## Weight Watchers allows zero points for fruits, vegetables

The company, which since 1997 has helped millions of dieters lose weight through its point system has changed its values. Previously, dieters could eat whatever they wanted, as long as they kept portions under control.

Now, company president David Kirchhoff concludes, on Weight Watchers website. that calorie counting has become unhelpful. Quoted in Time, he says, "When we have a 100-calorie apple in one hand and a 100-calorie pack of cookies in the other, and we view them as being the same because the calories are the same, it says everything that needs to be said about the limitations of just using calories in guiding food choices."

The new point system favors food that is high in protein or fiber (0 points for fruit and vegetables except starchy ones like potatoes) and higher points for foods loaded with carbohydrates, which are easily absorbed and turned into fat.

According to widespread belief, Easter owes its name to "Eastre", the Anglo-Saxon goddess symbolizing hare and egg. Another theory suggests that it comes from the early German word "eostarun", meaning dawn and white.


Easter always falls between March 22 and April 25.

Easter is a "moveable feast" as it does not fall on a fixed date in the Gregorian or Julian calendars. The full moon determines the date of Easter.

"Pysanka" is a name given to the tradition of Easter egg painting.

The color used in painting the eggs differ in different nations. Orthodox Grecians paint their eggs red to symbolize the blood of Christ. Some Germans and Austrians paint their eggs green and use them on Holy Thursday. Slavic peoples decorate their eggs in gold and silver patterns.

Chocolate eggs were traditionally given as gifts in Europe.



In 19th century Europe, bitter dark chocolate was used to make small egg shapes. These chocolate eggs were traditionally exchanged as Easter gifts, especially in countries like France and Germany.

Ninety million chocolate Easter bunnies and 16 billion jelly beans are produced each year before the commencement of the Easter festivities. As a holiday, Easter comes only second to Halloween in terms of the annual sale confectionary items.

76 percent of people eat the ears on chocolate bunnies first.

According to the Guinness Book of World Records the largest Easter egg ever made was just over 25 feet high and weighed 8,968 lbs.

In countries like Hungary and Transylvania, the day after Easter is called "Locsolo Hetfo" meaning "Watering Monday". This is because water, perfume or perfumed water is often sprinkled in exchange for an Easter egg on this day.





#### The Passover Seder -- for Christians

As spring nears, the stores start to fill up with colorful baskets, candy and other trappings of the holiday we call Easter. Christians often look to create or recover traditions that

specifically celebrate the resurrection of Christ, the savior. One such increasingly popular tradition is borrowed from the

Jews: The Passover Seder. The traditional Jewish Seder is a ritual feast that marks the

beginning of the Jewish holiday of Passover, the liberation of the Israelites from slavery

in Egypt. In a traditional Seder, special food is set out in the family's finest table settings, each step and every word of the ritual dinner dictated by the scriptural commandment



to each Jew to 'tell your son' about the liberation.

Christians increasingly incorporate a version of the Seder into their Easter week traditions, sometimes holding it on the Thursday before Easter, the day reserved to celebrate Jesus' last supper with his disciples. Jesus' last supper is traditionally held to be a Seder, although some scholars disagree.

While many styles of the Christian Seder exist, Christian Seders can follow the Jewish order of service exactly or with some changes. The Seder meal requires four cups of wine each with a message: I will bring out; I will deliver; I will redeem; and I will take. Christian Seders sometimes quote Christ at the last supper for one or all of the cups: Take, eat: This is my body. Or "This is my blood."

The theme of liberation that the Seder represents has also been borrowed from time to time for other purposes. During the 1960s civil rights movement, Seders were often held as an interfaith service, uniting civil rights workers.

## The worst excuse: No time to take care of yourself

People have lots of excuses for not thinking about health and getting in shape. Lack of time is the most common excuse, says best-selling author Bob Greene in his book The Life You Want: Get Motivated, Lose Weight and Be Happy.

He studied peoples' schedules and found they all had time every day that would be better spent being physically active. He asks, "Who doesn't have 30, 40 or 60 minutes a day to exercise and take care of themselves?"

Green says exercise aversion is another cause. Even his most famous client, Oprah Winfrey, didn't like to exercise.

People avoid it because they don't want to experience the discomfort of working at it. But discomfort means you are exerting yourself enough to burn calories and improve your health. Some people exercise while watching TV or walking with a friend.

Once a week, it's important to make a healthy week's menu instead of just eating whatever is in the fridge.

Buy fresh fruit, vegetables, fish, whole grain bread and

crackers, plus meat, but not too much. Skip the processed foods and fatty snacks.

