Long-term planning for long-term care

It's a new year and for many Americans, it's smart to consider expanding or modifying insurance plans to better suit your needs.

One thing folks should consider is long-term care (LTC). These plans typically help cover the costs for services like in-home care, stays at nursing homes and assisted living facilities, and adult daycare programs. Traditional insurance plans and Medicare/ Medicaid often cover only limited aspects of LTC and may prove inadequate.

When people need care over time, it's often because they're seriously ill, recovering from an operation, or have an impairment. It's smart to prepare for such hardships by enrolling in an LTC health insurance program. Yet, as of 2020, only 7.5 million Americans had LTC coverage.

Without LTC insurance, people have to pay out of pocket for care. That can cost more than \$50,000 a year in an assisted living facility or more than \$100,000 in a nursing home. Medicare covers only shortterm stays. Long-term care insurance can protect your nest egg.

How about costs? A LTC plan will cost a 55-year-old male about \$950 a year and a female about \$1,500. For a 65-year-old, the plan would cost \$1,700 and \$2,700, respectively. If you select a plan with inflation adjustments, costs go up.

Keep in mind, these are only averages. Like traditional insurance plans, you can select more basic LTC plans that offer more affordable premiums. Likewise, you may be able to add LTC coverage to existing health insurance plans and save money.

Shelley's "Frankenstein" was published in 1818 and Johnny Cash had a concert at San Quentin State Prison in 1958. Attending the concert as a prisoner was Merle Haggard, who credited Johnny Cash with giving him the inspiration to launch a career after prison.

On January 2, 1890, President Benjamin Harrison welcomed Alice Sanger as the first female staffer to the White House. Also on the 2nd, Georgia became the fourth state in the US in 1788. In 1974, President Nixon signed the national speed limit into law. This was during the oil embargo with OPEC and Nixon lowered all national highway speed limits to 55 mph. On January 2, 1965, quarterback Joe Namath signed with the New York Jets. The contract was reportedly for \$427,000, the most lucrative signed by a rookie in any sport.

On January 3, 1925, Benito Mussolini declared himself dictator of Italy. In 1973, a group headed by George Steinbrenner purchased the New York Yankees for \$10 million from CBS. In 2004, the Mars Exploration Rover "Spirit" safely landed on the planet and surveyed the surface for the next seven years. Also on January 3, 1521, Pope Leo X excom-

municated Martin Luther from the Catholic Church. Alaska was admitted into the Union as the 49th state on January 3, 1959.

On January 4, 1896, Utah entered the Union as the 45th state. Earlier, in 1847, Samuel Colt sold his first revolvers to the US Government. On January 4, 1999, the Euro made its debut, as 11 European nations adopted the single currency.

On January 5, 1933, construction began on the Golden Gate Bridge over San Francisco Bay. It opened in 1937 and was the longest bridge span in the world at that time. On January 5, 1643, the first legal divorce in the colonies was granted to Anne Clark of the Massachusetts Bay Colony from her absent and adulterous husband. In 1920, the New York Yankees announced the purchase of Babe Ruth for the sum of \$125,000 from the Boston Red Sox. In 1972, President Nixon launched the space shuttle program.

On January 6, 1838, Samuel Morse unveiled the telegraph, which revolutionized communication. In 1975, Wheel of Fortune premiered. Also on January 6, 1412, Joan of Arc was born and in 1919 Theodore Roosevelt, the 26th president, died. In 1912, New Mexico was admitted to the Union as the 47th state. Wow! That's a lot of history!

Flavonols may slow cognitive decline

Higher dietary intake of flavonols -- antioxidants found in tea, wine and certain fruits and vegetables -- may help preserve memory and cognitive abilities among older people, according to a new study published in the journal Neurology.

Researchers followed 961 study participants whose ages ranged from 60 to 100 years old for an average of 6.9 years, tracking their intake of flavonols called quercetin, kaempferol, myricetin and isorhamnetin. None of the participants showed symptoms of dementia at the beginning of the study, and all participants underwent annual cognitive and memory assessments.

The study conclusion: People whose diets were highest in flavonols, particularly kaempferol, displayed measurably slower rates of cognitive decline



compared to people who consumed flavonols lower quantities. You can find kaempferol in apples, grapes, tomatoes, green tea, and several types of berries, among other foods.

Though the results are promising, researchers aren't jumping to conclusions or recommending flavonol supplements yet, according to CNN. Flavonol-rich diets typically include larger quantities of fruits and vegetables, which provide an array of health benefits. More research is needed to determine whether the cognitive benefits were a direct result of flavonol consumption or due to healthy diets

and other factors.

