The other important date is Father's Day, June 20th. Father's Day is celebration that was inaugurated in the early twentieth century to complement Mother's Day in celebrating fatherhood and male parenting. It is also to honor and commemorate our fathers and forefathers. It was much like Flag Day in that it was celebrated on different dates by the various states. Father's Day was made a permanent national holiday by President Richard M. Nixon in 1972. Be sure to honor your Father on that special day.

Remember June 14th... Flag Day. It is a day that all Americans are to celebrate and show respect for our Flag which represents our independence and our unity as a nation. The American flag should be held in the high-



est regards. Here is a reminder on the basics of displaying the American flag:

- \*The flag is normally flown from sunrise to sunset.
- \*The flag should not be flown at night without a light on it.
- \* When flown vertically on a pole, the stars and blue field is at the top and at the end of the pole.
- \* The American flag is always flown at the top of the pole. Your state flag and other flags fly below it.
- \* The Union (stars and blue field) is always on top and when in print the Union is always on the left.
- \* Never let your flag touch the
- \* Fold your flag when storing.
- \* When your flag is old and it's time to be retired, do not throw it in the trash. Old flags should be burned or buried. There is a special ceremony for retiring the flag by burning. Your local Boy Scout troupe knows the proper ceremony and will take your old flag for proper disposal.

So put out your flag on June 14th!



Moral of the story:


To be sitting and doing nothing, you must be sitting very, very high up.

Rund 18000 Siebenbürger Sachsen feierten vom 21. bis 24. Mai ihren 60. Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl. Cell biologist Daniel Gottschling, Ph.D., a member of the Basic Sciences Division at Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, has been elected to membership in the American Academy of Arts & Sciences, one of the nation's oldest and most prestigious honorary societies and independent policyresearch centers.

"It's flattering and an honor to be recognized by your peers for the quality and significance of your work," Gottschling said. "It reflects the good fortune I have had to live most of my life in an environment of family, friends, colleagues and students who have been supportive of my curiosity and have shared in the pursuit to satisfy it."

Gottschling studies yeast cells for clues to the molecular underpinnings of life—clues that he hopes will have parallels in humans. He uses this model organism to understand the relationship between cancer and aging—a problem that has long vexed biologists. He was inspired to study the connection between aging and cancer after learning some startling statistics: A person's risk of

developing cancer starts to increase exponentially around age 40. By age 55, men have a 50 percent chance and women have a 33 percent chance of acquiring some form of the disease. Gottschling and colleagues study yeast to determine whether a fundamental process exists in all cells as they get older that might explain the increased incidence of cancer.

He is among 229 leaders in the sciences, social sciences, humanities, arts, business and public affairs who have been elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences 2010 class of fellows. This year's class includes winners

of the Nobel, Pulitzer and Shaw prizes, MacArthur and Guggenheim fellows and Grammy, Tony and Oscar award winners.

The latest honorees include actors John Lithgow and Denzel Washington, director Francis Ford Coppola and jazz saxophonist Sonny Rollins.


The new class will be inducted at a ceremony Oct. 9 at the Academy's headquarters in Cambridge, Mass.Other Academy members at the Hutchinson Center are Lee Hartwell, Ph.D., president and director of the Center who in 2001 received the Nobel Prize in physiology or medicine for his work in yeast genetics; Linda B. Buck, Ph.D., who in 2004 received the Nobel Prize in physiology or medicine for her groundbreaking work on the network responsible for our sense of smell; Mark T. Groudine, M.D., Ph.D., deputy director of the Hutchinson Center and former director of its Basic Sciences Division; Robert Eisenman, Ph.D., a leader in the field of oncogenes, aberrantly regulated genes that cause cancer; and the late Harold M. Weintraub, Ph.D., an international leader in the field of molecular biology.

Founded in 1780 by John Adams, James Bowdoin, John Hancock and other scholar-patriots, the Academy elects the finest minds and most influential leaders from each generation, including George Washington, Ben Franklin, Daniel Webster, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Albert Einstein and Winston Churchill. The current membership includes more than 250 Nobel laureates and more than 60 Pulitzer Prize winners.

