If you have any questions or concerns please call. See you on the 22nd.


TIMELY - DO NOT DELAY

New mortgage ideas help homeowners 'trade up'

Low mortgage rates and low returns on other investments are prompting people to invest more in their homes.

In the past, financial advisors recommended that people devote less cash to homes and more to other investments. With iffy returns from the stock market, they now say investing in their homes could be a better move.

Some homes in the United States are worth less than the owners paid for them. If they want to trade up to a better home, they feel trapped where they are. But some are not as trapped as they think.

Low mortgage interest rates and low home prices are presenting unusual opportunities in the housing market.

According to The Wall Street Journal, some underwater homeowners are selling their homes for less than they owe on them. They write a check for the difference. Doesn't sound smart?

Economists say it can be. They can now buy a bigger, better home for not much more money. The home they want is also bought for less than its actual value.

They are essentially trading up, but monthly payments are less because their new interest rate is lower. And they may have reduced the term to 15 years. Right now, the average 15-year rate is 4.17 percent, but some lenders are charging much less.

At the Mortgage Bankers Association, they say if people don't have anything else that is bringing a tremendous return, paying their houses off sooner than they need to is like buying themselves an annuity.

One real estate broker in Denver says about half of home sellers are paying \$5,000 to \$45,000 in cash to sell their homes. Some people are doing the same thing just to refinance.

Economists are saying trading up can be smart even if it means plunking down some cash. In cases where people live in less-desirable neighborhoods, they can find better homes in tonier areas that offer better appreciation potential for the future.

This year, a single shot protects against H1N1 and the seasonal flu

Earlier this year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommended a “universal” vaccine program.

They want everyone six months and older to get a flu shot for the 2010-2011 season. Many health authorities also say the vaccine is important for teenagers with health problems.

This year's vaccine will also protect against the H1N1 (swine flu) virus and two new flu virus strains. Last year, those who

wanted to be protected against both the flu and H1N1 had to get two separate shots. This year, a single shot is all it takes.

Flu shots are easy to get. At most workplaces, schools and clinics, they are free of charge. Medicare and health insurance programs usually cover the cost of the vaccine.

Retail clinics in pharmacies and grocery stores offer flu shots. That means you could get groceries, newspaper and a flu shot all in the same trip.

Immunization is especially important for people in various groups.

- Those with diabetes should get a flu shot because they are more likely than others to suffer serious side effects.

- People with asthma need to guard against respiratory infections, such as the flu, that could cause a serious asthma attack.

- Cancer patients and survivors have a higher risk for complications.

- Heart patients: The risk of dying from a heart attack increases by one-third during outbreaks of the flu and colds. Researchers at the University of Texas say coronary deaths could be reduced by 90,000 a year in the U.S. if more heart patients got a flu shot.

- People with compromised immune systems, such as from HIV/AIDS are at an increased risk for heart- and lung-related hospitalizations.

- School and childcare workers should make sure they are immunized. About 1/5 of the population attends school or works in a school, according to the Department of Education.

This pizza is an excellent choice for all

After every holiday, cooks grumble about what to do with the leftovers. Most of this dilemma is associated with Halloween dinners, Thanksgiving and Christmas. It includes the vegetables from a relish tray.

But there are also the garden leftovers when autumn descends. When nights begin to chill and the garden is growing brown, it's time to harvest everything.

Many dishes can be made from garden leftovers, including frittatas and pizzas.

A perfect way to celebrate October, National Vegetarian Month, is with a vegetarian pizza. This recipe is rich, tasty and healthy. It can incorporate almost any garden fare.

Veggie pizza

1 12-inch pizza crust, any kind
2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

1/2 cup red onions, cut in pieces.
1/2 cup diced tomatoes
5 shredded spinach leaves
1 tablespoon tender diced fennel or a teaspoon of fennel seed
1/4 cup peppers of your choice
1 1/2 cups Mozzarella cheese
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese, shredded or grated

Coat the crust with olive oil. Spread the Mozzarella evenly from edge to edge and add the vegetables in an even mixture.

