On Saturday, May 17th, the ATS Board of Directors met in Columbus, Ohio. The topics discussed ranged from a review of the first quarter financials to upcoming ATS events. Our financials showed a healthy first quarter profit. During the week leading up to the meeting, the Investment Committee met with our Investment Counselor, as we do prior to every Board Meeting. Our independent advisor evaluates our portfolio and monitors the ratings of our investments on a continuous basis. He reassured the committee that the ATS investment portfolio is well positioned and that he does not foresee any major issues with our investments. With the recent ups and downs in the stock market, I want to reassure our members that their life insurance and retirement plans in the ATS are safe and secure.

Following the Board Meeting, the ATS Branch Presidents met. We had the following Branch cities being represented: Alliance, Chicago, Cleveland East, Cleveland West, Columbus, Detroit, Lorain, Merrillville, New Castle, Salem, and Youngstown. The 2024 year-end financials and investments were discussed. Reports were also given on last year's Cultural, Fraternal, and Youth events as well as upcoming ones. Scholarship awards were announced, with the Branch President receiving a certificate to be presented to their members who won. The ATS Subsidy Grants were awarded to the Cultural Groups and Branch Sharing checks were distributed. Chris Phillis, Branch 18 - Salem, Karl Hermann, Branch 25 - New Castle, as well as I, Branch 8 - Alliance received new Branch President pins. Local Branch Officer duties and information, ATS information, and ATS programs were reviewed. We also had a discussion on the topic "What is a Fraternal Benefit Society". Those that stayed for dinner enjoyed a beautiful and fun evening watching the harness racing at the race-track, picking out horses with the best names, and then saying "I should have placed a bet" when that horse actually won. A great snack

One nutritious snack for wild birds may surprise you: cooked potato. Peeled, cooked, plain potato may be added to feeders in the summer, according to Homes and Gardens, but bird lovers must be sure the potatoes are peeled and cooked thoroughly. Raw potatoes contain solanine, a toxin that is harmful to birds and can cause stomach and brain issues, and even death. Add no salt or butter to the cooked potato, which should be mashed or finely chopped.

June 14th is Flag Day. This day commemorates the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. Fly your American flag proudly!

Sunday, June 15, is Father’s Day. To all of you out there who still have their Dad, make sure he knows you love him. For those who do not still have their Dad, think of a happy memory of a time spent together. To all the Dads out there, enjoy your day!

Did you know that the Allies started storming the Normandy coast on June 6, 1944?

The Allied forces launched “Operation Overlord”, the largest amphibious invasion in history on this date, marking a pivotal turning point in World War II. According to HaveFunWithHistory.com, the invasion involved a meticulously planned assault on the Normandy Coast of France, which was occupied by the Nazi’s. Led by General Dwight D Eisenhower, the operation included forces from the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, and other Allied nations. The invasion began with airborne assaults and a massive naval bombardment, followed by the landing of 156,000 troops

on five beach heads, which were code named Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno, and Sword.

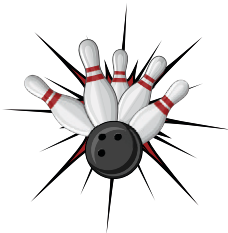
By daybreak, according to History.com, 18,000 British and American parachutists were already on the ground. An additional 13,000 aircraft were mobilized to provide air cover and support for the invasion. At 6:30 a.m., American troops came ashore at Utah and Omaha beaches. The British and Canadians captured Gold, Juno and Sword beaches. Omaha beach was a much harder task than the rest. The U.S. First Division battled high seas, mist, mines, burning vehicles, and German coastal batteries, including an elite infantry division which spewed heavy fire. Many wounded Americans ultimately drowned in the high tide. By the day’s end, the Allied troops had successfully stormed Normandy’s beaches and were then able to push inland. These landings were originally planned for June 5th, but postponed due to bad weather. More commonly known as D-Day, this victory paved the way for the liberation of Western Europe from Nazi occupation.

