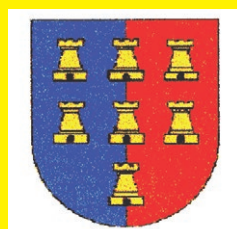


The Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl is a sight to see! Estimates of between 20,000 and 25,000 people attended the weekend festivities. My trip started with a visit to our relatives in Germany who live near the Munich airport. While visiting, I noticed one custom that I think follows all Saxons no matter where they live – I never sat in their living rooms. We were always at the dining room table with food and drink! My mother and I arrived in Dinkelsbühl on Friday of Heimattag weekend. The city has been hosting the Heimattag on Pentecost weekend since 1951. The schedule of events lasted through noon on Monday. The Opening and Greetings took place Saturday morning. The parade was on Sunday. What a fantastic display watching the various Saxon dance groups and bands from all over Germany march past. Sunday evening was the Torch March. Led by the Dinkelsbühl Boys Band, thousands of people marched up the hill to the Saxon Memorial. Flaming torches held by people on the right and the left side of the cobblestone street lit the way for everyone else in the middle. The Transylvanian Saxon Memorial is dedicated to the Saxons who were victims of war, persecution, flight, and expulsion. On Monday morning, I participated in a panel discussion regarding the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Federation of Transylvanian Saxons. Federation members (past and present) attending the weekend included Rainer Lehni, current Federation Chairperson; Herta Daniel and Dr. Bernd Fabritius, past Federation Chairpersons; Manfred Schuller, Chairman of the Saxons in Austria; Rebecca Horeth, the VP of the Saxons in Canada; and Dr. Paul Jürgen Porr, President of the Democratic Forum of Germans in Romania. Congratulations to Dr. Porr who was awarded the Federation's Star of Honor during the weekend for his outstanding work with the Saxon people.

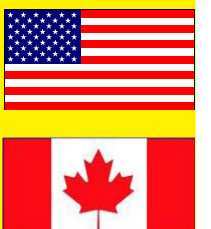

**Hydration:  
the water, salt,  
potassium connection**



Keeping your body hydrated by taking in enough fluids is an important part of good health. But even if you don't drink the recommended eight glasses of water each day, you probably don't have to worry.

Counting the food and beverages people consume each day, the Institute of Medicine (IOM) says Americans are usually getting enough water without purposely drinking more.

Caffeinated beverages can be counted. IOM's Food and Nutrition board says there is little evidence that caffeinated beverages flush water and its benefits from the body. They do contribute to hydration, but are often full of sugar and phosphates, which can weaken bones and teeth.

The real problem is sodium. The average man takes in two to three times the daily recommended sodium intake and women get twice as much as they need.

The second problem is a lack of potassium, an essential nutrient found in spinach, potatoes, cantaloupe, bananas, almonds and mushrooms. IOM recommends that adults get at least 4.7 grams of potassium daily, but the average man gets between 2.8 and 3.3 grams. Women get between 2.2 and 2.4 grams.

Doctors writing in Health-News say getting too much salt and too little potassium increases the risk of high blood pressure. Balancing these two nutrients is very important.

Before exercising or when you are outdoors in hot weather, drink extra water to make up for what you lose through sweating.

By limiting salt, getting enough potassium, and drinking more on hot days, you should keep your body properly hydrated.

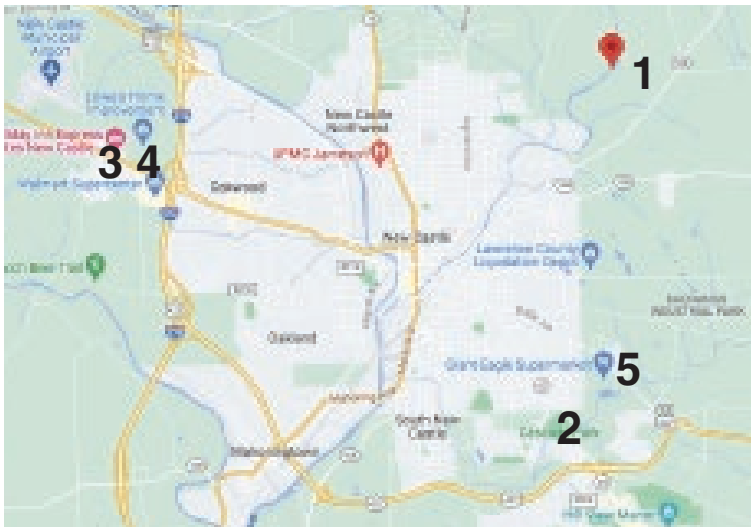

**Cold potatoes in potato salad have an unusual benefit**

That potato salad at the Fourth of July picnic might be better for you than you think.

