Valentine's Day, or St. Valentine's Day, is a holiday celebrated by many people throughout the world on February 14th. It is the second most card - sending holiday next to Christmas with about one billion cards sent worldwide per year. It is a traditional day on which lovers express their love for each other by sending Valentine's cards, presents of flowers or candy. It is believed that this all came about in Great Britain in 1847 when Esther Howland started a successful business in her Massachusetts home with hand-made Valentine cards based on British models.

This holiday is named after numerous Early Christian martyrs named Valentine. This day became associated with romantic love in the High Middle Ages when the tradition of courtly love flourished.

It is said that in the ancient Athenian calendar the period between mid-January and mid February was the month dedicated to the sacred marriage of Zeus and Hera. During these times boys and girls were segregated, however there was a custom on the eve of a special festival of which girls names were written on pieces of paper and inserted into jars. Each boy then drew a girl's name from the jar and they were partners throughout the festival. After being paired, the children would often continue to see each other and occasionally fell in love and married. Perhaps this is where the Valentine card and boxes at our grade school parties began.

This romantic holiday is also linked to a cruel Emperor "Claudius the Cruel," who was finding it difficult to recruit men as soldiers. He believed that the men did not want to leave their sweethearts and cancelled all engagements and marriages throughout Rome. St. Valentine, a priest of Rome, secretly married couples. He was eventually caught, arrested, and condemned. Pastors and priests of

the early Christian church did away with the pagan custom by replacing the names of girls with the names of saints. They chose St. Valentine's Day as the day of celebration for the new feast.

Valentine's Day is no longer part of the official liturgical calendar of any Christian church; it was dropped from the Catholic calendar in 1969. A return to the more pagan-like celebrations of this date is not surprising and neither is the overall commercialization of the day. There is a lot of debate and disagreement among scholars about the origins of the holiday, but commercial interests make so much money from Valentine's Day that they aren't going to accept any changes. Christians helped make Valentine's Day a cultural holiday and now it is entirely out of their hands.

Walking Safely

If you are trying to get more exercise into your routine, walking is a great choice. Not only can you improve your fitness level, but you can enjoy the great outdoors at the same time. Unfortunately, many drivers do not always pay attention to pedestrians on the road, especially as dusk falls. Around 5,000 pedestrians are killed each year by motor vehicles.

Be sure that the reflective area is large enough to be seen well and is exposed from every angle. Many brands of walking shoes have reflective material on the heels. Also dress in

light colored clothing to maximize your exposure.

You should walk facing oncoming traffic. Walk defensively. Although pedestrians have the right of way, this doesn't mean a driver will always yield. Be aware of the traffic around you. If you are walking on a pedestrian path, always walk on the right-hand side so that faster walkers, runners, and cyclists can easily pass.

Never walk alone. If you have no one to walk with, be sure to tell someone the route you will be on and when you expect to return. Also, leave the headphones at home for maximum safety. You are not able to hear potential dangers if you are listening to music.

Glanzvoller Siebenbürgerball mit Barbara Stamm und Peter Maffay

Der Große Siebenbürgerball 2010 des Verbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland e.V. fand am 30. Januar im Festsaal des Hofbräukellers in München statt. Die rauschende Ballnacht stand unter der Schirmherrschaft von Barbara Stamm, Präsidentin des Bayerischen Landtages, und des Rockstars Peter Maffay, die beide anwesend waren und mit den 380 Gästen feierten. Dr. Bernd Fabritius, Bundesvorsitzender des Verbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland e.V., wurde zum „Siebenbürgischen Ritter wider den tierischen Ernst“ gekürt. Für beste Tanzstimmung sorgte die „Franz-Schneider-Band“.

Als „Freundin unter Freunde“ war die Landtagspräsidentin Barbara Stamm aus Würzburg zu den Siebenbürger Sachsen nach München angereist. In ihrem Grußwort würdigte sie das „wunderbare Miteinander“ der Generationen im Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen und lobte die hervorragende Zusammenarbeit mit Generalkonsulin Brândușa Predescu, die eine sehr gute Vertreterin ihres Landes sei. Peter Maffay sei für uns alle nicht nur der Musiker, sondern auch die Persönlichkeit, die sich für humanitäre Hilfe, für kranke und behinderte Kinder engagiere. Was die Peter Maffay Stiftung leiste, sei großartig. Peter Maffay habe seine Heimat nicht vergessen: „Er ist auch in Rumänien unterwegs und sieht die Not der vielen Kinder“, betonte Barbara Stamm.

