

Collective prayers begin at sunrise and end at the last sunset. The prayers follow the sun's path around the world

Before, on and after the 2011 World Day of Prayer, the USA Committee reminds us of the women of Chile. They have spoken of a world of hunger and great anguish, and where noise prevents many from hearing the voices of the impoverished.

The guestions remain from the women of Chile, "How many loaves have you?" "What do you have to share with others?"



Trutzige Kirchen und mächtige Türme, Teil 3

An schönen Wintertagen hat man oft nur zwei oder drei Stunden Zeit, um in einer siebenbürgischen Ortschaft Fotos zu machen. Am Morgen treibt kalter Nebel durch Täler und Höhen, und am Abend bedecken lange Schatten Kirchen und Burgen, die man im Visier hat. An einem Tag in der Weihnachtswoche versuchte ich, ein gutes Bild von der Kirchenburg in Agnetheln zu schießen, was aber nicht gelang. Zu wenig Licht auf der Nordseite, zu viele Bäume zwischen den Gebäuden, eine Menge Drähte und Kabel, die unregelmäßig die Burg umlaufen, abgestellte und kaputte Autos, die auf allen Seiten stehen und so weiter. Gegen vier Uhr verließ ich die Stadt am Harbach und machte mich auf den Heimweg ins Alttal.

In Mergeln, das in einem Seitental, am Altbach, liegt, hielt ich an. Aus dem Osten hatte sich der Mond an die Wehrtürme der Burg herangepirscht, gelb und rund wie eine rumänische Palukes, und guckte neugierig durch die schneebedeckten Linden-, Eichen- und Kastanienzweige. Den wollte ich über den Dächern der Kirchenburg fotografieren. Plötzlich rief eine dunkelhaarige junge Frau: "Jetzt werde ich von zwei Männern unter Druck gesetzt!". Ich hatte meinen Fotoapparat auf sie und ihren jüngeren Partner gerichtet. Beide lachten auf, ließen voneinander aber nicht los. Im Hintergrund ragten die zwei Türme der Wehrkirche in den abendlichen Himmel.

Im Ersten Weltkrieg lernte eine 19-Jährige – Anna hieß sie – einen jungen Offizier aus Wien unter den gleichen Türmen und Bäumen kennen. Die zwei schrieben sich, auf ihre Briefe bekam sie eines Tages aber keine Antwort mehr. Der Dorflehrer, dem das Mädchen aufgefallen war, hatte die Post abfangen lassen. Das sollte Anna erst Jahre später erfahren. Als 70-jährige las sie in der Zeitung von einem musikwissenschaftlichen Buch, dessen Verfasser den gleichen Namen wie ihr Jugendbekannter trug. Sie schrieb an den Verlag und erhielt einen Brief vom Sohn des Autors. Ja, teilte der Anna mit, sein Vater habe von ihr erzählt und sich stets gefragt, warum sie ihm nicht mehr geantwortet hätte. Mittlerweile lebte er nicht mehr.

Ich begegnete der Frau 1982. Die Frage, wie sich ihr Schicksal wohl im gegenteiligen Fall gestaltet hätte, beschäftigte sie auf die alten Tage. Einen Blick auf die andere Seite der Kirchenburg hätte sie als junges Mädchen gerne gewagt, doch der war ihr verwehrt geblieben. An sie erinnerte ich mich, als ich zu meinem Wagen ging, um weiterzufahren. Doch da stand die vorhin angetroffene junge Frau. Ob ich sie mitnehmen würde, fragte sie unumwunden. Sie möchte in die weite Welt ziehen, wo das Glück liege. Das sagte sie und – ohne eine Antwort abzuwarten – ging sie weiter, die Straße abwärts.

Mergeln. Romanische Basilika und Glockenturm im Westen wurden im 13. Jahrhundert errichtet, im 15. Jahrhundert zur Wehrkirche umgebaut. In dieser Zeit wurde der Ostturm, der ursprünglich auch einen Wehrgang besaß, über den Chor gesetzt. Die Ringmauer entstammt dem 16. Jahrhundert, von ihren vier Ecktürmen sind noch zwei vorhanden. in den Urkunden auch Mariental und Rosental genannt, bringen wir heute Fotos. Die erste Ortschaft wurde 1336 zum ersten Mal genannt, die zweite einige Jahre später, 1349. Mergeln zählte vor dem Zweiten Weltkrieg rund 800 Sachsen, Roseln 680. Bekannt über die Grenzen ihrer Ortschaft waren die Handwerker aus Mergeln; die großen Bauernhäuser der Ortschaft, oft quer zur Straße gebaut, zeugen von ihrem Ruf. Die evangelische Gemeinde (Kuratorin: Katharina Lautner) zählt heute 13 Sachsen, die vom Agnethler Pfarrer Reinhard Boltres betreut werden. Die Gottesdienste im Ort besuchen durchschnittlich fünf bis sechs Frauen und Männer.

