Fake winnings, dead debts, false bills: How to recognize scams


A few days after the funeral, a "collection agency" calls and says your deceased mother or dad owed \$500 and it's up to you to pay the bill.

This scam takes advantage of people who are still in grief. Elderly people are often targeted. When threatened with

legal action, they may rush to settle. Another goal of the con artist is to obtain bank account and Social Security numbers.

Unless you are a cosigner, you are not responsible for the deceased's debt and you should not pay, whether or not it's a legitimate bill.

Police say con artists are ramping up their old false winnings game. In difficult people times, are eager to win something. Some will send thousands dollars to "pay



One type of improper "bill collection" may be initiated by legitimate companies. It involves accounts that are settled for one reason or another. But five or six years later, the

company sells a list of old debts to a collection agency for pennies on the dollar.

In one case, a cardholder's brother asked to borrow his card so he could use it "just to check into a hotel." The brother charged \$3,000, moved to another city and couldn't be

found. The card company settled for \$1,500.

Six years later, a collection agency came after the former cardholder balance. In spite of the threats, he insisted the account was settled. He never heard from the collector again.

Other cases involve smaller amounts of money. A collector called to say a woman owed \$55 charges bank on an account that had been closed for several years. He

said he could ruin her credit by reporting that she had a bounced check and never paid for it, which wasn't true.

Though some people would be bullied into sending money, this woman was not.

Exercise helps your heart even if

you don't lose weight

Maybe you've been exercising some and pretty regularly, but the bathroom scale hasn't budged and your middle is still about the same size.

You have probably made an improvement in your cardiovascular health, and that could be even more important than your pants size.

Researchers at Harvard University and Brigham and Women's Hospital report that moderate amounts of exercise is associated with as much as a 41 percent reduction in cardiovascular risk. While their study was done entirely on women, men can assume they have a similar benefit.

In various study subjects, Body Mass Index changes accounted for just 10 percent of the reduction. Blood biomarker improvements accounted for about one-third of the risk reduction, and blood pressure changes were accountable for 27 percent of the improvements. Reduced cholesterol accounts for a 20 percent improvement.

The benefits of regular moderate exercise outweigh what the scale will tell you. The researchers found that the more study subjects exercised, the greater their cardiovascular health improved.

The surprise was that cardiovascular risk dropped by 27 percent for those whose activity burned just 200 to 599 calories per week.

The risk was reduced by 32 percent for those who burned 600 to 1,499 calories per week, and 41 percent for those who worked off 1,500 calories a week.



THURSDAY, AUGUST 13 Kayaking am Hollerer See





Peter Maffay wurde 60: "Über Siebenbürgen musst du gehen"

Peter Maffay, einer der erfolgreichsten Sänger und Rockmusiker Deutschlands und der wohl bekannteste Siebenbürger der Gegenwart, wurde am 30. August 60 Jahre alt. Welch schöner Zufall, dass Peter Alexander Makkay – besser bekannt als Peter Maffay – just in dem Jahr seinen 60. feiern kann, in dem auch die Bundesrepublik auf ihre sechs Jahrzehnte währende Erfolgsgeschichte zurückblickt. Dafür stehen die Ideale von Freiheit und Gerechtigkeit, dafür stehen ein recht erfolgreiches Wirtschaften sowie das Sich-Aufrichten der Kultur und der Kulturschaffenden. Peter Maffay ist einer dieser Kulturschaffenden – und zwar kein Unbedeutender.

Erfolgsgeschichten sind bekanntlich keine endlose Kette heroischer Glanzleistungen und stets-grandioser Ideen. Das war in der Geschichte der Bundesrepublik nicht so, das war bei Peter Maffay auch nicht so. Gelungene Karrieren lassen sich aber an dem messen, was unter dem Strich steht. Und das ist nicht selten einfach das Ergebnis eines gesunden Vorhabens, verbunden mit knallharter Arbeit. Wie war das also bei Maffay?

Schon früh wollte er Musiker werden, früh wusste er, dass der konventionelle Weg nichts für ihn ist. Geboren in Kronstadt, wuchs er in einfachen, aber gesicherten Verhältnissen auf und bekam früh Zugang zur Musik. Mit sieben hielt er zum ersten Mal die Geige in der Hand-wie sollte an jener Stelle absehbar sein, dass er später, mit der unglaublichen Zahl 40 Millionen verkaufter Tonträger, zu einem der erfolgreichsten deutschen Pop- und Rockmusiker werden sollte? Erste musikalische Gehversuche machte er in den Jahren 1963 bis 1970, also in den ersten Jahren seines neuen Lebens in der Bundesrepublik.

