PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

April is Financial Literacy Month. Its purpose is to bring awareness and understanding to our personal finances by helping us to make better-informed decisions that can stretch our dollars further. As a Fraternal Benefit Society, the main purpose of the ATS is to benefit our members. Understanding your financial situation is very important for everyone. Whether you are just graduating from high school and heading to college or to the work force or are an older adult, you need to know and understand your financial assets. What is your wage potential over your lifetime? How many more years until you retire? How much do you have saved for retirement and how much more can you save before that time comes?

As a member of the ATS, do you understand what type of benefit you have with the ATS? Occasionally we get phone calls in the office from people saying, "I have something with you, but I don't know what it is". I thought with April being Financial Literacy Month, this would be a good time to review our membership benefits. Benefits include scholarships, orphan benefits, youth activities (coloring contests, summer camp, International Youth Rallies), cultural activities (choirs, dance groups, bands), and promoting and preserving our Transylvanian Saxon heritage. For you financially, the ATS has two types of membership contracts. One is Life Insurance. The other is an Annuity. Members can have one or the other, or both.

Our life insurance is whole life. This means that as long as the premium payments are being made or have been paid in full, the insurance will cover you for life. We do not sell term insurance. Term insurance is like renting your insurance. You have to keep paying on it to keep it in effect. Once you quit paying, the coverage is gone. Whole life insurance is a great way to help your loved ones get through your death. It can help pay funeral expenses, medical bills, credit card debt, and other expenses.

Our annuities are fixed annuities. This means that they receive a fixed guaranteed interest rate, although it could be earning a higher interest rate. Our annuities are not linked with the stock market. An annuity consists of an agreement between you and an insurance company like the ATS, in which you make a lumpsum payment or a series of payments, earn interest, and in return, receive regular disbursements beginning immediately or at some point in the future. It is intended to be a retirement asset. Quite a number of our members choose this option to become a member of the ATS. The minimum initial deposit is \$300 (\$150 for children under 16). This is not a "membership fee" or "national dues" payment as I've heard it called. It is the first deposit into your retirement account. What you do with the account after that is up to you. Just remember that even small amounts contributed over

To follow up from the last issue, the total solar eclipse in Cleveland was spectacular! My daughters had an eclipse party at their house, complete with eclipse glasses, Milky Way candy bars, Cosmic brownies, Sun chips, Starry and Sunkist pop, Moon pies, Starbursts, Eclipse gum, and a musical playlist of sun, moon and eclipse themed songs. It turned out to be a beautiful day for this historic event.

The Youngstown Saxon Bowlers are hosting the Transylvanian Saxon Bowling Association (TSBA) Convention on June 8. Each city is allowed to send three representatives. I also want to add Get Well Soon wishes to TSBA President Glenn Spack. He recently had surgery, and according to Glenn, all went well. We wish him a speedy recovery.

Speaking of bowling, did you know President Harry

the first White House bowling alley on April 25, 1947? The two-lane alley was situated in the West Wing. The bowling alley was funded by a group of Truman's fellow Missourians, who intended to open the alley as part of Truman's 63rd birthday on May 8. The construction, however, was completed ahead of schedule. Truman knocked down 7 of the 10 pins on his first ball. One of those pins is on display at the Smithsonian Insti-President Truman did not use the alley very much himself but supported the White House Bowling Teams League in 1950. included Secret Service agents, household staff, secretaries, switchboard operators and groundskeepers, according to History. These teams competed across the country where many opponents were surprised to discover that the players were really from the White House.

President Eisenhower

closed the alley in 1955 and turned it into a mimeograph room. Later, another bowling alley was opened next door in the Old Executive Office Building (now called the Eisenhower Building). President Johnson and his wife Lady Bird used this alley frequently. President Nixon also used this second bowling alley until he had an additional one-lane alley installed directly under the North Portico entrance of the White House. Other recreational facilities at the White House include putting greens, swimming pools, a jogging track, a tennis court, and a pool table.

2024 Election of ATS National Officers

At the upcoming ATS Convention that is being hosted by Branch 30 - Youngstown on May 18 -19, 2024, the following offices (all with four-year terms) were scheduled for election:

> President Second Vice President Secretary

> > 2 Trustees

However, with the passing of our First Vice President, Robert B. Cunningham III, in the middle of his term, a shuffling of positions is happening due to filling the vacancy for the office of First Vice President.

Nomination forms for individuals wishing to run for office had to be submitted to the ATS Board of Directors and received by March 15, 2024. The following ATS members have submitted their nomination forms for the following offices:

- Denise A. Crawford (currently President) - running for President (4 year term)
- Monica M. Weber (currently 2nd Vice President) - running for 1st Vice President (unexpired 2 year term)
- Randall B. Floyd (currently 3rd Vice President) - running for 2nd Vice President (4 year term)
- Michael Bachinger (currently Trustee) - running for 3rd Vice President (unexpired 2 year term)
- Monica F. Gilles (currently Secretary) running for Secretary (4 year term)
- **Debbie Ferguson** running for Trustee Barbara A. Spack (currently Trustee) running for Trustee
- Jacob F. Spor (currently Trustee) running for Trustee

Delegates will be limited to voting for two Trustees only. The two nominees with the highest votes will receive the 4-year terms and the other nominee will receive the unexpired two-year term left open by Trustee Michael Bachinger moving to 3rd Vice President.

