The scenes in Kansas were filmed using traditional black and white film, while Oz appeared in vivid Technicolor, a relatively new film process at that time. egory. However, it lost to *Gone With The Wind*. The movie won a Best Oscar song for "Over the Rainbow", sung by Judy Garland. She also won a special award at that year's Oscar for the Best Juvenile Performer. Production on the film began when Walt Disney's *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs* (1937) showed that films adapted from popular children's stories and fairytale folklore could still be successful. Filmed at MGM Studios in Culver City, California, the movie was a modest box-office success when it was first released. It did not make a profit until it was re-released in 1949. It was MGM's most expensive production at that time. Its popularity grew after it was televised for the first time in 1956. An estimated 45 million people watched that inaugural broadcast. As it has aired countless times since then, it is not surprising that the U.S. Library of Congress states it is the most seen film in history. Some of the movie's famous lines, including "There's no place like home" and "Toto, I've a feeling we're not in Kansas anymore" are well known to several generations of movie watchers.

ATS OPEN BOWLING TOURNAMENT RULES

1. All bowlers must be Alliance of Transylvanian Saxon members in good standing to participate in this tournament.
2. Each bowler will receive 100% of the difference between his or her average and a two hundred ten (210) scratch with no limit on pins.
3. Averages to be used are:
 - a. The average of the past five years' tournaments, with exception of 2020.
 - b. If the bowler has no tournament average, then the bowler will establish his or her average after the first three games rolled in the tournament, which will remain the bowler's average for the remainder of the tournament.
4. A bowler may bowl only once in each event in this tournament.
5. The tournament management has the right to return for correction any entry which does not comply with the above rules.
6. Prizes will be awarded at the ratio of at least one (1) prize for each ten entries. One hundred percent (100%) of the prize fee must be returned. Prizes will be awarded by handicapped scores and not by gender.
7. It shall be the duty of the tournament manager to keep a running record of all bowlers' averages participating in each event.
8. Tournament starts on October 21, 2023 and ends on October 22, 2023.
9. Closing date for entries is October 6, 2023.
10. There will be no refunds of fees after October 11, 2023.
11. Two All Events Winners will be awarded. One for actual scores; one for actual scores plus handicap.
12. We will start with Doubles Event followed by the Singles Event on Saturday.

Your All Events score will be your total individual score of singles, doubles, and team event plus your handicap total for the tournament.
 Separate men and women prizes will be awarded in Singles event only. Doubles and team event will be mixed.

BRANCH 4, CLEVELAND By Joan Miller-Malue





Foods you won't find on the menu in the US

Adventurous diners will have to travel outside the U.S. to try any of these banned foods. If you do happen to find one on a restaurant menu stateside, it's probably not the real deal. But if it really is authentic, you may still want to pass -- there are no safety inspections or food handling standards for banned items.



Puffer fish

- Epoisse de Bourgogne cheese: This earthy and pungent cheese, made from unpasteurized milk, pairs well with Belgian white ale, and is notorious for listeria contamination. Epoisse can be imported -- but only if it's less than 60 days old.

- Horse meat: Slightly sweet and similar to beef, goes well with garlic butter, and potentially full of medications that are toxic to humans. The federal government prohibits the commercial slaughter of horses for human consumption, though private slaughter is permitted in many states. But you still might want to skip it -- horses raised in the U.S. are broadly considered unsafe for human consumption because of the medica-

tions they routinely receive.

- Fresh ackee: This pear-shaped pinkish-red fruit boasts a delicate and lightly sweet flavor, tastes lovely in savory preparations, and is highly toxic until it's ripe. Unripe ackee contains the toxin hypoglycin, which causes dangerous drops in blood sugar, vomiting, and sometimes death. The U.S. only permits the import and sale of canned or frozen varieties.

- Casu martzu: This traditional Sardinian sheep's milk cheese boasts a strong flavor and spicy aftertaste, marries perfectly with a bold red wine, and contains thousands of live maggots. Casu martzu sales are illegal in all of Italy, the whole European Union,

and the U.S., but some scientists (and many Sardinian locals) argue that the cheese is safe when eaten correctly. Even if it doesn't tempt you, casu martzu represents a fascinating look into how the common people of the Roman Empire lived and used unexpected ingredients to create extraordinary things.

