# Prepare Your Garden for Fall

Fall can be an active time in your garden. It is a great time to plant pansies, flowering cabbage and kale, and other hardy plants. These plants generally can withstand down to 12 degrees Fahrenheit. Replace any withering annuals with chrysanthemums, which thrive in fall weather. These can be planted directly into the ground or in containers.

If you expect a sudden frost, you can cover your outside plants with a rug, sheet, or other cotton material. Do not use plastic. As the weather turns even colder, bring clay pots inside. Otherwise, they may freeze and crack. Wash them out and sterilize them with a rinse of diluted bleach. Let dry completely before stacking or storing.

Plants such as bougainvillea, hibiscus, and geraniums can be left in their pots during the winter. Simply cut them back to a size and shape that fits your home and move inside when the weather turns cold. In the spring, gradually introduce them back to the great outdoors by placing them outside for several hours each day until the danger of frost is over. Then you can move them outside to enjoy the summer weather.

# WHEN WAS THE LAST TIME YOU MADE A CONTRIBUTION TO YOUR HERITAGE?

Do your ancestors come from Germany, Austria or the homeland, Romania? These are all areas where there is need to help our Saxon people. For \$40.00 you could buy a

box of food, perhaps for some Saxon you don't even know. Yes, I know we have serious needs here, but they are greater there for our people, especially the elderly and those ill or trying to survive.

I spent three weeks recently in Romania where I again saw the amazing work of the Saxon Relief Fund, being very carefully managed. You see those boxes of food piled against the wall and know that some Saxon needs it and it tears hard at your heart. Or someone comes into the relief office and asks for money for medicine because he/she is terminally ill and the hospital has turned them away in Romania. If you are sixty years or older, the general hospitals send you home because "you are too old"! These are our people and what our relief fund has to deal with as far as bureaucracy is concerned is appalling. For example, we had a very fine hospital at Blumenau which was exceptionally well run by a Frau Bauer. This was a hospital for

#### Food Tip

If you are buying fish, there are a few things to consider to make sure you get the freshest product available. Try to shop in a busy store, as their fish will not sit around too long. You can also ask when they get in their shipments of fish and try to buy close to that day and time. Ask to smell the fish and pass on it if it doesn't smell fresh (it should not smell strongly fishy). Fresh fillets should be shiny and there should be no discoloration of the edges. Whole fish should have shiny eyes, and live shellfish should have no open or broken shells. When in doubt, remember that most fish can be purchased frozen. Since this fish is flash frozen often right at the point of the catch or processing, it is a good alternative to fresh.

those Saxon/Germans who are bedridden and have "no one". Because of bureaucracy, some influential man wanted his son to be the head of Blumenau. which has two divisions, one for the bedridden and the other for ambulatory residents. He closed down the bedridden and the building remains vacant. For years, I carried money for medicine and pampers for our fellow Saxons in a well run building.

While in Kronstadt with Karl Ehrmann, the director of Saxon Relief in Romania, I also got to meet with director of our Dr. Carl Wolff facility in Hermannstadt. That respected woman runs a 190 bed hospital for us, half old people's home and one half hospital. This hospital now has the only hospice wing of its kind in all Romania, for, it accepts anyone. Right now, it has a number of patients who range between 25 and 35 years old who, even though some of them can be helped enough to go home, want to stay there because it's "better". This director also has started a home around the corner from the hospital for street children. This is the work of the Evangelicische Kirche of Germany and your Saxon Relief Fund.

Our nursing homes/hospitals are models of cleanliness and good management, but the government has the allocated funds and takes almost no responsibility for the hospitals; corruption is draining it off in health care; it is true socialized medicine and truly scary.

Our Saxon Relief Fund has every penny accounted for and our books are open for

evaluation, which is unusual in this country. While I was there, two accountants were in from Germany reviewing our books; one made a point of asking me to tell you that our Saxon Relief Funds are impeccably handled and they were awed and very much impressed, "better than in Germany," they said.

As an aside, I was invited to go to the new cathedral in Fagaras because the metropolitan Bishop of the Romanian Orthodox Church was blessing the new basilica. This was a huge cathedral built to dominate this relatively poor town; the people were asked to pay for this ornate building. We stood shoulder to shoulder, crowded together to hear this powerful man over all Transylvania; he, in his robes blue, gold and silver decorated with silver bells down the sides carrying a nearly six foots staff of solid silver asking for money. So far, I was told, all the funds received from the people for the new building was about \$1000.00, what they could afford.

The Romanian Orthodox Church does very little in the way of social services for its members, as we do for our Saxon people and the comparison is there.







