

History of the Society The First Transylvania Saxon Sick Benefit Society Branch 1 of the Central Verband

Preamble. Rev. John H. Deutschlander

This feastscript for the 50th Foundation Jubilee of the First Transylvania Saxon Sick Benefit Society, Branch 1 of the Central Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen of the United States owing its formation to the Joint work of the three best workers: President, George Weber, Michael Krauss, the loyal Eckard of the Saxons in the United States and William Schuster, Secretary for many years of Branch 1. In thorough preparatory work they have from the archives gathered the dates, to them we all owing thanks.

It can't be the mission of this feastscript on hand of the biografic sketches from life of the leading man to describe the creation and growing of the Society, although in such a way a much more interesting history of the Society would have come out of it. In this here given form we had to confine ourself to the statements of simple facts and events that have brought out the founding and building of the organization. Of the historical presentation, we had to take register names of the presidents, the veterans and the active members of the Society besides survey of the money chest. Conduct of the Society in the 50 years of its existence must be added in order to get the best possible picture its work in the past as its producing power give in the present time. When you read this booklet with observance you will wonder how simple workers and almost beginners in a strange land have created and built such things in 50 years. You will feel that love for the race he derived from and loyalty to the new homeland have been the connecting link between them. This booklet shall be a guide for the Junior Saxons and how they shall act in the sence of their fathers for the benefit of their people and the honor of God.

our people have been members of this Society. Their endeavors in behalf of their people have not only been a blessing in the past but will be even of greater significance in the future.

Even the historian, who is accustomed to measure greater time periods, must admit that the Saxons who are united in the First Transylvanian Saxons Sick Benefit Society Branch 1 have accumulated great things.

The Transylvanian Saxons who came to the shores of America as poor immigrants have brought their thrift and industry, their loyalty and dependability, soon earned an honorable and influential place in American citizenship.

A good cosmopolitical education they brought along from their Old Country. So that they proportionally very easy could find their way into the new conditions without losing much of their naturality and characteristic.

Transylvania Saxons already began to migrate to the United States as early as the 80's of the past century. In the 90's there were traces of Saxon immigrants in almost all of the large industrial centers of the eastern states. Material need and unfavorable political conditions forced them to leave their homeland. There, economic conditions were desperate, in spite of hard work and the simplest kind of life, the farmers fell deeper in poverty and debt. Thus, it was, that many a Saxon home and farm fell into other hands through indebtness.

But in America things were different. There a man could earn \$1.40 a day, - quite a sum in those days -, and that was equal to 5 Hungarian crowns or 2.50 Gulden. At this rate an immigrant could pay off his debt within two or three years in America and still with a decent burial.

Thus their feeling of loneness and social responsibility brought about a closer union among them, and on the very first day of March, 1895 witnessed the organisation of the first Saxon Society in Cleveland, with a membership of 27, and their purpose that of closer fellowship and mutual assistance in sickness and in death. Only one of the original founders is privileged to live and witness the fiftieth anniversary of this organization, and his is Brother Michael Ulman.

In 1897 there was organized the "Eintracht" Singing Society. The purpose of this group was not only the fellowship, song and music but mutual assistance among the membership as well.

Meanwhile a number of the other Transylvanian Saxon Societies were founded in other cioties. In 1902 a union of all Saxon societies was suggested. Under the leadership of the First Transylvania Saxons Sick Benefit of Cleveland, Ohio, the Central Verband of the Transylvanian Saxons of the U.S. was organised, which with its Insurance, as well as its humanitarian endeavors, have become a strong bulwark for Saxons in their New Country. The names of Martin Ulmann of Cleveland, Ohio, and John Krauss of Erie, PA will long be remembered for their work of uniting the Saxon Societies into one organization. The present Grand president of the Central Verband John Balthes and Grand secretary George Martins had rendered a life work to the Central Verband. Under their leadership this beneficial institute expanded and reached a new height.

The next task of the Beneficental Society, Branch 1, was the establishment of its own "home". The suggestion for this new project was made by Michael Krauss, born in Gross Schenk, who in the month of August of the year 1903 presented the Saxon stage-play "Am Zween Kretzer". The receipts from the play, \$127.28, were dedicated to the building fund of the "Saxon Home".

Under the energetic leadership of the that time president, Martin Schuller, immediately a committee was appointed for the purpose of beginning work on the new project.

The year 1904 witnessed the

the home, because the Singing Society Eintracht was organized. The Singing Society Eintracht has, according to a resolution in the year 1909 furnished to 155 of 165 deceased the funeral committee and sang at the funeral home, house of mourning and at the cemetery to the deceased member at his grave a funeral song as last greeting and at all festivities it gave dignity with its songs, therefore the Society also renumerated the choirmaster for his services.