The good news is that successful dieters take a break on one or two days of the week. Within reason, they eat whatever they want, such as a few slices of pizza but not the whole pie.

Put health on your timemanagement plan. When you are stronger and healthier, you'll do everything better.

## The Traditions of Easter

As with almost all "Christian" holidays, Easter has a secular side as well. The dichotomous nature of Easter and its symbols, however, is not necessarily a modern fabrication.

Easter has always had its non-religious side. In fact, Easter was originally a pagan festival. It was co-opted by Christian missionaries starting in the second century CE.



The ancient Saxons celebrated the return of spring with an uproarious festival commemorating their goddess of offspring and of springtime, Eastre. When the second-century Christian missionaries encountered the tribes of the north with their pagan celebrations, they do what Christian missionaries have always done; they attempted to convert them to Christianity. They did so, however, in a clandestine manner.

It would have been dangerous for the very early Christian converts to celebrate their holy days with observances that did not coincide with celebrations that already existed. To save lives, the missionaries decided to spread their dogma slowly throughout the populations by allowing them to continue to celebrate pagan feasts, but to do so in a Christian manner.

As it happened, the pagan festival of Eastre occurred at the same time of year as the Christian observance of the Resurrection of Christ. It made sense, therefore, to alter the festival itself, to make it a Christian observance as pagans were slowly indoctrinated. The early name, Eastre, was eventually changed to its modern spelling, Easter.

#### The Date of Easter

Prior to A.D. 325, Easter was variously celebrated on different days of the week, including Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. In that year, the Council of Nicaea was convened by emperor Constantine. It issued the Easter Rule which states that Easter shall be celebrated on the first Sunday that occurs after the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox. The "full moon" in the rule is the ecclesiastical full moon, which is defined as the fourteenth day of a tabular lunation, where day 1 corresponds to the ecclesiastical New Moon. It does not always occur on the same date as the astronomical full moon. The ecclesiastical "vernal equinox" is always on March 21. Therefore, Easter must be celebrated on a Sunday between the dates of March 22 and April 25.

#### **The Lenten Season**

Lent is the forty-six day period just prior to Easter Sunday. It begins on Ash Wednesday. Mardi Gras (French for "Fat Tuesday") is a celebration, sometimes called "Carnival," practiced around the world, on the Tuesday prior to Ash Wednesday. It was designed as a way to "get it all out" before the sacrifices of Lent began. New Orleans is the focal point of Mardi Gras celebrations in the U.S. Read about the religious meanings of the Lenten Season.



The Easter Bunny

The Easter Bunny is not a modern invention. The symbol originated with the pagan festival of Eastre. The goddess, Eastre, was worshipped by the Anglo-Saxons through her earthly symbol, the rabbit.

The Germans brought the symbol of the Easter rabbit to America. It was widely ignored by other Christians until shortly after the Civil War. In fact, Easter itself was not widely celebrated in America until after that time.



The Easter Egg

As with the Easter Bunny and the holiday itself, the Easter Egg predates the Christian holiday of Easter. The exchange of eggs in the springtime is a custom that was centuries old when Easter was first celebrated by Christians.

From the earliest times, the egg was a symbol of birth in most cultures. Eggs were often wrapped in gold leaf or, if you were a peasant, colored brightly by boiling them with the leaves or petals of certain flowers.

Today, children hunt colored eggs and place them in Easter baskets along with the modern version of real Easter eggs -- those made of plastic or chocolate candy.



#### Ostern ist das Fest des Lebens



# Help cancer society save lives by reducing your own risk

The American Cancer Society is a nationwide, community-based health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer as a major health problem. They want to prevent cancer, save lives and diminish suffering from cancer.

Their goals, by 2015, are to reduce cancer lifetime. You can do it. mortality by 50 percent, to reduce the incidence of cancer by 25 percent, and to improve the quality of life for cancer patients. How can you help the organization reach its goals and save lives, including your own? Think about this:

- \* You could help reduce cases of skin cancer. It's not that difficult for you as an individual, but if many people stay out of the midday sun, cover exposed areas of the skin when outdoors and wear plenty of sunscreen, skin cancer can be avoided. Protecting children, who are outdoors more than adults, is especially important. Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer.
- \* Believe the facts about smoking and lung cancer. It's the leading cause of death from cancer in both men and women. In order to quit, you have to do more than read statistics. You need to make a personal commitment. Over-the-counter nicotine replacement products and prescription medications can help you start, but it takes great dedication to quit for a



