



Our next meeting will be on Wednesday, June 8th at St. John's Lutheran Church in Highland Heights. We will have a party tray with Chinese food at 7 pm.


Kids at the wedding

For oncoming colds, get zinc

The recent review of scientific studies on the effect of zinc shows that the mineral may prevent some sneezes and sniffles, but it only works if you take it within 24 hours of the first signs of a cold.

Researchers reviewed 15 studies of people who took zinc lozenges, syrups or placebos. The studies show that zinc cut the duration of colds by a day and reduced the severity of symptoms by 40 percent.

Children who took zinc protectively for five months or longer caught fewer colds and had fewer sick days than kids who didn't take zinc.





The neatly manicured cemetery will be decorated in full beauty of bright bouquets of flowers and rows and rows of American flags and gold markers in honor of our many deceased veterans. All of our veterans of yesterday and also today will be honored on this special day for they're fighting, suffering, and giving their lives for our freedom. We are so grateful to them and cherish this freedom today.

When attending Veteran's Day Banquets in their honor, I often felt sad where there also was an empty chair in the veteran's honor. Some veterans attended were our old fathers who fought many battles without a thank you. It was a must as so many were wounded without even knowing what they were fighting for other than a dictator's lust for power.

We are honored to claim a very special honored veteran as our own, Saxon Eugene "Ike" Spack who will be riding in a car of honor in the Memorial Day parade. There aren't too many of our guys left here so many had to leave our Junior Saxons during the wartime. Ike is probably one of the few and best known POWs in our area. Many of us grew up with Ike and attended Prospect School together, which is still standing. We had many veterans in our class of 1940, a great class. He still looks great for his age of 89 with his shy smile and deep blue eyes that have seen so much. He never has much to say, but heroes never talk much.

Ike came from a large family of six boys; Mike, Simon, George, Robert, Albert and himself. His parents were Michael Spack, deceased, and his mother, Elizabeth Spack, died in 1978. She died when all her boys were home except George, who died just a short time before the war ended. My hubby Mike and his cousin Steve Fronius were the last to see him and had just taken a picture together before he was killed in battle. This picture was sent to his mother.

Ike was only 21 years old when he was drafted, even though he was the sole provider of his mother with two younger brothers still in school. On April 29, 1943 he was sent to Fort Mead S.D. for basic training and sent overseas in July with the 88 Glider Infantry. He was then shipped across the water and landed on the beaches of Normandy, one week after D-Day. This was part of the contingent of soldiers replacing men who had been killed in the 9th Infantry Division. Being in the Infantry, soldiers had no choice but to be killed, captured or wounded. Their division moved too fast before the rest of the allied forces could catch up. They were then captured, question and lockedup. The other soldiers arrived an hour later and were safe. It is believed the others included our Herman Linder and John (Ham) Girscht. This was the same day Ike's brother George was killed, therefore his mother received two telegrams; one for George's death and the other for Ike missing in action. The Battle of the Bulge was next and Ike had to repair the enemy's tracks. They had just left their hut in time before an explosion hit it. Safe! Now they were fleeing towards a high hill and they helped their enemy older guards run for safety. Liberation had come for Ike and his fellow POWs. It took 2 days to be prepared to go home, clean up and fatten up.

When he arrived home he married his next-door neighbor, German born Hilda Seeger on August 31, 1946. They have now been married 65 years and have a beautiful 5 acre home with a lake and a lovely country atmosphere. They have 2 daughters, Heidi and Carol, and three grandsons and one great granddaughter nearby.

Ike belongs to the Amvets, VFW, DAV and ex-POWs. He was honored with the Legion of Honor award by the French government, which is the highest coveted award for helping liberate northern France from the Nazis. This was created by Napoleon for remarkable deeds for France. He received a "Knight of Legion of Honor" plus a Bronze U.S. star for his service. Today whenever there is a drive for veteran funds you will see lke once again giving of himself supporting his comrades, selling Poppies or whatever is needed with his same humble hero's smile. A proud and gracious "Thank You!" to all of our veterans and those serving our country!

We have so many on our growing sick list who are in our thoughts and prayers!

