

Summer is rapidly approaching and the ATS Youth Activities Committee is once again sponsoring Saxon Summer Camp, for our Junior Members and friends, ages 7-17, the opportunity to spend a week together in fellowship. This year we are extending the ages from 7-17 by offering four camp programs for the different ages. The programs are designed to allow campers to continue to grow, every time they move to a new age group the type and level of activities increase to meet the needs of that age group:

New Adventurers – Ages 7–8 Songs, creek stomping, hiking, swimming, crafts, discovery time, camp fires and more.
Cost: ATS Junior Member is \$165 and \$300 for non-member children.

Discoverers - Ages 9-11 Traditional camp activities plus climbing tower and archery.

Cost: ATS Junior Member is \$185 and \$320 for non-member children

Journeyers – Ages 12-14 Includes traditional camp activities plus canoeing, high rope courses and zip line.
Cost: ATS Junior Member is \$240 and \$375 for non-member children

Ultimate Challenge – Ages 15–17 Includes camping out at Ohiopyle, Pa, go whitewater rafting and caving at Laurel Caverns.
Cost: ATS Junior Member is \$315 and \$450 for non-member children

The one week camp will be held at Camp Frederick, a beautiful camp located in Rogers, Ohio on 144 acres of forest, rambling streams, rolling hills, glacial rocks and meadows. Camp Frederick is an organized camp center located at the Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia border. The camp is located 1 ½ miles east of Rogers, Ohio off SR 154. The address is 6996 Millrock Road. The camp is staffed with trained and experienced counselors.

At Camp Frederick our campers will be housed in Cabins which accommodate eight persons.

One evening will be devoted to Saxon folk dancing and folklore.

We welcome our members to bring along one friend who is not a member. Also, ATS members may send their children or grandchildren (who are not yet ATS members) to the camp at the non-member cost. Each Camper will receive a free Saxon Summer Camp T-Shirt.

If you wish to attend please complete the Registration Form and send it along with a \$100.00 deposit for ATS Junior Members and \$150.00 for non-member children to the ATS Home Office by June 10, 2016. Upon receipt of your registration fee we will send you a Camper's Health Examination Form and Personal Information Form that must be completed by you and returned to this Office by June 30, 2016 along with the balance of your camp fee. We will mail you a map and detailed information as to arrival and departure times, and what to bring along.

SAXON HANDICRAFT EXHIBIT

A highlight of the ATS Convention is the Saxon Handicraft Exhibit. The Exhibit this year will be held at the Salem Saxon Club, where the ATS Convention will meet on May 14 - 15, 2016.

The Junior Category, which allows our junior members, ages 13 and under, to exhibit their handcrafted items in an open category will once again be a part of the Exhibit. All members competing in this category will receive a small token of appreciation.

The Handicraft Exhibit provides an opportunity to display articles which relate to our Transylvanian Saxon cultural background, but is not restricted to this category only. It is a showplace for the artistic talents and abilities of our people, present and past.

A prize competition is held for items made by present ATS Members only. The rules for this prize competition are as follows:

- 1. There will be prize competition in ten (10) categories.
- 2. There will be first and second prizes awarded in each category.
- 3. There will be one (1) President's Award for "Best of Show" Entry.
- 4. No more than three (3) entries allowed per member.
- 5. Only items actually made by present ATS members, ages 14 and over, are eligible for entry in this prize competition.
- 6. Winning entries will be determined by ballot vote of the Convention Delegates.
- 7. There will be a separate Junior Category for ATS members, Ages 13 and under.

NOTE: An Entry Blank must be filled out for all items placed on display. Advance registration will be appreciated. The exhibit room will be opened Saturday morning (May14) for delivery and set-up of display items. All items must be picked up Sunday morning (May 15) prior to the start of the Sunday Convention Session.



