





Cities are stepping up tree plantings in hopes of improving air quality, reducing energy consumption and easing storm water flows.

The UMV scientists, working with researchers from the U.S. Forest Service, now use computer programs and their expertise to combine satellite images with aerial photos and tax maps to determine tree canopy size and break it down by parcel.



There are only two planets in our solar system without moons: Mercury and Venus.

Stephen Hawking was born on the 300th anniversary of Galileo's death.

The hottest planet is Venus at 457 degrees F (236 degrees C), due to the large greenhouse effect on the surface and its thicker atmosphere.

If there are two full moons in the same calendar month, the second one is called a "blue moon." This happens on average every 3 years.

If our entire solar system could fit into a coffee cup, the Milky Way (our galaxy) would be as big as the North American continent.

The core of the Sun is at a temperature of 24.5 million degrees F (13.6 million degrees C).

The Hubble Telescope has provided evidence that there are about 175 billion galaxies in the observable universe.

Approximately 60 percent of the light on a moonless night comes from sunlight reflecting off of the particles that make up the interplanetary dust cloud.

Vor 430 Jahren starb der bedeutende Raketenpionier und Humanist Conrad Haas

2009 ist das Jahr, in dem die Raumfahrt zahlreiche Jubiläen zu verzeichnen hat. Allen voran natürlich die 40 Jahre seit der ersten Mondlandung im Juli 1969; aber auch einige nicht unbedeutende Ereignisse, die nach Siebenbürgen führen: Zu Conrad Haas, der vor 430 Jahren verstorben ist, vor 480 Jahren die Mehrstufenrakete baute und vermutlich vor 500 Jahren das Licht der Welt erblickte.

Und auch bei Hermann Oberth, dem "wirklichen Vater der Raumfahrt", gibt es ebenfalls drei begründete Anlässe, an seine großen Leistungen zu erinnern: 115 Jahre seit der Geburt, 80 Jahre seit der Veröffentlichung seines Hauptwerkes "Wege zur Raumschiffahrt" (die "Bibel der wissenschaftlichen Astronautik") sowie 80 Jahre seit der Premiere des ersten Raumfahrtfilms "Die Frau im Mond", bei dessen Realisierung Oberth entscheidend mitgewirkt hatte. Darauf werden wir zur gegebenen Zeit eingehen. Die folgenden Zeilen sind Oberths rund 400 Jahre älterem Vorgänger, Conrad Haas, gewidmet.

Beispiele: ohne Raumfahrt keine weltweiten TV-Sendungen und Internetdienste, ohne Raumfahrt keine Navigationssysteme in Autos, Flugzeugen und Schiffen, die einen zielgenauen Verkehr ermöglichen, ohne Raumfahrt keine verbesserten Wetterprognosen und globale Umweltüberwachung usw. usf. All diese weltumspannenden Dienste für die Menschen sind mittlerweile so alltäglich und so selbstverständlich geworden, dass wir kaum noch wahrnehmen, wem wir das zu verdanken haben-allen voran den großen Pionieren der Raketentechnik und Weltraumfahrt. Juni 1894 in Hermannstadt geborene siebenbürgendeutsche Raketen- und Raumfahrtpionier Hermann Oberth von Beginn an als unumstrittene Größe auf diesen Feldern der Wissenschaft und Technik galt, so musste Conrad Haas über 400 Jahre lang auf seine Entdeckung warten. Erst 1962, kurz nachdem die ersten Menschen des Planeten Erde in den Weltraum aufgestiegen waren, erregte eine im siebenbürgischen Hermannstadt verfasste und aufbewahrte Handschrift die gebührende Aufmerksamkeit, die diesen bis dahin der Öffentlichkeit und Fachwelt unbekannten Namen ins Gespräch brachte – und das gleich weltweit.

Die konstruktionstechnischen Neuheiten

Die Handschrift des Conrad Haas, sie wurde in den Jahren 1529-1569 verfasst, weist ihn als den ältesten bislang bekannten Vorläufer der modernen Stufenrakete aus - ohne die es keine Raumfahrt gäbe -, als einen Raketenpionier, der durch seine Beschreibungen und Zeichnungen, Erfindungen und Lösungen vieles seiner Zeit vorwegnahm, was mehr als vier Jahrhunderte später in der raketentechnischen Literatur und Praxis auf wissenschaftlicher Basis weiterentwickelt werden sollte.