Unlike V-E Day (Victory in Europe) or V-J Day (Victory over Japan), the “D” in D-Day doesn’t stand for anything. As early as World War I, the U.S. Military used the term D-Day to designate the launch date of a mission. One reason was to keep the actual date out of the hands of spies; another was to serve as a placeholder until an actual date was chosen. The bravery and heroism displayed by troops from the Allied countries on D-Day has served as inspiration for several films, most notably The Longest Day (1962) and Saving Private Ryan (1998). It was also depicted in the series Band of Brothers (2001).

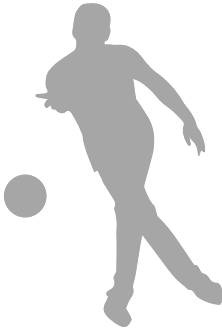

Skin care products
recalled for
elevated benzene

Several acne treatment products have been recalled after lab testing revealed elevated levels of benzene, a chemical linked to cancer. Walgreens Acne Control Cleanser, Proactiv Skin Smoothing Exfoliator and La Roche-Posay Effaclar Duo Dual Acne Control are among the affected products to be pulled from store shelves, according to CNN Health. Health officials noted that benzene exposure raises cancer risk only slightly after several decades, and that consumer risk from short-term exposure in the affected products was very low.

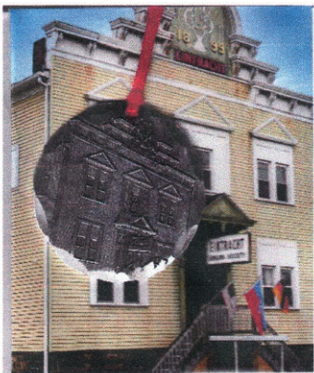

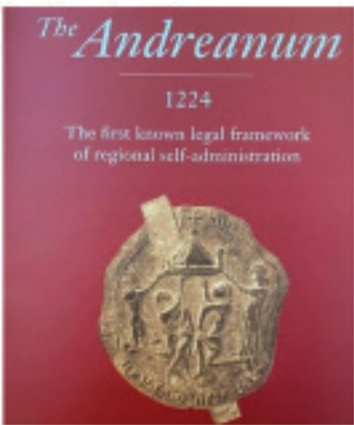

On May 4th, Detroit Branch 37 celebrated its 112th Anniversary. Our President Susanna Fleischer started it off with this prayer: "Thank you LORD for bringing us together to celebrate our 112th Anniversary and Mother's Day with family and friends. GOD of all the nations, you desire for the world to be united in peace. You have gifted the planet with people who speak in many languages and celebrate their culture in creative and colorful ways. Help us celebrate all that we share on this beautiful planet. Komm HERR JESUS, sei unser Gast und segnet was du uns bescheret hast. AMEN."

We arrived at the hall that was decorated in vibrant Spring colors for the occasion. We enjoyed a wonderfully catered luncheon, a beautifully decorated cake, plenty of food and drinks, and homemade pastries provided by member Herta Benesch.

Everyone received a special gift to commemorate the anniversary, a small notebook with the Saxon logo on it, and a pen.

It was interesting to learn the history of our Detroit Branch. The Siebenbürgen Sachsen Verein (Transylvanian Saxon Club) of Detroit, Branch 37 was founded February 23, 1913 by 11 men. Originally, the membership consisted of only men, but in 1916, the membership was opened to women.

Shortly thereafter, the Detroit Saxons became part of the ATS as Branch 37. In 1925 the Detroit Saxons bought a wooded property that for many years was used as a playground for the young people to play basketball and baseball. The Youth Group formed a sports club that regularly played against other groups from Ohio, Indiana, and Pennsylvania. Also, in 1925 a clubhouse was purchased where regular meetings and festivities were conducted. It was also used by the newly founded St. Peters German & Saxon Evangelical Lutheran Church under the direction of Pastor Hans Teutsch.

During the time of WWII everything seemed to be at a standstill, since many men were away at war.

In the early 1950s, many Transylvanian Saxons immigrated to the U.S. and joined the Saxon Club, and sub-groups were formed like the Saxonia singing group, who later joined the G.B.U. Saxonia Chorus.

Then, in 1963, the Saxons bought an old Baptist Church, where a new Saxon Club came into existence. In 1976, a Cultural Youth Group was formed under the leadership of Kaetchen Breckner and Ruth Kracker, and these groups regularly participated with others at the yearly Heimattag of the ATS.