- 1. Choose whole foods over processed foods. They generally are composed of one ingredient, have been refined as little as possible, and don't include added salt, carbohydrates or fat. Whole foods include fruits, vegetables, nuts and legumes.
- 2. Get more of your food from plants. Eating plantbased foods and limiting meat can boost health outcomes and possibly add years to your life. Fruits and vegetables are associated with a lower risk for heart disease and cancer, and they help you stay full longer. In a study published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, participants who ate meat less than once a week had a significantly lower risk of death over time than those who ate it more often. Cutting back on red meat can cut your risk of dying early, the National Cancer Institute has found.
- 4. Slash sugar. It may be one of the best things you can do for your health. The American Heart Association recommends no more than nine teaspoons a day for men and six for wom-

4. Eat nuts. They are one of the best snacks. In one study, participants who ate a handful of nuts daily were less likely to die for any reason over a threedecade period.

Registered dieticians and nutritionists recommend nuts as part of a diet for a longer life, according to a 2013 New England Journal of Medicine study.

5. Water, coffee, tea and red wine are fine. The vast majority of the long-living people were found to drink these liquids. Voluminous research has shown the health benefits of drinking plenty of water, especially as you age, when it's easier to become dehydrated.

Meanwhile, coffee is an antioxidant. Antioxidants are linked to lower rates of diseases and conditions.

No place to dig a garden? Grow edibles on a patio, deck, porch or balcony

Container gardening has grown rapidly in recent years. Burpee.com is offering compact and dwarf varieties intended to succeed in small spaces. Containers make it easier for you to control the soil, light, water and fertilizer.

Bigger containers are better. The greatest challenge of container vegetable growing is watering, since soil dries out faster in pots than in the ground. A larger volume of soil won't dry out as fast, but be sure that any container has holes so excess water can drain away.

Self-watering containers have a reservoir beneath the soil topped with a grid through which the roots can reach down to the water. With these containers you won't have to water as often, but you still have to fill the reservoir daily.

Spread mulch over the soil in pots just as you would in a garden.

Herbs are easy to grow, especially if you begin with transplants. They add a fresh-grown taste to almost any meal, but remember that all herbs need full sun. Some, such as rosemary, prefer dryer soil and fewer nutrients.

With pots, you may be able to finesse a sun shortage. Place a wheeled pot trolley (available in garden centers) under a large pot and move it to follow the

Baby greens, such as lettuce and spinach, are simple to grow, Sow seeds right in the pot. They take a week to sprout, but then will quickly reach a harvest size of three to four inches.

Everybody loves tomatoes, but they take some work. For pots, find dwarf varieties that only grow to a certain size and bear all their fruit in a few weeks.

Buy transplants rather than trying to start them from seed. You need a large container, at least the size of a five-gallon bucket. Selfwatering containers are wise because they even out the water and fertilizer supply and deter cracking, but you still will need to water frequently in summer. Provide a cage for all but the most dwarf determinate tomato varieties. Or install sturdy stakes when you plant and tie new shoots to the stakes.

He attended Youngstown State University for 3 years and is a graduate of the Lawrence County Vocational Technical School.


He is currently a superintendent and estimator for Stevens Masonry.



Hieran lasse sich ermessen, wie wertvoll "das vertrauensbildende Wirken der Vertriebenen und ihrer Organisationen" für Eurowir in der Bundesregierung Ihnen ganz herzlich zu Dank verpflichtet", betonte Merkel und wies auf die in diesem Zusammenhang ebenso wichtige Bedeutung sowohl der Aussiedler

und Spätaussiedler als auch der bis heute in den Heimatgebieten lebenden deutschen Volksgruppen hin.

Kurz ging die Bundeskanzvertriebenenpolitischen Fragen ein, wie etwa die unlängst vorgestellte Neukonzeption der Kulturförderung nach § 96 Bundesvertriebenen-und Flüchtlingsgesetzes, die weitere Arbeit der Bundesstiftung "Flucht, Vertreibung, Versöhnung" sowie die beschlossene Entschädigung ziviler deutscher Zwangsarbeiter, für die sie eine zügige Umsetzung zusagte.

