Veterans Day: The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month

Nov. 11, 1918 is recognized as the end of the world's first global conflict, World War I. In 1938, November 11 was named Armistice Day in recognition of those who served.

Then came World War II and the greatest mobilization of armed forces in history. After that, American forces fought in Korea. So in 1954, the 83rd Congress changed Armistice Day to Veterans Day to honor all who served.

Veterans Day National Committee services are held at Arlington Memorial Amphitheater. It is built around the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery, property that once belonged to General Robert E. Lee.

At 11 a.m., a color guard representing all branches of the military honors the Unknown Soldier with "Present Arms," the laying of a Presidential wreath and the playing of Taps.

Though these services are held at Arlington, the primary focus of Veterans Day is on veterans who are alive and with us today. They are honored with parades and speeches.

To all veterans working among us, and especially those who have recently served in Afghanistan, we offer our sincere thanks. We will not forget.

Thanksgiving: How we have changed

The essentials of Thanksgiving have not changed over the years: Special food, family, giving thanks, and delicious desserts.

But the details have changed a lot.

In the 1940s, you might not be dining on turkey, but maybe a roast or chicken. The average feast cost \$5.68 -- about \$48 today.

During the war years, the main dish and side dishes would probably be governed by what was available. And someone would have been missing from the feast -- a son, a father, or a brother. In the countryside and small towns, the food would have come at least in part from your own garden. A special pudding might replace a pie, although if there was sugar (unlikely during rationing) and flour, there was pumpkin pie.

In those days in rural and small town America, families played music together before or after dinner, with Dad on the fiddle and brother on the guitar or banjo. Later, the men went hunting with their favorite hunting dogs.

In the 1950s, the feast cost more than \$6, or about \$44 to \$48 today. You would almost certainly have turkey. It's a good bet that a side dish would involve gelatin. Inside your gelatin mold there could be any kind of fruit or vegetables. You would be more likely to see a mincemeat pie than today.

The first 'Thanksgiving'



After the dark days of 1620, the Pilgrim's 1621 harvest festival was their first celebration of abundance. It has become a model of present-day Thanksgiving feasts. Their festival is described in a letter by Edward Winslow to friends in England:

"Our harvest being gotten in, our governor sent four men on fowling, that so we might after a special manner rejoice together after we had gathered the fruit of our labors. They four in one day killed as much fowl as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week. At which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and among them rest their greatest King Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted, and they went out and killed five deer, which they brought to the plantation and bestowed on our governor, and upon the captain and others. And although it be not always so plentiful as it was this time with us, yet by the goodness of God, we are so far from want that we often wish you partakers of our plenty."

HISTORY OF MARTIN LUTHER CHURCH

The records indicate that the Martin Luther Evangelical Lutheran Congregation was organized on January 2, 1927, under the leadership of Student George Schuster of the Theological Seminary of Capital University. This information is part of the minutes of the first official gathering of a group of individuals that had a desire to have a church, as well as the beneficial society, which they had organized in its "Sachsenhiem" at 323 Woodrow Avenue. In this edition of the History of Martin Luther Church we will see how Martin Luther Church was affected by the Third Wave of Immigration of Transylvanian Saxons to America, from 1949 to 1955. The growth of Martin Luther Church and the Saxon Club Branch 10 went hand-inhand. The number of members at Martin Luther Church increased and so did the numbers of the Saxon Club. While the numbers increased in parallel, something different was happening. The war was over and there was resurgence in America in many industries reverting back to post war activities and the return of soldiers from the war. Families that had put a pause on expanding the family began to see an increase to family size.

There were changes occurring in Europe. In misguided agreements by the Allies and the desire to never let Germany regain it's wartime capabilities, much of Europe was conceded to Russia and communism. Where we had just barely gotten through a war with the oppressive power of Hitler, we were now faced with an equally oppressive power of Stalin and Russia. In the war torn Europe everyone was trying to pick up the pieces and regain some sense of normalcy. Russia had other intentions. They saw an opportunity and took advantage of the Allies wanting to rebuild with no concern for Russia's ambition. Russia began to spread their communism philosophy and everyone was naïve to their intentions. Russia began to enter countries politically and make sure the ruling parties of many countries demonstrated loyalty to Russia. Countries like Albania, East Germany, Poland, Armenia, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia and yes Romania came under the communist control. Europe had just replaced one oppressor with another. What did this mean of Romania and our Transylvanian Saxons? Many had already left Transylvania and sought safe haven in Austria, Germany and other friendly European countries. Transylvanian Saxons saw their homes and businesses confiscated (stolen) by Russia and communistic rulers. If you were not part of the communistic movement there were grave consequences. During the war, Russia had sent many Saxons to labor camps in Siberia and elsewhere. It continued after the war. Saxons fled Transylvania and European countries in an effort to find freedom from communism. This started the massive Third Wave of migration to the U.S. and Canada. The U.S. and Canada saw a massive rebuilding of the economies and the need for skilled individuals to help. Additionally, prior waves of migrations by Transylvanian Saxons provided sympathetic groups willing to reach

out and help their family and friends that had a shared heritage. Many Transylvanian Saxons welcomed them with open arms. Lutheran Churches and organizations provided sponsorship, living arrangements and employment to these fleeing Saxons. People from different cities, towns and villages would find comfort in Canadian and U.S. cities that had come from the same areas.