So wird Brot bis zum Zweiten Weltkrieg und darüber hinaus noch in vielen siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Haushalten fast zu jeder Mahlzeit gereicht. Es wurde von den meisten Bauern im Schweiße ihres Angesichts erzeugt. In Dörfern mit Flurzwang (vor allem bei Dreifelderwirtschaft) wird das Säen des Weizens sowie das Schneiden desselben mit der Sichel noch von Hand ausgeführt. Die festgebundenen Korngarben türmt man in Kreuzform zu Haufen von sechzehn oder mehr Garben auf und lässt sie im Feld stehen, bis der Kornschnitt beendet ist und die Erlaubnis zur Einfuhr bekannt gegeben wird. Der in der Erntezeit gefertigte Weizenstrauß, -kranz oder "Kornbaum" (letzterer in Arkeden, Deutsch-Weißkirch, Maldorf, Zied nachweisbar) sind Symbole der Freude, des Ährensegens. Sie bekunden die Dankbarkeit der Gemeinschaft und des Einzelnen gegenüber Gott und den Menschen. Sie werden vor allem am Erntefest, dem Erntedankfest, im Gotteshaus auf und vor dem Altar angeordnet.

Brauchhandlungen begleiten die Arbeiten vom Säen bis zum Brotbacken und -essen. Auch Redewendungen, Sagen und Märchen sind ortsweise über das Brot und seine Erzeugungsweise bekannt. Keine andere Frucht ist in den siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Überlieferungen so verwurzelt wie das Handeln und Wirken um das Korn und Brot; vor allem in der Erntezeit. Brot wird oft auch als Dank, Schenkung und Anerkennungsmittel angesehen. Brot bedeutet Leben.

## Honterus-Denkmal in Kronstadt wieder geschändet

Nach dem Schlusskonzert des "Musica Coronensis"-Festivals am Sonntagabend, dem 18. Oktober, wurde festgestellt, dass die westliche Relieftafel am Honterus-Denkmal in Kronstadt (Braşov) teilweise aus der Halterung herausgerissen wurde. Am 19. Oktober in dere Früh stellte sich heraus, dass die östliche Relieftafel ganz verschwunden ist.

Das Honterus-Denkmal neben der Schwarzen Kirche wird damit zum zweiten Mal Opfer eines Raubfalls, trotz eines Eisengitterzauns, der seit Oktober 2000 den Zugang zum Denkmal behindert. Im Januar 1999 hatten Kinder die westliche Relieftafel gestohlen und als Altmetall verkauft. Durch den beispielhaften Einsatz des in Augsburg lebenden Kronstädters Wilhelm Roth konnte im Oktober 2002 eine von ihm angefertigte Replik der westlichen Relieftafel anstelle des Originals angebracht werden.

Das Honterus-Denkmal wurde am 21. August 1898 aus Anlass des 400. Geburtstages des Humanisten und Reformators Johannes Honterus (1498-1549) eingeweiht. Es ist das Werk des Berliner Bildhauers Harro Magnussen (1861-1908). Am Sockel des Denkmals befanden sich zwei Relieftafeln aus Bronze (je 81 cm breit und 70 cm hoch). Die westliche Tafel zeigte Honterus in seiner Druckerei, deren erste erhaltene Drucke aus dem Jahre 1539 stammen.

Die östliche Tafel, die nun gestohlen wurde, stellte Honterus als Stadtpfarrer dar, wie er einem Kranken in Anwesenheit der Familienmitglieder das Heilige Abendmahl reicht. Am unteren Rand des Reliefs stand in gotischen Majuskeln "Wachet und betet", der Wahlspruch von Honterus aus dem Matthäusevangelium 26, 41. Johannes Honterus war vom 22. April 1544 bis zu seinem Tod am 23. Januar 1549 evangelischer Stadtpfarrer von Kronstadt. 1543 hatte er das "Reformationsbüchlein" im Auftrag des Stadtrates geschrieben und veröffentlicht sowie danach auch dessen "Apologie".

Der Diebstahl wurde der Polizei gemeldet, die mit den Untersuchungen begonnen hat. Die von den Dieben teilweise losgelöste westliche Replikplatte wurde vom Wirtschaftsamt der Schwarzen Kirche abgenommen, um sie vor Diebstahl zu schützen.

So steht das Honterusdenkmal erstmals nach 111 Jahren ohne seine beiden Seitenreliefs da.

