


## More U.S. applicants are seeking an MBA degree

World wide, applications for admission to MBA schools grew at 57 percent of schools offering full-time, two-year programs, according to the Graduate Management Admission Council.

In the United States, where international students previously drove growth, 59 percent of U.S. full-time, two-year programs said they drew more applications from the U.S.

The rise in b-school applicants might signal that students who graduated from college at the beginning of the crisis in 2008 are now competitive candidates for the MBA. They are looking to the degree as a form of financial and psychological insurance, said Jeremy Schinewald, president and founder of mbaMission.

The University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, the University of Chicago's Booth School, Yale University's School of Management and Harvard Business School were among the MBA. programs that are drawing more applications.

#### How nine airlines became four

Mergers have created a quartet of very large airlines. The four airlines, Delta, United, Southwest and American, now control 80 percent of the U.S. market. Here's when and how it happened.

2005. The US Airways-American West. The merger combined then No. 7 and No.8 airlines to create the USA's largest carrier.

2008. Delta merged with Northwest. The company took Delta's name in what became the largest U.S. airline deal ever.

2010. United and Continental merged, making Continental the largest U.S. Airline. Continental told its employees it was necessary to "make sure we remain a strong long-term competitor.'

2011. Southwest-AirTran. It took Southwest three years to fold AirTran operations into its own. The deal eliminated one of Southwest's leading low-cost rivals, say analysts reporting in USA Today.

2014. American-US Airways, the most recent merger restored American's status as the world's largest airline. It had slipped to No.3 and was at risk of being dwarfed by corporate contracts being offered by rivals Delta and Unted. U.S. Airways still needed help.

Seth Kaplan, editor of Airline Weekly, says this ends the round of mergers, partly because the government wouldn't approve any more.

Sister Schmidts reported that Brother Andreas Mueller was on the sick list. We wish him a speedy recovery!



### Senators want to keep drones in check

After analyzing 891 drone sightings, the Federal Aviation Administration found more than half of the drones were flying too close to an airport. The reports prompted lawmakers to renew calls to tag the remote-controlled aircraft with electronic collars that would keep them away.

Senators Dianne Feinstein D-Calif., and Charles Schumer, D-N.Y. want "geofencing software" that works like electronic collars for pets. They would keep drones from wandering in front of passenger planes.

From April through August, the FAA reports that 248 drones came within 500 feet of a passenger plane. California had the most violations with 182, Florida had 103, New York had 89, Texas had 47, and Massachusetts had 35 violations.

Drone hobbyists should fly drones no higher than 400 feet, away from other aircraft, and at least 5 miles from an airport unless they have permission from airtraffic controllers.

Airline pilots approaching the New York-area airports, John F. Kennedy, La-Guardia and Newark, have raised alarms about collisions.

The Academy of Model Aeronautics, which represents 180,000 hobbyists, has raised questions about pilot reports to the FAA. They say birds and balloons were sometimes mistaken for drones, according to USA Today.

In spite of all the reports about drones that were flying near airports, pilots rarely reported close calls or taking evasive action, the Academy says.

## How to get the most from physical therapy or cardiac rehab

Unlike other types of treatment, physical therapy or cardiac rehabilitation aren't things that are "done" to you; you must be an active participant. Dr. Donna Polk, medical director of cardiac rehabilitation at Harvard-affiliated Brigham and Women's Hospital, says "You get out of it what you put into it."

Both physical therapy and cardiac rehab programs involve about two or three sessions a week for six to 16 weeks.

#### **Get information**

Talk to staff members about what you want out of rehab, such as being able to walk without pain and climb stairs, or if you want to lose weight and become physically fit to reduce the risk of a heart attack.

Set short-term goals for yourself so you can monitor how you're doing. That way, you'll know if what you are doing is working or not.

#### Talk to your team

Communicate with staff members if something isn't working for you. Discuss any problem or concern and what you feel are barriers to your rehabilitation program. They'll know what modifications can be made.

Make keeping your appointment a priority. If you skip one or more, you'll lose momentum and the ability to progress regularly.

#### Work on your program at home

You'll be expected to keep up with rehab on days you don't have a session. That means doing your exercises or sticking to a healthy diet.