Gottschling was born and raised in Gary, Indiana, until the age of 12, after which his family moved to Portage, where he attended junior high school and in 1973 graduated from Portage High School. He received his undergraduate degree from Augustana College in 1977 and received his doctoral degree from the University of Colorado at Boulder in 1984.

His father, Ed Gottschling, is currently a Portage city councilman and has long been active in local social service organizations, including the Exchange Club of Portage, the Democratic Club and VFW. Gottschling's mother is the late Nina (Chakos) Gottschling.



My granddaughter Hannah works in the city of Cleveland and sends me such interesting information. This time she sent me an article about Romanians who settled in Cleveland. It states that in the late 1800's an increasing number of ethnic Romanians, mostly from the province of Transylvania, at that time part of Austria-Hungary, settled there. They lived in walking distance to their place of employment, which consisted of ore docks, stockyards, meatpacking houses and knitting mills. In the early years of immigration, cultural, social clubs, and small businesses were established in each neighborhood. However, none of them, except for the west side, was strong enough to become selfsufficient for any length of time. Since most of the immigrants intended to return home, they made no effort to learn English. Some with steady jobs stayed and foresaw their future here and brought their families over. Others went back to marry and returned with their brides. After the war, when the provinces of Transylvania and Bucovina became part of Greater Romania, nearly half of the immigrant population returned to their native land. In the1920's only about 6,000 Romanians were left in Cleveland. After the Quota Act of 1921 and the restrictive immigration legislation, few Romanians were able to get visas for this country. Only a few elderly old-time Romanians remained in their original neighborhood by the 1980's.

We are so fortunate in the U.S.A. to have so many interesting cultures and selection of many cuisines to choose from, for it really is a melting pot. How many countries have the many choices of restaurants and foods from all over the world? We now see so many Chinese, Mexican, Greek, Syrian, Italian restaurants etc., visited on a daily basis that we don't give it a second thought. Once again it is something we take for granted. So whenever you are going through one of the bigger cities take note of all of the different choices of ethnic dishes that are available for your convenience.

### How what you eat affects your mood

Researchers have long wondered why people living in the lower Mediterranean countries don't get depressed as often as people living in northern Europe. One thing they discovered: It isn't the sunny days or a nice blue ocean to look at. It's their diet.

They studied more than 10,000 Spaniards who filled out a long food questionnaire. Then they checked for depression some years later.

Those who consumed more olive oil and less fat, had a moderate intake of alcohol and dairy products, and ate a lot of beans, fruit, nuts, cereal, vegetables and fish were far less likely to be depressed.

Doctors at Tufts University offer

this happy-plate advice:

- Eat breakfast and have healthy snacks to avoid drops of blood sugar.
- Try complex carbohydrates, like whole grains, for increased feeling of calm.
  - Protein can boost alertness.
- Folate is important. It is in fortified cereals, leafy vegetables, okra, asparagus, bananas, melons, beans, orange juice and tomato juice.
- Don't overdo alcohol. It is a powerful depressant.
- Coffee is an antidepressant, but too much can give you the jitters.
- Skip the chocolate. It improves mood at first, but makes you feel even worse when its effect wears off.

with the mixture as they cook. Spicy baked beans Add these ingredients to two 15-oz.

cans of pork and beans. 6 pieces bacon in small pieces 1/2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup barbecue sauce 12 dashes Louisiana hot sauce

Mix in a grill-proof pan, and set have been honed and improved. Great on a medium-heat area of the grill

before grilling the meat. Stir occasionally until it's bubbling.

Perfect grill com 6 ears corn on the cob 1/2 stick, melted butter salt to taste

Carefully peel the husks back on the ears of corn and remove corn silk.

Brush the corn inside with the melted butter and add dashes of salt. Put the husks back in place and soak the corn in water for a few min-

Place the corn in its husks on the grill in a position of medium heat. Turn frequently until charred spots start to appear on the husks. Cooking should take about 10 to 15 minutes. Check for tenderness.