Die Gemeinde Roseln, die in einem Nebental des Harbachs, am Graubach, liegt, zählt 18 evangelische Mitglieder (Kuratorin: Sophia Merlă). Pfarrer Boltres holt jene, die die Gottesdienste an Sonn- und Feiertagen in Agnetheln besuchen möchten, mit dem Wagen ab.

Die verwaiste Wehrkirche in Roseln hat einen Wetterhahn auf dem Dach. Vermutlich nach dem Agnethler Vorbild errichtet, auf deren Kirchendach gleichfalls ein siebenbürgischer Kokesch wacht. Sonst zieren Knöpfe und Wetterfahnen die Kirchendächer, im Burzenland auch Kreuze. Im Harbachtal und in der Schäßburger Gegend sitzen Wetterhähne auch auf Türmen, so in Neithausen und Trappold. In einigen Ortschaften sind die Dachaufsätze allerdings verrostet und heruntergefallen, die hohen Dächer sehen daher etwas kahl aus. Doch das fällt wahrscheinlich nur einem Fotografen auf.

Begrüßt wurden auch Experten von Museen aus Italien und Polen, die im Rahmen des EU-Projektes Carnival King of Europe, das sich mit Fastnachtsbräuchen beschäftigt (weitere Partnerländer sind Bulgarien, Frankreich, Kroatien, Mazedonien, Slowenien und Rumänien; Internetseite: www.carnivalkingofeurope.it), den Urzelbrauch in Rumänien erforschen und alle Veranstaltungen der Urzeln gefilmt haben.

Eine Vision wurde wahr

Die Urzelparade, mit der auch früher die wichtigsten Traditionsfiguren der Agnethler Zünfte vorgestellt wurden, und der anschließende Lauf durch die Gassen Agnethelns in die Häuser der Kränzchenfreundinnen, wo man bewirtet wurde, wurden 1941 verboten, 1969 wieder erlaubt und 1990 zum letzten Mal von den Agnethler Sachsen gefeiert. Inzwischen gab es in Deutschland schon Urzelläufe in Sachsenheim (seit 1965), Traunreut (1981), Geretsried (1986), später auch in Nürnberg (2001), Weisendorf (2004) und Bonn-Niederholtorf (2006). Für die Agnethler war der Urzeltag in Sachsenheim viele Jahre Ersatz für den ehemaligen Urzelbrauch in Agnetheln. Bis 2006 der Deutschlehrer Bogdan Pătru, der den Urzeltag aus seiner Kindheit in schöner Erinnerung hatte, mit seinen Schülern einen Urzellauf durch Agnetheln organisierte. Seine Vision, den Urzeltag neu zu beleben, wurde schon 2007 wahr, als zu Ehren der Kulturhauptstadt Hermannstadt rund 40 Urzeln aus Deutschland zu einer gemeinsamen Parade nach Siebenbürgen fuhren und mit den 80 meist rumänischen Urzeln, Lole genannt, zusammen zwei schöne Urzeltage verbrachten. Schon im nächsten Jahr entstand in Agnetheln der Verein Breasla lolelor, der sich satzungsgemäß

der Pflege des sächsischen Urzelbrauches widmet.

Urzelbräuche auch in Großschenk und Marpod

Am Abend des 11. Februar wurden die Urzeln aus Deutschland im Agnethler Rathaus offiziell begrüßt und zu einem Festessen eingeladen. Mit Bussen fuhren am Samstag knapp 200 Urzeln (30 davon aus Deutschland angereist) erst nach Großschenk, wo sie von Bürgermeister Nicolae Ion Tănase begrüßt wurden und ihre Parade mit den Traditionsfiguren vorführten: Bär mit Treiber, Kürschnerkrone, Rössel mit Mummerl, Holzpferd mit Reiter und drei Reifenschwinger.

Alle Vorführungen wurden von der Blaskapelle H-Musikanten aus Hermannstadt begleitet. Friederike Pall stellte vor dem einstigen Narrenwagen den Großschenker Urzelbrauch vor, das von Urzeln begleitete Narrengericht. Großschenk hat das Ladenforttragen auch gekannt und die Urzeln begleiteten auch das Begraben des Faschings. Nachher wurden die Urzeln im Saal mit einem köstlichen Imbiss bewirtet und natürlich wurde bei herrlichem Wetter gemeinsam "Siebenbürgen, Land des Segens" gesungen. So auch in Hermannstadt, wo sich die Parade von der 90er Kaserne durch die Heltauer Gasse über den Großen Ring, wo es Auftritte gab, zur ev. Stadtpfarrkirche bewegte. Stadtpfarrer Kilian Dörr empfing die Urzeln freudig, hoffend, dass diese die bösen Geister vertreiben mögen. Er sprach dabei die "vielen versteckten oder offenbaren unguten Machenschaften" an, die die Entwicklung des Landes bremsen: "Noch besser wäre es, wenn wir durch das Geknalle die guten Geister wieder wecken und neu beleben würden. Denn diese Zottelwesen sind ja für Hermannstadt eine gute neue Tradition, die viel mit dem Zusammenwirken von Rumänen,