Still, a few extra daily servings of flavonol-rich foods, like leafy greens or berries, are unlikely to hurt you, and the benefits may be greater than we know.

Everyone please have a most wonderful, safe and healthy Christmas and New Year and also a warm one.





Venezuelans wrap 12 lentils in a money bill to in order to provide financial wealth and well-being. If you are looking for happiness and prosperity make sure you wear yellow underwear. If you are looking for love, wear red underwear. Some

believe you should wear the underwear inside out before midnight and then when the clock strikes 12 turn them right side out. If you are lookempty suitcase around the house or block in order to improve your chances to travel the world. Apopular tradition

write down things on paper you would like to change and then burning it. Some Chileans celebrate the occasion by spending time with dearly departed family in the cemetery.

Columbia, Peru, Ecuador and Paraguay build dolls or effigies, dressed in old clothes or with faces of unpopular cultural figures and set them ablaze at midnight. Depending on your goals you may burn a different colored candle; blue for peace, red for love and green for health. Money can be an incentive for the New Year; Ecuadorians hide their money around the house. Some believe dropping a gold ring in a flute can bring good luck and prosperity.

Argentina's New Year occurs in the summer. Their tradition is swimming at the beach, having barbecues and spending time with family and friends.

Bolivia has a tradition surrounding love. In order to make your love notice you, you must stand up and sit down 12 times. Then you must tie a red ribbon around a picture of the person you love and sleep with the pic-

January 16: Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

The speech that changed Standing before the Linthe world

This year, 2023, will mark the 60th anniversary of one of the most famous speeches in American history, and perhaps the history of the world, too.

Just 17 minutes long, Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech was a turning point in the civil rights movement. In it, King departed from his prepared text, possibly because gospel singer Mahalia Jackson urged him, "Tell them about the dream!"

coln Memorial on Aug. 28, 1963, King improvised the most iconic passage. His famous words:

I say to you today, my friends, so even though we face the difficulties of today and tomorrow, I still have a dream. It is a dream deeply rooted in the American dream.

I have a dream that one day this nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are cre-



ated equal.'

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character."

I have a dream today.

The neo-classical hall church with chancel and western bell tower was built between 1810 and 1813, after the collapse of the initial construction, first mentioned in documents from 1270. But there is no information concerning the aspect of this former church. It is, though, supposed to have been represented in a drawing on one of the church's pews, dated 1793. The interior hosts the altar with organ gallery, the pulpit and the font, which were made partially at the same time with the construction itself, but also in 1822.

Only the ring wall and four defensive towers are still preserved from the 15th century fortification system, while the fifth tower collapsed in 1925 and was never rebuilt. On the southern side, next to the former kennel, only the ruins of the old Saxon school still exist today.

Place and surroundings

The fortified church in the village of Crit, where more than 400 years ago the first village school law in Transylvania was enacted, lies on a hill in the middle of the place. In the past this location demanded a castle guardian who was a cobbler or at least a skilled craftsman. The steep ascent to the church is arduous and paved with round cobblestones. Many women, on their way to Sunday service, broke their footwear, which were heeled with horseshoes. A cobbler was church.

Brighten up January with black bottom lemon pie

Sweet, tart and colorful lemon in this unique pie provides a splash of color and flavor on gray January days, with a layer of slightly bitter chocolate ganache to balance it out. Meyer lemons create an especially brilliant flavor, but regular lemons are also delicious.

Ingredients

- 1 pre-baked pie shell 3/4 cup heavy cream 4 ounces bittersweet chocolate, chopped into small pieces
- 4 eggs
- 1 egg yolk
- 1-1/3 cups white sugar 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice
- from about 4 lemons 1/4 fresh orange juice zest of 1 lemon

zest of about 1/4 orange

First, make the ganache. Heat 1/4 cup of the heavy cream over medium heat until it bubbles. Remove from heat, add chocolate pieces and swirl to coat the chocolate. Set aside for 2 to 3 minutes, then gently stir to combine. Spread choco-



late mixture on the bottom of the pie shell in an even layer and place in refrigerator to set.

For the lemon filling, mix eggs, yolks, sugar and salt on medium speed with a stand or hand mixer until thick and fully combined. Add lemon and orange juice, zests and the remaining 1/2 cup of cream and mix well. Strain filling though a mesh sieve into a

separate bowl.

To assemble, place pie shell on a baking sheet and pour strained filling over the cooled ganache layer. Bake on center rack at 325 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes, then rotate and bake for an additional 15 to 20 minutes. Pie is done when edges are set and center is wobbly, but not liquid. Cool for 2 to 3 hours before serving.

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
