Also, the same form holds good for any of our members who would like to, but are not receiving the newspaper. If you are a member in good standing, you are entitled to receive our publication.





A highlight of the ATS Convention is the Saxon Handicraft Exhibit. The Exhibit this year will be held at the Youngstown Saxon Club, where the ATS Convention will meet on June 2 - 3, 2012.

The Junior Category, which allows our junior members, ages 13 and under, to exhibit their handcrafted items in an open category, will once again be a part of the Exhibit. All members competing in this category will receive a small token of appreciation.

The Handicraft Exhibit provides an opportunity to display articles which relate to our Transylvanian Saxon cultural background, but is not restricted to this category only. It is a showplace for the artistic talents and abilities of our people, present and past.

A prize competition is held for items made by present ATS Members only. The rules for this prize competition are as follows:

- 2. There will be first and second prizes awarded in each category.
- 3. There will be one (1) President's

Award for "Best of Show" Entry.

- 4. No more than three (3) entries allowed per member.
- 5. Only items actually made by present ATS members, ages 14 and over, are eligible for entry in this prize competition.
- 6. Winning entries will be determined by ballot vote of the Convention Delegates.
- 7. There will be a separate Junior Category for ATS members, Ages 13 and under.

NOTE: An Entry Blank must be filled out for all items placed on display. Advance registration will be appreciated. The exhibit room will be opened Saturday morning (June 2nd) for delivery and set-up of display items. All items must be picked up Sunday morning (June 3rd) prior to the start of the Sunday Convention Session.

### **Keeping Your Cool: Protecting Yourself** from the Dangers of Sunstroke

Warmer weather is just around the corner. Along with the fun of outdoor activities come some dangers, too. Among those dangers is sunstroke, also called heat stroke. To protect you and your loved ones from this hazard, keep these tips in mind this summer.

To avoid getting sunstroke, remember to drink plenty of fluids on warm days or when your activity level is up. Avoid caffeine and alcohol, both of which can dehydrate you. Wear light colored, loose clothing and always wear a hat in direct sunlight. Try to stay in the shade and take breaks as needed. If you do find that you are experiencing any symptoms of heat stroke, get help immediately. Symptoms of sunstroke include dizziness, fatigue, headache, and rapid pulse and breathing. This eventually progresses to an elevated body temperature, lack of sweating, confusion, and can lead to shock. The sooner you get treatment, the better.



### High prices spark Interest in natural gas cars

CNG

With the price of gasoline approaching \$5 a gallon, automakers are testing natural gas vehicles with consumers.

GM and Chrysler have announced a new heavy-duty natural gas truck with a duel fuel option for gasoline. Meanwhile, Honda is expanding sales of its natural gas Civic.

About 113,000 natural-gas vehicles are on U.S. roads, says NGV America, a trade group for natural-gas vehicles. Worldwide the vehicles are much more popular with 4.2 million on the road in Latin American and 6.8 million in the Asia-Pacific region.

A natural gas vehicle has almost zero carbon emissions, a fact pleasing to those who care deeply about the environment.

Compared to gasoline, natural gas is also a good deal. For the equivalent on one gallon of gas, customers pay \$2 to \$2.59 for natural gas.

But the reality check comes with three steep hits: price, cost and practicality.

Upfront price for a vehicle is higher than gasoline powered cars and trucks. Honda, one of the bigger players in the natu-

ral gas vehicle scene, sold 2,000 natural gas Civics in 2011 at a cost of about \$4,000 more than the gasoline powered mode. The bifuel Chrysler heavyduty pickup will cost almost \$12,000 more.

Refilling is more of a problem in the U.S. than in Latin America but in every state power companies offer fueling to the public. Problem is that this might not give you enough fueling stations to actually use the car for travel.

Consumers can purchase a natural gas filling station for \$6,000. These stations tap into your home's natural gas line, compressing the gas for use in your car. It takes about six hours to fill up but costs only \$15.

Also, depending on the vehicle, trunk space will be limited, since NGVs usually store fuel canisters in that space.