The following recipe is great for an Independence Day picnic in that it contains a little red, a little white, and a little blue ... with the kick of

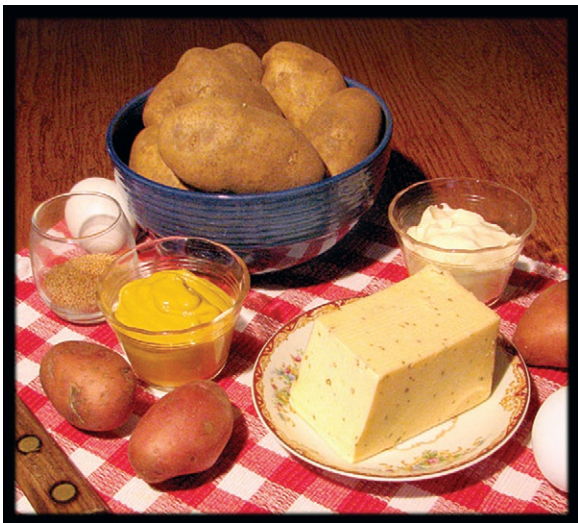
a firecracker added for good measure.

Besides containing resistant starch in its cold potatoes, it has additional fiber in the horseradish.

**Independence Day  
Potato Salad**

**Ingredients**

2 cups boiled red potatoes with skin left on  
2 cups of boiled small white potatoes with skin left on  
2 hard-boiled eggs cut in small pieces  
1 tablespoon celery seed  
1/2 cup blue cheese crumbles  
3 tablespoons light mayonnaise  
1/2 cup natural yogurt  
1 tablespoon sugar



5 tablespoons horseradish  
6 tablespoons chipotle mustard

Ferdinand Habsburg:  
The man who won't be king

In 1531, Ferdinand I of the powerful Habsburg dynasty became the King of Germany, Bohemia, Hungary and Croatia, Archduke of Austria, and Holy Roman Emperor. His grandson, also called Ferdinand, inherited the same titles in 1619, followed by his son, Ferdinand III, in 1636.

The Habsburgs were in their golden age, but it didn't last. The next Ferdinand suffered from a variety of serious medical conditions and was forced to abdicate his throne in 1848. Even less lucky was Franz Ferdinand, who famously caught an assassin's bullet in 1914. Four years later, the Habsburgs, minus a Ferdinand, lost their empire for good when Austria dethroned and exiled them.

More than a century later, the Habsburgs are still around and there's even another Ferdinand, albeit one with a very different life than the ones who came before him. Ferdinand Zvonimir Maria Balthus Keith Michael Otto Antal Bahnam Leonhard von Habsburg-Lothringen, heir apparent to the royal House of Habsburg-Lorraine, is 25 years old and shares a Vienna apartment with his sister, although his net worth is estimated at \$5 million. On occasion, he goes for long runs around the vast Schönbrunn Palace, where the Habsburgs once spent each summer. These days, he has

to pay the entry fee to get in like anyone else.

In theory, he's an archduke of Austria and a royal prince of Hungary, but the titles don't mean much when the throne no longer exists. Not that he minds -- without an empire to inherit, he's free to pursue his real passion: motor sports, specifically long endurance races that can last as long as 24 hours. And he's good at it, if his 2021 victory at the prestigious Le Mans race in France is any indication.

Being a Habsburg still comes with some perks, Ferdinand said in an interview with the New York Times. With around 600 Habsburgs scattered around the world and a group chat to connect them, he can almost always crash with a relative when he travels -- no palaces required.

Surgeon general:  
Social media harms youth



The United States surgeon general, Dr. Vivek Murthy, has issued a public warning about the risks of social media to children and adolescents. According to the New York Times, Murthy’s 19-page advisory included recommendations to limit social media use, along with a call for tech companies to enforce minimum age limits and improve safety and privacy standards.



“Peanut patch”  
shows promise for  
allergies in toddlers

An experimental patch could prevent severe reactions in toddlers with peanut allergies, according to NBC News.

A late-stage clinical trial of more than 200 young children with peanut allergies found that after a year of treatment with the patch, 67 percent of participants could tolerate small amounts of peanut protein. In addition, the group experienced fewer severe allergic reactions overall after completing treatment.