In the year 1910 the first addition at the Saxon Home in form of a big dance hall, two bowling alleys, dining hall and music room for the cost price of \$11,710 was erected.

In the year of 1922 the two Singing Societies united under the name "Eintracht-Hermania" since that time they are peacefully cooperating together, sociable and artistically accomplished great things. The days of glory of Eintracht-Hermania began since Prof. Andreas Nikolaus took over the direction.

After the first World War was an inflow of Saxon emigrants with the result of increasing the work field of the Society.

In 1925 the new front building of the "Sachsenheim" was built with the expenditure of \$66,148.46, thereto also equipment in the amount of \$11,641.56 added, makes the sum of \$77,790. The corner stone added in the course of years a garden lot, costing money, during which Pastor Johannes Deutschlander addressed the gathering.

To the property of the Society, Branch 1, was laid by Michael Krauss at an impressive ceremony \$800.00, and the neighbor home and property east, as well as west, of the Sachsenheim, at a cost of \$4890.73, and \$6329.33 respectively.

The Home of Branch 1 serves also as headquarters of the First Transylvanian Saxon Ladies Sick Benefit Society, Branch 4, who also can look backward upon many years of profitable blessed service to our people. We acknowledge with gratitude the substantial contribution made by these women toward the furnishing and equipment of the home. At the beginning of the year 1920 a women's chorus, "Saxonia", was organized under the musical leadership of Prof. Rudolph Schuster. During the 25 years of its existence the Ladies Choir Saxonia has become a singing society of first class and stands deserving in

its accomplishments of Art on the side of Eintracht-Hermania. Branch 1 is greatly indebted to the Saxonia for its splendid contributions toward the cultural effort of the Society. At present the Saxonia is also under the musical leadership of Prof. Andreas Nikolaus.

The Young Saxons

The pleasant rooms of our home re-echoed of the song and happy activities of a new generation. It's the "Saxon Juniors" now who prepare to take possession of the heritage of their fathers, and to carry on the work, which their fathers had begun. These young Saxons are a most promising brave and worthy generation, as we see them filled with the American ideal and cherishing Christian culture and a happy sense of work. Most of our Juniors have served our country with the armed forces and have served and have offered their lives for the country on all of the bloody battlefields of World War I and II. Many have been decorated for their outstanding performance. Others made the supreme sacrifice and laid down their lives for their country. To all of them our heartfelt thanks, and to the latter a holy and honored memory in the hearts of all Saxons in America.

The Saxon Juniors club was organized on the West Side of Cleveland toward the end of 1928. It became apparent to members of Branch 1 that the for long without the addition of new and younger members. Thus it was that a youths meeting was called for November 4, 1926, for the purpose of creating a youth organization. Branch 1 and 4 appointed committees to initiate and supervise the work among the young people until such a time when they would elect their own officers. The committee of Branch 1 consisted of Dan Rehner, chairman, Pastor Johannes Deutschlandler Sr., Max Böge, Andrew Schmidt Sr., John Binder, Editor George Schneider and George Martini, Grand Secretary of the Central Association. After careful discussion it was decided to adopt the name of Transylvania Jugend Bund or the name of "Transylania Junior Club". The first officers of the Juniors were: Rudolph Metter, President; Emma Schneider, Vice President; Catherine Kauntz, Secretary; Michael

Transylvania Saxons in the United States of America have maintained their traditional character of honorable service to people and country. The fifty years of existence of Branch 1 is part of the history of the Transylvania Saxons in America. Men of leadership who have been counselors and guides to have a little savings left. Yes, it was a bitter and imperative need that caused these Saxons to leave their homeland, and not merely the love of travel and adventure.

However, they were not spared want and labor in the country of their adoption. Take for instance the case of the twenty-eight Saxon immigrants in Cleveland, who stayed at the Mild Boarding House. Only seven of them had work, none of them had any money. The cost of room and board was \$10.50 a month and when death suddenly called one of them away then the others had to pool their meager resources in order to provide their brother union of the Benefit Society with the Singing Society Eintracht and thus a period of intensive civic and cultural work was begun.

The place for the "Sachsenheim", 7001 Denison Avenue was bought in 1907 for the sum of \$5000.00. At that time there was only a frame building on the premises. At first this had to be remodeled to serve as "home" of the growing society.