Unter anhaltendem Applaus wurde der bekannte Sänger Peter Maffay begrüßt, der nach langer Zeit zur siebenbürgischen Gemeinschaft zurückgefunden hat. Am 31. Januar 2008 hatte er am Jahresempfang des Verbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen im Bayerischen Landtag teilgenommen und angekündigt, dass er sein humanitäres Engagement nach Siebenbürgen ausweiten werde. Der Rockstar hat Wort gehalten.

In seinem Grußwort freute er sich, nun auch diesem Abend im Hofbräukeller beiwohnen zu dürfen. Peter Maffay plädierte dafür, den Kindern die Achtung zu zollen, die man ihnen schuldig sei. Als Beispiel erwähnte er das Schutzverhalten der Elefanten, die ihre Kleinen bei

einer Gefahr schützend in die Mitte nehmen. Es sei nötig, dass auch wir die Kinder vom Rand in die Mitte holen. Peter Maffay berichtete über den aktuellen Stand des Kinderprojektes in Radein, das 80 Kilometer nördlich von Kronstadt in einem wunderschönen Tal gelegen ist. Im März 2011 will man dort die ersten Kinder als Gäste empfangen. Das Ferienheim in Siebenbürgen soll wie jenes in Peter Maffays Finca auf Mallorca (Spanien) traumatisierten Kindern eine Wertekette, Grundbegriffe, Wärme vermitteln. Radein ist als internationale Begegnungsstätte gedacht, da hier, neben Kindern aus Rumänien, auch ausländische Gruppen empfangen werden sollen.

Maffay berichtete über viele Freunde und spontane Unterstützer für Radein. Selbst Bundespräsident Horst Köhler und der ehemalige Außenminister Frank-Walter Steinmeier gehören dazu, Studenten aus Dresden haben die Kirchenburg digital vermessen, und die Deutsche Umweltstiftung hilft bei den Abwasserstudien. Er hofft auch auf einen Schulterschluss mit der örtlichen Bevölkerung, muss doch die ganze Infrastruktur des Dorfes aufgebaut werden. Nicht zuletzt freute sich Peter Maffay über die Literaturnobelpreisträgerin Herta Müller: „Sie hat Rumänien in den Fokus gestellt, viele Leute beginnen erst jetzt zu kapieren, was Transsilvanien ist.“ Viele Ballbesucher nutzten im Laufe des Abends die Gelegenheit, mit Peter Maffay ins Gespräch zu kommen. Begleitet wurde er vom Albert Luppert, Geschäftsführer der Peter Maffay Stiftung, die ebenfalls Rede und Antwort stand.

Mit besonderer Dankbarkeit nahm Peter Maffay zur Kenntnis, dass der Verband das Projekt in Radein mit 1000 Euro unterstützen werde. Bundesvorsitzender Dr. Bernd Fabritius äußerte die Hoffnung, dass wir dadurch gemeinsam etwas für die Kinder – das schwächste Glied in der Gesellschaft – erreichen können. Eine spontane Sammelaktion unter Ballgästen brachte weitere 1593 Euro ein, die von der Landesgruppe Baden-Württemberg des Verbandes aufgestockt wurden, so dass insgesamt 3000 Euro zusammenkamen für die „sächsische Kirchenburg, die jetzt Heimstatt für Kinder wird“ (Alfred Mrass).

Fabritius konnte unter den vielen Gästen begrüßen: die Generalkonsulin von Rumänien in München, Brândușa Predescu, Mihaela Ghiță, Chef der Fluggesellschaft Tarom in München, den Unternehmer Michael Schmidt (BMW Wolfratshausen), der den Ball großzügig unterstützt hatte, Bernhard Krastl, Bundesvorsitzender der Landsmannschaft der Banater Schwaben, Konsulent Dr. Fritz Frank, Ehrenobmann des Bundesverbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich, Peter Pastior, Vorsitzender des Sozialwerks, sowie zahlreiche Gäste aus Nordrhein-Westfalen, Hessen und Baden-Württemberg. Besonders stark vertreten waren die Kreisgruppen Sachsenheim und Schwarzwald-Baar (Rottweil).