Sprinkle the top with Parmesan cheese and brown the pizza under the broiler, being careful not to burn.

Then bake at 425 degrees, for about 30 minutes or until the crust browns and cheese is melted.

Other items that could be added are okra, zucchini, yellow squash, garlic, chives or lemon balm.

My Trip to Siebenbürgen

You can have a lot of fun in a New York minute, but there are some things you can't do inside those city limits.

From what I had been told, Transylvania, Romania seemed like a mystical and magical fairytale land. When our plane landed in Sibiu (Hermannstadt), my first impression stayed almost the same. The scenery seemed almost like a figment of my imagination.

With my head hanging half way out of the window, I felt partly like a princess and partly like an obnoxious tourist. However, as we were driving along for what seemed like forever, my impressions began to change. I started to see old, abandoned homes that looked like they would fall over at any second. Now and then you would see a multi-century home that was so well kept that you would swear you saw it on the latest issue of one of those home and garden magazines. I also saw houses in between the two extremes.

We stayed with a family friend in Schässburg who didn't speak any English or any German so my Oma and Opa and I were stuck talking with our hands or using sign language to communicate with her. This was too bad because she had a heart of gold. Her name was Magdelena.

We saw several Saxon villages and churches. They were all so beautiful. Then we visited Klein-Alisch.

I had always thought that

Krestel was a fairly uncommon last name. Now I'll be the first to tell you that I was very wrong. When we visited the gravesite of my Opa's Opa, Michael Krestel, in a small overgrown cemetery outside of Klein-Alisch, I swear every other headstone said Krestel.

Let me tell you, those first impressions that I had when we first landed, became unrealistic when we entered Klein-Alisch, as well as some other towns. I think I could count the number of well-to-do houses on one hand.

I felt so bad for that town, I really wish there was something that I could do. Believe me; if I could, I would help out. I seriously felt like crying. I tried to imagine what that town once was, or could have been. It just broke my heart. I really want to make a difference. Especially when we learned that Opa's childhood home had caved in.

I was surprised to learn that many people who still live there say "I was born here and I will be buried here." Those people have a lot of faith in that, and I respect them.

This experience really opened my eyes to the world around me. I now understand a lot more about my family and my heritage than I ever thought I would. I am really thankful for this opportunity and I will remember it for the rest of my life. I could not be any more appreciative.

Learn to love your liver

October is National Liver Awareness Month

It can happen when people visit their doctors for an annual checkup.

When the doctor orders a medication, they are surprised to hear that they can't take it. Certain drugs, including statins and cholesterol-lowering drugs, can't be taken by many people with liver disease.



'Love your Liver'

That's the advice of the National Liver Foundation. It's not hard to do, because most of their advice about keeping your liver healthy is the same as for general health. For example:

- Drink alcohol in moderation, especially if you are a woman. One and a half cans of beer a day can cause liver problems in some women.

- Maintain a normal weight so you don't develop a fatty liver, which increases the risk of cirrhosis and liver failure.

- Don't smoke. Smoking is linked to liver cancer, and it may increase the toxic effects of some medications.

- Never share a toothbrush or razor with anyone. The toothbrush or razor could carry hepatitis B or C.

- For a tattoo or body piercing, only use establishments that practice meticulous sterilization of instruments.

- Practice safe sex to protect yourself from hepatitis A and B.

- If you have ever been told that something is wrong with your liver, even if you have no symptoms whatever, see a liver specialist (a hepatologist).

Risky business

- Avoid recreational drug use. Intravenous drugs are a common mode of hepatitis B and C transmission. Never share a needle.

- If you have ever experimented with intravenous drugs, even if it was years ago, see a liver specialist. Symptoms of liver damage may not be present even when the liver is significantly damaged.

When you love your liver, the body's largest organ, and avoid risky business, the liver will serve you well for the rest of your life.

