4.The roll call of delegates showed 7 men and 11 women present and registered to vote.
5. On behalf of the host city, CJ Schmitz welcomed the Officers and Delegates hoped that they would have a successful convention.
6. A motion was made by Joe Noll and seconded by Carl Schmitz Jr. to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the $53^{\text {rd }}$ Annual T.S.B.A. Convention, since they had already been accepted. Motion carried.
7. Tom Simon gave the President's report for the 2010-2011 season on behalf of Glenn Spack. Vice President Tom Simon, Secretary/Treasurer Jenny Miller, and Statistical Secretary CJSchmitz also gave their reports. Hazel Tennis gave the auditor's reportwhich found the records to be in good order. After all Officers' reports were given, a motion was made by Helen Aeling and seconded by Joe Noll to accept the Officers reports. Motion carried.
8. Hazel Tennis made a motion to keep all Honorariums and Allowances the same. Joan Miller-Malue seconded the motion. All were in favor. Motion Carried.
9. Vice President Tom Simon, Secretary/Treasurer Jenny Miller, Trustees Hazel Tennis and Monica Gilles all accepted another term in their positions. Joan Miller-Malue made a motion to cast a unanimous ballot to re-elect these officers to their respective offices. Barb Noll seconded the motion. Motion Carried. Past TSBA President Marie Benedict conducted the installation of officers.
10.Tom Simon read Glenn Spack's suggestion to join the men's and women's league and create one association. Joe Noll gave a first to allow the discussion, followed by Ron Benedict's second. ## Happy 4th of July

In 1774 the thirteen British colonies in America, unhappy about being taxed without any say in the matter, convened the First continental Congress to see if some solution to the problem short of war could be found. In April, 1775, British troops, sent to put down the threatened rebellion, advanced on Concord, Massachusetts. Paul Revere, riding through the night shouting "The British are Coming", roused the people, and the Battle of Concord began with "the shot heard round the world."

After another year of trying to find a peaceful solution, the Second continental Congress met in Philadelphia and in June established a committee to draft a statement formally cutting the colonies' ties with Great Britain. This document, mostly written by Thomas Jefferson, was The Declaration of Independence It was officially adopted by the Congress on July 4, 1776.

Since then, people across America have celebrated the 4th of July, Independence Day, with speeches, fireworks, picnics, parades with marching bands, games and the ringing of bells, including the "Province Bell," renamed the "Liberty Bell" because of its inscription: "Proclaim Liberty Throughout All the Land Unto All the Inhabitants Thereof."
