Anyone wishing to attend the Eastern European Congress of Ohio dinner celebration on Saturday, April 22 should call the ATS Home Office at (440) 842-8442 for reservations. The dinner will be held at the Westside Sachsenheim in Cleveland. As I mentioned in the January 20th issue, April is Eastern European Month in Ohio. The ATS is a member of this organization, along with 25 other nationalities. Entertainment for the evening will be our own Cleveland Saxon Dance Group. The deadline for dinner reservations is Friday, March 31. Anyone is welcome to attend. I am hoping that we have quite a few Transylvanian Saxons on hand that evening to meet with the other nationalities attending.

I would like to remind all Branch Treasurers that the IRS Form 990 or the 990-N Electronic Postcard is due May 15th. Every ATS Branch is required to file one of these two types of information forms. Even though each Branch is exempt from federal income taxes under the ATS exemption, each Branch still has an annual reporting requirement. If the annual gross receipts of a Branch is normally \$50,000 or less, the 990-N E-Postcard can be filed online with the IRS. If the annual gross receipts for the Branch is normally greater than \$50,000, a traditional Form 990 must be completed and filed. If a Branch goes for three years without filing one of these types of forms, it will lose its tax-exempt status. If this happens, you will be required to pay federal income taxes on the Branch's earnings, just like any other taxable company. Filing the 990-N E-Postcard is relatively easy. If you need assistance, call the ATS Home Office and we can help you through the process. A copy of the filing (whether it is the Form 990 or the 990-N E-Postcard) should be mailed to the ATS Home Office for our records.

During the 2022 ATS Convention, there were no bids received to host the 2024 Convention. The ATS is still looking for a Branch to host the Convention next year. Please discuss hosting this event during your next Local Branch Meeting. If you have questions about hosting the event, please feel free to call or email the **ATS Home Office.** Did you know the March weather proverb "In like a lion, out like a lamb" also has a different interpretation? The phrase means that if the month starts out stormy, it will end with mild weather. In most years, this proverb holds true. However, this phrase could come from an astronomy perspective. Survey: medical data is not accessible to patients

Sixty percent of consumers don't have quick access to their health records and another 17 percent aren't sure if they do, according to a new survey from Carta Healthcare.

Out of over 1,000 patients who participated in the survey, a further 66 percent didn't know what happened to their data after they left their doctor's office. The large majority of the patients -- 74 percent -- indicated that better access to their data was important, and 45 percent said they were more likely to recommend physicians who provided easy access to their medical records.



Classic Irish soda bread comforts the soul

Irish soda bread might be one of Ireland's most famous foods, but the technique -leavening bread with soda instead of yeast -- is probably even more American than apple pie.

Native Americans prepared the first quick breads with pearl ash, a potashderived natural soda that reacted with mild acids like sour milk or honey to release carbon dioxide bubbles.

Irish soda bread came along much later, when commercial production of baking soda made it cheap and widely available. When famine and poverty ravaged Ireland, basic soda bread, which could be prepared with just four ingredients, helped families survive. Eventually, necessity turned into tradition, and today, just about every Irish family has their own traditions regarding this classic staple. Experiment with this simple recipe and maybe you can create your own.



Ingredients:

1-3/4 cups buttermilk 1 large egg

4-1/4 cups flour (spooned and leveled), plus more for hands and work sugar, baking soda, baking powder and salt together in a large bowl; then cut in cold butter into flour mixture with a fork, your hands, or a pastry cutter. Whisk buttermilk and 1 egg together and add to flour mixture. Bring the dough together with your hands into a circular loaf and score the top with a very sharp knife. Bake in pie dish or cake pan until golden brown -- about 45 minutes. Cool for at least 10 minutes in pan before transferring to wire rack.

The Irish ballad of beauty and mystery

The ballad Danny Boy perhaps perfectly reflects the pain of the diaspora from Ireland and has become an Irish anthem. But the origins of the tune are obscure, its lyrics something of a mystery.