20. Sachsentreffen wirft Bistritz in ein neues Licht

Das Sachsentreffen fand vom 17. bis 19. September 2010 erstmals in Nordsiebenbürgen statt. Der positive Verlauf dieses wahrlich großen Jubiläumstreffens – es war das zwanzigste dieser Art – in Bistritz wurde in zahlreichen Gesprächen mit Teilnehmern des Bundesvorstandes des Verbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland, der Evangelischen Kirche A.B. in Rumänien, des Demokratischen Forum der Deutschen in Siebenbürgen, der HOG Bistritz-Nösener und der noch in Siebenbürgen lebenden deutschen Gemeinschaft verdeutlicht. Eine Nachlese von Horst Göbbel, stellvertretender Vorsitzender der HOG Bistritz-Nösener e.V., der auch auf die hervorragende Zusammenarbeit mit der Stadtverwaltung und die Frage des siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Kulturerbes eingeholt.

„Das Sachsentreffen in Bistritz war ein wohltuendes Erlebnis. Hätte das Wetter mitgespielt, wäre es ausgezeichnet gewesen. Insgesamt hört man nur anerkennende Worte und die Bereitschaft, beim nächsten Mal wieder dabei zu sein.“ So lautet ein erstes Fazit von Dr. Hans Franchy, Vorsitzender der HOG Bistritz-Nösener, die sich schon seit 2007 (einem Jahr vor dem verheerenden Kirchenbrand in Bistritz) bemüht hat, dieses Sachsentreffen im Jahre 2010 nach Bistritz zu holen. Natürlich hat der Brand am 11. Juni 2008 nolens volens das Augenmerk in besonderem Maße nach Bistritz gelenkt, noch mehr jedoch die Hilfswellen in seinem Gefolge sowie die sehr erfolgreichen Wiederaufbauarbeiten: Im Oktober 2008 erfolgte die Glockenweihe und im Juli 2010, nach der unerwartet schnellen Fertigstellung des neuen Kirchendaches, wurde die neue Uhr installiert und an die Stadt Bistritz übergeben. Die drei Glocken und die Uhr sind ein Geschenk der HOG Bistritz-Nösener. Dem Siebenbürgenforum sind wir zu großem Dank verpflichtet für seine Entscheidung, das Sachsentreffen 2010 in Bistritz durchzuführen und für die umfassende Organisation des Treffens in Zusammenarbeit mit gewichtigen Partnern: der Stadt Bistritz, namentlich dem Bürgermeister Ovidiu Teodor Crețu, dem örtlichen Forum, der Bistritzer evangelischen Kirchengemeinde und der HOG Bistritz-Nösener, namentlich unserem unermüdlichen Dr. Hans Franchy.

„Bistritz – ein Höhepunkt. Bistritz ist uns genau so wichtig, wie das Alte Land“, meinte Erhard Graeff, Bundesgeschäftsführer unseres Verbandes, und betonte das erstmalige Dabeisein des kompletten Bundesvorstands bei einem Sachsentreffen, weil man dieses Treffen in Bistritz für besonders wichtig erachtet habe. Bundesvorsitzender Dr. Bernd Fabritius bewertet das Treffen mit einem Wort: „Ausgezeichnet!“ Damit das Dach des Kirchenchores noch vor dem Winter gedeckt werden kann, hat der Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen im Sommer dieses Jahres die Kirchengemeinde Bistritz mit Euro 20.000 unterstützt. Michael Konnerth, Vorsitzender des Verbandes der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Heimatortsgemeinschaften,

schreibt begeistert: „Vielen Dank für die großartige Leistung beim Bistrizer Sachsentreffen“, und Dr. Michael Kroner, von 1958 bis 1968 stellvertretender Schulleiter am Bistritzer Gymnasium, sieht darin „eine große Sache für Nordsiebenbürgen, mit viel Prominenz, die die Bedeutung von Bistritz auch als Ort der frühen sächsischen Bildungseinrichtungen ins rechte Licht gerückt“ habe.

