Since 1960 Schloss Horneck has housed the Siebenbürger Museum, the Siebenbürger Library and Archive, the Siebenbürger-Institut and is the base for many Saxon organizations. A seniors home is also located on the property. Last September the Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland purchased the property for one million Euro.


BRANCH 26, MERRILLVILLE By Helen Brooks







Census: The kids want to live with parents

Census data show 18-to-34-year-olds would rather live with parents than start their own households.

Census data won't tell us why. Are they less romantic? Can't find a job or hold one? Have they just decided not to live on their own until they reach 35? Or do they just want help to pay off student loans. passed living with a romantic partner (31.6 percent) as the top arrangement among young adults. The rest lived alone, with roommates or as single parents. It was the first time since 1880 that so many decided to live with their parents.

The researchers said there was a dramatic drop in the share of young Americans choosing

be for young adults, according to Richard Fry, senior researcher at the think tank.

He found that half those 18 to 34 were living with their parents while 25 percent of those 25 to 29 were. But both groups were much more likely to live at home in 2014 than in 1960.

Apparently, the young adults and their parents get along pretty well and often share the young person's goals.

New findings on coping with lactose intolerance

People who suffer from lactose intolerance often needlessly avoid dairy products, according to the National Institutes of Health.

About 30 million Americans are deficient in the enzyme lactase, causing a condition called lactose intolerance. It can cause bloating, cramps, flatulence, diarrhea, stomach ache, even nausea.

Previously, it was thought that avoiding dairy products was the only way to avoid the symptoms. That meant the people didn't get such nutrients as calcium, protein, magnesium, potassium, zinc, and phosphorous, more of which are found in dairy products than others.

A National Institutes of Health study shows that 8 ounces of milk, small helpings of yogurt, and hard cheese, particularly if eaten with other foods throughout the day, may effectively manage symptoms NIH recommends starting with small amounts of dairy -one-fourth cup to one-half cup of milk with meals. Chocolate milk is also an alternative to unflavored white milk. Some say that it is easier to digest.

- This document is known as the Declaration of Independence.
- On July 4th 1776 the Declaration of Independence was signed giving the United States independence from Great Britain.
- The first person to sign the Declaration of Independence was John Hancock.
- The Declaration of Independence was written on July 2nd 1776.

Thomas Jefferson is credited for writing the Declaration of Independence. However the Committee of
Five (Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman and Robert Livingston) were all
involved with the final draft of the Declaration of Independence.

- The Declaration of Independence was written during the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783).
- Did you know that when the United States gained independence the population of the country was around 2.5 million. Today the population is around 304 million.
- The first event celebrating the 4th of July at the White House was in 1801.

So why do we celebrate the 4th of July with parades, fireworks and BBQ? Many believe that if
has to do with a letter John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail on July 2nd 1776 about America's Independence. In the letter he wrote " The day will be most memorable in the history of America. I
am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, bonfire and illuminations (fireworks) from
one end of the continent to the other, from this time forward and forever more."