In seiner Schrift entwirft Haas die wohl älteste "Theorie" der Stufenrakete. Es sind konstruktions-und fertigungstechnische Beschreibungen und Zeichnungen, die ihn als den ältesten (bisher bekannten) Vorläufer der Mehrfachrakete ausweisen. Zudem werden Bumerangraketen, Stabraketen, Bündelraketen, Raketenbatterien und andere kombinierte Raketen in Wort und Bild dargestellt. Als absolute raketentechnische Erstleistungen, die man Conrad Haas aufgrund einer vergleichenden Analyse der bekannten Literatur zuerkennen kann, erweisen sich folgende entwicklungstechnische Lösungen, Prinzipien und Erfindungen:

In der Geschichte der Raketentechnik wird die herausragende erfinderische und experimentelle Leistung des Conrad Haas ein wichtiger Beziehungspunkt bleiben, die ihn für immer als einen bedeutenden Frühpionier dieser so vielschichtigen und äußerst komplexen Technologie ausweist. Und das vor allem deswegen, weil er als Erster die Mehrstufenrakete beschrieben und gebaut hat. Nach diesem antriebstechnischen Prinzip werden heute alle weltraumtüchtigen Großraketen ausgelegt. Conrad Haas ist und bleibt damit ein verdienstvoller Vorläufer der Weltraumrakete, ohne die der lang ersehnte Flug des Menschen zu den Sternen ein Wunschtraum geblieben wäre!

Siebenbürgen als Wahlheimat

Leider sind die Lebensdaten. die uns von Haas überliefert werden, äußerst spärlich. Denn mehr als die in seinem "Kunstbuch" eingestreuten autobiografischen Details vermitteln eigentlich auch die übrigen 34 einschlägigen Handschriften nicht, die im Hermannstädter Staatsarchiv aufliegen. In der Handschrift "Varia III 374" heißt es auf Blatt 111: "Diese Kunst der Büchsenmeisterei vnnd was zum Geschoß gehört seind geschrieben, gerissen vnnd gebraucht, auch probiert worden bei Zeiten des hochlöblichen Kaysers Caroli Quinti vnnd des allerdurchleuchtigsten, großmächtigsten Kaysers vnnd Königs Ferdinandi, König zu Ungarn vnnd Böhmen, Erzherzog zu Österreich vnnd bei Zeiten des durchleuchtigen Fürsten vnnd Herrn Johannes des andern erwählten [Königs] in Ungarn. Durch einen ehrsam gelehrten Büchsengießer vnnd Meister Namens Connrad Haas von Dornbach bei Wien in Österreich, gewesen der Röm. vnnd Ungarisch köngl. Mst. Zeugwart vnnd Zeugmeister in

der römisch-kaiserlichen vnnd königlichen Majestät auch der Krone Ungarn Büchsengießer, Zeugwart vnnd Zeugmeister".

Damit ist belegt, dass Conrad Haas aus Dornbach bei Wien nach Siebenbürgen kam, dass er und seine Vorfahren ...aus dem Haasenhofbei Landshut" stammten. Die Landshuter Wurzeln werden auch in einem anderen Zusammenhang bestätigt: Das "Kunstbuch" beginnt nämlich mit einer älteren wehrtechnischen Arbeit von Hanns Haasenwein. ebenfalls ...vom Haasenhof bei Landshut", offensichtlich ein enger Anverwandter, in dessen Fußstapfen zwei Generationen später Conrad Haas treten sollte.

Alle Anzeichen und schriftlichen Dokumente sprechen dafür, dass Haas im Gefolge der Befreiungstruppen Kaiser Ferdinands unter General Castaldo im Jahre 1551 nach Siebenbürgen kam und in Hermannstadt die Leitung des Kriegsarsenals (Zeughauses) übernahm. Zudem lässt sich belegen, dass Conrad Haas auch nach dem Rückzug der österreichischen Truppen aus Siebenbürgen (1556) in Hermannstadt blieb. Und dass er seine Wahlheimat bis an sein Lebensende nicht mehr verlassen hat, ist nicht bloß eine Vermutung, die darauf beruht, dass der Name Haas bis heute bei den Siebenbürger Sachsen vorkommt. Ein gewisser Christian Haas, 1635 in Hermannstadt geboren, sollte es im Jahr 1682 sogar bis zum hohen Amt des Sachsenbischofs bringen. Im Haas'schen Nachlass werden u. a. auch alle seine Dienstreisen vermerkt: wir erfahren daraus beispielsweise, dass er 1557 von der Königin Isabella nach Klausenburg gerufen wurde, dass er 1571 in Bistritz war, 1572 Weißenburg besuchte, dass er die 15 "Büchsenmeister vnnd Arthillerey Persons" aus anderen Städten Siebenbürgens als seine Untergeordneten zählte, die er regelmäßig inspizierte. Der rumänische Raketen- und Raumfahrthistoriker Florin Zăgănescu will sogar das

genaue Geburts- und Todesjahr ausgemacht haben: Conrad Haas wurde danach 1509 (?) geboren und starb 1579 in seiner Wahlheimat Siebenbürgen, was soviel bedeutet, dass Haas ganze 28 Jahre lang in Hermannstadt gelebt und gewirkt hat.