### Mit offenen Augen auf den Nächsten zugehen

SeitHerbst2009dientderjungePfarrerAndreasHartig(Jahrgang 1982) als Seelsorger der Evangelischen Kirchengemeinden A.B. Zeiden und Heldsdorf. Er stammt aus Bistritz und hat in Hermannstadt das Theologiestudium und das Vikariat abgeschlossen. In den beiden Burzenländer Gemeinden, die er seit zweieinhalb Jahren betreut, sieht er ein vielversprechendes Potenzial: Zeiden ist mit 443 Seelen die sechstgrößte Kirchengemeinde der Landeskirche und die drittgrößte des Kronstädter Kirchenbezirks, Heldsdorf zählt 139 Seelen. Mit den elf Konfirmanden (zehn in Zeiden und einem in Heldsdorf) am Palmsonntag entsteht auch Hoffnung auf Zukunft. Einen Einblick in die Arbeit des Pfarrers erhielt für die Siebenbürgische Zeitung Korrespondentin Christine Chiriac.

Es war ein längerer Prozess. In Bistritz habe ich lange Zeit in der Jugendarbeit mitgemacht. Irgendwann hat man mich gefragt, ob ich als Akkordeon- und Klavierspieler mir vorstellen könnte, den Sonntagsgottesdienst auf der Orgel zu begleiten. So engagierte ich mich immer mehr im Gemeindeleben. Pfarrerin Birgit Hamrich machte mich auf das Theologiestudium aufmerksam, und ich habe diese Chance wahrgenommen, zunächst weniger aus innerer als aus äußerer Berufung.

Haben Sie seither daran *gedacht, beruflich doch etwas* anderes zu machen?

Nein. Obwohl es andere Berufe gibt, wo man finanziell viel besser abgesichert ist, hält mich irgendetwas fest. Man lernt mit der Zeit die Situation der Menschen in der eigenen Kirche kennen, entwickelt Verantwortung für jene, die noch da sind, und für das, was hier noch möglich ist. Was wäre, wenn wir alle nur die leichteren Aufgaben auf uns nehmen würden? Deswegen habe ich mich entschieden, den Weg weiter zu gehen.

Wo sehen Sie die größten Herausforderungen?

Mir gibt die Verwaltung am meisten zu tun. Früher gab es Nachbarschaften oder mehr Gemeindeglieder, die sich fachlich gut auskannten und für verschiedene Aufgaben Verantwortung übernahmen. Heutzutage hat man diese Strukturen leider nicht mehr, dafür aber seit der Wende viel mehr Besitz: Schulen, Kindergärten, Grundstücke, eigene Räumlichkeiten. Es ist nicht einfach, den Überblick zu behalten, mit dem Bürgermeisteramt oder den Mietern zu verhandeln, Klarheit in den Zahlen und Ziffern zu schaffen, vor allem wenn man kein großer Fan der Mathematik ist. Als Pfarrer wird man im Studium nicht als Manager ausgebildet und lernt auch nicht, was ein Vertrag zu beinhalten hat. Auf einmal sieht man sich aber damit konfrontiert. Man kann nur hoffen, dass man keinen Fehler macht. Es ist auch deshalb wichtig, sich durch Gespräche mit der Gemeinde und dem Presbyterium abzusichern, Fachleute heranzuziehen, Anwälte und Notare aufzusuchen. So lernt man dazu. Man würde sich manchmal vielleicht doch wünschen, mehr Zeit für die Vorbereitung der Predigt, für den Religionsunterricht, für Hausbesuche oder Jugendprojekte zu haben.

Wie verläuft diese "andere" Arbeit? Die Herausforderung be-

steht darin, das Potenzial der Gemeinden heranzuziehen, die Menschen für die Gemeindearbeit zu begeistern. Man hat viel mit älteren Menschen zu tun, die Jüngeren sind selbst sehr beschäftigt, die ganz Jungen kommen zum Teil aus einem anderen konfessionellen Hintergrund. Sie haben nicht mehr den gleichen Bezug zur Kirchengemeinde wie die früheren Generationen, die in diesen Glauben hineingeboren wurden, mit ihm aufgewachsen sind, die Traditionen von klein auf gepflegt haben. Die heutige junge Generation kennt das alles nicht. Man muss viel Zeit investieren, um sie mit den Grundsätzen vertraut zu machen, letztendlich auch was die Konfirmation angeht. Manchmal habe ich den Eindruck, dass viele Jugendliche die Konfirmation als eine Klubmitgliedschaft betrachten, die man aufgibt, wenn man keinen Spaß mehr daran hat. Sie müssen erst lernen, sich mit dem Glauben, der Kirche und den Traditionen zu identifizieren.