Lauran Mellett, a physical therapist quoted at www. health.harvard.edu, says rehabilitation itself is a lifestyle change. "Try to establish a routine before rehab ends, so you'll be able to sustain it for the rest of your life."

#### Don't overdo it.

It's better to start exercising slowly and build up over time. Commit to 10 minutes of exercise on days away from rehab. It's a level you can sustain and add to when your programs is finished.



Erwähnenswert ist allerdings, dass eine ganz dicke Wurzel, nämlich der Nachlass von Ute Sieglinde Hien in Höhe von 200 000 Euro, entscheidend dazu beigetragen hat.

Die Bestände von Bibliothek und Archiv werden ständig größer, die Zahl der Benutzer steigt an und die damit verbundene Arbeit erfordert infolgedessen mehr Personal. Daher muss die Stiftung weiter wachsen, um höhere Erträge liefern zu können. Es wäre von großem Vorteil, wenn diejenigen, die die Stiftung bisher schon unterstützen, in ihrer Umgebung weitere Unterstützer anregen könnten, sich zu beteiligen.

Wer sich die in der Siebenbürgischen Bibliothek oder im Internet unter www.stiftungsiebenbuergische-bibliothek.de ausliegende Stiftertafel angesehen hat, wird feststellen, dass viele Namen mehrere Male vorkommen, weil deren Träger sich im Laufe der vergangenen 16 Jahre seit Gründung der Stiftung immer wieder, oft auch mit kleinen Beträgen, engagiert haben. Allein im Jahr 2015 wurden 34 Namen in die Stiftertafel aufgenommen. Zwei von ihnen wurden mit einer Urkunde für besondere Verdienste beim Aufbau der Stiftung ausgezeichnet, nachdem die Summe ihrer Zuwendungen die Marke von 10 000 Euro erreichte. Leider können wir hier aus Platzmangel nicht alle Spender namentlich ehren. Ich verweise aber auf die "Mittei- Stiftung, die mehr Erträge er- in der Schlossstraße beteiligt. lungen aus dem Siebenbürgen-Institut", herausgegeben vom von Bibliothek, Archiv und Arbeitskreis für Siebenbürgische Landeskunde (AKSL) und den "Freunden und Förderern der Siebenbürgischen Bibliothek", einzusehen auch unter www.siebenbuergen-institut. de. Zu den "dicken Wurzeln" zählen vor allem die elf Unterstiftungen: Dr. Ortrud u. Dipl.-Ing. Gerhardt Graeser; Dr. Roswitha und Martin Guist; Elfriede und Balduin Herter; Ute Sieglinde Hien; Gerlind und Harro Hubbes, Dagmar Heuchert; Dipl.-Ing. Alfred Kasper, Sächsisch Reen, und Frau Marga, Freiberg/Sachsen; Meta und bürger Sachsen, regeln oder



vanicum; Hildegard und Günter Volkmer; Hedwig Waadt, geb. König und Johanna und Dr. Arnold Weingärtner. Dazu gehören aber auch die weiteren zehn mit Urkunden ausgezeichneten Personen und Vereine sowie die vielen Spender, die mehrere Male in die Stiftertafel aufgenommen wurden.

Wir erhoffen uns eine langfristige Perspektive für unsere Stiftung, um die Funktion der Siebenbürgischen Bibliothek auf Dauer zu gewährleisten. Das ist ein sehr anspruchsvolles Ziel, ein großes Vorhaben, das nur mit sehr vielen Helfern erreicht werden kann und viel Ausdauer erfordert, insbesondere jetzt, wenn auch für die Einrichtung des Schlosses Horneck für die neuen Aufgaben und seine Instandhaltung Mittel benötigt werden. Im Zusammenhang mit der angestrebten Nachhaltigkeit ist auch zu bedenken, dass eine starke Institut erforderlich ist, sich auch am Unterhalt des Schlosses beteiligen kann, und zwar dann auch dauerhaft. Der Vorteil dieser Überlegung besteht darin, dass die Zuwendungen in das Stiftungsvermögen nicht verbraucht werden dürfen, nur dessen Erträge. #### "Dem Zahn der Zeit zum Trotz" – Faszination Kirchenburgen