After their own home had been acquired, the fellow countrymen rapidly joined the Sick Benefit Society and so, that today it stands as the biggest branch of the Central Verband. An active society life developed soon at



Als am Valentinstag gegen 23 Uhr bekanntgegeben wird, dass sie die Schönste der Schönen ist, atmet sie tief durch und guckt aus großen braunen Augen ungläubig in die Runde. Seit 2003 gehören die Seiten der Ortschaften zu den häufig besuchten Seiten von Siebenbuerger.de. Hunderte Gästebucheinträge und Linkvorschläge sowie über 4 000 eingeschickte Bilder zeugen von der regen Teilnahme der Besucher. Dabei werden die Seiten sowohl von ehemaligen Ortsbewohnern als auch von ortsfremden Interessierten besucht. Viele der Ortschaftenseiten sind von entsprechenden Lexikoneinträgen bei der Online-Enzyklopädie Wikipedia als Referenz verlinkt.

Im Rahmen der vor zwei Jahren begonnenen Umgestaltung und Modernisierung des Webauftritts von Siebenbuerger.de sind nun auch die Ortschaftenseiten umgearbeitet worden. Die Seiten wurden nicht nur mit einem frischeren und benutzerfreundlichen Aussehen versehen, auch das im Hintergrund arbeitende System wurde neu programmiert. Vorgabe und Ziel war es, die Seiten benutzerfreundlicher zu gestalten, die Querverbindungen zu anderen Bereichen wie Zeitung, Treffpunkt, Sprachaufnahmen stärker zu betonen, die Kontaktmöglichkeiten zwischen ehemaligen Bewohnern zu verbessern und die Plattform um weitere Informationsbereiche (z. B. Nachrichten und Termine, Adressen) zu erweitern. Jetzt werden beispielsweise die Ortschaftsbilder, die zuvor mit mehr oder weniger aussagekräftigen (Datei)Namen aufgelistet wurden, als Galerie mit Vorschaubildern angezeigt, um so den Besucher zum Betrachten und Verweilen einzuladen. Jedes Bild kann als elektronische Postkarte per E-Mail verschickt werden – ob als Urlaubsgruß oder Erinnerung an die alte Heimat. Die Besucher können auch weiterhin eigene Bilder vom Ort hochladen und diese nicht nur mit einem Titel, sondern auch mit einer kurzen Beschreibung versehen.


Das Heimatblatt, das von einem guten Dutzend Ortschaften genutzt wurde, steht nun allen Ortschaften kostenlos zur Verfügung. Es wurde zu einem allgemeineren Nachrichtenblatt erweitert, wo neben Berichten der HOGs auch sonstige Nachrichten, Termine und Berichte über den Ort veröffentlicht werden können. Damit soll neben dem Informationsaustausch zwischen den organisierten ehemaligen Dorfbewohnern auch das Informationsbedürfnis eines erweiterten Besucherkreises abgedeckt werden.

Neu sind auch die Beschreibungen der Gästehäuser auf den entsprechenden Ortschaftsseiten und die Auflistung von Nachbarorten, in denen sich Gästehäuser befinden. Sofern zu einem Ort Mundartaufnahmen veröffentlicht wurden, werden diese auch auf der Seite dieses Ortes angezeigt. Adressen und Links von HOGs, Kulturgruppen und Institutionen vor Ort (Rathäuser, Kirche) runden das Informationsangebot ab. Dank der Übernahme der geografischen Koordinaten aller Ortschaften, die Jochen Philippi freundlicherweise zur Verfügung gestellt hat, ist es jetzt möglich, bei jeder Ortschaft automatisch das entsprechende Satelliten- bzw. Luftbild von Google-Maps anzuzeigen. Die Detailschärfe dieser Bilder reicht aus, die Straßenzüge oder gar einzelne Häuser zu erkennen. Zusammen mit den über tausend Luftbildaufnahmen von Georg Gerster bieten sie eine faszinierende Möglichkeit, Siebenbürgen aus der Luft zu betrachten. Zur geografischen Orientierung dienen auch die schon bekannte Übersichtskarte, die die Lage der Ortschaft innerhalb Siebenbürgens zeigt, und eine schematische Darstellung der bis zu sieben Kilometer entfernten Nachbargemeinden. Man kann Siebenbürgen nicht nur "im Flug" kennen lernen, sondern auch durch Anklicken einer Ortschaft auf diesen Karten von Ort zu Ort mit "Siebenmeilenstiefeln" durch Siebenbürgen wandern.

