
BRANCH 27, NEW CASTLE By Marie Benedict

The National Institute of Health recommends Qi Gong for seniors. Routines are 7 to 30 minutes long and include exercises for people who are seated.


BRANCH 5, LORAIN BY Michael Johnson

The leaves have also been changing already in August. Soon many of the birds will be flying to warmer locations where food is available and also to avoid our often- harsh winters. The daily supply of birdseed is also getting quite expensive especially the special mixture of thistle and sunflower seeds that attract the colorful finches and cardinals. My daily cardinal that I always look forward to seeing must be enjoying the timely treat of berries in the woods this time of year for I noticed it missing from my feeder. I also noticed that I never see the female. I read that he eats his few seeds

and saves a few in his mouth for the female waiting nearby. What a gentleman! I have heard that smaller birds also hitch a ride on the larger birds back. I don't know if this is true or not. I get a lot of sparrows that know when the feeder is filled daily and it is gone in no time. It is nice to help the poor creatures that don't hibernate and need to fatten up to brave the winter.

To continue with my article on the dove; this bird played a very significant part in the Bible for many reasons. It was the first animal Noah released from the famous Ark after the great flood to determine how far the floodwaters had receded. The dove was said to be carrying an olive branch as a symbol of peace and no more such floods. The dove is also a term of endearment in Songs of Songs and elsewhere. Jesus' parents sacrificed doves on his behalf after his circumcision and later the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus at his baptism. Therefore, the dove became a common Christian symbol of the Holy Spirit.

While reading over the research papers on pigeons, I found pigeon racing to be quite interesting. This sport traces back to 220 AD and began in Belgium. A pigeon race begins as they take off from their loft and must race back home from the same measured distance with the first returning pigeon declared the winner. These races are generally between 100 and 1000 km in distance. Flights up to 1800 kilometers have been recorded. A new Electronic Timing System has even been developed as a special band can be read when the bird comes home without anyone actually there to witness the return.

The image of the sport has changed in the last decade, as pigeon racing is now a fine art within Romania, Belgium and Germany. The sport has also become popular in Brazil, Asia, China, Japan and Taiwan. South Africa is the home of the richest One-Loft Race in the world with 25 countries against each other for a share of \$1.3m in prize money. The runners-up win cars and smaller monetary prizes with the grand prize being \$200,000. Who would have ever thought!

geons can become grounded and disoriented and unable to finish the race. Other hazards are wild predators, which kill the valuable pigeons and obstructions like TV aerials and other objects they fly into at high speeds or in the dark. It is thought that they rely on the Earth's magnetic field to find their way home. Some evidence has surfaced indicating that mobile phone towers may also be interrupting the bird's navigation. For these many reason bands are placed on the leg to identify the owner when they become lost. In the earlier days paint was used as a marking. I was surprised to notice and ad for a pigeon found in our Salem news ad just after I had written my last article about them. The ad was in for several days. I hope the right person claimed the bird for they can be quite expensive.

Pigeons also contributed to both World War I and II, notably by the French, German, American and UK forces. 32 pigeons have been decorated for their war contributions. A grand ceremony was even held in Buckingham Palace to commemorate a platoon of pigeons that braved the battlefields of Normandy to deliver vital plans to Allied forces on the fringes of Germany.

Have you ever heard of the expression, "You Dodo bird"? or "As dead as a Dodo"? This is a very odd name for a very unusual looking bird that has been extinct since the reported last sighting of 1681. It name may have derived from the Dutch word "Dodoor", which means "sluggard" or "slothful. A part of the reason for it's becoming extinct, may be the fact that they were overweight at some 45 lbs., a quiet robust

bird at 3 feet tall. They were also quit slow and considered stupid and may be a part of the pigeon family. This is where the term "You Dodo!" derived as an insult to many. Its 9 inch hooked bill, which was hood shaped possibly to catch fish and could deliver quite a bite as its only defense. Cameras didn't exist when this strange looking bird was around, so scientist must rely on early drawings and skeletal remains. These odd birds lived in forests of an island in the Indian Ocean isolated until the 16th century when humans began to inhabit their territory. Since they made their nests on the ground these large bird's wings became smaller as they evolved. They also fed off of berries, fruits and other ground food. In their previous safe little world there was no need to flyaway to safety. There is little doubt that humans are the cause of their extinction. since the birds had never been threatened on the islands they didn't run from humans or the pigs, dogs and other animals the early settlers brought to the island. Their ground nests were also very vulnerable to predators. This is a perfect example of evolution!

Well, I hope I didn't bore you with all this bird talk! For those who beared with me, at least we all learned something!

After all this research I managed to make time to be the honoree of a "Princess Birthday Party" given for me by my family on Labor Day weekend to celebrate my 89th birthday. Did you ever hear of an 89-year old princess? It was a surprise for me too!

