michael's Church served as the center, and most important site, for the Unitarian religion in all of Europe. In 1570, the Unitarian bishop of Klausenburg, Francisc David, prophesied that the coming of Jesus would take place in the city of Klausenburg. After his prophecy became unfulfilled many Unitarian adherents were left disappointed and dissatisfied in the bishop.

In the year 1699, the Habsburgs took occupation of Transylvania. During their occupation, they gained control of all the places of worship in Klausenburg and surrounding areas. They converted the Church of St. Michael's back to the church's original, and the empire's primary religion, of Catholicism. The St. Michael's Church is Romania's only church to have served 4 different religions.

For half a century, the St. Michael's Church was also a primary meeting location for the Transylvanian Diet. The Transylvanian Diet was a group of noblemen that compromised a legislative, administrative and judicial body, which operated in the region from 1570 and 1867. The Diet made numerous important political decisions at meetings within the church's walls.

In terms of religion, Protestant ideas first appeared in the middle of the 16th century. During Gáspár Heltai's service as preacher, Lutheranism grew in importance, as did the Swiss doctrine of Calvinism. By 1571, the Torda Diet had adopted a more radical religion, Ferenc Dávid's Unitarianism, characterized by the free interpretation of the Bible and denial of the dogma of the Trinity. Stephen Báthory founded a Catholic Jesuit academy in the city in order to promote an anti-Reform movement; however, it did not have much success. For a year, in 1600-1601, Klausenburg became part of the personal union of Michael the Brave. Under the Treaty of Carlowitz

in 1699, it became part of the Habsburg Monarchy.

There are a large number of castles in the countryside surroundings, constructed by wealthy medieval families living in the city. The most notable of them is the Bonţida Bánffy Castle — once known as "the Versailles of Transylvania. In 1387, the Bontida estate came into the possession of the Hungarian Bánffy of Losonc family, when Sigismund of Luxemburg donated it to Dénes, son of Tamás Losonci. The present castle was preceded by a manor house, whose history

dates back to the 15th-16th centuries. The castle was later fortified between 1668 and 1674 by surrounding it with curtain walls that formed a rectangular enclosure, reinforced at the corners with massive circular towers. The castle could be accessed through a seven-story high gatehouse located on the fortification's eastern side.

This covers one more of the Seven Towns/Fortifications represented on the Transylvanian Flag/Emblem. We have two more Towns/Towers to cover in upcoming issues.

Is it a scam? How to know if the IRS is really calling

IRS scams are everywhere, bilking people out of thousands of dollars and fraudulently obtaining their personal information.

Phone scams are big at tax season. The thing to remember is that the real IRS will never:

- Call to demand an immediate payment using something like a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. If the IRS wants money from you, they will send a letter first. It won't come as a surprise.
- Threaten you. The IRS will never say they are going to bring police or any other kind of law enforcement person to arrest you.
- Demand tax payments without offering you the opportunity to appeal or even ask for details about the demand.
- Call you about a tax refund. They might write to you, but they won't call you first.

If you receive such a call, note the number and hang up. You can report the scam at treasury.gov/tigta/re-portcrime_misconduct.shtml

Earth Day 2022: Consider the chopstick

Chopsticks are everywhere.

A third of the global population uses them every single day. The rest of the population fumbles (and masters) them at restaurant meals. All those chopsticks add up -- mostly in landfills.

About 80 billion pairs of chopsticks are thrown away every year. To make that massive number of chopsticks, activists in China have documented the destruction of 100 acres per day of aspen, birch and bamboo.

In Vancouver, Canada, entrepreneur Felix Bock wants to do something about all those chopsticks. Something useful. Something artistic.

His new startup, ChopValue, transforms sticky single-



use chopsticks into furniture.

His raw material is not in short supply. According to Bock, his company collects 350,000 used chopsticks from 300 restaurants every week. He cleans them, compresses them, and turns them into book shelves, cutting boards, art, and desks. He

estimates that he has transformed 50 million pairs of chopsticks since 2016.

Here is how it all works.

The wood is harvested in Asia and made into chopsticks. The sticks travel 6,000 miles to Vancouver, where they end up in restaurants and are used once.

The ChopValue staff collects the sticks. They coat them in a water-based resin and sterilize them at 200 degrees Fahrenheit for five hours, according to Atlas Obscura.

After that, the sticks are sorted and sent to a hydraulic machine than breaks them down into composite wood. They are sanded, polished and lacquered.

It takes more than 10,000 chopsticks to make a desk.



Electrical injuries up, fatalities down

The good news is that in 2020, there was a 24 percent decrease in fatal electrical injuries.

However, nonfatal electrical injuries were up 17 percent, according to the Electrical Safety Foundation International.

Of the fatalities, 44 percent involved workers in construction and extraction. About 20 percent involved installation, maintenance and repair. The highest number of fatalities occurred in mining and construction.

Even while work hours decreased 10 percent in 2020, non-fatal injuries occurred in maintenance and repair (31 percent), service (25 percent) and construction and extraction (21 percent).

Anti-cancer drug promotes weight loss in obese mice

The drug camptothecin has been around since 1966 and was previously used as a cancer drug. But according to Fierce Biotech, Chinese researchers have been testing another application -- weight loss.

Obese mice who received the drug lost 11 percent of their body weight in 30 days, with most of the reduction from fat reserves. Researchers believe that the initial rodent tests are promising, but there are skeptics. Camptothecin was sidelined as a cancer drug due to its side effects, which include constipation, shortness of breath, insomnia, headache and flu-like symptoms.


