PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

Attention all Branch Treasurers: Please remember to file your Branch's Form 990 or the 990-N Electronic Postcard by May 15. Every ATS Branch is required to file one of these two types of information forms. Although each Branch is exempt from Federal income tax because of the ATS's exemption, each Branch still has an annual filing requirement. If the annual gross receipts for a Branch are normally \$50,000 or less, the 990-N e-postcard can be submitted online with the IRS. If the annual gross receipts are normally greater than \$50,000, a traditional Form 990 is required. If a Branch goes for three years without filing, the IRS will cancel that Branch's exemption. If this happens, the Branch will be required to pay Federal income taxes, just like every other corporation. Once you have filed either one of these types of 990s, please mail a copy to the ATS Home Office for our files.

The 108th ATS Convention is fast approaching. Have you finished your craft item to be entered into the Saxon Handicraft Exhibit? Remember, you do not have to be a delegate to the Convention to submit a Handicraft item. If you are a delegate, have you (or your Branch) made your meal reservations and your hotel reservations? Even if you are not a delegate to the Convention, you are welcome to make a meal reservation for Saturday evening at the Youngstown Saxon Club.

Do you live in an area where you could see the total solar eclipse earlier this week? As I write this article a week before, the forecast is for a rainy and cloudy day. Most of the area schools have cancelled classes for the day. City and county offices will be closed, as well as many businesses. Tourists from all over the country and even the world are descending on northeast Ohio. The total solar eclipse is projected to be the US's largest mass travel event this

Did you know that on April 12, 1633, the inquisition of physicist and astronomer Galileo Galilei began? The chief inquisitor appointed by Pope Urban VIII ordered Galileo to turn himself in to the Holy Office to begin a trial for holding the belief that the Earth revolves around the sun, which was deemed as heresy by the Catholic Church. Standard practice, at that time, demanded that during the trial, the accused be imprisoned and secluded. According to History. com, this was the second time that Galileo was at odds with the Church for refusing to accept their orthodoxy that the Earth was the immovable center of the universe. The first time was in 1616, when he

was forbidden from holding or defending his beliefs. In the 1633 interrogation, Galileo denied that he "held" belief, but continued to write about the issue and evidence as a means of "discussion" rather than belief. The Church had decided the idea that the sun moved around the Earth was an absolute fact of scripture that could not be disputed, despite the fact that scientists had known for centuries that the Earth was not the center of the universe.

This second time, however, Galileo's arguments did not win. On June 22, 1633, the Church handed down the following order: "We pronounce, judge, and declare, that you, Galileo, have rendered yourself vehemently suspected by this Holy Office of heresy, that is, of having believed and held the doctrine (which is false and contrary to the Holy and Divine Scriptures) that the sun is the center of the world, and that it does not move from east to west, and that the earth does move, and is not the center of the world." The penalty included Galileo's book entitled Dialogues of Galileo Galilei be prohibited and condemned him to the prison of the Holy Office. He was also ordered to recite once a week for three years the Seven Penitential

Galileo agreed not to teach the heresy anymore and spent the rest of his life under house arrest. It took more than 300 years for the Church to admit that Galileo was right and to clear his name of heresy.

2024 Election of ATS National Officers

At the upcoming ATS Convention that is being hosted by Branch 30 - Youngstown on May 18 -19, 2024, the following offices (all with four-year terms) were scheduled for election:

> President Second Vice President Secretary

> > 2 Trustees

However, with the passing of our First Vice President, Robert B. Cunningham III, in the middle of his term, a shuffling of positions is happening due to filling the vacancy for the office of First Vice President.

Nomination forms for individuals wishing to run for office had to be submitted to the ATS Board of Directors and received by March 15, 2024. The following ATS members have submitted their nomination forms for the following offices:

- Monica F. Gilles (currently Secretary) running for Secretary (4 year term)
- **Debbie Ferguson** running for Trustee Barbara A. Spack (currently Trustee) running for Trustee
- Jacob F. Spor (currently Trustee) running for Trustee

Delegates will be limited to voting for two Trustees only. The two nominees with the highest votes will receive the 4-year terms and the other nominee will receive the unexpired two-year term left open by Trustee Michael Bachinger moving to 3rd Vice President.