Mit seinem ersten Plattenvertrag, den er 1970 erhielt, bekam die Richtung, die sein Leben nehmen würde, Kontur. Mit dem Titel "Du" erzielte er seinen ersten Nummer-1-Hit und landete damit sogleich in der deutschen Welt der Schlager. Die Wandlung zum Rocker vollzog sich mit dem Album "Steppenwolf". Es verkaufte sich 1,6 Millionen Mal und damit so oft wie bis dahin kein anderes Album in Deutschland. Mal um Mal bewies Maffay, dass

er das richtige Gespür für die jeweilige Situation hatte, und er zeigte sich dabei überaus anpassungsfähig.

"Beständigkeit im Wandel"

Kaum ein Motto passt so gut zur Vita Peter Maffays wie jenes, das die Podiumsdiskussion beim Heimattag der Siebenbürger Sachsen im Jahr 2006 trug: "Beständigkeit im Wandel". Die Verwandlungen sind vielschichtig: Vom Schlager- zum Rockstar, von jemandem, der ein ziemlich exzessives Leben führt, hin zu einer vernunftgeprägten Lebensanschauung, von dem auf sich selbst fokussierten Musiker hin zu einem Prominenten, den die gesellschaftlichen Belange, insbesondere die von Kindern, etwas angehen. Und sein Verhältnis zu Siebenbürgen? Auch das scheint sich im Laufe der Jahre etwas verändert zu haben. In einem Interview mit der Rhein-Zeitung berichtete er: "Für mich war Rumänien ein abgeschlossenes Kapitel, dachte ich. Und da kommt eine junge Dame in mein Leben, die sagt: ,lch schwöre dir, das ist es nicht.' Und ich sage: ,Red' keinen Quatsch. 'Und da merke ich, der einzige, der Quatsch redet, bin ich. Denn eine solche Verbindung, die kappt man nie wirklich durch, und das braucht man auch nicht. Es ist ein Bekenntnis und es ist auch eine Erkenntnis. Ein Bekenntnis zu den Wurzeln und eine Erkenntnis, dass es gut ist, welche zu haben."

Für ein solches Bekenntnis zu den Wurzeln hat Peter Maffay zu einer eigenen Lösung gefunden: Mit dem Projekt eines Ferienheims für traumatisierte Kinder, das in Radeln im Kreis Kronstadt beheimatet ist, beweist er, dass ihn die Angelegenheiten seiner alten Heimat betreffen. Durch den Kauf des Pfarrhauses und die Restaurierung der Kirchenburg wurden die Fundamente für ein langfristiges Engagement gelegt. Damit verbindet sich auch die Hoffnung, dass neues Leben in die einst zentralen Orte des siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Kultur- und Gemeinschaftslebens einkehrt. Maffay setzt sich ein. Er versammelt Freunde und Förderer und steht mit seinem Namen für den Kampf gegen die Sorgen und Nöte der Kinder, gerade in seinem Herkunftsgebiet.

Das wiedererwachte Interesse an Siebenbürgen lässt sich aber auch daran ablesen, dass er sich dem Dialog mit seinen Landsleuten stellt, so z. B. beim Jahresempfang der Siebenbürger Sachsen im Bayerischen Landtag am 31. Januar 2008. Bei dieser Gelegenheit schilderte er seine Eindrücke von einer Reise nach Kronstadt und zeigte sich sehr interessiert an siebenbürgen-spezifischen Themen

Doch vielleicht zu Recht wehrt sich Maffay gegen eine Überbeanspruchung dieses, seines siebenbürgischen Etiketts. Da mag es für den einen oder anderen befremdlich sein, dass Maffay seinem Siebenbürgen zwischenzeitlich 34 Jahre lang ferngeblieben ist, untätig war er in dieser Zeit jedenfalls nicht. Beständig hat er für seine Leidenschaft, die Musik, gearbeitet, er hat sich auf die Eigenarten der bundesdeutschen Gesellschaft eingelassen und sie nicht ganz unerheblich mitbestimmt. Die Märchenfigur des kleinen Drachen Tabaluga ist Ausdruck der Fantasie und der Kreativität, deren es bedarf, um in einem Umfeld, in dem "alles schon einmal da war" und in dem sich vieles recht schnell verbraucht, zu wirken. Sie zeigt, dass es funktionieren kann, sich gegen allzu kurze Halbwertzeiten zur Wehr zu setzten, in der Musik wie in der gesellschaftlichen Anteilnahme.

Mit seinen 60 Jahren scheint Maffay nichts von dieser Energie eingebüßt zu haben. Seine gerade erschienene Biographie "Peter Maffay – Auf dem Weg zu mir" dokumentiert seine Tatkraft. Eines ist gewiss: Die Ideen werden ihm so schnell nicht ausgehen.

