Guard your health: These vaccines prevent diseases

At least 45,000 adults in the United States die from complications of influenza, pneumonia and hepatitis B each year. These diseases and others can be prevented by vaccines, but the vaccines are underused.

Some adults incorrectly assume that immunizations they received as children will protect them for the rest of their lives. This is true for diseases such as polio, but they may not have been vaccinated as children. Some vaccines, such as the chickenpox vaccination, were not available when many adults were children. And vaccinations for certain diseases must be repeated periodically to maintain immunity.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends.

* Tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough): One dose Tdap for those who have never been immunized. A booster shot of Td every ten years.

* Human papillomavirus (HPV): For girls, three doses starting at age 12.

* Varicella (chicken pox): Two doses, four weeks apart.

* Herpes Zoster (shingles): One dose for those age 60 and over.

* Measles, mumps, rubella: One or two doses up to age 59, or one dose after that age.

* Influenza: One dose annually.

Hepatitis A: Two doses for men who have sex with men, use injection drugs or travel to countries that have a high incidence of Hepatitis A.

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* Hepatitis B: Three doses for people who are not sexually monogamous or who work in a health care facility and are exposed to blood and body fluids. * Meningococcal (meningitis) vaccine: First-year college students living in dormitories and those who travel to countries where the disease is endemic. Saudi Arabia requires it for people traveling to Mecca for the Hajj. * Pneumonia: One or two doses up to age 65, one dose for those over 65. Always discuss your immunization needs in the light of your present health condition when visiting your doctor.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

GURKEN

It's summer time and hopefully there are cucumbers in the garden. Here are a few suggestions as to what do with them.

Salzgurken

Salt Water Cucumbers Medium size cucumbers 2 quarts water 1/3 cup salt 2 cloves garlic 2 twigs dill weed 2 twigs summer savory 1/2 slice rye bread

Wash cucumbers, dill weed and summer savory. Place in oversized glass jar. Cut ends off cucumbers and slit them twice, lengthwise, ³/₄ down. Place cucumbers and garlic cloves into jar. Combine water and salt, mixing until salt is dissolved. Pour over cucumbers. Place a slice of rye bread on top (optional). Cover the jar loosely with lid. Place jar in a warm or sunny spot. Check daily and remove any foam forming on top. Remove bread. After 3 days the cucumbers should be ready to eat. Place jar in a cool place or in refrigerator.

Gurkensalat

Cucumber Salad 4 cucumbers 1 tsp salt 3 Tbsp sugar ¹/₂ cup vinegar Fresh ground pepper Dill – finely chopped Peel and thinly slice cucumbers. Mix remaining ingredients and toss with cucumbers.

Gurkensalat mit Sauerrahm

Cucumbers with Sour Cream 2 Cucumbers 3 Tbsp Vinegar Pinch of black pepper Sour cream (1/2 cup) Pinch of Salt Slice cucumbers very thin. Add, salt, pepper, sugar, sour cream and vinegar to taste. Enjoy!

In 2010, the cost of the average wedding was \$24,641. The average number of guests was 141. The arrangements for these events can be very complicated, but software can help the planner (the bride and groom or parents) keep track of prices and arrangements. Search the Web for wedding planning software, some of which is free. The toprated package is the iDo Wedding Couple Edition, according to experts at bridaltips.com.

Discuss the guest list and limitations with both sets of parents, allowing each the same number of guests. If one set of parents has more people they need to invite, give the other parents a few more seats at the rehearsal dinner.

Event Planner Tasha Brown of Boston, writing in The Wall Street Journal, suggests letting single guests who have been with someone for some time bring their dates.

Decide whether children will be invited. If many parents are disappointed at not being able to bring them to the big event, compromise by hiring a baby sitter.

Moneysavers: Instead of having a dinner and dance, marry in the morning and have a nice luncheon. If mom or dad are disappointed at not having a dance, hire a DJ and have dancing at the lunch.

Speaking of weddings ...

A new study shows that men in general are not afraid of commitment. They are as likely to want to marry as women, more likely to be open to dating people of a different race or religion, more prone to falling in love at first sight, more likely to combine bank accounts, and more likely to want children. The research by Match. com and Rutgers University included 5,200 single people ages 21 to 65 who weren't married, engaged or in a serious relationship. Age played a role in subjects' preferences. Men age 21 to 24 and age 50 and up were more likely to want a lifetime union. Half of single men ages 21 to 34 wanted children, compared with only 46 percent

of women.

Emergency rooms see an increase in cases of heat stroke and dehydration in July and August.

The American College of Emergency Physicians gives this advice on how to stay safe in hot weather:

Check the heat index before going out to work, play or practice and plan accordingly.

Avoid direct sunlight in the middle of the day. Schedule activities for the early morning or early evening hours.

Wear loose, light-colored clothes and hats. Dark colors absorb more heat.

Drink lots of water or sports drinks, about 8 ounces an hour when in the sun in order to avoid dehydration.

Bemerkenswert an der Streitforter Hochzeitstracht ist das aus weißen Seidenblumen gefertigte Myrthenkränzchen auf dem Borten der Braut, das jenem aus Deutsch-Weißkirch (ebenfalls in der Repser Gegend) ähnelt. Die bunten Glasperlen auf dem Borten gleichen in ihrer Farbenkombination "dem Schäppel" aus dem Schwarzwald in Baden-Württemberg. Der Borten stammt aus dem 18. Jahrhundert. Die Nadeln, mit goldenen Kugeln und Sichelmond versehen, stammen aus der Zeit, als Siebenbürgen ein Großfürstentum unter türkisch-ungarischer Herrschaft war. Diese Nadeln wurden beim Schleiern der verheirateten Frau am Tag nach der Hochzeit verwendet, als das Paar zur Einsegnung in den Gottesdienst ging.

Die Streitforter Braut trägt auf beiden Seiten der schwarz gestickten Schürze zwei seidene Tücher, die mit Blumenmotiven verziert sind. Ein besonderes Schmuckstück ist der Spangengürtel.

Der Streitforter Bräutigam trägt ein weißes Sträußchen aus Seidenblumen auf der schwarzen Weste an der Brust und ein weiteres Sträußchen auf dem Hut. Die Stiefel, Stiefelhosen, das gestickte Hemd und die gestickte Samtkrawatte ergänzen das Bild der Bräutigamstracht.

Wedding Tracht from Streitfort worn by Brigitte Sedlak and Dietmar Melzer, members of the adult dance group from Schwäbisch Gmuund.

Of note are the white silk flowers on the wreath adorning the bonnet of the bride, which originated in the 18th century. The needles, with golden balls and sickle moon, come from the time when Transylvania was under Turkish and Hungarian rule. These needles were used in the veil of the bride on the day after the wedding when the couple went to the consecration into the religious service.

The bride carries on both sides of the embroidered apron two silk cloths that are trimmed with flower motives. A special item is the clasp belt.

The groom wears a white bouquet of silk flowers on his black vest, as well as his hat. The boots, riding pants, embroidered shirt and embroidered velvet necktie supplement the groom's attire.

JOHANNES HONTERUS, THE GREAT SAXON REFORMER, 1498-1549

James Mackinnon, in the fourth volume of his great work, "Luther and the Reformation," says concerning the Transylvanian Saxons: ". . . The teachings of Luther gained ground among them then almost as rapidly as among their countrymen in Germany." It was in the city of Hermannstadt where the reformation was introduced and suffered its first violent persecution. Spreading into other towns, it took a firm hold in Kronstadt, where the great Saxon reformer Johannes Honterus infused the new faith into the common religious life and practice of the whole people. We should know this man, for his name is great in the history of his times.

moved he decided to call himself Honter, or with the Latin ending then customary, Honterus, and to dedicate his life to the service of God. He was a brilliant student in the schools of Kronstadt and became a noble type of the youth of this city. At the age of seventeen he was ready to continue his studies at the great universities of Europe. His ambition was to learn everything that was known at the time. The following years were to be full of trials and hardships for young Honterus. Throughout his years as a student he had to earn his living, his tuition, and his books. Though he was poor and often without the bare necessities, he had an

Honterus was born in 1498 in Kronstadt, a son of the simple leather worker George Grass. He experienced the serious side of life quite early. The dangers of war which constantly threatened the city and made every citizen a well-trained fighter, the rigid forms of life within the walls, the discipline and high moral standing of the population, the unwavering trust in God Almighty-all these elements entered deeply into the formation of his character.

An incident which occurred in his boyhood explains the change of his name. One day while Johannes was swimming with some other boys, he got into dangerously deep water and nearly drowned. In the fear of death he desperately grasped an over-hanging branch of an elderberry bush (which in Saxon is called "Honter") and held on until saved by his companions. Deeply unfaltering trust in God to help him over all obstacles. He started at the University of Vienna and continued his studies at other famous schools in Germany. Here he obtained his degrees-and also a deep and lasting impression of the new religious movement that arose like dawn from Wittenberg over all of Europe.

In 1530 Honterus was in Krakow, holding a professorship in the University of Poland, where he published a Latin grammar and a great World Geography. Two years later he went to Basel, Switzerland, where he prepared and published the first map of Transylvania. He became skilled in the arts of drawing and painting, of carving of wood cuts and the new printing. From here the ambitious young Saxon went to Wittenberg where the famous scholar Philipp Melanchthon and the powerful reformer Martin Luther held the students

in the grip of their inspiring world-famed teachings. Johannes Honterus became a convinced and enthusiastic adherent of Martin Luther, "the new true apostle of God."

Though positions of great distinction were awaiting him as a university professor, he turned his thoughts to his people and his homeland : - to serve them, he felt to be his proper mission. So at the age of thirty-five he came home to Kronstadt. His father had died, but his mother still lived to enjoy the honors bestowed upon her son by the grateful city.