That brings us back to Columbus and Martin Luther Church. Columbus already had German immigrants, and specifically Transylvanian Saxon groups. Martin Luther Church had German/English services, which provided a familiar language to assist in the transition. The Saxon Club provided friendship and association to migrating Saxons. Martin Luther Church would see a substantial growth due to the welcomed influx of the new Saxons.

Something else was happening at Martin Luther Church. The 'Southend Columbus' experienced a tremendous growth in population, industry and businesses. The surrounding area of Martin Luther Church benefited immensely from this activity. The church saw an unexpected growth in non-German/Saxon members. People liked the atmosphere, family friendly environment and had ties to the Lutheran Religion. I have talked with many people that attended the church, Sunday School, Catechism, were Baptized and even married in the Church and were not German/Saxon. German/ Saxon or not, I am sure they thoroughly enjoyed the sausage making and picnic events. The growth of the church necessitated the consideration for expanding the church. Fortunately, the church already had

Großschenk / Nagysink / Cincu



From its very beginning the destiny of the Evangelic church in Cincu was to be a bastion of faith, both metaphorically and literally: the western tower was erected at the beginning of the 13th century, it was heightened and strengthened several times, gaining its current appearance after the works in the 18th century. A large part of the two ring walls, which had bastions and defense towers, have been demolished. However, from all the fortified buildings two are still preserved: the so-called old town hall and a defensive storage building.

The interior nowadays has the appearance of a hall church, due to the heightening of the aisles to make room for installing the galleries. The wrought iron balustrade was added about a hundred years later. The interior furniture of the church shows an attractive mixture of styles: next to the chancel pews in the late Gothic style there is the Renaissance pulpit, while the classicist organ dominates the Baroque font, epitaphs and pews of the guilds.

Place and surroundings

The Saxon name "The Big Inn" probably refers to a location that was founded hundreds of years ago by a local landlord. These counts (germ. "Graf") used to have an important position in the Transylvanian society, and many of them became mythical characters over time. Indeed, walking through the village in the morning fog and confused by the smoke coming from the nearby coal depot, the traveler would not be amazed if he would meet such a historical figure. Legends smoulder here like burning coal: translucent beings dance stunningly at night above the fortified church. "The Cursed Bridge" in the village has a story of its own. A long time ago, while the borderlines of the place were established, the wise old man of the village is said to have secretly put some soil in his boots and sworn before the authorities "I am standing now on the ancestors' ground". While he was returning home, his horse stumbled on the bridge and the man broke his neck as a punishment for his fraud.

Tourism

Some popular cold remedies don't work



A U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) panel recently confirmed what health care providers and consumers have long suspected: Phenylephrine, a decongestant used in more than 250 over-the-counter cold and flu remedies, doesn't work at all when taken orally. Versions of DayQuil, Sudafed, Tylenol and Theraflu all contain phenylephrine, according to the New York Times.

Though phenylephrine doesn't work in oral medications, it does appear to work when used in nasal sprays, according to CNET. Oral medications containing phenylephrine are still considered safe to use as directed, and may contain other ingredients that can relieve congestion or other cold or flu symptoms.

According to CNN, phenylephrine was originally

approved for over-the-counter use in the 1970s, and became more popular in the early 2000s as Congress and state legislatures expanded regulation of pseudoephedrine. A common and effective decongestant, pseudoephedrine was also a key ingredient in the manufacture of the illicit drug methamphetamine. Today, medications that contain pseudoephedrine are only available behind pharmacy counters and require prescriptions in two states.

Medications containing phenylephrine will remain on shelves for now, but for real relief from nasal congestion, consumers should request medications with pseudoephedrine from behind the pharmacy counter. Common side effects can include shakiness or restlessness, according to CNET.

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skilled craftsmen and the new migration provided additional skilled craftsmen with a group that would undertake the expansion of the church. Heck, some of the non-Saxons would pitch in on the expansion.

While the Third Wave of Transylvanian Saxons occurred from 1949 to 1955, the undertaking of expanding the Martin Luther Church would not occur until the mid 1960's. This is where we take a pause in the history of Martin Luther Church. We will pick up in the next article regarding the expansion.