The Viaskin Peanut patch from the French pharmaceutical firm DBV technologies contains 250 micrograms of peanut protein -- about 1/1000th of a peanut, according to CNN. The toddlers wore the patches between their shoulder blades for 22 hours each day for a year, with new patches applied daily.

According to the American College of Allergy, Asthma, & Immunology, peanuts are among the food allergens most commonly associated with life-threatening reactions. Currently, there are no approved treatments for peanut allergies in children under the age of four. The FDA has approved one treatment, the powder-based Palforzia, to reduce the risk of severe allergies in children between the ages of four and 17.

According to the National Institutes of Health, early exposure is key to preventing severe allergies. Current NIH clinical guidelines recommend that babies who have not already tested positive for peanut allergies should eat peanut-enriched foods when they start other solid foods -- between four and six months of age.

**The Federation of Transylvanian Saxons is alive: panel discussion at the Homeland Day in Dinkelsbühl cultivates cross-border dialogue**

*“40 years worldwide federation of Transylvanian Saxons” - the topic of the panel discussion in Dinkelsbühl and this year’s motto “Together creates home” form a logical context. After various phases of emigration, the origin-related identity question, which was perceived as unifying, has long since arisen in a global context. The Federation of Transylvanian Saxons, founded in 1983, serves the purpose of representing the Transylvanian Saxons worldwide, strengthening their unity and enforcing their common interests, especially in the humanitarian, homeland and cultural areas - how much life is it still filled with today?*

Around a hundred guests gathered in the Schranne ballroom at 10 a.m. on Whit Monday. Chaired by **Christel Ungar**, the President of the Federation and Federal Chair of the Union of Transylvanian Saxons in Germany, **Rainer Lehni**, the President of the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons (ATS) in the USA, **Denise Crawford**, the Deputy Chair of the Association of Transylvanian Saxons in Canada, **Rebecca Horeth**, President of the Democratic Forum of Germans in Romania (DFDR), **Dr. Paul Jürgen Porr**, the federal chairman of the Federal Association of Transylvanian Saxons in Austria, **Manfred Schuller**, and **Kathrin Welther**, former federal officer of the Transylvanian-Saxon Youth in Germany (SJD).

Moderator Christel Ungar warmly welcomed the audience, introduced the panelists and introduced the discussion topic. The term federation describes “a community with autonomy for each individual”. After a brief outline of the history of the formation of the federation, which is linked by a common “descent, language and fate”, the decision to found the federation was made on October 1, 1983 in Elixhausen in Austria, the documents were signed on July 19, 1984 in Kitchener in Canada – Ungar asked the podium participants to present their respective association and its activities.

**Denise Crawford**, who spoke English, made the start; Kerstin Arz, sitting next to her, interpreted. Arz, acting chairwoman of the Landshut district association of Transylvanian Saxony, will in future take over the management of the Kulturwerk der Siebenbürger Sachsen e.V. This was announced by Federal Chairman Rainer Lehni during the panel discussion. Crawford, an accountant and chartered accountant by trade,

has served as President of ATS in the United States since 2020. Her parents come from Großscheuern. In addition to cultural work, the association in the USA provides social support in particular, especially at funerals.

The Federal Chairman **Manfred Schuller** recalled the post-war period in Austria, the late receipt of citizenship, the founding of the neighborhoods in the 1950s, the beneficial work of his predecessor Volker Petri and the deceased Honorary Federal Chairman Dr. Fritz Frank. Contrary to the Association of Transylvanian Saxons in Germany, there is currently a youth or junior problem in Austria, since the third and fourth generation lack the connection to Transylvania. Personal contact is fundamentally important, which is why the federal youth camps are supported.

**Rebecca Horeth** now had the floor. Her commitment to the Transylvanian community began when she was a schoolgirl, she took part in the Federation Youth Camp and helped with cultural exchange. Today she is the deputy chairwoman of the Transylvanian Saxons in Canada, cultural officer and secretary. Horeth, who spoke German during the panel discussion, touched on the history of immigration of the Transylvanian Saxons in Canada, which began in the early 20th century and was particularly intensive after the Second World War. The compatriot team in Canada was founded in 1960. According to Horeth, the current activities of the clubs (associations) in Kitchener, where most Transylvanian Saxons live, and Aylmer are dominated by the support of the various

cultural groups (bands, choirs, dance groups, children’s groups). There are also donations, such as for the Transylvanian Library, Horneck Castle and for the social work.