Interestingly, the lyrics weren't written by an Irishman, but English lawyer Frederic Edward Weatherly, who wrote two stanzas of the song in 1910 without a tune to go with it. How the lyrics were set to music is hotly debated. Some say that in 1912, Weatherly's Irish sister-in-law sent him the music to Londonderry Air. Others say that Weatherly's sister-in-law was living in Ouray, Colorado, and set Frederic's poem to the tune of Londonderry Air herself. Londonderry Air is an ancient tune with roots in Ireland and Scotland, perhaps even Celtic origins. The tune was first published in 1851 by Jane Ross, who heard it played by a blind traveling fiddler. Before the tune became famous as Danny Boy, it had been arranged many times as Londonderry Air with many different lyrics,

usually patriotic.

But come ye back when summer's in the meadow Or all the valley's hushed and white with snow 'Gis I'll be here in sunshine or in shadow O Danny boy, O Danny boy, I love you so


Even so, Danny Boy's well-known lyrics continue to intrigue.

For one thing, we can only speculate about the narrator, who says that Danny Boy must leave for a long while, but the narrator must stay,

In addition, nowhere in the lyrics does it say why Danny Boy must leave. Some say the 'pipes calling across the glen' suggest that Danny Boy participated in an uprising. In some versions, notably that of Sinead O'Connor, the verses are changed to be explicitly political: Danny Boy is fighting for the freedom of Ireland. Finally, in the last two stanzas, the longing for Danny Boy changes. It becomes clear that Danny Boy has been so long gone that he is feared dead. Only in heaven will they all be reunited.

pledging to wait for him always, even to death. While the song is a favorite of tenors, the lyrics can be read as a woman longing for her beloved, a father lamenting his son, or even a paean to a sibling. In the second to last verse, we know it is not the mother singing, because she has been brought low by Danny Boy's absence.

Reducing the pain, increasing function with wrist arthritis

Wrist arthritis is common in older adults. Often, it develops as the result of a past trauma or fracture, but there are simple steps that can reduce pain and increase function.

• Apply heat, cold, or both. An electric heating pad or warm water soaks can ease pain and stiffness. An ice pack or cold water soaks can reduce pain from a flare-up caused by too much activity.

• Contrast baths can also be helpful. Soak hands in warm water for 10 minutes. Then switch to cold water for one minute. Or cycle back and forth for half an hour and end with warm water.

• Apply a topical prescription pain reliever gel like Voltaren or Solaraze.

Over-the-counter pain relievers can help. Acetaminophen (Tylenol and others) and Advil have the lowest risk of side effects.

The Centers for Disease Control Prevention and has this important information for you.

If you suspect that a child or adult has ingested poison, first, remain calm.

• Call 911 if the victim has collapsed. If the victim is not breathing, call 911, then

give mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

• If the victim is awake and alert, call the Poison Control Center at 1-800-222-1222. It is open 24/7.

• Be prepared to give the victim's age and approximate weight.

• Describe the substance. Read from the container if available.

• Never make the victim vomit unless instructed to do so by Poison Control.

· Give your address and phone number. Stay on the phone for instructions from the emergency operator. The specialist may need to call you back.

Poison Prevention

Medicines: Turn on a light when you give or take medicines. Read medication directions. Keep medicines in their original bottles. Store in a safe place where they can't be reached by children or teenagers.

Household cleaners and chemicals: Keep chemicals, cleaners and beauty products in their original containers. Always read the label before using.

Never mix cleaning products together. Doing so could produce toxic gases. Wear clothing that covers the skin

when you spray pesticides or other chemicals.

Open the windows and use a fan when using chemicals in the house.

Protecting young children: Keep drugs and chemicals in childproof cabinets that children can't reach.

Don't take medicine in front of children, since they often try to copy adults. When giving children a medication, never call it "candy."

Caution guests not to leave drugs where children can find them. Don't leave your own next dose on the counter.