Besonderer Einsatz der Stadt Bistritz

Wohl noch nie hat sich eine rumänische Stadtverwaltung (Bistritz hat ca. 83 000 Einwohner, davon zählen noch etwa 270 zur evangelischen Kirche) so massiv für ein Sachsentreffen eingesetzt. Auf Initiative des Bürgermeisters Ovidiu Teodor Crețu hat der Stadtrat Gelder bewilligt, um beispielsweise die Jubiläumsfeierlichkeiten der ersten sächsischen Ackerbauschule in Bistritz (von 1870) in einem großartigen Rahmen

durchzuführen sowie die rund 550 Ehrengäste (besonders diejenigen aus dem Ausland) in einem aus Bukarest eingeführten Festzelt gratis festlich zu bewirten und mit Musik zu versorgen. Ebenso wurden für die Organisatoren kostenlos die Bühne in der Fußgängerzone in der Holzgasse und das städtische Kulturzentrum (das früheres schmucke Gewerbevereinshaus) mit seiner Infrastruktur zur Verfügung gestellt. Der Empfang im Rathaus war dem Bürgermeister eine große Ehre, der Sektempfang im Gewerbeverein ein Geschenk der Stadt an uns, ihre wohlgesenen

sie mit ‚Feuer und Schwert‘ überzogen haben.“

In den Lokalzeitungen wurde das Sachsentreffen sehr positiv begleitet. „Mesagerul de Bistrița-Năsăud“ am 19. September: „Cea mai frumoasă „Întâlnire a sășilor“, „Răsunetul“ vom 21. September: „Bistrița – central tradițiilor săsești“). Unter diesen positiven Eindrücken des Sachsentreffens genehmigte der Bistritzer Stadtrat am 30. September 2010 weitere 800 000 Lei für Arbeiten an dem Kirchendach der evangelischen Kirche über dem Chor. Somit hat die Stadt in diesem Jahr insgesamt 1 800 000 Lei für die Reparaturen an der Kirche bewilligt und zur Verfügung gestellt (das sind über 400 000 Euro!). Der Bürgermeister hatte 500 000 vorgesehen, ein Abgeordneter der Opposition hat die Erhöhung auf 800 000 Lei vorschlagen. Der Antrag wurde bewilligt.

„Gottes Güte hat kein Ende“

Im Rahmen des Sachsentreffens wurden zwei beeindruckende Gottesdienste in der ehrwürdigen evangelischen Stadtpfarrkirche gefeiert. Am Samstag, dem 18. September, predigte im wirklich vollen Gotteshaus – erstmals nach vielen Jahren durften wir durch das westliche Hauptportal unter der Renaissancefassade zum Gottesdienst schreiten, ein erhebendes Gefühl – unser hochverehrter Landesbischof Dr. Christoph Klein tiefgründig zum Thema des Heimattages „Bildung ist Freiheit“.

Am Sonntag, übernahm die Auslegung des Wortes Gottes der langjährige Stadtpfarrer von Bistritz Kurt Franchy – erstmals nach knapp 33 Jahren wieder in seiner Heimatkirche. Predigttext: Klagelieder 3, 22-23: „Die Güte Gottes ist's, dass wir nicht gar aus sind, seine Barmherzigkeit hat noch kein Ende, sondern sie ist alle Morgen neu, und deine Treue ist groß.“ Keineswegs frei von tiefen Emotionen wob Franchy in seine Auslegung des Bibelwortes seine eigene Existenz und die unseres Volkes am Beispiel von Bistritz und des Nösnerlandes ein und immer wieder betonte er: „Aber Gottes Güte hatte kein Ende. Er ließ die Sonne über dieser Stadt nicht untergehen.“ Nicht nach dem Mongolensturm, nicht nach den bewegten Zeiten im Mittelalter und in der Neuzeit, nicht im zum Teil so dunklen zwanzigsten Jahrhundert. Es sei ja keineswegs selbstverständlich, dass wir hier Gottesdienst und Abendmahl feiern dürfen.