Sachsen, Deutschen und allen,

die hier leben, zu tun hat und uns anregt, auf die guten alten Traditionen aufzubauen und für die heutige Zeit Neues zu schaffen." Ähnliches brachte Doris Hutter in ihrer rumänischen Ansprache zum Ausdruck: "Europa ist heute unter uns. Lasst uns also gemeinsam feiern. Und ein Gedanke möge uns ewig vereinen: Freundschaft - bereichert mit Aufschwung." Hutter schloss auf Deutsch: "Die Kirche viele hundert Jahr/ den Sachsen wert und Stütze war./ Wir wünschen ihr noch langes Leben!/ Zum Glauben mögen die Leut' streben!/Dem Gotteshaus Zuspruch und Ehr'!/ Für Christen tröstliche Einkehr."

Vermächtnis für die nächsten Generationen

In Marpod stellte Wilhelm Schneider, nach der Begrüßung durch Bürgermeister Sebastian Dotcoş, den dortigen Brauch der Hieschen uch Heßijen/Lolen vor, wobei die Masken der Lolen, anders als bei den Urzeln, mit Krähen- oder Bussardfedern bestückt sind. Im Gemeindesaal gab es für die Urzeln ein Festessen, die Blaskapelle spielte zum Tanz auf.

Blauer Himmel begleitete

die 220 Urzeln am Sonntag (13. Februar) in Agnetheln. Die Sachsen besuchten erst den ev. Gottesdienst von Pfarrer Reinhardt Boltres, dann fand die Parade wie früher in Agnetheln statt. Bürgermeister Radu Curcean sagte vor dem Rathaus, dass die Urzeln die Menschen in Freundschaft vereint hätten und zugleich Botschafter der multikulturellen Werte der Stadt Agnetheln seien. Zunftmeister Bogdan Pătru versprach, den Brauch als Vermächtnis für die nächsten Generationen zu pflegen. Er hoffe, dass dieser auch in 100 Jahren noch gefeiert werde. Paradehauptmann Horst Wellmann aus Dinkelsbühl sprach im Namen des ersten Paradehauptmanns vor 100 Jahren: "...dass heut der Anfang wird gemacht/ für einen Brauch, der voller Pracht/ die Urzeln weiter leben lässt!/ Auf dass der Wind nie so rau bläst,/ dass dieser Brauch mal untergeht!/ Ich wünsche, dass er lang besteht,/überlebt Kriege und Gefahren/und weiterlebt in 100 Jahren!"

Doris Hutter erinnerte an die lang gepflegte Tradition des Brauches, die Aussiedlung der Sachsen, den Verlust der Heimat und an das Empfinden, wenn man wieder im Heimatort steht. Dabei stellte sie fest, dass es nicht schwer sei, gemeinsam mit den Rumänen, die den sächsischen Urzelbrauch übernommen hätten, diesen Brauch zu pflegen, weil junge Menschen die Zusammenarbeit gewünscht

Brukenthal-Museum zeigt Bauzeichnungen der Jahrhundertwende

Mehr als 400 historische Bauzeichnungen und Pläne entdeckten Mitarbeiter der evangelischen Kirchengemeinde Hermannstadt durch Zufall 2009 in ihren Archiven. Unter den Zeichnungen sind Werke der bedeutendsten an der Entstehung des heutigen Hermannstädter Stadtbildes beteiligten Architekten. Fünfzig der Zeichnungen sind noch bis zum 3. April in einer Ausstellung im Hermannstädter Brukenthal-Museum zu sehen.

Die Ausstellung vereint die 50 schönsten und interessantesten Zeichnungen dieses Archivbestandes mit Architekturzeichnungen aus den Sammlungen des Brukenthal-Museums und des Zentralarchivs der Evangelischen Kirche A.B. in Rumänien. "Die unsichtbare Stadt. Entwurfszeichnungen aus Hermannstädter Architekturwettbewerben 1880-1930" nennen die Veranstaltungsmacher ihre Schau. Für eine Reihe von prägenden Bauten des Hermannstädter Stadtbildes sind nicht nur Baupläne der ausgeführten Gebäude überliefert, sondern auch solche, die zwar zu den ausgeschriebenen Wettbewerben eingereicht wurden, aber unausgeführt blieben. Hinzu kommen Auftragsarbeiten oder von Architekten in Eigeninitiative gefertigte Entwurfszeichnungen, die so ebenfalls nie umgesetzt wurden. In der Summe bildeten diese nicht realisierten Entwürfe das Gesicht einer Stadt, die so niemals erbaut wurde, sondern nur auf dem Papier lebt: einer unsichtbaren Stadt, meinen die Kuratoren der Ausstellung, Kustos Frank Ziegler und der Kunsthistoriker Timo Hagen.

