



The club would like to wish a warm welcome to Brother Rick Hartig who will be joining the club membership.



Help to Restore the Evangelical Church in Bistritz

There was a disastrous fire that hit the Evangelical Church in Bistritz, a church that has been a part of the Transylvanian Saxon community for nearly 700 years.

A restoration project was recently completed to preserve this beautiful church. Then, this misfortune happened that destroyed the church tower and part of the roof. *This church is a part of our history and we must help to rebuild it*!

Analyzing study data, researchers found that, during an 18-year period, the relative risk of death decreased among study subjects in direct proportion to the amount of coffee they drank.

The coffee consumption was self-reported among the 41,736 men and 86,214 women in the Nurse's Health Study and the Health Professionals Follow-up Study. Researchers divided subjects into six categories ranging from less than one cup per month to more than six cups per day. They found that the relative risk of death from all causes decreased in proportion to higher coffee intake. The decrease in deaths was primarily due to fewer cardiovascular deaths.



Archäologische Forschungen in Marienburg

Vergangenes Jahr berichtete die Siebenbürgische Zeitung über "Neue Gräberfunde bei Marienburg – Archäologische Forschungen auf den Spuren der deutschen Siedler im Burzenland". Der Leser erhielt Kenntnis von Teilergebnissen der Grabungen in der Nekropole der mittelalterlichen Siedlung bei Marienburg, die nach einer Unterbrechung von sieben Jahren 2006 wieder aufgenommen worden waren dank finanzieller Unterstützung des Vorsitzenden der Siebenbürgisch-Sächsischen Stiftung München, Dipl.-Ing. Hans Christian Habermann. Die Grabungen konnten in den Monaten Juni bis Juli 2007 fortgeführt werden.

Ziel dieser Grabung war die Bestimmung der nördlichen und westlichen Grenze der Nekropole, die den ersten deutschen Siedlern, die sich im 12. Jahrhundert in Marienburg niederließen, zugeschrieben werden kann. Darüber hinaus versuchte man zu ermitteln, ob im Kirchhof Fundamente verschiedener Bauten noch erhalten geblieben sind. So wurden zwischen dem Kirchenchor und der Befestigungsmauer und im südlichen Bereich des Kirchhofs jeweils ein Suchgraben und außerhalb des Kirchhofes zusätzlich auch noch eine Grabungsfläche angelegt.

Insgesamt wurden 30 neue Fundkomplexe erforscht, von denen fünf Gräber aus der zweiten Hälfte des 12. Jahr124) wurden ein Erwachsener und ein Kind bestattet, während das Grab (M. 126) ohne Nische versehen war, was darauf hindeuten könnte, dass es aus dem 13. oder 14. Jahrhundert datiert. Das Grab (M. 127) ist im Bereich des Schädels von einer anderen Bestattung zerstört worden, so dass man nicht mehr nachvollziehen konnte, ob es auch mit einer Nische versehen war. Die Gräber waren weitgehend beigabenlos. Eine Ausnahme stellen einige Eisennägel im Grab M. 124 dar. hunderts und 25 Gräber aus dem 14. bis 17. Jahrhundert stammen. Die Gräber aus dem 12. Da die Nischengräber in beiden Suchschnitten gefunden wurden, kann man annehmen, dass die Nekropole aus dem 12. Jahrhundert sich sowohl gegen Norden als auch gegen Westen - also außerhalb des archäologisch erschlossenen Areals noch weiter ausdehnt. Das deutet darauf hin, dass die Niederlassung, deren Siedler in der zweiten Hälfte des 12. Jahrhunderts hier beigesetzt wurden, ziemlich groß gewesen sein muss. Die Gräber aus späterer Zeit unterschieden sich von denen aus dem 12. Außer den erwähnten Funden entdeckte man Tonscherben aus der Bronze- und Römerzeit sowie dem Mittelalter. In Anbetracht der zahlreichen Bestattungen waren die Grabbeigaben und das archäologische Fundmaterial insgesamt sehr durchmischt, so dass stratigraphische Beobachtungen hinsichtlich der Altersfolge der Schichtgesteine praktisch unmöglich sind.

Bis jetzt fanden sich im Hof der Kirche keine archäologischen Belege, aufgrund derer die Präsenz der Kreuzritter hier nachgewiesen werden konnten. 

FRUITCAKE Wordoku



Wordoku is another form of sudoku. It simply uses letters instead of numbers. You just make sure that each 3x3 square region has the 9 letters indicated and that the letter only occurs once. Each column and row of the large grid must have only one instance of each letter.

Here's a tip for playing. We'll call the 3x3 squares "regions." With a highlighter, color in all the rows in the large grid and all the columns in the larger grid that have an A in them. We chose A because there are several of them in the puzzle.

Now observe. In the middle column in the middle region, what is the only possible location for the A?

This technique is called "scanning" and you usually do it with your eyes and not a marker.

The difficulty rating on this puzzle is easy.

The nine letters used in this Wordoku spell the holiday favorite: F R U I T C A K E.

More demand for defibrillators

Since the death of newsman Tim Russert, more people are realizing that the number one killer in America is sudden cardiac arrest.

The most effective emergency treatment is a defibrillator. It increases the odds of survival from 2 percent to 50 percent. The odds are even better if the device is used within three to four minutes of a heart attack.

No one knows if Russert could have been saved. There was at defibrillator at his NBC office, but it wasn't used until paramedics arrived.

Doctors at UCLA School of Medicine say CPR is the only thing that will keep a patient alive long enough for the paramedics to arrive and defibrillate. The window of opportunity is tiny, only five to seven minutes before brain damage begins.

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
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