„Denken wir an die Tage zurück, als der große Brand den Turm zerstört, die Glocken vernichtet und das Kirchendach so sehr beschädigt hat, dass wir den Einsturz des Gewölbes befürchten mussten. Viele Menschen haben ihr Scherlein dazu beigebracht, dass die Beseitigung der ärgsten Schäden möglich wurde.“ Und schließlich, nach dem großen Bogen der Dankbarkeit, hält der frühere Stadtpfarrer von

Bistritz treffend und wohltuend zusammenfassend fest: „Heute leben wir in aller Welt verstreut. Wir gehen mit Österreichern, mit Bayern und Rheinländern, mit Amerikanern, Kanadiern, und hier mit rumänischen Christen zum Gottesdienst und loben Gott in unterschiedlichen Sprachen. Das ist ein wunderbares Miteinander in neu entdeckter ökumenischer Gemeinschaft, die über Grenzen und Zeiten hinweg reicht. Wir haben ein Jahrhundert zurückgelassen in dem es viele Irrungen und Wirrungen gab, in dem wir viele Verletzungen und Wunden erfahren und zum Teil verursacht haben. Aber Gott hat uns nicht aufgegeben. Christus ist in die Welt gekommen, uns zu versöhnen, das geknickte Rohr aufzurichten und den glimmenden Docht neu zum Brennen zu bringen. Und darum nochmals: Gott ist treu!“ In beiden Gottesdiensten erfreuten uns durch ihre bezaubernde Musik Noemi Domokos an der Orgel und als begnadete Sopranistin mit einigen markanten Gesangsoli Edith Borsos.

Kulturelle Akzente

Das Sachsentreffen 2010 umfasste weitere qualitativ wertvolle Unternehmungen im Bereich Kultur und Bildung: die Vernissage zweier Ausstellungen im Kreismuseum („Acasa... încotro – Heimat wohin?“ und „Norbert Thomae – Gemäldeausstellung“ in Zusammenarbeit mit dem Siebenbürgischen Museum Gundelsheim) und eine in der Kreisbibliothek: „Bistritz – Punktum“ (zu dem alten Bücherbestand des Evangelischen Gymnasiums Bistritz), eine Kunstausstellung in der ältesten romanischen Kirche in Mönchsdorf und einen großen Festakt im früheren ev. Deutschen Gymnasium, heute Nationalkolleg „Liviu Rebreanu“ Bistritz aus Anlass der hunderten Wiederkehr des Erstbezugs des Gymnasialgebäudes am 8. September 1910 – worüber in den nächsten Folgen der Siebenbürgischen Zeitung noch berichtet wird.

Richtfest mit Peter Maffay im siebenbürgischen

„Schutzraum für Kinder“ in Radeln

Der Bau am therapeutischen Ferienheim für körperlich und seelisch geschädigte Kinder in Radeln schreitet geschwind voran. Das Projekt der Tabaluga Stiftung („Fundația Tabaluga“), der rumänischen „Tochter“ der Peter Maffay Stiftung, entsteht im kleinen Dorf bei Reps im Kreis Kronstadt auf Wunsch des international gefeierten Musikers Peter Maffay, einen „Schutzraum für Kinder“ auch in seiner Heimat Siebenbürgen bauen zu lassen, nachdem eine ähnliche Einrichtung auf Mallorca seit einigen Jahren funktioniert.

Im Frühjahr 2009 erwarb die Tabaluga Stiftung das Radelner Pfarrhaus, den Pfarrhof und die dazugehörigen Nebengebäude von dem historischen Besitzer, der Evangelischen Kirche A.B. in Rumänien. Ein Jahr später, Ende März 2010, feierte Maffay mit zahlreichen Gästen und Vertretern aus Politik, Wirtschaft, Verwaltung und Medien den ersten Spatenstich. Bereits am 27. September fand nun das Richtfest statt. Anwesend waren der Generalkonsul der Bundesrepublik Deutschland in Hermannstadt, Thomas Gerlach, der Unterstaatssekretär im Departement für Interethnische Beziehungen, Helge Fleischer, der Bürgermeister der Gemein-

de Bodendorf, zu der Radeln gehört, Mircea Pălaşan, Pfarrer Siegmar Schmidt, der für die dortige Kirchengemeinde zuständig ist, Karl Hellwig als Vertreter des Demokratischen Forums der Deutschen im Kreis Kronstadt sowie zahlreiche Unterstützer des Projektes, Vertreter der Presse, Dorfbewohner und selbstverständlich Baumeister und Handwerker.