The youngest member association of the federation (since 1993) was presented by the chairman of the Democratic Forum of Germans in Romania (DFDR), Dr. Paul Jürgen Porr. His first contact with the Federation was in July 1990 when he had just been awarded the Star of Honor of the Federation the day before, in Cluj-Napoca. Later, as chairman of the Transylvanian Forum, he had “great help” in the then national chairman of the Transylvanian Saxons’ Association in Germany, Volker Dürr. After initial tensions, there were mutual visits, and with the cross-border cultural and youth exchanges from the 1990s onwards, relations had become “always warmer and more constructive”. These were in the terms of office of Klaus Johannis in Transylvania and Romania and Dr. Bernd Fabritius in Germany “continued to deepen and are excellent today under his successor Rainer Lehni and Martin Bottesch,” stated Porr.

The moderator asked **Rainer Lehni** for his contribution to the discussion on behalf of the Association of Transylvanian Saxons in Germany, which is organizing the Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl. The federal chairman, who has been in office since 2019, presented the association, which was founded in 1949 to represent the interests of the Transylvanian Saxons in Germany. Next year we will be celebrating our 75th anniversary. “The basis of our association is

voluntary work,” emphasized Lehni. The association has eight regional groups and 95 district groups. Most compatriots lived in Bavaria and Baden-Württemberg. A special focus is on youth work. As chairman of the federation, Lehni said about the current situation: “I can’t imagine the cooperation that we have with all other associations any better.”

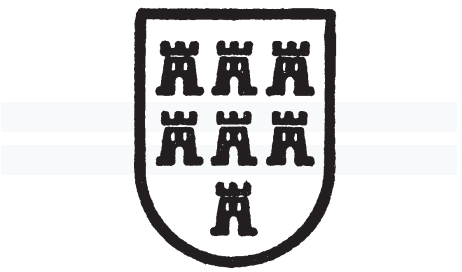
**Kathrin Welther** spoke for the Transylvanian-Saxon Youth in Germany (SJD). Born in Nuremberg, Welther was involved in the dance group literally from an early age. Later she led the youth dance group for ten years, was deputy SJD federal youth leader in the years 2016-2019 and federal officer from 2013 to 2019. During this time she organized three Federation Youth Camps (Föjula) for the SJD. She was a participant at Föjula 2011 in the USA. As she explained in her statement, she associates very positive experiences with the federal youth camp, good encounters and friendly contacts. The focus of the SJD, the association’s youth organization, is on promoting youth work and introducing them to the association’s work. When she was active, Föjula was like her “little baby”.

In the further course of the discussion, various focal points and concerns of the federation were discussed, including youth work, which is so important for the future of the associations. When asked about the current membership status, the panellists stated: Germany 27,000 members, SJD 900 members, Austria 1,500 members, ATS in the USA 6,000 members, Canada 300-400 members. When the moderator opened the discussion to the audience in the hall, the desirable promotion of Saxon dialect knowledge was discussed in particular. Federal Chairman Rainer Lehni called for the Saxon spirit to be revived in the families.

With her thanks to the podium and the audience, Christel Ungar closed the 90-minute, extremely harmonious discussion.

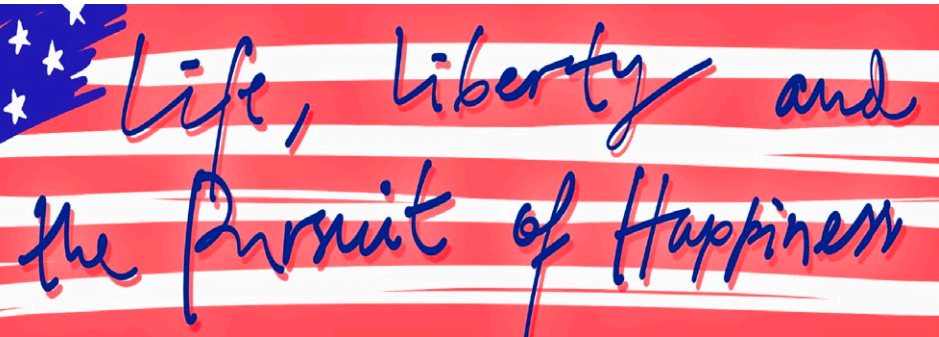
Here’s how to prevent the damage or stop its progress:

- Skip the crackers and dried fruit unless you intend to brush your teeth soon afterward.

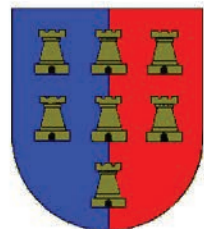