A brief background of each nominee follows.

ATS President Denise A Crawford Member of Branch 8 Alliance, OH (Incumbent)

Denise Crawford has served on the ATS Board of Directors since 1989. She held the position of Secretary until 1999 when she was elected as Treasurer. She moved from Alliance, Ohio to Parma in 2016 when taking over the position of Home Office Manager in the ATS Home Office. In 2020, she was elected to the position of President. Why grocery carts have wonky wheels

Practically everyone has been there. You're pushing a cart along in your favorite grocery store and everything seems fine. Then you hear it: The dreaded cart squeak. A moment later, one of the wheels develops a mind of its own, spinning this way and that. Next thing you know, you're dragging the cart like it's a stubborn mule.

Does it seem like every grocery store shopping cart has a broken wheel? Turns out, there's a good reason for that. Head to a pharmacy or a clothing store -- rather than a grocery store -- and the cart's wheels are typically far less rebellious.

Why? It's all in how folks use the carts that makes the difference.


Carts in stores with lighter shopping loads, like clothing stores and pharmacies, often stay inside the store rather than getting pushed into the parking lot. Customers can typically carry their purchases



without assistance. Grocery store trips, however, often involve bigger loads, so customers are more prone to pushing carts out into the parking lot, according to CNN.

Outside, grocery carts are bombarded with rain and snow. Collisions are common, potholes are more ubiquitous, and the wheels collect much more dirt and debris. Crucially, the caster plates that attach the wheels to the cart can warp over time, which is perhaps the biggest reason the wheels go haywire.

Those carts are not cheap either. Stores can pay well over \$200 per cart.





How to catch and release a fish

These steps help you return a fish to the water so it can be caught again. They are from The Complete Idiot's Guide to Fishing Basics (Alpha).

- Land your fish as soon as you can. Don't play the fish to exhaustion. Keep it in the water as long as possible while you remove the hook.
- Handle it carefully. Wet your hands. Be careful of the fish's dorsal and pectoral spines. Some fish have sharp spines on their fins.
- Gently remove the hook. Use pliers or forceps. Barb-



less hooks are easier to remove.

• Don't throw the fish back. Cradle it in your hands while moving it slowly forward and backward so water flows through its mouth and gills. Release the fish once it shows it can swim on its own.

Tiny plastic bits exist in food, soil, and water

Microplastics, bits of plastic that are less than five millimeters, are everywhere on Earth -- in our food, soil, and water.

A study by the University of Newcastle in Australia estimates that every person consumes about five grams of plastic every week. That would be like eating a credit card.

Microplastics come from everywhere. Some are created with the breakdown of larger items, including synthetic clothing that shed bits when washed, car tires, or paint flakes. Some microplastics are manufactured for use in other products like makeup or sunscreen.

In food, fruits and vegetables contain the bits, probably from the water taken in by roots. But plastics are also present in beer, rice, honey, tea, and salt.

At this point, it is not possible to avoid microplastics



entirely. They are literally in the apples on the trese, the snow in the Arctic, and the sands of the deserts.

Experts at Rutgers University say the scientific community is still speculating what impact micro-

However, you can avoid using plastic containers, single-use bags, and plastic packing materials. You can try to replace plastic tubes and bottles in everything from water to shampoo.

Experts at Rutgers University say the scientific community is still speculating what impact microplastics have on human health. There is some possibility that they can affect hormones and reproduction, and absorb chemicals and toxins before entering the human body.

Student loan match plan may help young employees

Student loan payments have emerged as one of the primary obstacles to retirement saving, but a new plan may change that.

Provisions in the Secure 2.0 Act are designed to help the 28 million student borrowers pay their loans and start retirement savings.

