



Guard against periodontal infection



There's more to oral health than whiter teeth

You could have the most beautiful smile in the room, but a serious condition could be developing around your pearly whites right now.

Gum disease can sneak up on you at any age. What's more, bacteria from gum disease has been linked to a higher risk of heart attack and stroke, a 14 percent greater risk of all cancers, problems for people with diabetes, and, of course, it can cause tooth loss.

You can keep the whole process from beginning.

- Brush at least twice a day and floss at least once.
- Use a toothpaste that contains triclosan, such as Colgate Total, advises the Mayo Clinic.
- Use a mouthwash that contains thymol, as in Listerine and generics.
- Have regular dental cleanings and checkups.

Other risk factors for periodontal disease include age and medications that reduce the amount of saliva you produce. These drugs include antihistamines, antidepressants, antihypertensives and others.

Police Officers Memorial Day, May 15

In the line of duty...

On Police Officers Memorial Day, the United States honors federal, state and local officers killed or disabled in the line of duty. Some 160 officers are lost in the line of duty each year.

The honor is well-deserved by these fallen heroes of law enforcement. It helps us and their families to know they have not been forgotten. Many businesses and community members lower their flags to half mast on this day.

The observance has been held for 46 years, since 1963. It includes special services and placement of a memorial wreath at the National Law Enforcement Memorial in Washington D.C.

In 1961, Congress asked the president to designate the day to honor the officers. President John F. Kennedy signed the bill into law on October 1, 1962. Each year since that time, the president of the United States proclaims May 15 as Police Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 occurs as Police Week.

This is a day to remember and honor those who have given life or limb to protect us.

Summer is just around the corner and the ATS Youth Activities Committee is busy preparing activities for our junior members. One of these activities is the Saxon Summer Camp, which offers our Junior Members, ages 8 – 13, the opportunity to spend a week together in fellowship and fun at the beautiful Joseph Badger Meadows Camp located in Burghill, Ohio.

The Joseph Badger Meadows Camp is an organized camp center located on 250 acres in rural Hartford Township in Northeastern Ohio. (East of Route 7 on Hayes-Orangeville Road.) The Camp is staffed with trained and experienced counselors.

Our Saxon campers will be housed in a modern facility with dormitory-style sleeping accommodations. Haynam House is equipped with air conditioning, modern bathrooms and bunk beds. The camp facilities include an activity barn, a swimming pool, hiking trails, and dining hall.

Activities are well planned and include swimming, crafts, a climbing wall, games, nature activities, evening campfires, etc. One evening will be devoted to a discussion on Saxon traditions and culture.

The cost of the one-week camp is \$200.00 for our ATS Junior Members and \$260.00 for non-member children. We welcome our members to bring along one friend who is not a member. Also, ATS members may send their children or grandchildren (who are not yet ATS members) to the camp at the non-member cost. Each camper will receive a free Saxon Summer Camp T-Shirt.

If you wish to attend please complete the Registration Form and return it to the ATS Home Office along with a \$100.00 deposit for ATS Junior Members and \$130.00 for non-member children to the ATS Home Office by June 25, 2009. Upon receipt of your registration fee, we will send you a Camper's Health Examination Form and Personal Information Form that must be completed by you and returned to this Office by July 3rd, along with the balance of your camp fee. We will also mail you a detailed map and complete information as to arrival and departure times, and what to bring along.

The ATS Youth Activities Committee recommends that our Junior Members attend this camp. You will spend a fun-filled week in the company of Saxon children from other Branches and will create wonderful memories and develop friendships that will last a long time.