Die Kirchenburganlagen in Siebenbürgen sind ein besonderes Kulturerbe Europas. Ihrem Erhalt haben sich Alexander Kloos, geboren am 30. Dezember 1975 in Bukarest, und Georg Fritsch, geboren am 28. November 1967 in Vöcklabruck in Oberösterreich, verschrieben. Beide haben siebenbürgische Wurzeln und engagieren sich, neben ihrer beruflichen Tätigkeit als Mediendesigner mit Bachelor of Arts bzw. als Sales Manager, für die Restauration der siebenbürgischen Kirchenburganlagen. Obwohl Fritsch in der Rosenau bei Seewalchen am Attersee/Oberösterreich und Kloos in Frankenthal/Pfalz aufgewachsen ist, fühlen sie sich den Denkmälern in Siebenbürgen geradezu liebevoll verbunden. Alexander Kloos ist Vorsitzender und Georg Fritsch stellvertretender Vorsitzender des Vereins "Kulturerbe Kirchenburgen", der auch im Internet unter www.kulturerbekirchenburgen.de und in sozialen Netzwerken aktiv ist. Christine Hauptkorn sprach mit Kloos und Fritsch über den Verfall der Kirchenburgen und die Projekte des 2015 gegründeten Vereins.

Mit dem Verein "Kulturerbe Kirchenburgen" setzen Sie sich als Vorsitzender für Kirchenburganlagen, Friedhöfe und Pfarrhäuser ein. Was motiviert Sie persönlich und hat Sie zur Vereinsgründung angetrieben?

Kloos: Dadurch, dass ich schon mit vier Jahren ausgewandert bin, fehlt mir quasi jede Kindheitserinnerung an Rumänien. Als ich die sächsischen Kirchenburgen vor knapp zehn



ihres Vermögens der Stiftung schenken, was auch zu Steuervorteilen führt. Der Stiftung wird auch mit der Gewährung von zinslosen Darlehen sehr geholfen. Diese werden nicht veröffentlicht und der eingezahlte Betrag wird am Ende der Laufzeit oder bei dringendem Bedarf sofort in Teilen oder in Gänze zurückgezahlt. Da die Stiftung ihr Vermögen nicht verbrauchen darf, ist die Rückzahlung nie gefährdet. Im Jahr 2015 erhielt die Stiftung Darlehen in Höhe von 35 000 Euro und zahlte Darlehen im Wert von 50 000 Euro zurück. Der derzeitige Bestand beträgt 85 000 Euro, ca. 3 % des verwalteten Vermögens. Die am Siebenbürgen-Institut an der Universität Heidelberg in Gundelsheim beschäftigten Personen werden auch in diesem Jahr besondere Leistungen erbringen müssen. Neben dem laufenden Betrieb der Bibliothek und des Archivs sind sie auch an der Einrichtung zusätzlicher Räume im Schloss und am Umzug aus dem Haus wirtschaftet, als für den Betrieb Die wissenschaftliche Arbeit wird daher zurückgefahren werden müssen. Nicht leiden sollen die periodischen Publikationen. Die Zahl der Folgen der "Mitteilungen aus dem Siebenbürgen-Institut" soll sogar von derzeit zwei auf drei Folgen erhöht werden.

Jahren zum ersten Mal richtig wahrgenommen habe, war es Liebe auf den ersten Blick, als ob sie mich erwartet hätten, um mir ihre bewegte Geschichte mitzuteilen. Mich fasziniert auch, dass sie nach bis zu 750 Jahren, trotz aller Kriege, dem Zahn der Zeit zum Trotz, immer noch stehen. Sie wurden fast bis in die 90er Jahre in Stand gehalten. Umso schwerer trifft mich der schnelle und stetige Verfall vieler Anlagen. Nach einigen Jahren entschloss ich mich dann, auch nicht länger zuzusehen, sondern zu handeln. Ich fand Gleichgesinnte und wir gründeten den Verein.

