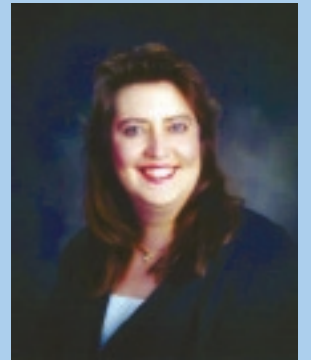

It is back to school time. Most schools seem to start earlier and earlier in August now. The school my girls graduated from still waits until after Labor Day to start. A large number of the students in that district are members of 4-H and their county fair where they show and sell their animals runs through Labor Day. Once the fair is over, it is back to school for them. Sports teams were always playing two weeks before school started, as the rest of the league was already back in school. Since it is back to school season, it means that summer is almost over. How did that happen? It seems the days fly past faster and faster. It is almost bowling season! Remember to contact a bowler from your branch or the ATS Home Office if you want to join the TSBA this season.

Did you know that the "Dog Days of Summer" have nothing to do with man's best friend? These days are usually the hottest and most unbearable days of the season. Some think it is a reference to the hot and sultry days that are "not fit for a dog". Others suggest it is a time of year when the extreme heat drives dogs mad. Actually, the phrase is a throw-back to the time when ancient civilizations tracked the seasons by looking to the sky. According to History.com, the ancient Greeks noticed that summer's most intense heat occurred during the approximate 40-day period in the early summer when Sirius, the brightest star in the sky, rose and set with the sun. To them, the daytime addition of the warmth of Sirius (ancient Greek for "glowing" or "scorcher") to the blaze of the sun equaled extreme heat. Sirius was the dog of the hunter Orion, and the ancient Romans placed the star in the constellation Canis Major (Latin for "Greater Dog"). The Romans referred to the sweltering period when the rising sun and Sirius converged as the "dies caniculares" or "days of the dog star". By the 1500s, the English world began to call the same summertime point on the astronomical calendar as the "dog days". Due to a wobble in the Earth's rotation that shifts the position of the stars in the night sky, the dates of the "dog days" now fall several weeks later on the calendar than they did thousands of years ago. According to the Farmers' Almanac, the dates now run from July 3 to August 11 each year. The extreme heat during this period is

not because of the Sirius star adding heat to the day. It is, instead, a direct result of the Earth’s tilt. During the summer in the Northern Hemisphere, the tilt of the Earth causes the Sun’s rays to hit at a more direct angle and for longer periods throughout the day. I believe that the last few weeks we have had here definitely fall into that category of “dog days of summer”! Try to stay cool, everyone.

Before Amazon,
Sears disrupted
retail

Back in May, Sears announced that it was closing roughly 100 stores, cutting the company’s footprint in half. Even those stores that survived the downsizing are likely living on borrowed time, and someday soon, Sears may fade into history. It’s hard to remember these days, but Sears revolutionized the retail industry and once ranked among the most successful companies in the world.

Founded in 1892, Sears, Roebuck and Co. initially focused on selling watches and jewelry. But the company moved aggressively to expand its product lineup. As with many disruptive companies, Sears leveraged emerging technologies and new ideas to offer goods at lower prices than the competition and the company won big.

Back in the late 19th century and early 20th century, folks living in rural areas were often forced to pay exorbitant prices at local general stores, typically on credit. Rather than setting standardized prices, local retailers typically set prices based on the creditworthiness of the customer. Have bad credit? Be prepared to pay more.

Rather than setting up local general stores and basing prices on creditworthiness, Sears offered a large catalog from which customers could order products. Prices were transparent and published in the catalog.

Of course, making a sale is one thing, and delivering the goods another. Rather than building up local infrastructure in rural areas, Sears used the high tech of the day -- railroad networks. After an order was received, the items were loaded onto trains and shipped to customers. By today’s standards, fulfilling an order was slow, often taking weeks. Back then, it was revolutionary.

Just as Amazon used the Internet to lower costs and offer a wider selection, Sears and its catalog offered folks in rural communities access to a wide productselection at lower prices. Sears would later build brick-and-mortar stores, but eventually fell behind more efficient competitors, like Walmart, along with tech-savvy companies like Amazon.

The 'big four' driver distractions



Returning from vacation, you were pretty proud of yourself for negotiating all the interstates without a wrong turn. But then your seatmate engaged you in an interesting conversation, and what happened? You missed your exit.

Distraction. That interesting conversation not only made you miss a turn, it put you and your passengers in danger. If a situation occurred that required fast action, could you have avoided an accident?

Four distinct types of distraction affect a driver's ability to safely operate a vehicle, says the National Highway Traffic Safety Commission.

Auditory distractions include conversations with passengers and listening to music or audio books.

Visual distractions include such activities as looking at the scenery and

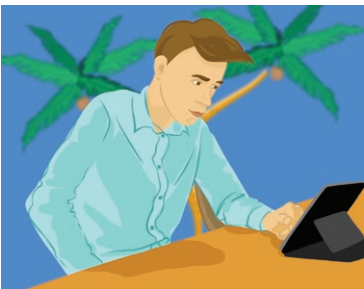
checking out other cars.