Internationales Pfadfindertreffen in Holzmengen

Unter dem Motto "Das sächsische Erbe Siebenbürgens" fand vom 20. bis 29. Juli ein Internationales Pfadfindertreffen in der Kirchenburg und dem Jugendbegegnungszentrum in Holzmengen statt. 200 Pfadfinder aus Rumänien, Frankreich, Belgien und Polen erkundeten die siebenbürgisch-sächsische Kultur und Tradition, ließen das mittelalterliche Leben rund um die Burg wieder aufleben und übten die Kunstfertigkeit verschiedener Handwerker. Das Treffen, zu dem der rumänische Pfadfinderverband (www.scout. 10) eingeladen hatte, wurde großzügig durch die Siebenbürgisch-Sächsische Stiftung in München und die Christian-Habermann-Stiftung in Bukarest unterstützt. Stiftungsratsvorsitzender Hans-Christian Habermann, ehemaliger Pfadfinder und Baden Powell Fellow, berichtet über das Treffen und weitere Ziele der Jugendarbeit der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Stiftung.

Um das siebenbürgischsächsische Kulturerbe zu erhalten, widmet sich die Siebenbürgisch-Sächsische Stiftung auch der Jugendarbeit. So werden an der Brukenthalschule in Hermannstadt Seminare angeboten, in denen siebenbürgische Geschichte vermittelt wird. Die Schüler legen Prüfungen ab und können, je nach erworbenem Wissensstand, Preise gewinnen. Diese Initiative hat einen großen Erfolg gezeitigt, und wir hoffen, derartige Kurse über unsere Geschichte in weiteren deutschsprachigen Schulen in Siebenbürgen einzuführen.

Im Rahmen des Europäischen Kulturhauptstadtprogramms 2007 veranstalteten wir ein Pfadfindertreffen in Hermannstadt und Umgebung. Über 100 Pfadfinder aus den Herkunftsländern der Siebenbürger Sachsen trafen sich mit rumänischen Jugendlichen. Es war eine sehr erfolgreiche Veranstaltung, die auch half, die rumänische Pfadfinderbewegung "Cercetaşi", die sich noch auf Identitätssuche befand, zu festigen.

Ende Juli 2009 fand in Siebenbürgen ein zweites Internationales Pfadfindertreffen mit über 200 jungen Leute aus Frankreich, Belgien, Polen, einigen Deutsche und vielen begeisterten Rumänen statt. Das Motto war: "Siebenbürgen 2009 - The Saxon Heritage". Die Organisation durch die jungen Rumänen und einige Vertreter unserer Stiftung war beispielhaft. Bei ihrer Ankunft in Holzmengen bekam jeder Pfadfinder ein Handbuch und Programm mit Einzelheiten über Städte und Geschichte Siebenbürgens ausgehändigt. Einleitend hielt Prof. Dr. Paul Philippi, Ehrenvorsitzender des Demokratischen Forums der Deutschen in Rumänien (DFDR), einen Vortrag über die siebenbürgische Geschichte.

Die Pfadfinder wurden mit Kunstfertigkeiten verschiedener Handwerker vertraut gemacht und konnten diese selbst praktizieren. So Iernten sie Töpfern, Schmieden, Schreinern, stellten Papier und Seife her, eigneten sich die alte deutsche Schrift an oder machten sich mit den Wassermühlen oder Kräuterkunde und deren vielfältigen Anwendungen in der Vergangenheit vertraut. Auch mittelalterliche Tänze wurden eingeübt. Bei einer Schatzsuche in Hermannstadt lernten die Pfadfinder die Stadt kennen. Hier wurden auch Spiele veranstaltet, ebenfalls in Hermannstadt traf man die fahrenden Gesellen. Zudem wurden Kirchenburgen wie jene in Birthälm und die Stadt Schäßburg besucht.

Ihre Zelte hatten die Pfadfinder während ihres zehntägigen Aufenthalts um die Kirchenburg Holzmengen aufgestellt. Es entstanden auch sehr schnell sehr erfreuliche Kontakte zu den Dorfbewohnern.

Bei der Abschiedsfeier am 28. Juli gestalteten verschiedene Volksgruppen das Programm mit. Erfreut nahm man ein Grußwort Seiner Majestät König Karl Gustav von Schweden, des Präsidenten der weltweiten Dachorganisation der Pfadfinder, zur Kenntnis. Die Pfadfinderbewegung wurde im Jahre 1907 von Lord Baden Powell in England ins Leben gerufen und zählt heute 28 Millionen Mitglieder in 216 Ländern.

Am Ende waren alle Teilnehmer von Siebenbürgen begeistert, und die rumänischen Pfadfinder erklärten, dass keine Gegend für derartige Treffen besser geeignet sei als Siebenbürgen.






Coming: a really thin TV


LED TV sets are making their way into stores around the world.

They are about one inch thick and weigh up to 25 percent less than to-day's liquid-crystal-display (LCD) and plasma TVs.

Engineers say there may be a tradeoff between picture quality and the thinness of a set. Samsung, however, says the picture quality of its new (light-emitting diode) LED set is higher than LCDs of just a year or two ago. Samsung charges \$2,199 for its new 46-inch LED TV.

LCD sets use a thin layer of liquid in front of slim fluorescent bulbs. The bulbs are much thicker than the diodes used in the new LEDs, which are about as flat as a computer chip.