- Puffer fish: With mild-tasting white flesh that can be eaten raw or cooked, puffer fish (also called fugu) pairs well with a variety of accompaniments and contains a poison 1200 times more powerful than cyanide, has no antidote, and kills around 100 unlucky diners each year. The U.S. doesn't ban all fugu outright, but any legal meat must be processed by licensed chefs in Japan before importation, inspected and approved upon arrival in the U.S., and prepared again by one of only about a dozen specially certified U.S. chefs before diners can dig in. Is fugu worth the risk and the hassle? Maybe, maybe not -- one diner described it as "bland" to the New York Times.



Labor Day: Summer's last fling has a serious past

Nap in the hammock, have a barbecue, or dive into the city swimming pool. Whatever you do, you are celebrating the last weekend of summer, though the calendar might disagree.

This year marks the 115th celebration of Labor Day. After much ado for many years, President Grover Cleveland signed the Labor Day proclamation in 1894. It is the only holiday in the year that does not focus on an individual or a national event.

The path to this proclamation was not a simple one. Rather, it was marked with hard work and risks from labor leaders and many thousands of workers.

While the work toward a Labor Day began years before, a celebration by the Knights of Labor in 1882

brought the cause to the public's attention.

More than 20,000 demonstrators paraded in New York City. Many carried signs that said "8 hours for work, 8 hours for rest, 8 hours for recreation."

In addition to a day of rest for workers, they marched for better working conditions.

The Labor Day movement spread from east to west over the following years. In 1887, Colorado was the first state to declare Labor Day a state holiday. By 1893, more than half of the states had an official Labor Day.

Then, a bill for a national Labor Day was introduced in Congress. When President Cleveland signed it on June 28, 1894, he thought it was a good political move. But he was not reelected.

Student loan debt varies widely

Here's a number that seems huge. Americans collectively have more than \$1.7 trillion in federal and private student loans.

While 54 percent of Americans do not have student loan debt, according to a GoBankingRates survey, if you are between the ages of 18 to 23, you probably do. Just 39 percent of this age group do not have any debt.

However, 31 percent young people with student loans owe less than \$10,000. About 16 percent owe more than \$10,000 and less than \$20,000.

Here is what the GoBankingRates survey found:

- 31% owe less than \$10,000
- 16% owe \$10,001 to \$20,000
- 11% owe \$20,001 to \$30,000
- 9% owe \$30,001 to \$40,000
- 4% owe \$40,001 to \$50,000
- 4% owe \$50,001 to \$60,000
- 3% owe \$60,001 to \$70,000
- 4% owe \$70,001 to \$80,000
- 6% owe \$80,001 to \$90,000
- 6% owe \$90,001 to \$100,000
- 6% owe more than \$100,000

One surprising finding: Student loan borrowers over the age of 65 are likely to have the highest student loan debt, with 72 percent owing between \$20,000 and \$40,000 and 17 percent owing up to \$100,000.

Older people have student loan debt for a number of reasons: They are sending their children and grandchildren to college; they are taking advanced degrees; and they are attending college themselves.

Dunesdorf / Daneş / Dános



The small tower-less late Gothic church in Dunesdorf was built in 1506. The tower was much later erected in 1927, as well as its defence levels, probably as a sign of self-assertion towards the 1918 new Romanian state and as a symbol for the 800 years of Saxon history in Transylvania. From the original defence wall only a few remains on the south side and a gate tower with a small watchtower are still preserved. The inner furniture dates back to different time periods: the baptismal font and the pulpit are Baroque, the altar is from 1878 and the organ from 1920. The vault covering the church's hall was built in 1868.

Place and surroundings

The village of Dunesdorf, located few miles west from Sighişoara (Schässburg) was documented for the first time mid-14th Century. The reports from the following years describe many difficulties and misery. Due to the great poverty of the place, between 1503 and 1507 a tax rebate was documented. Around 1507 the village burned down completely. Less than 50 years later, the unfortunate happening occurred again in 1555. At the beginning of the 17th Century the place got broke as result of civil wars and the number of the local farmers fell in just 15 years from 90 to 7. Because of the slow development of the village, tax exemption and other benefits were offered starting with 1656 to any colonist willing to settle here, but the success was only moderate. In 1658 the Ottoman troops attacked and destroyed the village once more. Only from 1665 colonists coming from Sighişoara were able to revive the place. Despite all the problems, the fortified church wrote its own history, as regular worship services are still regularly held today, as it has always been starting with the 16th Century.