Wer neugierig geworden ist, kann die neuen Seiten unter der Adresse www.siebenbuerger. <u>de/ortschaften/</u> besuchen. Gleich auf der Übersichtsseite werden die neuesten Bilder, Nachrichten, Erzählungen und Verweise angezeigt - gerade für regelmäßige Besucher ein nützlicher Service. Gleichzeitig animieren die Listen neuer Bilder und Beiträge manchen Besucher, sich auch auf anderen Ortschaften umzusehen. Mittels der alphabetisch geordneten Liste der Ortschaften können gezielt einzelne Ortschaften angesteuert werden. Nutzer von RSS-Feeds können sich auch automatisch benachrichtigen lassen, sobald es etwas Neues im Ortschaftenbereich gibt. Die Informationsmenge und deren Qualität sind natürlich noch nicht bei allen Ortschaften gleich hoch. Bei manchen kleineren Ortschaften sind die Informationen noch etwas spärlich. Auch die neuen Bereiche wie die Adressen von Kulturgruppen und Institutionen vor Ort werden erst nach und nach mit Inhalten versehen werden. Für die Zukunft ist die Einrichtung weiterer Bereiche geplant, wie etwa die Präsentation von Sehenswürdigkeiten und die Ergänzung der Informationen, beispielsweise um die sächsischen Ortsnamen.

Wie auch bisher wird der Erfolg der Seiten überwiegend von der Teilnahme der Besucher abhängen. Wer interessante Bilder einer Ortschaft besitzt, relevante Webseiten kennt, unterhaltsame Geschichten, Anekdoten und Erlebnisse aus dem Ort zu erzählen weiß oder einfach nur einen Gruß im Ortschaftsgästebuch hinterlassen möchte, ist herzlich eingeladen. Jeder kann dazu beitragen, dass die Ortsseiten interessanter, informativer und attraktiver werden. Um die Inhalte zu aktualisieren und die von den Besuchern eingesandten Beiträge zu verwalten, wird auch weiterhin auf die Unterstützung von ortskundigen Editoren vertraut. Zum jetzigen Zeitpunkt werden über 60 Ortschaften von Editoren betreut. Wer die Seiten seines Heimatortes pflegen möchte, findet nähere Informationen im Ortschaftenbereich. Es sind keine besonderen Kenntnisse vonnöten - jeder, der den Umgang mit Internet-Browsern und E-Mail-Programmen kennt, kann die erforderlichen Aufgaben erledigen. Wenn die Besucher sich weiterhin so zahlreich auf den Seiten einfinden und die dargebotenen Möglichkeiten aktiv nutzen. dann erfüllen die Seiten nicht nur die Funktion virtueller Erinnerungsorte an das siebenbürgisch-sächsische Kulturerbe, sondern werden gleichzeitig lebendige Begegnungsorte für alle, die sich einem Ort verbunden fühlen.

9. The tournament secretary shall have the right to return for correction any entry form that does not comply with the above rules.


10. All event winners will be determined by ACTUAL SCORES PLUS HANDICAP.


Most poisonings occur in the home

Poison Control Centers receive more than 2 million accidental poisoning calls each year. More than 90 percent of non-fatal poisoning occurs in the home and most involve children, according to the Poison Control Centers.

· To protect your children, choose child-resistant packaging wherever possible and close containers tightly after every use. Store hazardous products in a safe place and out of children's reach.

These include personal care products, such as baby oil and mouthwash; cleaning substances including drain and oven cleaners; over-thecounter pain relievers including ibuprofen and aspirin; and cough and cold medicines. Adult-strength vitamins and supplements containing iron are dangerous to kids. Hydrocarbons, such as lamp oil and furniture polish, are a danger.

· Adults may poison themselves by taking prescription or over-the-counter medications improperly. Always read directions carefully and follow them exactly.



Cat owners get fewer heart attacks and strokes?

Today's world can be a stressful place, so much so that it can make both blood pressure and cholesterol levels rise.

A number of studies show that owning a cat can help to prevent cardiovascular disease. Now, new evidence reported at the annual meeting of the American Stroke Association suggests that cat owners also have a lower risk of suffering a stroke.

The association reported on a 10-year study of men and women aged 30 to 75 who showed no evidence of cardiovascular disease at the beginning of the project.

Researchers found that those who did not own a cat,


or never owned one, had a 40 percent higher risk of having a heart attack. Their risk of dying from other heart diseases, such as stroke, was 30 percent higher.

By comparison, other research found that taking cholesterol-lowering drugs is associated with a 29 percent decrease in heart attacks among people without chest pain.

Cat ownership was shown to reduce the risk of depression and stroke.

Not everyone has time to care for a feline friend. For those who do, doctors say a cat could ultimately improve their quality of life.