The student loan match works much like employer match with a 401(k). Employers can match loan payments as contributions to an employer-sponsored re-



tirement plan like a 401(k). That means employees would be able to save for retirement just by repaying their student loans. Employers would be able to match dollar-for-dollar or as a per-

centage of the annual pay.

It is still unknown how many employers will implement the benefit. In a 2023 survey by the National Association of Plan Advisors, fewer than 5 percent of the firms surveyed say they have or will add student loan matching.

Some research suggests that employees are more likely to stay with a company when loan match is in place, according to Money.

GERMAN HISTORY COLUMBUS-EDUCATION

Through reading 'The Columbus Germans' by La Vern J. Rippley and reading articles from the Columbus Dispatch and Books by Myron T. Seifer on the Columbus Firsts in Public Education.

German language and education was prevalent in Ohio and particularly in Columbus. While public schools did not start in Ohio until the 1830's there were private schools that had begun in many cities and communi-

German education initially was associated with the German churches. Many of the churches served as churches on Sundays and then as schools during the week. Columbus was a pioneer in German schools. Initially, Germans in Columbus had at least nine of these schools. The schools handled a variety of subjects but more times than naught would teach religion, the bible and music, in addition to educational curriculum.

Pressure was exerted on the Ohio Legislature, allowing reading, writing and arithmetic, but also the teaching of German as a foreign language. Columbus was successful in setting up three German public schools, one dating back to 1839. The schools were so successful that they saw a 50% increase in students very quickly. This caused the Board of Education to build new schools at Fourth and Court streets to house exclusively German students. The number of schools continued to increase as the interest in the schools increased. The German schools became so popular that even non-German educators supported these schools.

Eventually, German was used so extensively that German language was incorporated in the schools along with English in three buildings; The Central School (near Mound & Fourth), The Third Street School (south of Beck on Third Street, and South Street School (near Fulton and Washington). In addition the South German School-Suburban-one room school, used as a course of study at the high school level.

Initially, the German public schools increased at such a rapid pace, that the Board of Education proposed that in the early grades that all instruction would be in German. The concept was introduced, that a gradual transition from the early grades would transition to an English speaking study by the completion of the fifth grade.

Reports indicated that many Americans sent their children to the German schools as the schools demonstrated superiority in education and the opportunity they provided in language learning.

It should be noted the Columbus Public Schools were the first in the country to teach the German language in depth.

German books of every kind were made a part of the Columbus City Library. One section was reserved for German children, mostly from the southend, who were able to read the German literature in their language.

The first German Artillery Company recruited from local schools. The students who signed up were expected to serve for a five-year period. Captain Otto Zirckel recruited 90 youths for a German Volunteer Military Company.

The idea for Kindergartens originated in Blankenburg, Germany, in 1837, by Friedrich Froebel. Caroline Frankenberg was a student of Froebel. While another individual was supposedly credited with starting the first Kindergarten in the U.S, Miss Frankenberg brought the Kindergarten concept from Germany to Columbus in the late 1830s, which predates any other kindergarten concept in America. The school was established at the SE corner of Rich and Pearl Alley.

Professor Anton Liebold was a pioneer in Physical and Gymnastic Education. He developed handbooks and methods of instruction. His manuals discussed instruction and training by documenting the systematic processes in teaching physical education. He was the first full time physical education head of Columbus public schools. Much of his instructions followed German formats of physical education. His books and instructions would become official instructions on a national level and would be incorporated in other school and college programs.

German schools and the German students were among the first in Columbus to hold a variety of entertainments in the school building. Holidays of various nature and German entertainment, generally musicals and military drills and exhibitions were prominent in the German schools. On the last day of school the German schools initiated picnics and entertainment concepts.

The first German classes in the high school, taught by JC Christian taught German at the high schools at \$0.50 per lesson.

German schools and education was expanding at phenominal rates up until when the war broke out in 1914. The affect was tremendous. The schools went from 4,340 students taking German and plummeted to zero.