Peter Maffay bedankte sich bei allen, die das Projekt von nah und fern fördern und unterstützen, sowie beim gesamten Bauteam. „Bald wird sehr deutlich, dass unsere Vision von einem Schutzraum für Kinder nicht länger ein Traum ist“, sagte der Sänger. „In all diesen noch nicht fertigen Gebäuden steckt eine Seele, und in ein paar Monaten wird hier das Kinderlachen erklingen.“

Architekt Sebastian Szaktilla, der das Bauprojekt leitet, stellte den Gästen die drei Teilprojekte vor, an denen die Stiftung in Radeln arbeitet, den Pfarrhof und das Pfarrhaus als Hauptprojekt, die Kirchenburg als wertvolles Kulturerbe und schließlich das gesamte Dorf.

Das Pfarrhaus soll gründlich saniert werden und die neu gebaute Remise im Pfarrhof soll als Wohnhaus für die Kinder und deren Betreuer dienen. Auch die Kirchenburg gilt es instand zu setzen. Die Stiftung möchte den Kirchturm und die Dächer reparieren, die Feuchtigkeit aus den Wänden beseitigen, die bemalten Holzdekorationen restaurieren. Im Schulturm soll ein Tourismusbüro und Ausstellungsraum entstehen, im Erdgeschoss der Lehrerwohnung ein „Burgcafé“. Letztendlich gilt es, das gesamte Dorf zu revitalisieren, eine moderne Infrastruktur herzustellen (Wege, Trinkwasserversorgung, Kanalisation, Müllentsorgung), die

Dorfarchitektur zu sanieren und auch das Lebensmittelgeschäft im Dorfzentrum in Gang zu bringen. Nicht zuletzt soll das traditionelle Handwerk wieder belebt werden und im Ferienheim sollen einige Arbeitsplätze entstehen.

Erste Schritte in diese Richtung wurden bereits getan. Auf einem Dorfrundgang mit Peter Maffay und Sebastian Szaktilla konnten die Gäste den reparierten Brunnen im Dorfkern sehen, die Schreinerei der Stiftung sowie das Gebäude, in dem in Zukunft die Arztpraxen eröffnet werden sollen. „Wir reparieren ‚in situ‘, ohne die alten Gebäude abzureißen“, erklärte Szaktilla, „denn wir wollen kein schlechtes Beispiel geben.“ Was die Abwasserentsorgung angeht beabsichtigt die Stiftung, eine moderne Pflanzenkläranlage zuerst auf dem eigenen Grundstück, dann im gesamten Dorf einzurichten, und somit rumänienweit genehmigungsfähig zu machen, so Szaktilla. Ziel des Bauteams sei es, bis zum Winter den Außenbau abschließen, um bis zum Frühjahr am Innenausbau arbeiten zu können, erklärte der Architekt. Vermutlich im April oder Mai 2011 können die ersten Kinder ihre Ferien hier verbringen.

Als „Herr des Hauses“ schlug Peter Maffay den letzten Nagel in die Holzstruktur der Remise im Pfarrhof. Nun kann das Dach gedeckt werden. Auf dem Dach erhab der Leiter des Bauteams sein Glas auf das entstehende Gebäude. Das Jahr 2010, in dem die Peter Maffay Stiftung zehnjähriges Bestehen feiert, scheint in der Tat ein erfolgreiches zu sein.

Förderung der deutschen Minderheit in Rumänien: Projekt von europäischer Bedeutung

Vorsitzende der Deutsch-Rumänischen Regierungskommission sind die beiden Staatssekretäre Bogdan Aurescu und Dr. Christoph Bergner. An der 14. Tagung, die am 20. September 2010 in Hermannstadt stattfand, nahmen neben den Vertretern der rumänischen und der deutschen Regierung sowie jenen des Demokratischen Forums der Deutschen in Rumänien (DFDR) erstmals auch die Bundesvorsitzenden von drei Landsmannschaften teil: Dr. Bernd Fabritius (Siebenbürger Sachsen), Bernhard Krastl (Banater Schwaben) und Helmut Berner (Sathmarschwaben). Beide Seiten bekräftigten ihre Bereitschaft, die deutsche Minderheit in Rumänien weiter zu fördern und dabei ihr Umfeld mit einzubeziehen. Unterstrichen wurde die Brückefunktion der Rumäniendeutschen zwischen den beiden Ländern und Regierungen.