Den Blick auf die aktuelle Flüchtlingssituation verband die Kanzlerin mit der Erinnerung an die Ereignisse von Flucht und Vertreibung der Deutschen am Ende und nach pa sei. "Dafür sind und bleiben dem Zweiten Weltkrieg: "Ohne Zweifel sind die Gründe, der kulturelle Hintergrund und die Hoffnungen der Menschen, die heute ihre Heimatländer verlassen und in Europa Zuflucht suchen, andere als die der deut-

schen Heimatvertriebenen vor rund 70 Jahren. Das Verbindende aber liegt in der Erfahrung, alles zurückzulassen und einen Weg ins Ungewisse zu gehen." Die Vertriebenen hätten nach dem Krieg "einen bedeutenden Beitrag zum Wiederaufbau Deutschlands in West und Ost geleistet" und das Land zu einer in vielerlei Hinsicht erfolgreichen, weltoffenen und selbstbewussten Nation gemacht. Integration, so Merkel, sei "stets auch eine Frage des gegenseitigen Nehmens und Gebens." Es gelte, Hilfe zu leisten und über Spracherwerb und berufliche Qualifikation Teilhabe zu ermöglichen, gleichzeitig aber Verständnis und Respekt für unsere Werte einzufordern. Das hier Gelernte könne auch all jenen helfen, die in ihre Heimat zurückkehren würden, sobald es die Situation erlaube. Die Bundeskanzlerin bat die Vertriebenen ausdrücklich, sich aufgrund ihrer eigenen, wenn auch unterschiedlichen Erfahrungen von Heimatverlust und Ankunft noch stärker an der gesellschaftlichen Debatte zu beteiligen.

BdV-Präsident Fabritius wirbt für Empathie für das Leid der heutigen

Vertriebenen und Flüchtlinge Bereits zuvor hatte BdV-Präsident Dr. Bernd Fabritius, MdB, in seiner Begrüßung der Gäste herausgestellt, dass die derzeitigen Herausforderungen in einer gemeinsamen europäischen Kraftanstrengung angenommen werden müssten. Die Lehren aus der Vergangenheit erforderten es, "sich einer Empathie für das Leid der heutigen Vertriebenen und Flüchtlinge nicht zu verschließen" und Menschlichkeit vorzuleben.

Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischer Jugendpreis 2016 geht an Manfred Schuller

Für herausragende Verdienste um die siebenbürgischsächsische Jugendarbeit wird der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsische Jugendpreis 2016 an Manfred Schuller verliehen. Die Verleihung findet im Rahmen des Heimattages der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Dinkelsbühl am Pfingstsonntag, den 15. Mai, um 17 Uhr in St.-Pauls Kirche statt. Der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsische Jugendpreis wird seit 1993 von Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Jugend in Deutschland (SJD) und Studium Transylvanicum (ST) verliehen - heuer zum 23. Mal – für herausragende wie stetige Leistungen im Dienste siebenbürgisch-sächsischer Jugendarbeit.

Geboren wurde Manfred Schuller 1962 in Gmunden am Traunsee als Kind siebenbürgisch-sächsischer Eltern, die sich durch die Flucht 1944 in Österreich angesiedelt hatten. Im Alter von 13 Jahren entdeckte er die Vorliebe für den Volkstanz und begann seine tänzerische Laufbahn in der Siebenbürgischen Volkstanzgruppe Laakirchen. Der persönliche Umgang mit den Menschen im Hause Schuller, Gastfreundschaft und Rücksichtnahme prägten den jungen Manfred für die Zukunft. 1984 übernahm er die Leitung der Volkstanzgruppe Laakirchen. Er bildete sich im Tanzunterricht weiter und gründete zusätzlich in den 1980er Jahren eine Kindertanzgruppe. Bald übernahm er das Amt des Jugendleiters in der Nachbarschaft Laakirchen, deren Nachbarvater er 2004 schließlich wurde. Hinzu kam auch seine Tätigkeit in der Siebenbürgischen Musikkapelle Laakirchen. 2004 wurde Manfred Schuller sowohl zum Bundesjugendsprecher Landsmannschaft in Österreich als auch zum Landesjugendsprecher des Landesverbandes Oberösterreich gewählt. Auf seine Initiative hin wurde die Bundestanzgruppe der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich gegründet. Im Februar 2005 erfolgte die Bildung dieses ,Nationalteams" mit dem Ziel, die Kommunikation unter den Tanzgruppen zu fördern. Das war für Manfred wichtig, weil das Miteinander die siebenbürgischen Tanzgruppen prägen sollte. Auf diese Weise sollte jungen Menschen eine besonders attraktive Aktionsform angeboten werden, um sich in Gemeinschaft und im Team im Tanz besser auszudrücken. Bis zu 13 Tanzpaare aus mehreren Tanzgruppen Österreichs trafen sich drei Monate lang wöchentlich, um ein gemeinsames Repertoire zusammenzustellen. Ein ganz besonderer Moment