Siebenbürgische Kultur in Dinkelsbühl erleben

Seit 2001 hat Michael Konnerth den Vorsitz des Verbandes der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Heimatortsgemeinschaften e. V. inne. Konnerth hat den Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl seit seiner Ausstellung 1979 jedes Jahr besucht und in den letzten Jahren auch aktiv mitgestaltet. Michael Konnerth wurde 1955 in Neithausen im Oberen Harbachtal geboren. Der Absolvent des Joseph-Haltrich-Gymnasiums in Schäßburg und ausgebildete EDV-Fachmann arbeitet zurzeit in einem mittelständischen Unternehmen. Im Verband der Siebenbürger Sachsen ist er vielseitig ehrenamtlich aktiv: seit 1982 im Vorstand der Kreisgruppe Göppingen (seit 1996 als Vorsitzender) und seit 1998 als stellvertretender Vorsitzender der Landesgruppe Baden-Württemberg. Im Vorstand des Bundes der Vertriebenen in Baden-Württemberg ist er Vertreter für Südosteuropa. Wie laufen die Vorbereitungen für den Heimattag und was erwartet die Besucher in diesem Jahr, wollte Siegbert Bruss im folgenden Interview wissen.

Der Verband der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Heimatortsgemeinschaften wird den diesjährigen Heimattag in Dinkelsbühl zusammen mit dem landsmannschaftlichen Verband, der siebenbürgischen Jugend und dem Hilfskomitee ausrichten. Welche besonderen Akzente werden die Heimatortsgemeinschaften setzen?

Wir wollen den Besuchern des Heimattages die Vielfalt der siebenbürgischen Trachten zeigen, nicht nur beim Festumzug, bei dem die Heimatortsgemeinschaften ja immer sehr gut vertreten sind, sondern auch durch andere Programmepunkte. Schon bei der Eröffnungsfeier am Samstagvormittag wird der Chor der HOG Reußmarkt in der prachtvollen Tracht des Unterwaldes auftreten. Des Weiteren werden wir auf die Unterstützung der alten Heimat und die Erhaltung des siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Kulturgutes hinweisen.

Höhepunkt des Heimattages ist der Trachtenumzug. Haben sich die Heimatortsgemeinschaften dafür etwas Besonderes vorgenommen?

Um die Vielfalt der Trachten besser zur Geltung zu bringen, werden die Heimatortsgemeinschaften nach Regionen gegliedert aufmarschieren – mit eigenen Schildern, die

sen von Ansprechpartnern für Kirchenrenovierungen zusammentragen.

Sehr beliebt ist die Brauchtumsveranstaltung am Samstagnachmittag. Was erwartet die Besucher unter dem Titel „Gut behauptet, behütet und betucht“? Wird dabei die Trachtenvielfalt der verschiedenen Regionen Siebenbürgens berücksichtigt?

Wir wollen möglichst vielfältige siebenbürgisch-sächsische Trachten zusammen mit dem Bundesfrauenreferat unter der Leitung von Enni Janesch und unter der Moderation von Ines Wenzel vorstellen. Wir hoffen, dass alle Regionen Siebenbürgens und alle Altersgruppen vom Kind bis zur Oma/Opa sowie alle Trachtenarten (Kirchentracht, Festtracht, Tanztracht etc.) vertreten sein werden. Allerdings sind wir auf Hilfe angewiesen. Leider sind bisher noch nicht alle Trachtenregionen Siebenbürgens vertreten. Daher rufe ich alle Landsleute mit siebenbürgisch-sächsischer Tracht auf, sich bis zum 7. Mai bei uns zu melden!

Ebenfalls im Zeichen der Brauchtumspflege steht die Kirchenpelzausstellung von Elisabeth Folberth. Was wird hier konkret gezeigt?

Elisabeth Folberth hat eine riesige Vielfalt an Mustern von Kirchenpelzen erfasst. Ihre Aufzeichnungen (sehr viele von Hand) sollen auch die Herstellung der Kirchenpelze dokumentieren. Mit ihren wunderbaren Aufzeichnungen will Frau Folberth das Handwerk der Kirchenpelzerstellung dokumentieren und sichern, wissend, dass Kirchenpelze auch dem Verfall geweiht sind. Neben den Aufzeichnungen und Dokumenten werden in der Ausstellung auch Kirchenpelze der verschiedenen Regionen Siebenbürgens gezeigt.

Wie weit sind die Vorbereitungen zu den verschiedenen Programmepunkten gediehen, wo ist nach Ihrer Meinung noch Handlungsbedarf?