As a surprise to his people Honterus brought home with him a gift of inestimable value: the first printing press ever to enter the country. With a Swiss helper he assembled the press and set it to work. The priinted word was to be the instrument for spreading the knowledge that he longed to bring to his people. Honterus was not only a competent instructor, sound advisor, and forceful preacher, but also a man of powerful practical abilities. His influence was such that the city readily accepted his questions regarding the subjects treated in the books. Thus his house soon became the center of learning in Kronstadt.

Later he compiled and published several books of theology and law and became famous in distant countries. His broad training enabled him to select the most important parts of the old Roman Law, which he printed and published for the first time in the country. He thereby laid the foundation for the Laws of the Saxons which were a little later adopted in Hermannstadt and which served the people for more than three hundred years,

Quietly and without great disturbance the city of Kronstadt, through the influence of this notable reformer, had adopted the new faith, Even the leading priests of the city left the bonds of the Roman Catholic Church and showed their earnest conversion by openly marrying. Led by the example of the largest Saxon city, soon other districts followed with the introduction of the Lutheran faith. The citizens of Kronstadt were proud of their leader, heaped honors

counsel. He began his great undertaking by thoroughly changing the whole system of education. The neglected schools were first given attention. The most capable teachers were engaged and instructed by him, what and how to teach. Honterus himself wrote and printed all the necessary school books. He wrote them in the new High German language of Martin Luther's Bible, thus introducing the language of the reformation as the official language into the Saxon schools. These books -- like the small catechism, and Bible stories were read by the older people as well as the school children. Men and women would come to the learned Master to ask all kinds of

and presents upon him, made him a councilman and superintendent of all the schools--and two years later elected him city minister.

It was the ideal of Honterus to regenerate and reorganize his whole nation and to bring everything under the influence of the Church, as it had been in the time of the early Christians. He wished to unite all Saxons in Transylvania into one communion, the members of which should be led in their actions only by the commandments and the Spirit of God. Being a born organizer like Calvin, he compiled a comprehensive set of regu-

lations and rules for the new National Church, a kind of constitution, in which all conceivable questions pertaining to organization and practice were treated and regulated. This book, written in Latin and German, was based on the Augsburg Confession and contained detailed rules for the government of the congregation, the election and duties of the clergy, the operating of the schools; the orders for marriage, baptism, communion, care of the sick and the poor-everything according to the dictates of the Bible and in the spirit of the Reformation.

The Reverend Mathias Ramser, City Pastor of Hermannstadt, presented this book to Luther, Melanchthon, and Bugenhagen and asked them for their opinions. All three gave their fullest approval in writing to the "Kirchenordnung" of the Saxon Reformer. Luther wrote: "This Honterus is indeed a real apostle whom God has sent to the land of Hungary! - Everything that you may ask me, you find in that book -- better than I could write it to you. How I like it! With what not to do.

A year later, when the National Assembly met in Hermannstadt, it adopted the Church Order of Honterus and by doing so made the Evangelical Lutheran Church the Official Church of the whole Saxon Nation. Thus the reformation had found a home in Transylvania. The change from the old to the new Church had been made without evident strife, war or bloodshed-thanks to the reconciling spirit, the broad knowledge and the winning love of Honterus.

Of course, there was opposition. Bishop Martinuzzi, the powerful political leader of the country, persuaded Queen Isabella to call the dissenters and heretics before the Court. He wanted to squelch the movement in true papal fashion: "The laws of King Ludwig are still in force. The new doctrine is prohibited. *Lutherani comburantur!* (The Lutherans are to be burned.) The damned infidels must be punished! Honterus must be exterminated!"-

The wise Burgomaster of Kronstadt,

what great scholarship and clarity, purity and faith it has been written!"

Of course, to adopt this constitution would mean a definite breaking away from the Roman Church. It would be daring and revolutionary indeed. - But the Council of Kronstadt unanimously voted to accept it, and soon all other Saxon congregations in the Burzenland followed the example of Kronstadt with enthusiasm. Notable reformers of other countries praised Honterus and his work. This new Church Order put an end to all uncertainty. It showed clearly what and Johannes Fuchs, did not allow Honterus to go to the trial. He would endanger his life, which was too precious to the Saxon Nation. So he himself went with several of the councilmen and ministers of Kronstadt. There in a fine speech the venerable old Burgomaster explained the content and spirit of the new Church Statutes, constantly referring to the Bible to show they were truly in accordance with the teachings of Christ.

The Roman Bishop raved and requested the Queen to have all the impudent heretics executed. Fortunately

Isabella was in great need of constant Saxon support, and therefore did not think it advisable to do Martinuzzi this favor. So the Saxons returned home unmolested.

Later, over-zealous Roman Catholics in power tried to bring opposition and persecution upon this first Evangelical Church in the East, but, through adopting the Lutheran faith as a whole nation and thus standing united and strong against all attacks, the new Church was soon recognized as a legal denomina-

tion.

Honterus was recognized and honored as the outstanding leader of his people until his death in 1549. As a great monument to him, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Transylvania still stands after a testing period of four hundred years. Its influence throughout the centuries has been immeasurable.