Im Mittelpunkt der Gespräche standen Maßnahmen zur Förderung der deutschen Minderheit in Rumänien für das Jahr 2010. Aus dem Bundeshaushalt stehen hierfür rund 1,7 Millionen Euro für soziale und gemeinschaftsfördernde Projekte sowie weitere 540 000 Euro des Auswärtigen Amtes für bildungspolitische Maßnahmen zur Verfügung. Die rumänische Regierung sicherte 1,13 Millionen Euro zu, die vor allem für Kulturveranstaltungen, Medien, aber auch für Personal- und Verwaltungskosten der Forumsitze eingesetzt werden.

Als „offen, freundschaftlich und fruchtbar“ bezeichnete Bogdan Aurescu, Staatssekretär im Außenministerium Rumäniens, die Gespräche, das „konzentrierte und freundschaftliche Klima der Beratung“ würdigte Dr. Christoph Bergner, Parlamentarischer Staatssekretär im Bundesinnenministerium und Beauftragter der Bundesregierung für Aussiedlerfragen und nationale Minderheiten.

Die beiden Vorsitzenden der Regierungskommission sprachen die symbolische Wirkung des Austragungsortes der 14. Sitzung der Kommission an: Hermannstadt. Diese Kommission sei für die deutsche Minderheit äußerst wichtig, denn ohne die Unterstützung von Seiten der deutschen und der rumänischen Regierung könnte keines der Projekte umgesetzt werden, betonte der DFDR-Vorsitzende Klaus Johannis.

In einem Protokoll wurden die Verwirklichungen und künftigen Fördermaßnahmen zum Erhalt der kulturellen Identität der deutschen Minderheit in Rumänien festgehalten. Die Grundlage der Tagung und Kommission bildet

der Vertrag vom 21. April 1992 zwischen der Bundesrepublik Deutschland und Rumänien über freundschaftliche Zusammenarbeit und Partnerschaft in Europa. Die beiden Kommissionsvorsitzenden betonten auf einer Pressekonferenz die Bedeutung der deutschen Minderheit und ihre Brückefunktion zwischen den beiden Staaten und Regierungen. Dr. Bergner sagte, dass sich die Bundesregierung weiterhin zur Unterstützung der deutschen Minderheit in Rumänien bekannt, die Hilfen aber nur effektiv sein können, wenn sie in guter Koordinierung mit der rumänischen Regierung, aber auch mit der Selbstvertretung der Rumäniendeutschen, dem Deutschen Forum, vorgenommen werden. Ein wesentlicher Teil der Hilfen des Bundesinnenministeriums geht in den sozialen Bereich – fast 60 Prozent –, zudem werden kleine und mittelständische Unternehmen in Handwerk, Gewerbe und Landwirtschaft gefördert.

Besondere Aufmerksamkeit wurde bei der 14. Sitzung auf die Pflege der deutschen Sprache in Rumänien als muttersprachliche Ausbildungsform gelegt. Probleme sind durch die Abwanderung der Lehrkräfte und die Tatsache entstanden, dass viele Absolventen deutschsprachiger Studienzweige nicht ins Lehramt gehen. Staatssekretär Aurescu teilte mit, dass nach Möglichkeiten und Wegen gesucht werden soll, das Lehramt in deutscher Muttersprache für Hochschulabgänger attraktiv zu gestalten.

Exercise at mid-life predicts successful aging

You know why exercise is good for you right now. Just a few reasons: It strengthens your lungs, heart and bones while making you think better, feel better and look better.

What about the future? Picture yourself at age 70, 75 or even 85? Will you be a "successful survivor" with few chronic conditions and a brain that still works?

One new finding by Harvard School of Medicine shows that people who regularly participated in physical activity during middle age are more likely to be in better health at age 70 and well beyond.