Humanist und Pazifist

Haas war ein vielseitig gebildeter Techniker. Seine Schrift verrät ein gediegenes mathematisches, chemisches und physikalisches Wissen, wie z. B. in dem "Buch" über die "löbliche Kunst der Geometrie". An anderer Stelle wieder berichtet Haas über Versuche zur magnetischen Prospektion von Eisenerzen, und erläutert eine Methode zur Destillation des Rohöls. Ebenso werden einschlägige Mess- und Prüfmethoden beschrieben; mehrere Bauarten von fahrbaren Kohlenöfen entworfen usw. Überhaupt bietet sein "Kunstbuch" ein ausgeglichenes Verhältnis von Theorie und experimenteller Untersuchung. Von diesem Standpunkt erweist sich uns Haas als typischer Vertreter der europäischen Renaissance seines Jahrhunderts.

Und noch etwas zeigt seine Biografie: Conrad Haas war (damals schon) ein ausgesprochener Europäer. Aus dem bayerischen Landshut, von wo seine Eltern und Vorfahren stammten, kam er nach Österreich, wo er es zu beachtenswerten Leistungen als Zeugwart und Büchsenmeister brachte; die ihn (1551) wiederum in das siebenbürgische Hermannstadt führten, wo er sein Werk vollendete. Aber auch seine tiefe humanistische Haltung, die in seiner Schrift dokumentiert wird, stützt diese Bewertung voll und ganz. Haas ist nämlich der erste uns bekannte Waffeningenieur und Raketenpionier seiner Zeit, der die kriegerische Verwendung seiner Entwicklungen verurteilt und sich für die friedliche Nutzung der Rakete einsetzte. Im letzten Absatz des Kapitels über militärische Raketen schreibt er: "Aber mein Rath mehr Fried und kein Krieg, die Büchsen do sein gelassen unter dem Dach, so wird die Kugel nit verschossen, das Pulver nit verbrannt oder nass, so behielt der Fürst sein Geld, der Büchsenmeister sein Leben: das ist der Rath so Conrad Haas tut geben.

Two-handed bowlers put a new spin on the game

By using both hands to bowl, a few young professionals can make the ball spin more than 600 revolutions per minute.

That's up to 17 percent more rotation than most champion one-armed bowlers can generate. Upon release, the ball moves to the edge of the lane before hooking sharply into the center and creating an explosion of pins.

A 22-year-old Australian, Jason Belmonte, is one of the current stars of pro bowling. He is one of only several top bowlers using the technique. You can watch his delivery on YouTube, as well as that of others on the Internet.

Cassidy Schaub of Polk, Ohio, another two-hander, was the champion of the recent 2009 U.S. Bowling Congress Team USA trials.

Both Belmonte and Schaub have been bowling with two hands since they were toddlers.

In 2006, Ohio's Chaz Dennis became the youngest bowler to roll a perfect 300 game. He was 10 years old and used the two-hand technique.

Some two-handers, such as Schaub, use a traditional heel-toe walking approach. Others, like Jason Belmonte and Finland's Osku Paler- never seen in bowling.

Make Grilling Easy with Dry Rubs

As the weather heats up, there is nothing better than grilling outdoors. Not only will

you get a great tasting meal, but you will keep your home cooler by not heating up the oven. To make mealtime preparation even faster, instead of marinating your meats, simply use a dry rub.

To make each seasoning mix, toss all ingredients together. Coat the surface of the meat with the rub, let sit for approximately ten minutes, and toss it on the grill. These rubs are great on all types of meats and seafood.

Basic Barbeque Mix

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 tablespoon black pepper 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 tablespoon dark chili powder
- 2 tablespoons paprika
- 1 tablespoon cumin
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Sweeten your life with a taste of stevia

Soft drink and cookie makers are telling the world that some of their low-calorie products are sweetened with something new: stevia. It's 10 times sweeter than sucrose.

Did you know that the plant stevia rebaudinana can be grown in your own garden? Starter plants can be found at nurseries, many garden centers and for sale on the Internet. (Seeds can be tricky to germinate.)

Once started, it will grow in any yard or on any balcony in states from Florida to Canada. Just don't overwater it or plant it in a soggy area. It does have shallow roots, so a layer of mulch will help to keep it moist. Most organic ferilizers will work well. Grasshoppers and most other insects pass it by.

Harvesting should be delayed as long as possible. The coolness of autumn temperatures intensifies the herb's sweetness. When harvesting, strip the leaves off of the plant. You may also want to clip the ends of the stems to add to your collection.

To preserve the leaves, you need to go through a drying process. It is fairly easy. Put them on a screen or net and place it outside on a warm day for about 12 hours. You can also cut down the whole plant and hang it upside down in a warm dry place. Plants should dry in four to 10 days. Crush the dried leaves to release the sweetening power.

- 1 teaspoon rosemary
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper

When to Buy Organic

Buying organic meats, fruits, and vegetables does not always fit into everyone's budget. You may find that you can afford to only buy some organic food.