Viele Programmepunkte sind gut in der Vorbereitung, aber es gibt noch einiges zu tun, etwa bei der Brauchtumsveranstaltung. Damit der Heimattag zur Geltung kommt, sollten sich möglichst viele Besucher einfinden. Ich lade daher alle ein, den Heimattag nicht nur am Sonntag, sondern auch am Samstag zu besuchen. Wir, der HOG-Verband und die Heimatortsgemeinschaften, werden mit allen Kräften zu einem guten Gelingen des Heimattages beitragen. Ich kann nur jedem raten: Kommt nach Dinkelsbühl und ihr werdet über das Pfingstwochenende eine Menge siebenbürgischer Kultur erleben.

Arbeiten an der Bistritzer Stadtpfarrkirche im Zeitplan

Liebe Bistritzer, liebe Landsleute und Sympathisanten der Bistritzer, es ist mir eine Freude berichten zu können, dass die Arbeiten an der Kirche und am Turm voranschreiten und der vorgegebene Zeitplan eingehalten wird. Geplant ist in diesem Jahr die Fertigstellung des Kirchendaches, des Turmdaches sowie der Innenausbau des Turmes. Das gesamte Kirchendach bis auf den Chorbereich ist abgedeckt, das Gewölbe der Kirche auf der ganzen Fläche hydroisoliert.



Die Dacharbeiten an der evangelischen Stadtpfarrkirche in Bistritz sind erfreulich weit fortgeschritten. Foto: Lucian Moise

Zurzeit werden die alten Dachlatten entfernt und Ausbesserungen am Dachstuhl vorgenommen. Die abgetragenen Dachziegel werden nach Alter und Qualität sortiert und auf Paletten gelagert. Im Turm sind Zwischenböden und Holzleitern als Arbeitshilfen eingebaut. Es wird schon am Turmdachstuhl gezimmert.

Das aus Italien gekaufte neue Stahlgerüst und Lastenaufzug für den Turm sind nebst einer Mannschaft zum Aufbau aus Italien eingetroffen. Am Boden um den Turm wurde eine Betonplatte für das Gerüst gegossen, die nach Beendigung der Arbeiten wieder abgetragen wird. Der Gerüstaufbau schreitet zügig voran. Am 29. April war man schon knapp unter der Galerie.

Die Planungsarbeiten sind bis auf Detailfragen erstellt und können zur Genehmigung vorgelegt werden (Termin: 13. Mai 2009). Am 22. April hat das Abschlussgespräch mit dem technischen Leiter der Glockengießerei Perner aus Passau, Günter Granz, in Bistritz stattgefunden. Stadtpräfekt Krauss, Hauptanwalt Gunesch und der Unterzeichner haben Einzelheiten dazu erörtert. Technische Fragen zur Statik, Stromversorgung und Platzfragen wurden mit Vertretern des Architekturbüros und der Baufirma Creativ vor Ort im Turm erörtert.

Die Entscheidung, die Glockengießerei aus Passau zu beauftragen, ist nach Prüfung der Angebote im Einvernehmen mit der Landeskirche und der Bistritzer Kirchengemeinde erfolgt. Die HOG Bistritz-Nösse ist Auftraggeber und Vertragspartner der Glockengießerei und wird auch die Rechnung bezahlen. Es werden drei Bronzeglock-

en gegossen (2 450kg / 1 600 mm Durchmesser, 1 200 kg / 1 260 mm Durchmesser und 720 kg / 1 060 mm Durchmesser), die im Turm im Bereich der oberen Schallfenster über der Endstation des zu bauenden Fahrstuhls aufgehängt werden. Die Montage der Glocken und der Turmuhr wird von der Passauer Firma Ende September vorgenommen. Die Glocken werden durch das Turminnere per Seilwinde hochgezogen und in einem Holzglockenstuhl nebeneinander angebracht. Läutwerk und Uhrschlagwerk werden elektrisch betrieben und elektronisch gesteuert. Das Steuerungsmodul soll in der Sakristei untergebracht werden und für alle Feierlichkeiten vorprogrammiert werden. Für besondere Anlässe, wie Beerdigungen, können die Glocken per Funk ferngesteuert aktiviert werden. Die Firma Perner übernimmt die übliche Garantie über zehn Jahre für Glocken, Joch und Glockenstuhl. Im ersten Jahr nach der Montage erfolgt eine kostenlose Wartung, in den Folgejahren muss eine kostenpflichtige Wartung vereinbart werden, um die Garantie nicht zu verlieren. Für Elektronik und elektrische Teile wie Läutewerk und Uhr wird eine Garantie für zwei Jahre übernommen.

