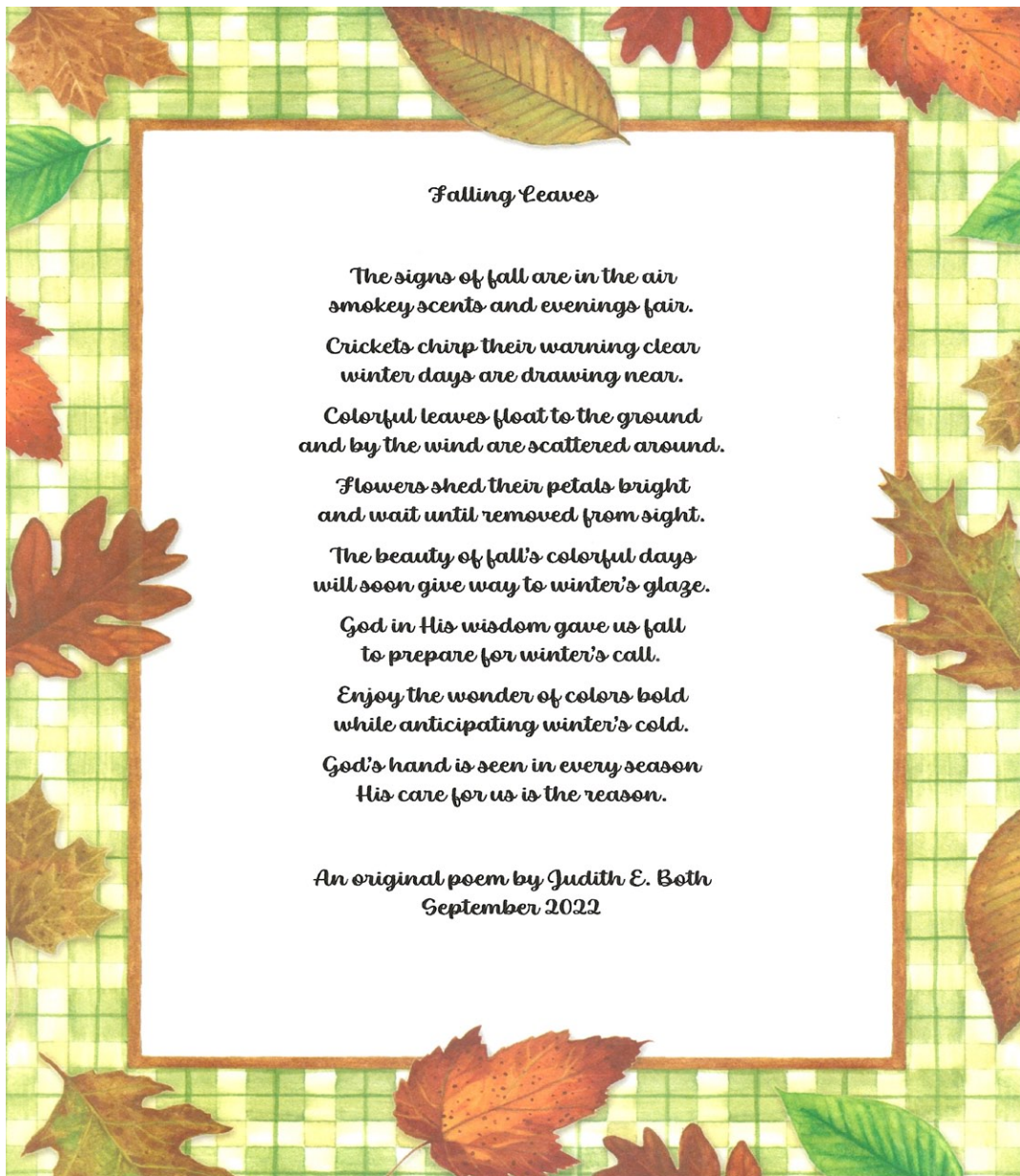

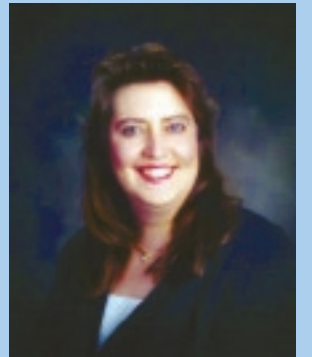

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As the year is starting to wind down, please don't forget that there are still ATS events in the Fraternal calendar. The first TSBA session will be on September 18th in Youngstown, Ohio. The ATS Family Weekend at Camp Fitch will take place September 23rd to the 25th. The second TSBA bowling session will be October 2nd in Salem, Ohio. The ATS Open Bowling Tournament will be on October 29th and 30th, in Youngstown.

As I am writing this, the office is busy preparing for the Annual Trustee Audit and the quarterly Board of Directors meeting. The ATS Trustees will be in the office on Friday, September 9th to review the financial and procedural processes of the Home Office. The following day, on Saturday, September 10th the Board of Directors will all meet to review the 2nd Quarter financials and other ongoing activity of the ATS. The 2nd Quarter financial statements were filed with the NAIC and state insurance departments on August 15th. I will report on the meetings in the next issue.

September is Life Insurance Awareness month. I came across the following facts and figures from LIMRA (a worldwide life insurance research and education organization). Here are 10 Facts about Life Insurance That Might Surprise You:

1. Half of American adults, representing 129 million Americans, say they do not have life insurance.
2. More than four in ten families would face financial hardship within six months should the primary wage earner die. A quarter would struggle financially within a month.
3. While seven in ten uninsured consumers say they do not have life insurance because it is too expensive, 75% overestimate the cost of life insurance.
4. Seven in ten women believe having life insurance is important, yet the majority of women are uninsured.
5. More than four in ten parents with financially dependent children do not have life insurance.
6. A majority of uninsured Americans say they have not purchased coverage because they do not know what to buy or how much they need.
7. Four in ten insurance owners say they wish they purchased coverage at a younger age.
8. Seven in ten Americans who own life insurance feel financially secure, compared with just 47% of uninsured Americans.
9. One in five millennials mistakenly believe they would not qualify for life insurance (although most would).
10. Forty-one percent of Americans, 106 million adults, say they need life insurance or need more life insurance.

Also according to LIMRA, the top three major reasons people say they have life insurance involve protecting



ATS OPEN BOWLING TOURNAMENT RULES

1. All bowlers must be Alliance of Transylvanian Saxon members in good standing to participate in this tournament.
2. Each bowler will receive 100% of the difference between his or her average and a two hundred ten (210) scratch with no limit on pins.
3. Averages to be used are:
 - a. The average of the past five years' tournaments, with exception of 2020.
 - b. If the bowler has no tournament average, then the bowler will establish his or her average after the first three games rolled in the tournament, which will remain the bowler's average for the remainder of the tournament.
4. A bowler may bowl only once in each event in this tournament.
5. The tournament management has the right to return for correction any entry, which does not comply with the above rules.
6. Prizes will be awarded at the ratio of at least one (1) prize for each ten entries. One hundred percent (100%) of the prize fee must be returned. Prizes will be awarded by handicapped scores and not by gender.
7. It shall be the duty of the tournament manager to keep a running record of all bowlers' averages participating in each event.
8. Tournament starts on October 29, 2022 and ends on October 30, 2022.
9. Closing date for entries is October 12, 2022.
10. There will be no refunds of fees after October 19, 2022.
11. Two All Events Winners will be awarded. One for actual scores; one for actual scores plus handicap.
12. We will start with Doubles Event followed by the Singles Event on Saturday.

Your All Events score will be your total individual score of singles, doubles, and team event plus your handicap total for the tournament.

Separate men and women prizes will only be awarded in Singles event only. Doubles and team event will be mixed.



How to store your emergency funds

Building up an emergency fund is one of the smartest steps you can take to ensure your financial and overall well-being. Emergency funds are liquid funds that you can tap into when the times get tough. Maybe you need to pay for an expensive automotive repair, or perhaps the fridge dies. If you suddenly have an expensive and unavoidable bill to pay, an emergency fund can come to the rescue.

But, where do you store those funds? Here are three considerations for your emergency fund:

- Your funds should be easy to access. In the parlance of finance, they should be liquid -- funds you can get today if you must.
- But not too easy to access. You should have to take an extra step and think about it for a minute. You should keep those funds where you can easily forget them, but still remember them in an emergency.
- They should also be safe. You don't want to risk your emergency funds.
- They should prevent you from falling into debt.

With those requirements in mind, it's easy to eliminate stocks and credit cards as a emergency money source. While stocks can be a very good investment, giving you a lot of return, they also can go down. While some financial experts argue that some portion of a large emergency fund should be in stocks, if your fund is



less than \$10,000, don't risk your money.

Credit cards don't work because they add debt. The whole idea of an emergency fund is to prevent a spiral into debt. You might be able to handle one small financial emergency on a card, but if a second emergency follows, you end up servicing debt rather than saving money.

That leaves savings accounts. They give you the opportunity to make regular deposits and they are safe.

You want to keep your emergency fund separate from your regular savings and checking accounts, making it easier to track your finances. Once a month or so, you can simply take a peek at your account to reassure yourself that the funds are there and will be there when needed.

Choose a separate credit union or bank for your emergency fund. Another choice is a high-yield online savings account. Those accounts usually have a higher interest rate than traditional banks.

How to get rid of those leaves

- Mow and mulch. If leaves aren't too deep, mow with a mulching lawn mower and leave them on the grass.
- Use a leaf blower. It will work very well on smaller lawns.
- Or you could rake your leaves. Occupational therapists recommend buying a rake with an ergonomic curved handle.

The American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons suggests wearing gloves to pre-

vent blisters, and bending at the knees rather than the waist. Avoid twisting motions while raking and take extra care when leaves are wet and slippery. Don't do too much at one time.

To bag leaves, rake the stack onto an old sheet or a tarp, then dump the stack into a leaf bag.

Apple orchards make fun outings



**It matters not
where you were born,
or where you live,
but what's in your HEART.
Be Proud to be
Transylvanian Saxon!**

Does anything taste better than a crisp, ripe apple, fresh from the tree? Not really, and unless you have trees in your backyard, the only way to get a just-picked apple is to visit your local orchard and do it yourself.

Decide when you should plan your visit. Earlier is better -- many orchards are picked clean before the official end of the season because it's such a popular activity. You should also consider when different varieties will be available. Call your preferred orchard or visit their website to see if they have that information available. Most orchards are only open to the public on weekends, so don't count on stopping by on a weekday.



Before you bring home more apples than you can possibly eat, consider how much you really want and what you might do with them. Are they all destined for lunchboxes? Is there an apple pie recipe or three you can try? Do you plan to cook a bushel down to make homemade applesauce?

When you head to the orchard, visit only the designated rows of trees that

have been opened for picking. Look at apples closest to the outside of the three -- those ripen first. The right color depends on the variety, and the orchard may provide pictures for reference. If not, just look them up on your phone.

When you start picking, lift the apple away from the branch and give it a little twist to release it. Don't pull -- you want the stem to remain on the fruit to help it last longer. Inspect the apple for any nicks or bruises, then place it gently (don't drop it) into your basket or bag. If you pick an apple and then accidentally drop it on the ground, it's still fine to pick up, but don't collect any apples that were already on the ground.