In addition to the public school system of Columbus

were challenges facing higher education. The story of Capital University begins in 1830. Under the leadership of Wilhelm Schmidt, a young German theologian, a seminary was started the Schmidt home in Canton, Ohio. A few months later it moved and was located on South High Street in Columbus. Students came from all over the state and did not have a strong basis of the German language. Due to the language challenge lectures had to be given in English. The board recruited Charles R. Schaefer to become the successor to Schmidt. English became the accepted language of teaching. The board appointed German born, Friederick Winckler as the new professor of the seminary. Winckler took a hard stand on the letter of the constitution that German was the only authorized language of instruction. Schaefer had already resigned so Winckler won his victory. There was one problem. The English constituency of the Zanesville Lutheran Synod withdrew its financial support. The only way to solve the problem was to implement that instruction would be in English and German. A way to address the problem was to hire Reverend William F. Lehman (Lehman would have a residential building dedicated in his name-the building has since been demolished), a master of both languages. Eventually, Lehman would become president of the seminary. It appeared as though Lehman had resolved the issues and problems, up and until his death. There were several successors after Lehman's death. The staunch support of the German factions of the seminary held it together but it was not amiable. The German factions said the seminary was getting too English and the English factions said it was too German for their liking. This went on for decades. In 1902, the "Eight...!"

Board of Education, there

General Assembly of German Lutheran Seminary voted to change the name to Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio and other states made a last ditch effort to hold things together. There was even an effort considered to ask the King of Prussia to raise money in his kingdom to endow a German professorship. Nothing ever came of it. A final effort was made to have a percentage of the Lutheran Book of Concern (Sermons on the Gospel by Matthias Loy) and all the profits of the Kirchenzeitung (church newspaper) would allow one man to devote his entire time to the German language and literature. The profits were substantial but the money would be put away into the general fund instead of being used for the endowment. The bickering continued until 1910. The board officially decided to discontinue the instruction of German for classroom instruction. It was deemed too expensive to support the dual language system for instruction, instructional material and books.

As you can see from the articles, Germans in Columbus have had a tremendously positive affect on so many diverse areas of the educational community.

We will continue to explore other areas in which the Germans had an impact on Columbus.

Today the church still exhibits the basic characteristics of the three-aisle Romanesque basilica that originally had a six-level western tower. The ensemble was surrounded by a ring wall, which was fortified starting in 1430, when the Ottoman attacks occurred. A second fortification wall was built, as well as several defence towers and a moat. The church itself was also strengthened: defence towers were built above the chancel and its apse and above the two side entrances. The western Romanesque portal is ornamented with typical interlace. The spire roof with corner towers was built as early as 1591. Especially valuable are the altars from other village churches, which are displayed inside. These were brought to Heltau for safety reasons.

Place and surroundings

The legend of the fortified church of Cisnădie tells us that a great treasure was once hidden inside. After numerous Ottoman attacks in the 15th Century the village community built a secret chamber within the castle walls. Access was secured with a massive oak door, which could only be opened by pressing a hidden spring. From the outside, the

entrance was camouflaged so well that only few insiders could find it. Not even the priests knew about it. Over the centuries, the knowledge of this hidden entrance got lost. At the beginning of the 20th Century it was rediscovered and can be visited today. In addition, not secretly hidden, but visible from far away visitors can spot the first clock tower in Transylvania, which is operated since 1425, and the first lightning rod in Transylvania dating back to 1795. The bell ringer of Heltau provides expert guided tours of the fortification and the church affiliated museum and has many more stories and legends to share.

Hegt wird gesangen!: "Det Frähjohr kitt än de Wegden"

It's hard to believe that the popular song "Det Frähjohr kitt än de Wegden" (Spring Comes to the Willows) will celebrate its 100th birthday in four years! Over time it has become part of the public domain and only a few people know its creator.

The lyrics of the song sparkle with joy of life. Imagine the long, cold winters in the farmhouse parlors 100 years ago. In the first weeks of spring not only did the ever-changing cycle of nature begin, but at the same time the spring customs also began.