Die Zahlungen sind fällig: 30 Prozent bei Auftragsvergabe, 30 % bei Gus und Restzahlung nach Inbetriebnahme. Die erste Zahlung (35 700 Euro) wurde bereits getätigt. Durch die großzügige Spende aus der Schweiz von Kirchengemeinde Rheinfelden (32 951 Euro) ist die Finanzierung des Projekts Glocken und Turmuhr von insgesamt rund 119 000 Euro

Sammelspenden bei feierlichen Anlässen für die Stiftung Siebenbürgische Bibliothek

Oft haben die Spenden von Institutionen, z. B. von Nachbarschaften, Kreisgruppen, Heimatortsgemeinschaften, ihren Ursprung in Aufrufen an die Mitglieder, anlässlich von Veranstaltungen die Stiftung beim Aufbau zu unterstützen. Genau wie bei Spenden von Einzelpersonen ehrt die Stiftung diese Organisationen durch einen Eintrag in die Stiftertafel, sobald die Summe der gespendeten Beträge 1 000 Euro erreicht hat.

Ab jedem Eintrag wird von neuem aufgerechnet, was zur Folge hat, dass einige Personen und Institutionen bereits mehrfach in der Stiftertafel geführt werden. Sammelspenden bieten auch Familien oder Einzelpersonen, etwa bei Geburtstagen, Familienfeiern, oder anderen festlichen Anlässen, eine gute Gelegenheit für einen ehrenden Eintrag in die Stiftertafel.

Die Idee dabei ist, lieber etwas zu verschenken, als Geschenke anzunehmen. In einer Zeit, in der es zunehmend schwieriger wird, ein originelles oder nützliches Gastgeschenk zu finden, weil die Haushalte oftmals komplett ausgestattet sind, entschließen sich manche Jubilare und andere Gastgeber zum Verzicht auf persönliche Geschenke. Sie bitten vielmehr die geladenen Gäste und Gratulanten, stattdessen einen entsprechenden Betrag für die Stiftung bereitzustellen oder mit dem Vermerk des Anlasses direkt zu überweisen. Auf diese Weise können sie gleichzeitig drei Erfolge für sich verbuchen: Erstens beherzigen sie die Maxime: Geben ist seliger denn Nehmen; zweitens tun sie eine für die Gemeinschaft nützliche Tat; und drittens vermeiden sie damit eine Anhäufung unnötiger oder mehrfach vorhandener Gegenstände in der Wohnung.

Die eingesammelten Beträge überweist der Gastgeber an die Stiftung. Ist die überwiesene Summe allein oder zusammen mit vorherigen Spenden groß genug, erfolgt ein Eintrag in die Stiftertafel. Überweisen die Gratulanten ihre Beträge direkt an die Stiftung, können sie ihre Bilanz für einen Eintrag verbessern.

Des Öfteren werden Spendenaufrufe auch dafür genutzt, verstorbener Angehöriger durch einen ehrenden Eintrag in die Stiftertafel dauerhaft zu gedenken. Manchmal ist es sogar der Wille des Verstorbenen, dass bei seiner Beisetzung auf Blumen und Kränze weitgehend verzichtet wird und die Trauergemeinde stattdessen die Stiftung unterstützt. Damit erweist er unserer siebenbürgisch-sächsischen Gemeinschaft noch einen letzten Dienst, für den ihr diese in Dankbarkeit verbunden bleibt. Unabhängig davon, wie die Marke von 1 000 Euro erreicht oder überschritten wird, sei es durch Sammelaktion, Einzelüberweisungen mit dem Vermerk des Anlasses oder kombiniert, wird der Verstorbene mit dem Zusatz post mortem in die Stiftertafel eingetragen und damit für sein Engagement gewürdigt.