- \* Your anti-cancer lifestyle is much the same as that recommended for a healthy heart and avoidance of other diseases. You'll get a big bang for your buck if you decide to eat a healthy diet, avoid weight gain (or lose weight if you should) and get some exercise on most days of the week. Adopting a healthy lifestyle can't be done instantly, but if you steadily work toward it, you can save your own life. Think about it every day and make a plan.
- \* Take early detection seriously. Many cancers are curable if found early, including cancer of the colon, prostate, cervix and breast. Ask your doctor for a screening sched-\* Get immunized. Immuni-
- zations are available for Hepatitis B, which can lead to liver cancer, and for human papillomavirus for people under age 26, which can lead to cervical cancer.
- \* Practice safe sex to avoid HIV or AIDS, which increases the risk of several types of can-

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

## Nintendo: A new era of 3-D entertainment

The new Nintendo 3DS was released March 27 in the United States. It costs \$250, the same price the Wii console cost when it went on sale in 2006.

The company says the 3DS creates a truly unique experience that doesn't exist anywhere else.

It has three cameras, one facing the user and two facing outward that let you take 3-D photos that are instantly dis-



played on the screen.

The accelerometer and gyroscope track players' movements and how they tilt the screen. Users can play games with motion-based capabilities or see the 3-D games at different angles.

The Mii creator uses photos you take of yourself to instantly create a cartoon avatar based on your image. Then you can adjust it as you like.

The 3DS has new social features, including Street Pass, which lets users exchange game information with other 3DS users nearby. A high game score, for example, can appear on a friend's 3DS if they choose to activate the feature.

It can play games from older DS systems, but they just won't be in 3-D.

Nintendo Co. says more than 30 games will be available for the 3DS by early June.

#### **Senior Scene**

#### Help for the 'doughnut hole'

Beginning in 2011, seniors stuck in the doughnut hole will see the cost of their brand-name drugs discounted by 50 percent at pharmacies.

Previously, after yearly drug costs exceeded \$2,800, they would have to pay the entire cost of prescription drugs out of their own pocket. As a result of the reform to health care, the doughnut hole will gradually get smaller until it's fully closed in 2020.

Seniors don't have to do anything at all to receive the 50 percent discount after they arrive at the \$2,800 limit under Medicare Part D. Pharmacies should discount their prescriptions automatically, but it might be a good idea to remind them.

#### **Better reverse mortgages**

A new type of reverse mortgage is attracting the attention of more affluent borrowers who are eager to extract cash from their homes. The mortgage can provide a lump sum or monthly payments to people age 62 and older.

The Federal Housing Administration (FHA) has introduced the "Saver," which reduces fees by about 40 percent. Lenders such as MetLife Bank, Bank of America and Wells Fargo, are marketing them.

The FHA reduced its typical 2 percent charge for the mortgage insurance premiums, to 0.01 percent of the property value for the Saver mortgage. Owners are limited to borrowing 80 percent to 90 percent of what they could get with a regular reverse mortgage.

Though expenses are reduced, taking a reverse mortgage for short-term needs will always be more expensive than other loans, such as a home equity line of credit.

## More older folks go online

Eldercare Locator, a service of the U.S. Administration on Aging, has released a guide to help seniors do things like go online to join social networks, hook up to Skype or explore Google.

The fastest-growing group of people using social networking today is adults ages 65 and older, followed by those in the 50 to 64 age group.

## Stroke is no longer the third leading killer

Healthier lifestyles, better blood pressure control and cholesterol management by Americans are credited with moving stroke down a notch.

Instead of being the third leading killer, it has moved to number four behind heart disease, cancer, and chronic respiratory disease, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

While improved treatments can take some of the credit for the improvement, better stroke prevention is having an even greater effect.

#### **Treating risk factors**

The American Heart Association and the American Stroke Association report that metabolic syndrome is defined as having risk factors such as high blood pressure, high tryglycerides, Low HDL cholesterol, a large waist circumference and elevated fasting glucose.

Screening just for metabolic syndrome may not be effective. Stroke specialists quoted in Duke Medicine say each component is a risk factor that should be treated individually.

## Fixing the carotids

When medication and lifestyle can't halt narrowing of the carotid arteries, the blood vessels on either side of the neck, options include implanting a stent or having surgery to remove the blockage. Carotids are the arteries that carry oxygenated blood to the brain.

Surgery isn't advised for those with general coronary artery disease.

Stroke prevention advice

- Treat blood pressure to a goal of 140/90 mm Hg or less.
  - · Stop smoking.
- · Eat more fruits and vegetables for weight control and potassium.
- Talk to your doctor about daily aspirin use.
- Limit alcohol consumption to two drinks per day for men, one for women.
  - Treat sleep apnea.
- Exercise moderately for at least 150 minutes per week.
- Know your family history
- · Ask your doctor about statin therapy.