The boys in some villages used to attach branches with pussy willows to the windows or gates of the houses where their sweethearts lived. Catkin branches in a vase by the window were supposed to protect the house from evil spirits. Flirchers (flures, flutes) made from young willow bark also had an established place in earlier spring customs: the boys made them sound loudly to scare witches. (Carl Göllner "In the cycle of the year", Kriterion-Verlag Bucharest, 1987, p. 58)

Even today people still like to put the pretty Palmitzker in the vase as a herald of spring. Grandfathers teach their grandchildren to beat flutes made of willow branches. Declarations of love and driving away evil spirits are no longer associated with it, you simply enjoy spring and perhaps feel transported in space and time.

Grete Lienert-Zultner (*1906 Malm-krog, †1989 Traunreut) was a gifted song writer and is one of the best-known and most popular dialect poets in Transylvania. In 1925 she completed the teachers' seminar in Sighisoara. In 1926 she married the notary Michael Lienert. In addition to her family, she was also active in the women's association and gave lectures and recitals together with Anna Schuller-Schullerus. During

her years as a teacher in Waldhütten, Neithausen, Neustadt, Denndorf and Schaas, she created numerous plays and musical plays (e.g.: "Äm Ihr uch Gläck", "Bäm Brännchen", "Wieht de Fånn hiemen?", "Fosnicht hu mer"), " Bauernliesel", "Das Salzfass" and others), in which she incorporated several of her songs in folk music. Through the theater performances, their songs quickly spread and became popular: "De Astern", "De Schnieglekelcher blähn", "Der Owend kitt errun", "Iwwer de Stoppeln", "De Birkeblädder fallen", "Ställ uch fridlich", "Sälwerfäddem" and many more).

From 1963 the family lived in Sighisoara, where Grete Lienert-Zultner founded a singing group, which Paul Schuller, music professor at the Bergschule, transformed into a chamber choir in 1965, which existed until 2001. In 1967 and 1968, this choir recorded a total of 26 dialect songs on two records for Electrecord Bucharest. In 1978 the family moved to the Federal Republic. Here Grete Lienert-Zultner published two volumes of poetry "Wat u menjem Wiëj bläht" and "Growing, Blooming, Ripening" and two songbooks "De Astern uch ånder Liedcher" (22 songs) and "Der Owend kit erun uch ånder Lieder" (21 songs). Ernst Irtel praised Grete Lienert-Zultner's songs as follows: "Her melodies are tasteful and noble, always stimulating and imaginative, versatile in expression [...] born from the experience of the village and its people, they also hit right in the heart."

April is Financial Literacy Month

Financial literacy is the ability to understand and make use of a variety of financial skills, including personal financial management, budgeting, and investing. It also means understanding certain financial principles and concepts, such as the time value of money, compound interest, managing debt, and financial planning.



What is Compound Interest?

Compound interest simply means that you are earning interest on both your original money saved and any interest you earn on that original amount. Compound interest has been called the eighth wonder of the world. Albert Einstein is said to have called it one of the greatest mathematical concepts of our time. Another example of compound interest is like a snowball. In year one, you invest or save an amount. That amount earns interest. In year two, you earn interest on the original saved amount plus the interest from the first year. During the third year, you earn interest on your original amount plus the interest earned the first two years. Keep rolling that snowball every year, and it just gets bigger and bigger.

When you are young, you have an asset money can't buy: TIME!

Example 1

At age 20, you start saving \$100 each month until you turn 65. You earn an average of 4% annually, compounded monthly.

Your investment: \$54,000

At age 65, you have \$151,550.

Example 2

You wait until age 50 to start saving. You initially invest \$5,000 and then \$500 monthly until you turn 65. You earn the same 4% return, compounded monthly.

Your investment: \$95,000

At age 65, you have \$132,147

As you can see from the above examples, starting early is definitely the way to go. Even small amounts saved, on a systematic basis, starting when you are young can really add up. In addition, if you could increase that small amount by a little bit each time you get a raise, it will really pay off for you when you retire.

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