Die Kür des „Siebenbürgischen Ritters wider den Tierischen Ernst“ hatte die „Foederatio Saxonia Transsilvana“ aus Anlass ihres 25-jährigen Jubiläums aus Rottweil nach München verlegt. Es marschierten auf Paul Schuller, erster Ritter aus dem Jahr 1985, die Ehrenvorsitzenden der Foederatio Fritz Frank und Alfred Mrass, Doris Hutter, die jüngste, amtierende Ritterin, der zu kürende Ritter Dr. Bernd Fabritius und drei jugendliche Paare als Knappe und Burgfräulein. In einer minutiös geplanten Zeremonie erinnerte der Begründer und Vorsitzende der Foederatio, Siegfried Habicher, zunächst an einige Höhepunkte der Ritterkür. Doris Hutter ging in der gereimten Laudatio auf ernste und heitere Begebenheiten aus dem Leben Bernd Fabritius ein. Er wurde in Agnethein geboren und wuchs auf dem Ulmenhof in Hermannstadt auf, wo er manchen Lausbubenstreich ausheckte und ausführte. Familie, Brukenthalsschule, Schülerblasia und verschiedene Chorgemeinschaften prägten ihn siebenbürgisch-sächsisch. In den 90-er Jahren setzte sich der Jurist gegen die ungerechten Kürzungen der Fremden ein und fand so den Weg in die Landsmannschaft. Das sei eine Chance für uns, denn „Ideen hat er ständig, dazu Durchsetzungskraft, / es ist wirklich großartig, was Bernd für uns geschafft!“ Doris Hutter

wünschte dem neuen Ritter „die Welt so zu verändern, dass sie dir gut gefällt“ und versicherte ihm seitens des „gemeinen Volkes“: „Wir folgen dir bei Fuße – und sind gut aufgestellt!“

Traute Habicher verlas den Adelsbrief, der den „weltweit agierenden Sachsenpolitiker Bernd Fabritius in den Ritterstand auf Zeit“ erhob: Der „Sachsengraf von Steinburg und Harbach“ werde die Bürde der Würde bis zum Rottweiler Narrensprung in zwei Jahren schultern müssen. Auch promovierte der Geadelte aufgrund seiner Verdienste um den sächsischen Humor zum Doktor humoris causa.

In seiner Erwiderung stellte der Bundesvorsitzende diesen Humor bestens unter Beweis. Er ging unter anderem der Frage nach, ob die Siebenbürger Sachsen ein Häuflein im Verschwinden seien. Das oft zitierte Wort „Christen werden nicht gezählt, sondern gewogen“, das Bischof D. Dr. Christoph Klein auf die Bedeutung der Siebenbürger Sachsen bezogen hatte, nahm Fabritius zum Anlass, seine Landsleute zwar nicht einzeln zu wiegen, aber ihr Gewicht zu mindest zu schätzen. Ein guter Sachs sei voller Lebensfreude, stehe zu leiblichem Genuss und

tun, um die derzeitige Schieflage zu beseitigen. Er hoffe dabei auf die Unterstützung seiner Landsleute und dankte für die ritterliche Ehrung.

Als Veranstalter des Balls zeichneten der Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen (Bund), die Landesgruppe Bayern mit ihrer Landesvorsitzenden Herta Daniel und die Kreisgruppe München unter der Vorsitzenden Heidemarie Weber, wobei sich der Bundesvorsitzende ganz besonders für professionelle Einladungen und eine reibungslose Organisation einsetzte. Der Graphiker Peter Baumgartl, der seit einigen Jahren die Weihnachtskarten des Verbandes entwirft, hatte ein Logo eigens für diesen Ball gestaltet. Durch das Programm führte die charmante und bewährte Moderatorin Annette Königes. Der Bundesvorsitzende bedauerte in seiner Begrüßung, dass nicht alle Interessenten in den Genuss der begehrten Eintrittskarten gelangt seien. Das Organisationsteam bemühte sich, im nächsten Jahr Abhilfe zu schaffen.

Zu den Klängen der „Franz-Schneider-Band“ gaben sich die Gäste bis spät in die Nacht dem Tanzvergnügen hin und tauschten sich auch in lebhaften Ge-

bringe daher im Schnitt 85 kg auf die Waage. Die Landsleute in ganz Deutschland wiegen demnach 23800000 kg. „Und im Bundestag? Kein einziger Sachsenfuß, kein Gramm Siebenbürger Sachsel!“ bedauerte Bernd Fabritius. Die Grünen hingegen, die 48096 Mitglieder zählten und aufgrund ihrer Essgewohnheiten im Schnitt 70 kg, also bundesweit nur 3366000 kg wiegen, hätten aber 68 Abgeordnete im Bundestag.

Das bedeutet ein Abgeordneter für 49500 kg. Bei diesem Wert müssten die Siebenbürger Sachsen 481 Parlamentarier stellen und hätten damit die absolute Mehrheit im Bundestag. So wären sie in der glücklichen Lage, die Regierung zu bilden und beispielsweise mehr Geld für die Kultureinrichtungen in Gundelsheim zu genehmigen. Als „Siebenbürgischer Ritter wider den tierischen Ernst“ versprach Fabritius, sein Bestes zu

sprächen aus. Um Mitternacht wurden drei attraktive Tombola-Preise verlost: ein Flug für zwei Personen (mit Übernachtung) nach Hermannstadt, gestiftet von Tarom, zwei Konzertkarten für die neue Peter-Maffay-Tour und ein Notebook, das der Verband gestiftet hatte.

Der Ball hat in diesem Jahr durch die glanzvollen Gäste, aber auch durch den Wechsel vom Augustiner- zum Hofbräukeller, deutlich an Profil und Anziehungskraft für die Siebenbürger Sachsen in ganz Deutschland gewonnen. Nach dem erwähnten Jahresempfang 2008 im Bayerischen Landtag war dies das bedeutendste gesellschaftliche Ereignis der Siebenbürger Sachsen in München.

Franz Zimmermann, der Anti-Teutsch

Vor 75 Jahren verstarb am 27. Januar 1935 in Linz Franz Zimmermann, der Begründer des modernen Archivwesens in Siebenbürgen, ein bedeutender Urkundeneditor und der erste von Berufs wegen als Historiker arbeitende Siebenbürger Sachse. Anders als Georg Daniel und Friedrich Teutsch, die sich als Bischöfe und Volksführer berufen sahen, Geschichte zur geistigen und geistlichen Erbauung ihres Volkes zu schreiben, hat sich der am renommierten Österreichischen Institut für Geschichtsforschung als Archivar und Historiker ausgebildete Zimmermann streng an die Kriterien der Fachwissenschaft gehalten, nicht heldisch überhörend erzählend, sondern quellenbasierte Studien verfassend.

Trotz dieser Gegensätze legten Teutsch und Zimmermann die Grundlagen der siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Historiographie. Diese verdankt den beiden Teutsch den großen, bewusstseinsprägenden Wurf einer vierbändigen Geschichte „für das Volk“, Zimmermann aber das bis heute stets genutzte und nützliche Urkundenbuch „für die Wissenschaft“.

Franz Joseph Zimmermann wurde am 9. September 1850 in Hermannstadt geboren, wuchs aber in Wien auf, wo sein Vater, der bekannte Jurist und Professor an der Rechtsakademie Joseph Andreas Zimmermann, 1852 Ministerialsekretär und 1859 Präsident des k.k. evangelischen Oberkirchenrates wurde. Er besuchte das bekannte Wiener Schottengymnasium und studierte dann klassische Philologie und Geschichte in Leipzig und Wien. 1873 wurde Zimmermann Mitglied des Österreichischen Instituts für Geschichtsforschung in Wien, der international bekannten Archivschule, die er 1875 mit dem Staatsexamen absolvierte. Er war nun qualifiziert „für diejenigen Zweige des öffentlichen Dienstes, für welche gründliche Kenntnis der österreichischen Geschichte und ihrer Quellen sowie der historischen Hilfswissenschaften verlangt wird, und speziell für Anstellungen in Archiven und Bibliotheken.“