Wie begeistert man sie?

Das ist die Frage! Man denkt sich verschiedene Aufgaben, Projekte, Veranstaltungen aus, man eröffnet neue Möglichkeiten und schaut auf die Reaktionen der Leute. Manche begeistern sich mehr, andere

weniger. Im Sommer haben wir zum Beispiel das Projekt "Offene Kirchenburg" ins Leben gerufen: So tun die Jugendlichen auch in den Ferien etwas Sinnvolles für ihre Gemeinde, während Touristen und Zeidner die Gelegenheit erhalten, die Kirchenburg zu entdecken. Einmal im Monat organisieren wir den "Kirchentee" oder "Kirchenkaffee" nach dem Sonntagsgottesdienst. Die Jugendlichen kommen schon um neun Uhr ins Pfarramt, bereiten Tee und Kaffee vor, sind im Gottesdienst dabei und bedienen anschließend die Gemeindeglieder. Es ist mir sehr wichtig, dass zwischen der jungen und der älteren Generation Kontakte geknüpft werden. Deswegen haben wir uns auch bei der Organisation des Faschingsfestes und der Zeidner Begegnung impliziert. Viele andere Projekte sind mit großzügiger Hilfe von außen möglich.

Wer unterstützt die Kirchengemeinde?

Beim Verfassen des Rechenschaftsberichts wurde mir klar, wie viel Hilfe wir erhalten haben. 2010 konnten wir eine neue Heizung in der Schule einbauen – dafür stellte uns unser Partnerkirchenkreis Oberes Havelland knappe 30000 Euro zur Verfügung. Auch die Zeidner Nachbarschaft aus Deutschland unterstützt uns regelmäßig, sei es bei den Arbeiten am Friedhof, bei dem Projekt Essen auf Rädern, bei der Restaurierung unserer Orgel oder bei der Weihnachtsbescherung. Wir haben zudem eine gute Beziehung zur Deutschen Botschaft in Bukarest aufbauen können, die nun unsere Zeidner Konzertreihe fördert. Hinzu kommen private Sponsoren. So viel Engagement ist nicht selbstverständlich, vor allem in Krisenzeiten. Auch im Vergleich zu anderen Gemeinden in unserer Landeskirche kann man sich in Zeiden glücklich



### Wrap your fingersaround this BLT

According to foodtimeline.org, bacon and lettuce recipes can be traced all the way back to the Roman Empire. Tomatoes that complete the BLT were introduced to

Europe in the 16th century and sand-wiches in the 18th century.

Since the 19th century, the BLT, in one form or another, has been a staple on menus from sandwich counters to haute cuisine tea rooms.

Traditionally, the ingredients appear as flat slices of toasted white sandwich bread laden with bacon, lettuce and tomato. Add a slice of cheese and it becomes a BLT Club.

According to foodtimeline.org, foods are not invented but they evolve. With this recipe, we have another take on the BLT, but it's far from being the final wrap.

Heart Healthy BLT wrap
1 pound light or turkey bacon

- 4 large whole wheat flour tortillas
- 2 cups diced and drained toma toes (may be canned)

1 bag shredded lettuce 1/2 cup light mayonnaise or Miracle Whip

Lightly brown tortillas in oven or a skillet sprayed with non-stick

cooking oil. Set aside. Microwave 16 strips of bacon until crisp.

Spread mayo on the tortillas, then space the strips of bacon on the coated tortillas and evenly sprinkle the diced tomatoes and shredded lettuce on

top. Roll tightly, like a burrito.

Also, you can create variations of the basic sandwich, by adding horseradish or substituting mustard, Dijon mustard, Russian or Thousand Island dressing in place of the mayonnaise.

South of the border zip can be added by substituting the diced tomatoes with fresh, drained Pico De Gallo or try pushing the thermal envelope even higher with a sprinkling of your favorite hot peppers.

Make a lunch complete with a large, cold glass of milk and a cup of your favorite light soup.