# Literaturnobelpreis für Herta Müller

Der Nobelpreis für Literatur geht in diesem Jahr an die deutsche Schriftstellerin Herta Müller. Das gab das schwedische Nobelpreiskomitee am Donnerstag (8. Oktober 2009) in Stockholm bekannt. Die aus dem rumänischen Banat stammende, in Berlin lebende Autorin habe auf unnachahmliche Weise "mittels Verdichtung der Poesie und Sachlichkeit der Prosa Landschaften der Heimatlosigkeit" gezeichnet, heißt es in der Begründung. Der mit 1,09 Millionen Euro dotierte Nobelpreis wird am 10. Dezember in Stockholm vergeben. Der letzte deutsche Schriftsteller, der diese Auszeichnung erhalten hat, war 1999 Günter Grass.

Das Nobelpreiskomitee bearündete die Entscheidung unter anderem auch mit der Reinheit der Dichtung, die ihren Werken innewohne. Als Höhepunkt ihres literarischen Schaffens, in dem die Autorin gegen das Vergessen ankämpft, gilt der im August 2009 im Carl Hanser Verlag erschienene Roman "Atemschaukel". Darin erzählt Müller vom Schicksal der nach dem Zweiten Weltkrieg aus Siebenbürgen in sowjetische Arbeitslager Deportierten. Den Stoff dazu hat sie in Gesprächen mit dem aus Hermannstadt stammenden Lyriker Oskar Pastior, Büchner-Preisträger 2006, sowie anderen Überlebenden der Deportation gesammelt. Auch Müllers Mutter war fünf Jahre in einem Arbeitslager



in der heutigen Ukraine interniert.

# Oskar Pastior hätte es sehr gefreut

In einer Reaktion auf die Auszeichnung erklärte Herta Müller u. a.: "Oskar Pastior hätte es natürlich sehr gefreut, vielleicht sogar mehr als mich. Ohne ihn und seine detaillierten Erzählungen aus dem Lageralltag hätte ich das Buch auch gar nicht schreiben können. Er wollte aber, dass es das Buch gibt. Es war meine Trauerarbeit, darüber darf man eigentlich auch kein schlechtes Buch schreiben.", zitiert die Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung die diesjährige Literaturnobelpreisträgerin.

Herta Müller wurde am 17. August 1953 in Nitzkydorf (Kreis Temesch) im Banat geboren. Ihre Kindheit in Rumänien, die schmerzhaften Erinnerungen an die kommunistische Diktatur unter Ceauşescu, an Repressionen, an Zensur und den rumänischen Geheimdienst

Seit 1995 ist die Banaterin Mitglied der Deutschen Akademie für Sprache und Dichtung. Anfang der neunziger Jahre ist Müller, deren Werke in mehr als 20 Sprachen übersetzt worden sind, zu einer international renommierten Autorin avanciert. Der Literaturnobelpreis krönt nun Müllers schriftstellerisches Schaffen.

# Veterans Day: Americans take the date very seriously

On Wednesday, November 11, while we continue to lean strongly on our military forces, we celebrate Veterans Day.

Originally called Armistice Day, the day commemorated the end of World War I. The war officially ended with the signing of the Treaty of Versailles but the temporary cessation of hostili-

ties went into effect on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month: November 11, 1918. On November 11, 1919, as President Wilson proclaimed the first Armistice Day, Americans celebrated by holding parades, public meetings and a pause of business at 11 a.m.



After World War II and following the

war in Korea, veteran groups lobbied for a change to honor all who served America in the armed forces.


On June 1, 1954, President Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name of the legal holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

However, the date was not written in stone. In 1968, Congress passed the Monday Holiday Law that established the fourth Monday in October as the new date.

An outcry went up. Initially, all states, except Mississippi and South Dakota, followed the federal observance the first year. But popular support was for the original date.

By 1975, the federal government passed legislation to return the national observance to November 11. This took effect in 1978. Popular sentiment won out.

While Memorial Day is reserved to honor those who have died fighting, America now honors all Service members, past and present, living and dead, on Veteran's Day.

Death and taxes are two sure things in life. The good news is Congress has granted a reprieve to the second when it enacted the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 where it created a new type of IRA. It is called the Roth IRA. An ATS Roth IRA is a great retirement planning tool that our younger members in particular should consider to include in their savings program:

- . Earnings accumulate tax-deferred and may be withdrawn tax-free if:
  - 1) The withdrawal occurs more than five years after the first contribution and

- There is no requirement for mandatory withdrawals at any age.
- Contribution eligibility is not restricted by active participation in an employer's retirement plan.
- The 10% premature distribution tax penalty for withdrawals of earnings before age 59 1/2 will be waived for qualified higher education, first-time home purchases (up to \$10,000), disability, death and certain medical expenses.
- · Heirs are not subject to federal income taxes on earnings.

## Contribution Restrictions:
