

HOME MISSION WORK



The Original St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church ca. 1924

It is due to the far-seeing vision of two prominent members of the Pittsburgh Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America that at the Convention in 1922 this Synod added to its program of Home Missions the work among the Transylvanian Saxons. Dr. Ernst A. Tappert, then President of the German Conference, and Dr. Ellis E. Burgess Synodical President, recognized the obligation and the opportunity presented by the settling in America of these people with Lutheran traditions of many years. The sympathetic and optimistic presentation of this new project by these two men was instrumental in securing the action of their Synod.



Cleveland was selected as the first mission field, and the newly ordained pastor, Rev. John Foisel, was sent to start the work among his countrymen in the Forest City. The beginning was hard, but able and devoted laymen helped the Pastor m his endeavors. On the 9th of July, 1922, at a meeting of interested Saxons, St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church was organized. The congregation grew, and in the fall of the same year a house was bought on Eddy Road where all activities of the mission were centered. In July, 1924, work was started on the first church to be built by Saxons on the American continent. Other organizations of Cleveland and the other Saxon colonies gave their support to the inspiring project, and all felt happy and proud when the first service was held in the new Saxon Church. During 1926-27 a small parish house with a janitor's residence was built. This made the property of St. John's Church the largest of all Saxon congregations in America.

PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

As the month of October winds down, so does the legacy of St. John's Lutheran Church in Highland Heights, Ohio. St. John's was one of the earliest Saxon Churches in America. Many members of Branch 33 (Cleveland East) attended this church throughout the years. John Foisel, a 26-year old missionary from Transylvania held his first service in Cleveland at the Westside Sachsenheim in June 1922. He organized St. John's Lutheran Church in July 1922 with 63 members. The congregation purchased land on Eddy Road by September of that year. While awaiting construction of the church, Reverend Foisel held services at various locations for the next two years. The cornerstone of the church was laid on September 7, 1924. Pastor Foisel dedicated the completed church in December 1924. In 1959, the congregation purchased land on Ford Road in Highland Heights to construct a new church. The Eddy Road church was sold in 1961 and the congregation again met in various places until the new church was built. This new location was dedicated in 1963. Nine years later in 1972, the congregation burned the mortgage in celebration of their 50th anniversary. From its purely ethnic beginning with services held in Transylvanian Saxon and German, St. John's evolved into an English-speaking congregation with members of many nationalities. St. John's Lutheran Church celebrated its 100th anniversary on September 18, 2022. Unfortunately, dwindling membership has resulted in the sale of the church. The final service to be held at St. John's is slated for Sunday, October 30. For those Transylvanian Saxons past and present, who helped sustain that church for 100 years, you have all of our thanks and blessings.

The Cleveland Saxon Dance Group held its Traubenfest on Saturday, October 15th. This is always a fun event and this year was no exception. The dance group prepared and served a delicious pork dinner. The Children's Dance Group performed as well as the Adult Group. It was nice to see some new dancers as well as the return of some dancers from years past. You can tell that they have been practicing hard with those new members and learning new dances. Both groups should be proud of themselves. I know the ATS is proud to have them as one of our cultural groups. The grape stealing was back this year! The young ones did a fine job as "Deputies", catching the grape stealers and hauling them off to jail to pay their fine. In addition, some young ones took the time to stuff a scarecrow, while blindfolded. I believe everyone enjoyed the evening. We look forward to the next Cleveland Saxon Dance Group event, which will be held January 28th when they have their 50 Year Reunion.

Did you know that candy corn isn't just for Halloween? Apparently, there are varieties for Thanksgiving, Christmas, Valentine's Day and Easter. Some other fun candy trivia follows. A dentist helped to invent cotton candy. The candy's early name was Fairy Floss. Life Savers got their round shape after the inventor visited a pharmacy. Most candies at that time were square, but the inventor made his round after seeing a machine making pills that were round and flat. The Snickers bar was named after a beloved racehorse that the Mars family owned that had passed away. Snickers was raised on the family farm, the Milky Way, in Tennessee. The 3 Musketeers bar originally featured 3 pieces of candy flavoring: chocolate, strawberry and vanilla. Vanilla and strawberry (as well as sugar) were scarce during World War II, so they ditched the vanilla and strawberry flavors and stayed with the chocolate flavor. Salt Water Taffy is generally not salty, watery or made from saltwater. Per New Jersey legend, in 1883 a storm hit the Atlantic City boardwalk, flooding several candy shops. When a girl approached a candy counter afterward looking for some taffy, the disgruntled proprietor jokingly told her only "salt water taffy" was left. The name stuck and today's Salt Water Taffy still echoes the storeowner's sarcastic comment. Whichever type of candy you enjoy, have fun this Halloween!




Our secretary, Dianne Kuttler, read the minutes from September and Katie Lederle gave the financial report. We had 2 birthdays,

Has internet killed radio?

You're driving down the road on a warm autumn day. The windows are down and burning leaves scent the air. The speakers pipe in "Video Killed the Radio Star" and you drum your fingers on the steering wheel in time with the beat. But wait a minute ... video didn't really kill the radio star, did it?

The end of radio has long been prophesied, but the marching bands march on. Television did have a huge impact on music, and as a result, radio. Ditto for the Internet, Napster, iTunes, and Spotify. Indeed, the rise of streaming and on-demand music is reshaping the radio industry as we know it.

Nov. 2, 1920, marked a momentous day for music and technology when KDKA-AM Pittsburgh, the first commercial radio station, launched. This kicked off the era of commercial radio. But now, traditional radio stations are falling to the wayside as more folks get their tunes over the Internet.

In the early 20th century, radios ranked among the premier electronic devices, allowing folks to tune into music, news and other entertainment from around the world. Now there are billions of electronic devices, and increasingly, these devices tune into the world wide web, not radio waves. The Internet probably won't kill the radio star, but it will change how radio stations op-

Some radio stations are adapting and putting listeners in charge. You can still listen to radio stations and you don't even need a tuner -- just a reliable Internet connection. Smartly run radio stations can benefit. iHeartMedia partnered with radio giant NPR to promote Disgraceland, a popular true-crime podcast. The results? Disgraceland went from 200,000 downloads to over 2 million a month.

What's more, with some on-demand web radio stations, you can often rewind, fast forward, and skip songs. Folks want music on demand, and if they disagree with the DJ's selection, they'll simply change the tunes or tune out.










George Eastman and the rise of Eastman Kodak



George Eastman

If you have a snapshot of your great-aunt Gladys from 1940, you can thank George Eastman, the father of consumer cameras.

Self-educated and from a modest background, George Eastman created one of the world's great technology companies, Eastman Kodak, and put cameras and photographs into the hands of everyday people in everyday situations.

Eastman's father died when he was young, forcing George to leave school to support his mother and siblings. Early on, Eastman founded a photography business and pursued photography both as an entrepreneur and as a passion project. "What we do during our working hours," Eastman later said, "determines what we have; what we do in our leisure hours determines what we are."

But it was Eastman's leisure hours that earned him a vast fortune and changed how we think about leisure in the process. He developed the idea of a film roll in his kitchen in 1884 at age 34. The roll made it possible to take black-and-white pictures one after another in sequence. In 1888, he introduced the Kodak camera, making the film roll easy to use. With the original Kodak camera, the film was pre-loaded and allowed the user to snap 100 photos before mailing the camera back to Eastman Kodak. The company would process the photos, reload the camera and send it all back to the photographer. It inspired the company slogan: You push the button, we do the rest. In many ways, Kodak cameras rank among the earliest examples of modern subscription services and products.

The name Kodak referred not only to the camera, but also to the film. Eastman invented the word with his mother using scrabble tiles. He thought the letter K was strong, and he wanted his film to have a short,

pleasant sounding, easily remembered name: Kodak.

In 1935, the Eastman Kodak introduced Kodachrome film, and suddenly, the world was documented in color

Perhaps a bit prophetically, Eastman argued that "The world is moving, and a company that contents itself with present accomplishments soon falls behind." Once a dominant player in the camera and film market, Eastman Kodak has fallen on hard times in the 21st century. The rise of mobile phones and digital cameras spelled doom for traditional film cameras, but when Kodak was founded in the 19th century, photography was at the cutting edge of technology. And George Eastman made cameras and photography a part of everyday life.

Eastman never married and spent his early life trying to support his mother and siblings. By the time he reached his late 30s, he was on the way to becoming a wealthy leader of industry, a philanthropist, a leader in establishing worker benefits and profit sharing, and one of the first to promote a woman to an executive position. In 1932, in great pain from a spinal disease, Eastman ended his own life after writing to friends that his work was done and "Why wait?"

The infamous chorizo tweet and what it teaches


Some Twitter users have been humbled, and a scientist has apologized, after a simple joke unintentionally revealed just how credulous people can be.

French physicist Etienne Klein recently trolled the Internet by posting up a supposed image of a distant star. Except it was no star at all -- just an ordinary slice of chorizo sausage.

Admittedly, the chorizo did share a somewhat uncanny resemblance with photos of our sun. Problem is, we have no way of collecting high definition images of distant stars, not even with the recently launched and cutting-edge James Webb telescope.

Consider this: The James Webb telescope recently had its sights trained on Jupiter and the images stunned many scientists. The details offered were far more nuanced than expected, even rivaling that sliced chorizo. But Jupiter is a mere 380 million miles away -- next door in cosmic terms -- and it takes light from the sun about 45 minutes to reach the gas giant.

The closest star to our solar system, Proxima Centauri, is about four light years away. In a single year, light will travel 5.88 trillion miles. Yes, trillion with a T, meaning Proxima Centauri is about 23.5




trillion miles away. Our best telescopes can collect detailed images of objects hundreds of millions of miles away, but with our current technology, there's no way to get detailed imagines from objects many trillions of miles away. Keep in mind that in the cosmic sense, Proxima Centauri is practically our neighbor.

What does all of this mean? For one, we're just starting to explore space. And on top of that, a healthy dose of skepticism can go a long way. That includes questioning authority figures, as the chorizo incident so finely illustrates. The internet has made it easy to share information, but that doesn't mean that everything floating around is true, even if the information comes from an authoritative source.


Deer love pumpkins!