Nahezu alle ausgestellten Entwurfszeichnungen sind Gebäuden für Bildungs- und Kultureinrichtungen gewidmet, wie sie um 1900 zahlreich entstanden. Zusammen mit historischen und aktuellen Fotos sowie zeitgenössischen Presseartikeln und Publikationen bieten sie interessante Einblicke in ein Stück Hermannstädter Stadtgeschichte. Anhand von zehn prägenden Bauten stellt die Ausstellung gebaute und unausgeführte Architektur gegenüber. Urheber der Entwürfe sind sowohl lokale Architekten als auch Baumeister aus dem Habsburger und dem damaligen Deutschen Reich. Der Besucher erfährt in ausführlichen Begleittexten Einzelheiten über die jeweiligen Entste-

hungsgeschichten und sieht Alternativentwürfe für das Brukenthal-Gymnasium, das heutige Teutsch-Haus mit der Johanniskirche, evangelische Schulgebäude in der Ober- und Unterstadt oder das ehemalige Archiv der Stadt und der sächsischen Nationsuniversität.

Bestimmt, um den Bauträger nicht nur von den praktischen und technischen Vorteilen, sondern auch von den ästhetischen Vorzügen der zu errichtenden Gebäude zu überzeugen, sind die Entwürfe selbst sowohl technisch vollendet als auch von erheblichem zeichnerischen Reiz, und fordern zum Nachdenken über ihren eigenen künstlerischen Rang auf.

Im Rahmen eines wissenschaftlichen Forschungsprojekts, das durch den Beauftragten der Bundesregierung für Kultur und Medien über den Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Kulturrat e.V. gefördert wurde, konnten die Architekturzeichnungen im Jahre 2010 vollständig inventarisiert und historisch und kunsthistorisch eingeordnet werden.



During the 18th century, dancing masters became familiar figures in Ireland as they wandered from village to village teaching dancing. Each dancing master claimed a district and did not venture into another's territory. Rivalries between districts were intense and it was not unknown for one district to kidnap a dancing master from another district.

Step dancing can be traced to sailors who danced during off-duty hours

Today's Riverdance consists of traditional Irish step dancing notable for its rapid leg movements while body and arms are kept largely stationary. It originated at the 1994 Eurovision Song Contest, a moment that is still considered a significant watershed in Irish culture. The popular Riverdance video is still available for purchase.

Will the tablet be the new PC? Tablet makers rush to compete with the iPad

Technology experts predict the PC will finally relinquish its spot as the dominant way to access multimedia and the Web. The tablet will soon take over.

New tablets have been released by Asus, HTC, LG Electronics, Motorola, Toshiba and many others. Each hopes to have the same success enjoyed by the iPad. Apple is ahead with an estimated 10 million iPads sold in 2010.

But the tablet market is expected to explode. Research by iSupply predicts 57 million tablets will be sold in 2011 and 171 million by 2014. Google and its partners LG and Motorola are in the best position to loosen Apple's grip on the market, according to Bloomberg

Businessweek.

The new tablets will come in several shapes and sizes. Some will have only Wi-Fi access, and others will also connect to 4G networks. A new version of Google's Android software is expected to work well on tablet-PC displays.

While the iPad has no camera, many of the others have two, one in front and one in back. But Apple will introduce a new iPad shortly after the Consumer Electronics Show. The company upgrades its models every year.

Samsung and Acer have tablets with seven-inch displays. The size makes it easier for users to hold in one hand or carry in pockets and purses.

Angie's pork casserole is a meal in a dish

Angie's pork casserole 4 to 6

pieces of thinly sliced pork tenderloin

chicken flavor stuffing 1 package mix

1/2 package au jus mix

1/2 cup chopped celery 1/2 cup chopped onion mushroom soup

Prepare stuffing in 2-quart pan as directed on package, adding the celery, onion and au jus mix.

Put a layer of pork tenderloin on the bottom of a baking pan. Add a layer of the stuffing and then add a second layer of the meat.

Pour condensed soup over the top and spread

evenly.

Bake at 350 degrees until the top of the mixture is slightly brown.

Add a side of seasoned green beans, buttered asparagus or peas, along with a tossed salad and hot rolls, and the meal is complete.

For more lavish fare, a light dessert can be added and all of it washed down with a cup or coffee or a big glass of iced tea.