Biomechanical distractions are activities such as adjusting the air conditioning, dialing a cellphone, using day planners, making notes, and eating.

Cognitive distractions include whatever is taking your mind off the road and driving. Preoccupation with other thoughts, worrying, and planning what you will do later are examples.

Cell phones, especially texting, are unique in that they encompass all four modes of driver distraction, say experts at Dynamic Science, a private research organization.

Research on crashes involving cell phone use shows that drivers often run off the road or hit something stopped in front of them, neither of which would happen if they were paying attention.



Clock in from paradise: Countries offer digital visas for remote workers

Does your home office look a little drab after years of remote work? Maybe it's time to move -- to Bali.

The Indonesian province has long been a tourist destination, and according to Forbes, it's one of the newest places to consider offering long-term visas to lure so-called digital nomads away from their boring home offices. Participating workers would get five tax-free years in Bali, which boasts white sand beaches, world-renowned food, lively nightlife, easily accessible WiFi and a modest cost of living. The benefit for the local economy: Day-to-day spending that would shore up the incomes of local workers for years.

Indonesia didn't invent the digital nomad visa -- dozens of countries, including Georgia, Croatia, Estonia, Barbados, the Cayman Islands, Iceland, Germany, Norway, Portugal, Seychelles and Cape Verde, already offer similar programs that roll out the welcome mat for remote workers from other nations. Each country has its own requirements for minimum income or bank balance, and the application process can vary in length and complexity.

Emergency savings

About one in five Americans didn't save any money in 2021, according to the MagnifyMoney Savings Index. About 18 percent of respondents admitted to contributing zero dollars to their savings last year and another 48 percent contributed fewer than \$5,000.

About 25 percent of Americans have no emergency fund at all, according to Bankrate's July 2021 Emergency Savings survey. About one in six households report having more savings now than prior to the pandemic.

The Federal Reserve reports that 36 percent of Americans don't have enough money on hand to cover a \$400 emergency.

At least 170 phytochemicals have been identified in orange juice. Orange juice also contains vitamin C, carotenoids and fiber. A study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association shows that drinking one extra glass of citrus juice reduces the risk of stroke by about 20 percent.

That was highly unusual. The personal savings rate was 4.4 percent in April 2022--the lowest rate recorded since September 2008.



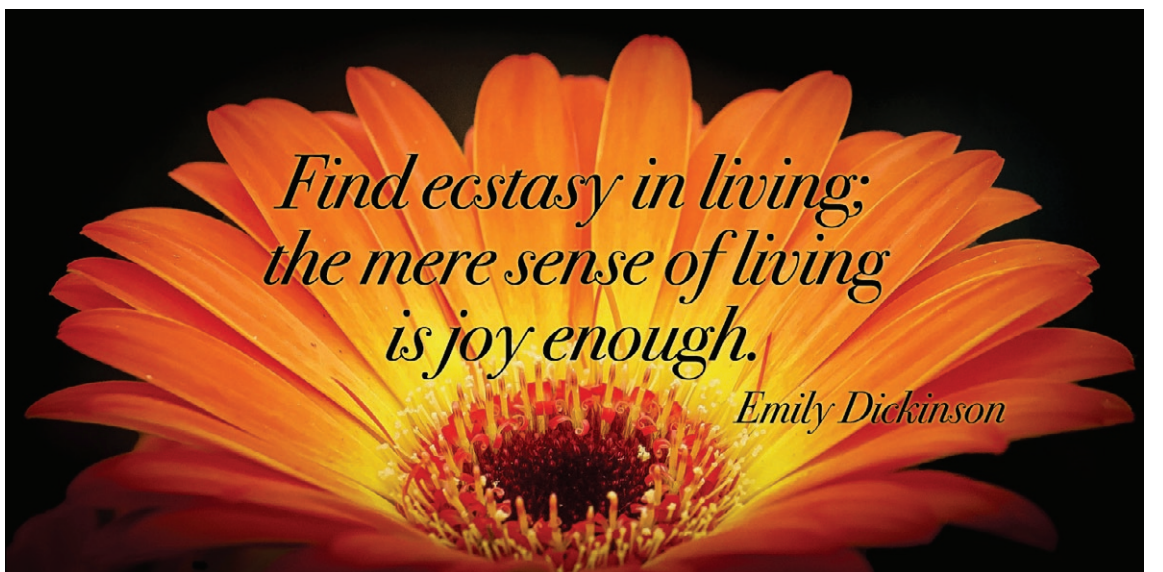
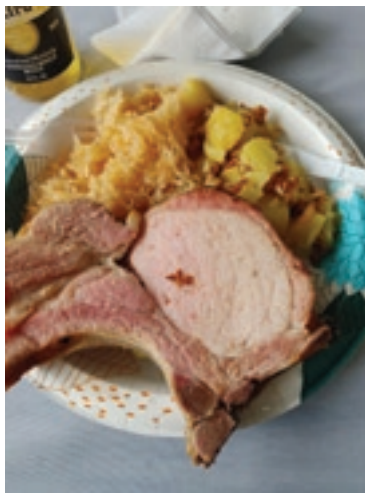