Es spricht für die damalige Führung der Siebenbürger Sachsen, dass sie noch im gleichen Jahr diesen hervorragend ausgebildeten, aber sehr jungen Fachmann anwarb und ihm die Leitung des Archivs der Stadt Hermannstadt und der sächsischen Nation übertrug. Mit Elan ging Franz Zimmermann an die Arbeit und begann eine gründliche, an den modernsten Kriterien der Archivistik orientierte Reorganisation des verstaubten Aufbewahrungsortes der wichtigsten Schriftquellen der Siebenbürger Sachsen, die er bereits 1887 weitgehend abgeschlossen hat. Das Ergebnis ist eine bis heute in ihren Grundzügen bestehende Ordnung, die in seinem unübertrroffenen Archivführer (1. Auflage 1887, 2. Auflage 1901) dokumentiert und den Forschern von größtem Nutzen ist.

Doch sollte das Archiv nach Zimmermanns Überzeugung nicht nur der sachgerechten Aufbewahrung, sondern auch der Kenntnis des Quellschatzes dienen, den es beherbergt. Er öffnete das Archiv den in- und ausländischen Forschern, so dass etwa ein Nicolae Iorga zwei wichtige Dokumentenbände zur rumänischen Geschichte

herausgeben konnte. Mit der Realisierung der schon vom Göttinger Aufklärer August Ludwig von Schlözer abgegebenen Empfehlung einer nach wissenschaftlichen Kriterien edierten Quellensammlung hat Zimmermann auch die Grundlagen der wissenschaftlichen Erforschung der mittelalterlichen Geschichte der Siebenbürger Sachsen gelegt. Die drei von ihm zusammen mit seinen „Archivschülern“ Carl Werner und Georg Müller herausgegebenen Bände des „Urkundenbuchs zur Geschichte der Deutschen in Siebenbürgen“ sind bis heute unverzichtbare Grundlagenwerke. Die Fortführung dieser Edition, die inzwischen auf sieben Bände gediehen ist, gehört zu den Langzeitprojekten des Vereins und dann des Arbeitskreises für Siebenbürgische Landeskunde. Dem Verein diente er in den Jahren 1878-1879 auch als Redakteur des „Correspondenzblattes“, des Vorgängers der „Zeitschrift für Siebenbürgische Landeskunde“.

Als Historiker war Zimmermann bei weitem nicht so produktiv wie Georg Daniel oder Friedrich Teutsch. Das von Fritz Sontag erstellte Werkverzeichnis (im Band „Figuri de archiviști, 1971“) zählt nur 50 Titel. Wichtig sind seine Arbeiten zur Wappen- und Siegelkunde und zur Ansiedlungszeit, anregend und weiterhin gültig seine kritischen Bemerkungen zum Werk von Georg Daniel und Friedrich Teutsch. Der methodischen wissenschaftlichen Forschung sei der Vorgang völlig fremd, eine Geschichtsdarstellung zu schreiben, ohne auf verlässliche Quelleneditionen und monographische Vorarbeiten zurückgreifen zu können, da es sie noch nicht gibt, schrieb er im Jahr 1900. Auch wies Zimmermann auf die Gefahr hin, die jungen, gut ausgebildeten Hochschulabsolventen drohe,

„Die Agnethler sind stolz auf die Urzeln“

Peitschenknallend und unter lautstarken „Hiräii“-Rufen zogen am ersten Sonntag im Februar die Urzeln durch Agnetheln – der fünfte Lauf seit der Wiederbelebung des Brauches 2006. Organisiert hatte den Urzellauf die Urzelnzunft Agnetheln unter Leitung von Bogdan Pătru.

Pătru hielt als „oberste“ Urzel die Ansprache vor dem Rathaus, wo die Teilnehmer des Zuges dem Bürgermeister ihre Aufwartung machten. „Diese Tradition war immer sehr wichtig für die Bewohner von Agnetheln“, erklärte dabei der Agnethler Deutschlehrer. Es sei ein Brauch, der es verdiente, erhalten zu werden. Ähnlich äußerte sich Bürgermeister Radu Curcean vor den versammelten Urzeln und Zuschauern des Spektakels. „Die Agnethler sind stolz auf die Urzeln“, sagte er, bevor er das Feld den Zünften für ihre traditionellen Auftritte überließ.