Bundestanzgruppe im Sommer 2005 in Wien bei einer Benefizveranstaltung zugunsten rumänischer Straßenkinder. Gemeinschaftssinn, Tradition, Brauchtum und Kultur zu leben, hat Manfred damit bezweckt und die Tanzgruppen in Österreich haben sein Angebot dankbar angenommen.

Durch sein Amt als Jugendsprecher erhielt Manfred Schuller gute Einblicke in die oberösterreichische Volkskultur und das Brauchtum. Durch die permanente Fürsprache und ständige Präsenz bei den vielen Veranstaltungen des Landesverbandes der oberösterreichischen Heimatverbände ist es ihm hervorragend gelungen, die Siebenbürger Jugend- und Volkstanzgruppen bekannt zu machen und damit die ganze Kultur der Siebenbürger Sachsen einer breiten Öffentlichkeit zu vermitteln. Seine Kontakte gehen aber über die Grenzen Österreichs hinaus. In Deutschland war er des Öfteren Gast bei den Volkstanzwettbewerben der SJD und ist fast immer beim Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl dabei. Mehrmals im Jahr ist Manfred in Siebenbürgen, ob mit Politikern, den Tanzgruppen oder mit Hilfsgütern. 2008 veranstaltete er ein einwöchiges Tanzseminar in Probstdorf bei Agnetheln für die deutsche Tanzgruppe aus Oberwischau (Maramuresch). 2009 war er der federführende Organisator des siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Föderationsjugendlagers in Österreich.

Folgerichtig wurde Manfred Schuller 2010 zum Landesobmann der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Oberösterreich und gerade erst zum Bundesobmann in Österreich gewählt. Sein Augenmerk legt er immer auf die Förderung der siebenbürgisch-Jugendlichen, sächsischen die alle in Österreich geboren und aufgewachsen sind. Fast 40 Jahre ist Manfred Schuller schon in der Vereinstätigkeit aktiv und genauso lange der siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Jugendarbeit verbunden. Spring for a salad in the merry month of May

Food Revolution Day on May 20 is a worthy addition to our May observations.

Celebrity Chef Jamie Oliver initiated this global campaign in 2012 to inspire and teach home, school, and even professional chefs how to use more fresh foods in their meal preparations.

To educate children about food choices "in a practical, fun and engaging way," Oliver leads an army of volunteers who become community activists. In 2015, over 8,200 schools in 100 countries participated in Food Revolution Day.

By mid-March, over 500 events in 300 cities across 33 countries have been organized.

How about making your Mothers Day celebration a food revolution? Try this easy and creative version of the classic Waldorf salad.

Merry Maypole-Ribboned Salad

1/2 cup walnut halves

1 tablespoon minced shallot

1/2 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest

2 tablespoon lemon juice

1 tablespoon white vinegar

1/3 cup canola oil

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin

Salt and pepper

2 cups romaine heart lettuce strips

1 small head of frisee (a curly endive), coarsely chopped



1 cup thinly sliced celery hearts (4 inner ribs) 1 cup red radishes (halved lengthwise and thinly sliced)

1/4 cup golden raisins

1 Fuji apple, quartered, cored and thinly sliced crosswise

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spread walnuts in a pie plate, toast until golden (about 8 minutes), cool and break into pieces.

Pour the lemon juice and vinegar into a large bowl, add the shallot and lemon zest, whisk in the canola oil and cumin, and season the dressing with salt and pepper.

Add the shredded romaine, celery leaves, chopped frisee, radishes, sliced celery, raisins, apple and toasted walnuts. Toss. Serves six.