Also take note that Ray Denny is now at Copeland Oaks, Crandel Unit. Take care everyone. Hope your health improves soon!

Walker safety

People of all ages use walkers when they have an injury or health problem. But the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that most of the 47,000 people treated for falls involving walking aids, particularly walkers, are older people. How to stay safe:

- * Clear the way. Pick up throw rugs, cords and any other tripping hazards. Watch for your dog or cat.
- * Have the right size. When your arms are relaxed at your sides, the

walker handles should line up with the bend of your wrists.

* With a non-wheeled walker, lift it and move a comfortable arm's length ahead, then step into the middle of the walker. With a wheeled walker, walk in the walker, not behind it.

* Wear stable walking shoes with nonskid soles or socks with rubber grips on the bottom.

* Keep the rubber legs of a walker clean. Replace if they show wear.

It was so fitting that at his funeral service the perfect hymn was played, "In the Garden", for Albert would have been cultivating and preparing his garden

soon. Anyone who was blessed to know Al would tell you what a genuine great guy and friend he was to all. He was so thoughtful and helpful to everyone in need and always asked if there was anything he could do for he always liked to keep busy. He kept an immaculate house and when his work was done he was ready to help others. Albert comes from a family of 4 boys and 2 sisters who were previously deceased. Good cholesterol linked to lower cancer danger

When you remember family members or friends who have had cancer, one of

your next thoughts may be, "How can I keep it from happening to me?"

There is no simple answer, but as scientists work to determine the factors involved, they come up with findings that decrease cancer risk. Some of these findings would apply to you.

your Increase good cholesterol

The surprising result of studying many controlled trials indicates that for every 10 mg/dl higher increase of HDL (good) cholesterol, cancer risk dropped by 36 percent. The analysis was done by Tufts Medical Center's Molecular Cardiology Research Institute and colleagues.

While researchers can't say for sure how high-density lipoprotein does it, they say HDL probably has anti-inflammatory and anti-oxidant effects that can reduce cancer risk. Or HDL might also be helping the body's immune system search out and destroy abnormal cells that could grow into tumors.

How to raise HDL lev-

* One way is to eat fish. A study published recently in the Journal of Nutrition shows that increased consumption of omega-3 fatty acids found in fish is associated with HDL increases. For every 10 percent increase in omega-3s, HDL levels rose by about 2.5 mg/

SMOKE

- * Lower levels of omega-3s are found in walnuts and leafy green vegetables, flaxseed and soy products.
- * Drinking alcoholic beverages is associated with modestly higher HDL levels if it is done in moderation.
- * HDL levels are also increased by regular exercise, avoiding overweight and not smok-

Researchers say the optimum HDL level for heart protection is 60 mg/dl. That number is probably a worthy target for cancer prevention as well.

Do you ever dream about the taste of crab-stuffed mushrooms as they are served in the country's largest seafood restaurants? Try this recipe for size.

These delicious gems can be used as an appetizer or as a starter for a seafood night at home.

Depending on the size of the mushroom

caps, the following will produce about 24 to 40. Any leftovers can be reheated

Crab-stuffed mushrooms 3 8-ounce packages of medium or large button

in the microwave.

mushrooms 1/2 pound crab claw meat,

fresh or canned 1/4 cup finely chopped celery 2 tablespoons finely chopped shallots 2 tablespoons finely chopped

bell pepper. 2 cups crushed oyster crackers 1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/4 teaspoon fresh ground

Old Bay seasoning 1/4 teaspoon fresh salt

1 egg, beaten

1 stick unsalted butter 1 cup Chardonnay wine

Preheat oven to 400.

Wash mushrooms, remove stems and set caps aside. Finely chop about half the stems (the most-tender appearing). Discard others.

Saute celery, shallots, and peppers in one stick of butter for about 2 minutes.

Combine the stems, sauteed vegetables and all other ingredients (except the Parmesan cheese and half the wine in a medium mixing bowl. Mix well.

Stuff the caps, mounding on the top Place the caps in a buttered, large but shallow ceramic baking dish.

Sprinkle each stuffed cap with Parmesan cheese and sparingly baste with the remainder of the wine. Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until the cheese and stuffing are slightly brown.