Die Schneiderzunft beziehungsweise deren Traditionssymbole Mummerl und Schneiderrössl (eine Gestalt, die Ross und Reiter in einer Gestalt vereint) führten zu den Klängen einer Blaskapelle ihren Menuett-ähnlichen Tanz auf. Es folgte der Tanz des Bären und seines Treibers, beide Vertreter der Kürschnerzunft.

Höhepunkt war die Vorführung des Reifenschwingers, des Repräsentanten der Fassbindenzunft. Ein Jugendlicher aus Agnetheln wirbelte drei in einem Reifen gestapelte, mit Wein gefüllte Gläser durch die Luft. Damit erreichte er zwar nicht die Bestmarke von bis zu neun Gläsern aus früheren Jahren, wurde aber von den Zuschauern mit freundlichem Beifall belohnt. Mit dem gemeinsam gesungenen Siebenbürgerlied wurde der offizielle Teil des Umzuges beendet.

Die Urzeln zogen anschließend weiter bis zum Ende der Stadt, wo sich die neun Parten (Gruppen) trennten und einzeln durch die Stadt zogen.

Ein kehrte zum Rathaus zurück, um Bürgermeister Curcean abzuholen, der sich inzwischen auch ein Urzelnkostüm übergestreift hatte. Gemeinsam mit den achtzehnköpfigen Parte ging es über den Harbach zur Kirchenburg und bis vor das evangelische Pfarrhaus. Auf dem Programm

stand ein Besuch bei Pfarrer Reinhard Boltres. Curcean dankte dem Pfarrer, dass sie als Bewahrer der Tradition von den sächsischen Bewohnern akzeptiert würden. Pfarrer Boltres zeigte sich froh, dass dieser Brauch nicht verloren gegangen ist.

Rund 160 große und kleine Teilnehmer zählte der Urzellauf, darunter etwa ein Dutzend sächsische Agnethler. Natürlich fehlten nicht die traditionellen Symbole der einstigen Agnethler Zünfte. Den Trägern der Zunftladden folgten der Hauptmann der Schusterzunft mit seinen zwei kleinen Begleitern, die Kürschnerkrone mit den vier Füchsen drehte sich weithin sichtbar über der Parade, ebenso wie das von den „Schneidern“ getragene Kind auf seinem Pferdchen.

„Man hat es sich als Kind immer gewünscht, bei den Urzeln mitzulaufen“, erinnert sich der Bürgermeister, dem als Kind die Teilnahme jedoch verwehrt geblieben ist – sie war ein Privileg der sächsischen Bewohner. Curcean verwies auf frühere Überlegungen, rumänische Elemente in den Umzug aufzunehmen, die er aber ablehnte. Der Lauf sei ein Andenken an die Siebenbürger Sachsen. Daher wolle man diesen sächsischen Brauch in unveränderter Form weiterführen.

Der Urzellauf hat eine lange Tradition in der Harbachtalgemeinde. Unter dem Namen „Mummenschwanz der Zünfte“ wird ein Umzug 1689 das erste Mal erwähnt. Seit 1910 wurde der Umzug von allen Zünften gemeinsam ausgetragen, bis er 1941 verboten wurde. Erst 1969 wurde die Wiederaufnahme der Tradition wieder gestattet. Der letzte Urzellauf wurde 1990 von den sächsischen Agnethlern durchgeführt. 16 Jahre später initiierte Bogdan Pătru mit den Kindern seiner Deutschklasse den Neuanfang dieses traditionsreichen Brauches.

wenn sie sich einer veralteten, bischöflich sanktionierten Geschichtsdeutung zu unterwerfen hätten. Seinen Aufsatz hat Zimmermann in den „Mitteilungen des Instituts für Österreichische Geschichtsforschung“ veröffentlicht. Friedrich Teutsch zeigte die menschliche Größe, den Aufsatz nicht totschweigen zu lassen, sondern sogar eine positive Einschätzung möglich zu machen. Es handelt sich, schrieb das „Siebenbürgisch-Deutsche Tageblatt“, um eine Abhandlung, die wir der Aufmerksamkeit unserer siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Geschichtsforscher empfehlen möchten, weil sie über den gegenwärtigen stand unserer Geschichtsschreibung und ihre Mängel, sowie über eine Reihe teils noch ungelöster, teils einer neuen Untersuchung und Bearbeitung bedürftiger Fragen gibt.“