I hope we can have an extended Indian summer--FNJOY!



DIE DEUTSCHE SEITE

Krönung des Jubiläumsjahres: Das Sachsentreffen in Kronstadt

"Herkunft prägt Zukunft. 800 Jahre Burzenland" – so lautete das Motto des ersten Sachsentreffens in Kronstadt. Der 17. September war eine Premiere für die Stadt, denn von insgesamt 21 Auflagen hatten alle in Birthälm stattgefunden – bis auf die Ausnahmen Hermannstadt (2007) und Bistritz (2010). Dank der traditionellen Hauptförderer – das Demokratische Forum der Deutschen in Rumänien, die Botschaft der Bundesrepublik Deutschland in Bukarest und die Landesregierung Kärnten in Österreich –, dank unzähliger ehrenamtlicher Helfer und Partner, dank des Hauptveranstalters Siebenbürgenforum und der tatkräftigen Unterstützung vor Ort durch das Kronstädter Kreisforum, dank des wunderschönen Wetters und der sonnigen Stimmung unter den rund 3000 Teilnehmern gelang es dem Fest, das Burzenland-Jubiläumsjahr zu krönen.

Die Veranstaltung begann traditionsgemäß mit einem Gottesdienst, diesmal in der Schwarzen Kirche, dem Wahrzeichen des sächsischen Kronstadt und der Reformation in Siebenbürgen. Stadtpfarrer Christian Plajer begrüßte die Gottesdienstgemeinde, Bischof Reinhart Guib hielt die Festpredigt, für die musikalische Gestaltung sorgten der Kronstädter Bachchor und die Kirchenmusiker der Schwarzen Kirche, Hans Eckart Schlandt und Steffen Schlandt, sowie der prachtvolle Klang der Buchholz-Orgel.

Selten ist der Honterus-Hofso voll, wie er nach diesem Festgottesdienst war, als sich der Festzug formierte – voran die Blaskapellen, die Trachtenund Wappenschildträger. Am alten Marktplatz konnten die siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Volkstanzgruppen bewundert werden-viele neugierige Kronstädter und vor allem zahlreiche Kameras und Aufnahmegeräte verfolgten den Aufmarsch. Um 12.00 Uhr erklang die Glocke vom Turm des alten Rathauses, es ertönten Kanonensalven, die Turmbläser spielten je ein ungarisches, rumänisches und sächsisches musikalisches Thema. Letzteres, die Melodie von "Bürger Kronstadts, lasst uns singen"/ "Siebenbürgen, Land des Segens", wurde von der Burzenländer Blaskapelle übernommen und von den Anwesenden gemeinsam gesungen.

Im Festzelt am Sportplatz des Sportlyzeums ging die Feier weiter. Hochrangige Gäste sprachen Grußworte von der Bühne, allen voran der Vorsitzende des Siebenbürgenforums, Dr. Paul-Jürgen Porr, der parlamentarische Staatssekretär Hartmut Koschyk und der Präsident des Hessischen Landtags, Norbert Kartmann. Vertreter der deutschen und österreichischen Diplomatie in Rumänien, Repräsentanten der Kronstädter Kommunalpolitik, des Verbands der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland, der ausgewanderten Sachsen oder der Regionalforen ergriffen ebenfalls das Wort. Das volkstümliche Kulturprogramm wurde vom Kronstädter Jugendensemble "Canzonetta" (Leitung Ingeborg Acker) eröffnet, es folgten

Auftritte der Burzenländer Blaskapelle (Dirigent Vasile Glăvan), der "Vereinigten Burzenländer Blasmusik" aus Deutschland (Dirigent Klaus Knorr), der "Korona"-Kapelle, der "Karpaten-Show" aus Bukarest sowie des Bistritzer Bläserensembles "Harmonie". Unter reichem Applaus tanzten Gruppen aus Hermannstadt, Bistritz, Sächsisch-Regen, Neumarkt, Schäßburg, Zeiden und Kronstadt, zum Schluss kam das Entertainer-Duo "Zwei" aus Bacău auf die Bühne.

An den stimmungsvoll dekorierten Verkaufsständen konnten Meisterstücke aus der Produktion der Näh- und Handarbeitskreise, Publikationen in deutscher und rumänischer Sprache, herausgegeben von der Honterus-Druckerei, dem Kronstädter Kunstmuseum oder den Verlagen Schiller, Hora und Aldus gekauft werden. Die deutschsprachige Presse aus Rumänien, das Jugendbegegnungszentrum Seligstadt, die Orgelbauwerkstatt Honigberg präsentierten sich mit eigenen Ständen, wobei die Käufer ebenso für die Baumstriezel- und Langos-Spezialitäten Schlange standen. Niemand, der das Festabzeichen erworben hatte, wurde vom Fest ausgeschlossen – bald reichte der Platz im geräumigen Festzelt nicht mehr aus. Eine Verkaufsausstellung "Aus der Werkstatt der Handarbeitskreise" konnte auch im Honterus-Lyzeum besucht werden.