A brief background of each nominee follows.

ATS President Denise A Crawford Member of Branch 8 Alliance, OH (Incumbent)

Denise Crawford has served on the ATS Board of Directors since 1989. She held the position of Secretary until 1999 when she was elected as Treasurer. She moved from Alliance, Ohio to Parma in 2016 when taking over the position of Home Office Manager in the ATS Home Office. In 2020, she was elected to the position of President. She has served on almost every ATS Committee throughout the years. Denise has served her Local Branch for over 30 years. Funeral insurance is another way. These policies typically build cash value over time. All benefits are paid to beneficiaries, who can shop funeral services to find the best prices. These policies can also be used anywhere in the world.

Prepaid funeral plans also provide the peace of mind that the details of a funeral are established and costs paid. You can pick the ceremony, the plot, and the services. The plans usually lock in a price so that, even if prices go up, your cost remains the same. However, most of these plans don't transfer to another funeral home, nor do they provide any benefits to family.

What happens if you die without family or money? It varies depending on state. In some cases, indigent cases can be cremated others require the signature of a family member. Unclaimed bodies often remain in state morgues for weeks.

founded by J. Sterling Morton of Nebraska in 1872.

Trees are an energy-savhome improvement. They can be as important to energy conservation as insulation or weather-tight windows and doors. They save energy by cooling with shade in the summer and providing a windbreak in winter. Three strategically placed shade trees can reduce air conditioning costs by as much as 30 percent.

Deciduous trees shed their leaves during the winter.

Arbor Day is a nation- They provide shade and ally celebrated observance block heat during hotter months. By dropping their leaves in the fall, they admit sunlight in the colder months. Place these trees on the south and west sides of buildings. Shade hard surfaces such as driveways to minimize heat load.

Evergreens retain their leaves or needles throughout the year. As windbreaks, they can save a significant amount of the energy a home uses for heating. Place them on the north side of your home. Evergreens also provide shade in the summer.

When the worst happens, what should you say?

To her Facebook friends, it came as a shock. Above all the usual photos of the birds she snapped on her daily walks was a simple, yet devastating, post:

"I had hoped for 'hope' when I had my oncology appointment ... But that was not the case. I have terminal cancer ..."

Not unexpectedly, an outpouring of grief and prayers swamped her Facebook feed. It was a stunningly rare type of post. More often, the sick and dying simply become ill and never post again on social media, and then one day, a relative makes the official death announcement on their page.

But this was different and it is something social media users might consider.

Is it useful to make such a post? For those who have a lot of cyber friends who live very far away, such an announcement can be helpful, since they might have no idea that their friend is ill in any way. Of course, it limits privacy for the person experiencing a terminal illness, and that's a consideration.

What should they say? Be sure to say whether visitors or calls are welcome -- and it is perfectly acceptable if they are not. A useful phrase: "I am not taking calls or visits right now as I come to terms with what is before me."

How much to reveal? Details are usually unnecessary and private.

What family details might be revealed? "My family has been so wonderfrul to me ... they are my shelter in all things. I believe that God walks with me and I will never be alone."

One caution: Don't air negative thoughts and family disputes. These will only detract from the topic at hand.

The second largest community from the Sibiu Chair (former administrative unit) brought important changes to the initial Romanesque church: in the 14th century a polygonal chancel flanked by two side chapels was added and the master-builder Andreas Lapicida coordinated the rising of the side aisles and the substitution of the central nave's arcades by piers. A late Gothic vault was unfurled over the central nave. The Romanesque western tower was heightened through the annexation of a defence floor, which was later on replaced by the present tower roof. The double defense wall encloses a small outer ward, which was completed on the northern side with a forecourt around 1550. The impressive inner furnishing dates back to the 18th century and is dominated by the richly decorated Baroque altar from 1729. Großau is one of the first three villages to be repopulated starting with 1756, after the plague had decimated the residents, through the colonization of protestants - Landlers - forcefully sent in from the Catholic Vienna.

Place and surroundings

Großau developed mid-12th Century not only as one of the first Saxon settlements in Transylvania, but it was also established in the same time as many historical towns in middle England. The place flourished beautifully in Sibiu's vicinity and became soon one of the largest communities in the region.

A harsh event is said to have occurred here mid- 17th Century: a large Ottoman army marching from Sibiu towards Alba Iulia was persuaded by a local noble to spare the fortified church in Großau. However, when a villager under Bacchus influence suddenly started shooting at the passing troops, these attacked back. Nevertheless, the army could not occupy the church tower defended by the villagers, so wood and straw have been brought and the building was torched. The peo- nurse around 80 chicks each year.

The big mystery of fingerprints

Fingerprints unlock smartphones. They help detectives identify suspects. But why do we even have them?

Researchers are seeking to explain this fascinating feature -- and they're making good progress.

In a 2020 study published in the journal Proceedings of the National; Academy of Sciences, researchers showed that those little ridges on your fingertips may help you grip and hold objects. Another study in the Journal of Neuroscience showed that the ridges also feature fields that explain the sensitivity of human touch.

Some odd facts about fingerprints:

- * Only primates and koalas have them.
- * They don't change with age.
- * A zebra's unique stripe pattern and a leopard's spots form in the same way as fingerprints.
- * Human fingerprints begin forming in the 10th week of gestation and are fully formed at 17 weeks.