Auf der Vereinshomepage sieht man T-Shirts mit der ro-"Kulturerbe ten Aufschrift Kirchenburgen SOS". Sind die Kirchenburgen in Siebenbürgen als Kulturerbe Europas ge*fährdet?* **Fritsch:** Sie sind zum Teil sogar sehr stark gefährdet, wobei wir die mittelalterlichen Dorfkirchen ohne Wehrcharakter ebenso als besonders schützenswert erachten. Neben den gut erhaltenen Klassikern wie Tartlau, Honigberg, Birthälm, Deutsch-Weißkirch, Michels-

eine Reihe stärker frequentierter Objekte, die auch im Fokus der EU-Projekte stehen. Auch müssen ca. 15% der Fördersumme von der Gemeinde oder einem Verein gestellt werden, sonst gibt es keine Förderung. Das ist aber nicht unbedingt mit architektur- und kunsthistorischer Wertigkeit verbunden. Dieses Glückes erfreut sich aber nur schätzungsweise ein Viertel der Baudenkmäler. Die Evangelische Kirche A.B. in Rumänien und die wenigen verbliebenen Sachsen können die über 200 besagten Anlagen kaum erhalten. Es gibt einige Heimatortsgemeinschaften, die sich stark für ihre Kirchen einsetzen. Aber die mehrheitliche Unterstützung der ausgewanderten Sachsen aus Deutschland und anderen Ländern fällt leider viel zu gering aus und beschränkt sich oft nur auf die Pflege der Friedhöfe. So bleibt der größte Teil dieser einzigartigen Denkmale seinem traurigen Schicksal überlassen. Durch marode Dächer und fehlende Drainagen dringt Wasser in das Mauerwerk, Decken stürzen ein und Wehranlagen verfallen.

## **Stephen Foster:** Folk music writer

Stephen Foster is considered one of our country's most famous 19th century composers. He is commemorated annually on January 13, Stephen Foster Memorial Day, the day of his birth in 1826, 190 years ago.

Accounts differ as to how Foster died at age 38. Some say he died in a New York theater-district hotel room after fighting a fever for days, falling, striking his head on the sink by his bed, and then hemorrhaging for three days before he was found and taken to a hospital.

Some say Foster died with three pennies in his pocket, the total sum of his wealth.

During the two decades of his music career, he wrote more than 200 folk songs and instrumental compositions.

Composers in his era didn't own copyrights on their music. They either produced songs while under contract to a music producer or sold individual songs to them outright, usually for a pittance.

In the years up to the 1960s, school children learned his songs, including Old Folks at Home (Swanee River), Oh! Susanna, My Old Kentucky Home, Beautiful Dreamer, Camptown Races, and Jeanie With the Light Brown Hair among the many.

In recent years, his music is little used because of its apparently longing for the old order of slavery and for his participating in black-face minstrel shows, now considered racist. But he was the first lyricists to refer to an African-American woman as a lady.

A sculpture of Foster stands near the entrance of the Carnegie Museum of Natural History, another memorial is dedicated to him at the University of Pittsburgh. The Stephen Foster Culture Center State Park in Florida is located on the Suwannee River banks.

Wie können Sie sich als Mediendesigner in die Vereinsarbeit einbringen?

Kloos: Von Berufs wegen kann ich schnell Produkte wie Homepage, Broschüren, Geschäftssachen umsetzen, aber auch Ausstellungen und Messen konzipieren, Marketingkonzepte und Vernetzungsideen mit einfließen lassen. Auch Funding ist ein wichtiges Thema. So haben haben wir jetzt unsere erste Benefizveranstaltung in Form einer Fotoausstellung mit Vortrag und musikalischer Begleitung in Zürich/ Witikon erfolgreich durchgeführt, weitere Ausstellungen stehen an.