Paninis have come a long way

The panini sandwich has evolved from the simple Italian 'toast' sandwich, filled with meat, usually prosciutto, and cheese.

Like its predecessors, you'll find today's paninis bear the distinctive toast lines of the Italian sandwich press. Similarly, they are concocted with the rich cheeses and meats.

But fillings and flavorings have changed. Local custom and favorites sometimes govern what goes into the panini. In central Italy, for example, the panini boasts succulent roasted pork.

Whether you have a panini press, a sandwich grill or just want to make one in a skillet, here's a recipe for the Hot Sicilian that offers the tastes of Italy, enhanced by spices.

Hot Sicilian paninis

- Ingredients**
- 1 loaf Italian bread cut in eight half-inch slices (OK to trim crusts)
 - 1 half-pound of deli shaved ham



- 1 package each hard salami and sandwich pepperoni
- 8 slices provolone cheese
- 1 medium tomato, sliced thin
- 1 medium red onion, sliced thin
- Dashes of parmesan cheese, salt, pepper, red wine vinegar, olive oil
- Optional: slices of pickled or fresh banana peppers.

Lay the eight slices of bread on a dish towel. On each bread slice, add one slice of provolone cheese. On four of the sandwich halves, add two pieces each of salami, a generous amount of shaved ham, and two pieces of sandwich pepperoni.

On the other four sandwich halves, add two slices of tomato, two slices of onion and a few pepper rings.

Shake parmesan cheese, oil, vinegar, salt, and pepper sparingly to all eight sandwich halves. Combine the halves into four sandwiches.

Preheat your press following the manufacturer's instructions, or in a large skillet lightly coated with butter or canola oil, place the sandwiches two at a time. Apply pressure with the sandwich maker or a spatula.

Open the sandwich maker every two minutes, or turn skillet sandwiches every two minutes until they are golden brown.

Today's lesson: The ABCs of Annuities



What is an Annuity? An Annuity is an agreement between you and an insurance company like the ATS, in which you make a lump-sum payment or a series of payments, earn interest, and in return, receive regular disbursements beginning immediately or at some point in the future. It is intended to be a retirement asset.

Are there different types of Annuities? Yes. Annuities come in three main types: Fixed, Variable, and Indexed. Variable and Indexed annuities could have a higher rate of return, but have increased risk because they are usually tied to the stock market. Fixed Annuities pay a guaranteed amount and come in two different types: Immediate and Deferred. The Immediate type annuity, as its name implies, pays out immediately. The Deferred type annuity pays you later. The ATS only sells this Fixed guaranteed type of Annuity.

Is the interest that the Annuity earns tax deferred? What does that mean? Yes, the interest that you earn on your annuity is tax deferred. This means you will not have to pay income taxes on the earnings each year while the account is growing. Instead, you will pay income tax in the year that you withdraw the interest, probably after you have retired.

Do I need a large amount to start an ATS Annuity? No. Unlike some insurance companies who require big deposits to start an annuity, the ATS requires only \$300 to open an annuity. This amount is \$150 for those under age 16. \$25 is the minimum amount for future deposits.

Are there fees on an ATS Annuity? The ATS does not charge any administrative fees for your account. There could be a small surrender charge fee in the first five years of the account being opened if you withdraw funds. Other companies can charge lots of fees such as statement fees, annual fees, or withdrawal fees. If you withdraw funds prior to reaching age 59 1/2, you could incur an IRS penalty.

Am I required to withdraw the funds from my ATS annuity? No. You are not required to withdraw the funds from a Tax Deferred Annuity (unlike a Traditional IRA account). You could leave the entire account to your beneficiaries. You could make periodic withdrawals from your account. You could receive an interest check each month. Or you could annuitize your account and receive either a set dollar amount, a set number of payments, or a check for the rest of your lifetime. An Annuity is the only product that can guarantee a stream of income that you cannot outlive.

Does my ATS Annuity account go through probate after I die? Not if your beneficiary is a person, church or charity. If you name your spouse, children, relative, friend, or even a charity as your beneficiary, the funds will go directly to them. If you name your Estate as your beneficiary, then yes, the funds will go through the probate process. Please use caution when listing your Estate as your beneficiary on any type of account as the funds could be tied up for a long time until the Estate is settled.