Trotzdem fühlte sich Zimmermann in der „wissenschaftlichen Idylle“ der Siebenbürger Sachsen, die er nach eigenem Bekunden gestört hatte, zunehmend isoliert. 1905 schrieb er – schon im Krankenurlaub in Österreich – ein 57seitiges Pamphlet über „die Lage“ des Archivs, in dem er auf die schlechte Unterbringung der Archivalien und die niedrigen Löhne der Mitarbeiter hinwies. Weder diese Schrift noch sein beständiges Drängen, die Si-

tuation des Archivs zu verbessern, stieß auf offene Ohren, so dass Zimmermann 1906 seinen Rücktritt einreichte. Erst seinem Schüler und Nachfolger Dr. Georg Eduard Müller war es vergönnt, den Bau eines modernen Archivgebäudes zu erleben. Franz Zimmermann aber zog sich nach Österreich zurück. Dort schrieb er kaum noch über Siebenbürgen, wohl aber über die Geschichte und die Situation der evangelischen Kirche in Österreich. Als er starb, wurde sein Tod in Siebenbürgen kaum noch wahrgenommen. Heute aber zählt er zu den Großen unter den siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Historikern.



How to stay positive in life, particularly in difficult times

A negative outlook can set in whether it's caused by a stressful event, a job situation or by too much routine, which may mean few events of any kind.

Dr. Daniel Wagner of Trinity University in San Antonio has found through his studies that trying to get rid of a negative thought only makes you think about it more. Instead, you should direct your thoughts elsewhere.

Wagner says when you decide on the question, keep asking it. Ponder it. Wonder about it. Let it run through your mind whenever you find yourself worrying. It will change your thoughts.

Other recommendations include:

Appreciate. Focus on something you are grateful for or that you like.

Visualize. Create the experience you want to have in your mind.

Be in the present. Don't spend time reliving the past. Acknowledge the present moment and its opportu-



nities.

Get healthier. Avoid eating junk food. Eat regular meals and exercise, both of which will give you a more positive outlook.

Associate with positive thinking, happy people. Their influence can rub off on you.

Find something to laugh about. It could be a joke, a TV show, a movie, or talking to a funny person. Laughing can change your outlook.

Stay away from negative people, those who criticize you, your ideas and everyone else.

You can't always control events in your life but you can control what you choose to think and feel about them. You can look at things positively or otherwise. You decide.

February is Chili Month!

Black bean chili, a hearty winter dinner

Dispel the myth. Chili is not a native Mexican dish and far from the fare of the South American country Chile.

Most early references referred to "chili con carne" or meat stew. Some legends trace it to a Spanish nun who came to the New World in the 17th Century, while others say it was brought to San Antonio, in 1731 by settlers from the Canary Islands.

Chili has evolved in many forms and has spawned cook-offs everywhere from county fairs to national festivals. Except for meatless recipes, all have two things in common, meat and some form of peppers.

Mary "Mom" Unser, matriarch of the famous auto racing family, made hers with shredded pork, Vodka, and large cans of jalapeños. Many varieties are topped with items like cheese or poured over spaghetti as a topping.

The recipe below uses Louisiana hot sauce in place of the traditional chili powder. (Add the hot sauce and

pepper to suit your taste.)

Quick black bean chili

1 pound ground beef chuck, turkey or chicken

1 medium onion, diced

1 14-15 ounce can chili-ready tomatoes

1 14-15 oz. can beef broth

1 14-15 ounce can black beans

1 teaspoon black pepper

3 tablespoons ketchup

10 dashes Louisiana hot sauce, Tabasco, or small can of peppers


Salt to taste



In a large, deep skillet or wok, brown the meat and onions, adding the salt, pepper and hot sauce.

Add the beans, tomatoes and broth and simmer on low for about 45 minutes stirring from time to time.

Serve with crackers as a main course or in a cup as a soup course. The mixture freezes well and still tastes great as a leftover.

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