Im Kulturzentrum Rédoute fand

gleichzeitig ein ebenso gut besuchtes Ereignis in etwas offiziellerem, "leiserem" Ton statt. Hier hielt Hansgeorg von Killyen, Vorsitzender der Heimatortsgemeinschaft Kronstadt in Deutschland, die Festrede zum diesjährigen Sachsentreffen-Motto. Er hob die wesentliche Rolle der deutschen Ritter und der moselfränkischen Siedler im Aufbau Siebenbürgens hervor. "Diese Kulturträger"hatten die Region nicht nur wirtschaftlich geprägt, sondern auch zum geistigen Zentrum, zur Schulstadt, zum Mittelpunkt von Handel und Gewerbe erhoben. Die "stolze Stadt unter den nicht minder stolzen Gemeinden des Burzenlandes"blieb stets freiheitsliebend und modellhaft, auch in schwierigen Zeiten, wie beispielsweise 1939, "als viele Landsleute den Hitlergruß für genehm hielten" oder in der deutschfeindlichen Nachkriegszeit im kommunistischen Rumänien. Das Wirken der Wenigen, die in den zwei Jahrzehnten seit dem Exodus in der Heimat geblieben sind, sollte nicht unerwähnt bleiben, so der Festredner.

Im Anschluss wurde die Honterusmedaille des Siebenbürgenforums an Dipl.-Ing. Erwin Hellmann, Altkurator der Kronstädter Honterusgemeinde und ehemaliger Bezirkskirchenkurator, vergeben. Den musikalischen Rahmen schmückten Burzenländer Lieder, interpretiert von Steffen Schlandt und den Sängerinnen und Sängern des Jugendbachchors Kronstadt. Wie Dr. Paul-Jürgen Porr betonte, sei Erwin Hellmann ein Inbegriff für "Ideenreichtum, Schaffenskraft und Effizienz". Laudator Wolfgang Wittstock, Vorsitzender des Kronstädter Kreisforums, ging auf Hellmanns langjährigen ehrenamtlichen

Einsatz für seine Landsleute ein – oft unter widrigen Umständen, in einer Ära, die die Spuren von Willkürhandlungen gegen die sächsische Gemeinschaft noch sichtbar behielt. Der Medaillenträger bedankte sich bei denjenigen, die sein Leben und Wirken geprägt haben, von Elternhaus über Schule und Universität bis hin zur Familie und Kirche, alles unter "Gottes schützender Hand". Sogar von der sozialistischen Industrie habe er etwas Wichtiges gelernt, und zwar, "dass es für jedes Problem eine Lösung gibt, nur muss man sie erarbeiten".

Die Festveranstaltung wurde mit einer wichtigen Premiere abgeschlossen: Die vom Bundesministerium der Finanzen gemeinsam mit der rumänischen Post (Romfilatelia) herausgegebene deutsch-rumänische Gemeinschaftsbriefmarke, Kirchenburg Birthälm" wurde öffentlich vorgestellt. Eine der bekanntesten Wehrkirchen Siebenbürgens, jahrhundertelang Bischofssitz der Evangelischen Kirche und seit 1993 Weltkulturerbe der UNESCO, ist nun grafisch auf einer motivgleichen deutsch-rumänischen Sonderbriefmarke abgebildet - den Unterschied machen nur der Portowert (75 Cent bzw. 2,10 Lei) und die Landesbezeichnung Deutschland bzw. Germania aus (siehe SbZ-Online vom 14. September 2011).

Hartmut Koschyk, Parlamentarischer Staatssekretär im Bundesministerium der Finanzen und Bundesvorsitzender des Vereins für Deutsche Kulturbeziehungen im Ausland (VDA), fasste die historischen Hintergründe um das Birthälmer Symbol zusammen: "Gemeinschaftsbriefmarken zweier Länder sind Ausdruck der Wertschätzung und manifestieren sich in einem Thema, das diese Länder verbindet." Birthälm sei nicht nur ein "Identifikationsort der Siebenbürger Sachsen", sondern genauso ein Modell für ein tolerantes Mit- und Nebeneinander der westlichen und östlichen Völker und Volksgruppen in Europa. Die deutsche Minderheit leiste auch heutzutage einen wesentlichen Beitrag zu den guten Beziehungen Deutschlands und Rumäniens in den Bereichen Diplomatie, Politik, Wirtschaft und Handel, Wissenschaft, Kultur und Tourismus. "Im rumänischen Parlament ist die deutsche Minderheit