What to expect this year, next year The stimulus package and you

The \$787 billion stimulus package, signed by President Barack Obama, includes tax benefits and spending increases that will directly benefit many Americans.

Reduction in income tax: The IRS is updating withholding tables to incorporate the Making Work Pay tax credit of \$400 for singles and \$800 for couples. When employers receive the new tables, the changes will be made.

First time homebuyer tax credit: Singles with income of up to \$75,000 and couples earning up to \$150,000 who buy their first home (or who haven't owned a home in the last three years) can claim a tax credit of up to \$8,000, or \$4,000 for singles, which does not have to be paid back. The home must be bought between January 1 and December 1 (not December 31) of 2009.

This is an "above the line" tax credit, which means you don't have to itemize taxes to get it.

New car tax credit in 2009: Individual taxpayers who earn up to \$125,000 in 2009 (\$250,000 for couples) will be able to deduct state taxes, local sales taxes and excise taxes paid for the purchase of any new car, light truck, recreational vehicle or motorcycle priced at up to \$49,500. This is also an "above the line" tax credit.

New car tax credit in 2010 and 2011: Taxpayers can claim a tax credit of up to \$2,500 for the purchase of a plug-in hybrid until manufacturers sell more than 200,000 of them. The credit starts at \$417.

One-time check for Social Security, Supplemental Security Income, railroad retirement benefits and veter-

ans disability compensation: \$250 checks are scheduled to be mailed in June 2009.

For the unemployed

Unemployment benefits: Beginning on March 2, unemployment benefits increased by \$25. For 2009, the stimulus plan exempts the first \$2,400 of unemployment benefits from federal income taxes.

Job training funds: The stimulus increases money states get for job training. To find a local job training program, visit www.servicelocator.org.

COBRA assistance: Those who lost jobs between September 1, 2008 and February 17, 2009 will have government assistance to pay for 65 percent of COBRA healthcare coverage.

Food stamps: Beginning in April, qualified recipients will get an additional \$20 to \$24 in stamps each month.

Pell Grants: The recovery bill increases the maximum Pell Grant, funds for low-income undergraduates and certain post-graduate college students, by \$500 for two years starting July 1. Maximum grant for 2009 will be \$5,350. It will be \$5,500 in 2010.

Higher education tax credit: The new \$2,500 annual tax credit can be claimed on tax returns filed in 2010 and 2011.

529 plans and computer expense: Money withdrawn from a 529 college savings plan is taxable if not used for a qualifying expense. Under the stimulus plan, computer-related expenses are allowable.

Have a Safe Memorial Day Weekend







One way we can show our appreciation is to do whatever we can to help returning service people. They have a big task ahead in readjusting their lives and their minds back to civilian life.


What could you do?

Dawdling over a shot can make your 'swing key' disappear

Swingkeys--those thoughts, visions or sensations that you focus on just before a shot--have very short lifespans.

Golf expert

John Paul Newport tells of golf pro Bert Yancy who had a swing key that lasted six months.



It was a vision of a high-drawing seven-iron shot that hopped twice on the green and stopped near the pin. The key worked time after time. Then it went away and no one knows why.

Swing keys lasting that long are rare. Most golfers are lucky to go one round with an intact swing thought.

Bobby Jones wrote that the magic of a swing key was good for only a short time, then it becomes blurred as the golfer adds to it or takes

something away, never returning to the key.

Sam Snead, says Newport, wrote that he tried to play

in sort of a daze as far as his swing was concerned. He tried to settle on what the shot should look like and visualize it before hand, to sense how it would feel to make it happen, then let it happen.

One pro golf coach, quoted in The Wall Street Journal, says people who think about their swings are telling their brain that they don't know how to swing. On the course, they should focus on a positive vision of the shot and swing away.

Another golf coach says the best swing keys, like, "swing easy," are broad in nature. The most powerful swing thoughts are forward-oriented, like "swing through the ball."

A third authority claims that human beings will lose focus after six to eight seconds at most. If you take longer than that, your swing key will disappear.