Beim Projekt "Kirchenburg Dobring" wurde das Dach repariert, es wurden Wandmalereien und Ornamente aufgedeckt. Das sind komplexe Vorgänge. Wie koordinieren Sie von Ihrem Wohnsitz aus den Einsatz der Fachkräfte und die Finanzierung? Kloos: Die Einsätze werden stets vor Ort, begleitet von Fachleuten, initialisiert und können dann zum Teil auch durch unsere Mitglieder und Freiwilligen vor Ort weitergeführt werden. Jedem Projekt geht eine Begutachtung eines Architekten, Restauratoren, Zimmermeisters etc. voraus. Somit verfügen wir über ein solides fachliches Konzept, das dann ausgeführt werden kann. Ebenfalls arbeiten wir mit einem wissenschaftlichen Beirat aus Fachleuten zusammen. Kooperationen mit dem Restauratoren Lorand Kiss vom "ARCUS Verein" oder der Kunsthistorikerin Dr. Ileana Burnichioiu von der Universität 1 Decembrie aus Karlsburg (Alba Iulia) helfen uns dabei, das fachliche Niveau zu halten.

Fritsch: So konnten wir bereits beim "Phoenix Projekt" in Felldorf umfangreiche Erfahrungen bei recht komplexen baulichen Vorgängen sammeln. Auch arbeiten wir stets nach den Richtlinien des Denkmalschutzes, indem wir unsere Projekte bei der "Direcţia judeţeană pentru Cultură" einreichen. Da wir auch Unterstützung auf freiwilliger Basis erhalten, können wir die Kosten bei kleineren Reparaturen minimieren.

Der Verein hat es sich zum Ziel gesetzt, Fachkräfte in den bauhandwerklichen Berufen an den "lebenden Objekten" vor Ort in Siebenbürgen zu qualifizieren. Wie passiert dies?

Kloos: Zum einen geht es um die Kooperation mit deutschen Berufsschulen, wie das "Erasmus+" Projekt der Theodor-Frey-Schule Eberbach, geleitet von Zimmermeister Fabian Fahr. An den Kirchenburgen haben deutsche Auszubilden-

de im Zimmererhandwerk die Möglichkeit, die traditionellen Handwerkstechniken zu erlernen und anzuwenden, und können so zu ihrem Erhalt beitragen. In der Jugendbauhütte in Pretai können rumänische Jugendliche sich innerhalb eines sechsmonatigen Kurses handwerklich ausbilden lassen und eine anerkannte Qualifikation erwerben. Diese Konzepte lassen sich ausweiten, und es ist noch viel Potential auszuschöpfen.

Fritsch: Da es in Rumänien an qualifizierten Fachkräften mangelt, scheint uns das besonders wichtig. Die Notwendigkeit erkennt man, wenn man die vielen unfachmännisch ausgeführten Reparatur- und Restaurierungsarbeiten sieht, was dem Erhalt des Bauwerks schadet und dem Vermächtnis nicht gerecht wird. Das ist auch ein Grund, weshalb wir zusammen mit dem ARCUS Verein und dem Architekten Klaus Birthler aus Sächsisch Regen planen, ein Restaurationszentrum in Felldorf aufzubauen

Welche Objekte stehen aktuell auf der "Roten Liste" des Vereins? Kloos: Die "Rote Liste" befindet sich noch im Aufbau. Sie umfasst im Moment nur einen geringen Teil der stark bedrohten Kirchenburgen und mittelalterlichen Dorfkirchen. Im Fokus für kleinere Soforthilfe bzw. SOS Projekte stehen beispielsweise Anlagen wie Neudorf, Magarei, Streitfort, aber auch Fresken wie die in Bonnesdorf und Schmiegen. Mindestens kleinere Dachreparaturen sind fast überall notwendig, da das Dach eine zentrale Rolle beim Schutz der Bausubstanz spielt.

Wo sehen Sie den Verein und dessen Vorhaben in der Zukunft?

Fritsch: Wir müssen hier positiv denken und retten, was zu retten ist: Jede verlorengegangene Kirche oder Kirchenburg ist ein ebenso unwiederbringlicher wie unnötiger Verlust. Wir hoffen, uns in Zukunft auch international vernetzen zu können, um auf möglichst viel Unterstützung zurückgreifen zu können. Auch möchten wir intensiv mit den HOGs, den Bezirkskonsistorien und anderen Organisationen, wie z.B. der "Stiftung Kirchenburgen", zusammenarbeiten, sei es aktiv in konkreten Projekten oder auch durch Beratung, konzeptionelle und administrative Unterstützung. Wir würden uns freuen, regelmäßig in dieser Zeitung über Fortschritte und neue Projekte berichten zu dürfen.