Four new studies reported by Tufts University should prompt people to get out of their easy chairs and get moving. Experts at the University of Miami, on reviewing the studies, conclude that regular physical exercise is associated with greater longevity and reduced risk of physical disability and dependence in old age. And it extends people's lives.

An analysis of the Nurses Health Study shows that the most-active one-fifth of women were nearly twice as likely to be successful survivors compared with the most sedentary.

Even those in the middle group improved their chances of a healthy old age by 37 percent.

The Nurses Study included only women, but these findings should be an eye opener for men as well.

You need to bank more than money in order to enjoy your retirement years. How about starting your own exercise bank? You'll enjoy your withdrawals.

Daily Devotion:
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Blood pressure cuff for fast heart attack treatment

A Danish study shows that inflating and deflating a blood pressure cuff en route to the hospital can help protect the heart muscle from injury.

The practice is called ischemic preconditioning. It briefly deprives the fingers of oxygen and reduces damage to the heart when blood flow is stopped during stenting. The percentage of heart muscle saved was nearly 50 percent greater than if the cuff wasn't used.





YMCA changes its logo, updates goals

We've called it "the Y" all of our lives. Now, the Chicago-based non-profit has made it the organization's official name, its first name change in 43 years.

The move comes after two years of research that showed people generally don't understand what the YMCA does. Their reach is far beyond swimming lessons and ping-pong tables.

The Y's stated mission now is three-fold:

- * Youth development
- * Healthy living
- * Social responsibility

"This is a very important, exciting time for the Y," said Neil Nicoll, president and CEO of YMCA of the USA. "People are concerned about

the problems facing their communities. Like the Y, they understand that lasting change will only come about if we work together to improve our health, strengthen our families and support our neighbors."

The name change represents a departure from the original mission of the YMCA, which was a Christian outreach program for young men. The new mission of the Y eliminates mentions of Christ.

Local Ys will still be called YMCAs until the secular transition is completed in more than 10,000 communities across the United States.



HISTORY OF THE JACK O'LANTERN

Pumpkin carving is a popular part of modern America's Halloween celebration. Come October, pumpkins can be found everywhere in the country from doorsteps to dinner tables. Despite the widespread carving that goes on in this country every autumn, few Americans really know why or when the jack o'lantern tradition began. Or, for that matter, whether the pumpkin is a fruit or a vegetable.

People have been making jack o'lanterns at Halloween for centuries. The practice originated from an Irish myth about a man nicknamed "Stingy Jack." According to the story, Stingy Jack invited the Devil to have a drink with him. True to his name, Stingy Jack didn't want to pay for his drink, so he convinced the Devil to turn himself into a coin that Jack could use to buy their drinks. Once the Devil did so, Jack decided to keep the money and put it into his pocket next to a silver cross, which prevented the Devil from changing back into his original form. Jack eventually freed the Devil, under the condition that he would not bother Jack for one year and that, should Jack die, he would not claim his soul. The next year, Jack again tricked the Devil into climbing into a tree to pick a piece of fruit. While he was up in the tree, Jack carved a sign of the cross into the tree's bark so that the Devil could not come down until the Devil promised Jack not to bother him for ten more years.


would not allow such an unsavory figure into heaven. The Devil, upset by the trick Jack had played on him and keeping his word not to claim his soul, would not allow Jack into hell. He sent Jack off into the dark night with only a burning coal to light his way. Jack put the coal into a carved-out turnip and has been roaming the Earth with ever since. The Irish began to refer to this ghostly figure as "Jack of the Lantern," and then, simply "Jack O'Lantern."

In Ireland and Scotland, people began to make their own versions of Jack's lanterns by carving scary faces into turnips or potatoes and placing them into windows or near doors to frighten away Stingy Jack and other wandering evil spirits. In England, large beets are used. Immigrants from these countries brought the jack o'lantern tradition with them when they came to the United States. They soon found that pumpkins, a fruit native to America, make perfect jack o'lanterns.

Soon after, Jack died. As the legend goes, God