Many properties have been bought and sold through the years, but the association between Branch 37 and St. Peters German and Saxon Lutheran Church still exists today, as we have our monthly meetings and special events at the Church.

A good time was had by all who attended the Anniversary event. We joined in singing the Siebenbürgen Anthem and "Der Mai Ist Gekommen". It was announced that Robert Schneider and Mike Rehner will be carrying the Saxon flag in a parade in Frankenmuth, Michigan, and anyone who wants to join them is welcome.

Members of Branch 37 wish all a very happy, healthy Spring and Summer. After our June meeting, meetings resume in September.

Father’s Day, June 15

There’s more to being a dad than earning a living and being an advisor to teenagers.

According to researchers in the Fatherhood Project at the Families & Work Institute, interacting with dad is crucial for child development. Researchers now know that even interactions with your infant or toddler influence how your kids will relate to other people later in their lives and how they will view the world at large.

A study at the University of Regensburg, Munich, Germany, shows that children whose fathers played with them in a sensitive, supportive and challenging way at age two tended to form closer, more trusting relationships with others at ages 10 and 16.

By age 16, fathers’ play proved even more powerful and predictive than the mother-child bond. The researchers found that dads’ play makes a pivotal and unique contribution to kids’ growth.

Telling stories of family history and how your parents and grandparents overcame adversity has an influence on how kids handle difficult times. An Emory University study showed that the ability of children, ages 14 to 16, to retell parents’ stories is linked to a lower rate of depression and anxiety.

Your stories, told with eye contact about how you and others overcame problems, can help your children view the world with optimism.

Men’s Health Week: June 9-15

Afraid to see a doctor? Don’t be!

There’s a chronic health problem among American men: They are more much more likely to avoid going to the doctor.

According to UAB Medicine, only about 60 percent of American men between the ages of 22 and 65 receive an annual physical, and many men will only seek care if they suspect a serious medical problem. And the Cleveland Clinic has found that about 65 percent of men will avoid going to the doctor for as long as possible.

Dr. Patrick Selph, a urologist with UAB Medicine, notes that avoid-

ing routine medical care means that medical conditions may go undetected for years. In his own clinic, Selph routinely diagnoses patients with diabetes or high blood pressure after they seek care for unrelated complaints like urinary tract infections. Many of these issues could have been detected earlier or prevented entirely with more routine medical care and annual physicals.

Why do people avoid care? Cost, inadequate insurance coverage, not enough local providers, and lack of time are some of the most common obstacles, according to Nash-

ville Medical News. But avoidance is common even if care is readily available. According to Texas Health, around one-quarter of men have felt judged by healthcare providers, and nearly half fear uncomfortable discussions about their sexual health. Other anxiety-provoking topics include their workout frequency, alcohol and tobacco use, and adherence to prescribed medications and treatment plans.

Selph urges men to remember that their health isn’t just about them -- major health issues can also create difficult and painful circumstances for family and loved ones.

Use caution with QR codes

QR codes are convenient,
easy to use, and increasing-
ly common in our everyday
lives.

We use them to access
restaurant menus, board an
airplane, or pay for broccoli
at a farmer's market.

But, according to the Fed-
eral Trade Commission,
scammers are using QR
codes to steal.

It's an updated form of
phishing called quishing,
according to ABC7 Chi-
cago. Scammers cover up
legitimate QR codes with
fake ones or send the ma-
licious codes via email or
text message. But the code

doesn't link
to any legiti-
mate web-
site. Instead,
users go to
spoof web-
sites where
they unwit-
tingly enter
their person-
al informa-
tion. And in other cases, the
link may install malware on
the victim's device.

Watch for these common
signs of a scam QR code:

- A QR code on a sticker
placed over another QR
code in a public place.
- Text messages or emails



claiming to
be govern-
ment, such
as a demand
to pay un-
paid tolls.

• Warn-
ings about
undelivered
packages.

• Commu-
nications about suspicious
account activity or password
changes.

- Offers for investments.
- A QR code that offers a
prize.
- A package you weren't
expecting labeled with a QR
code.

• Messages from unknown
senders.

Never scan a QR code
if it's suspicious or if you
aren't sure whether it's safe.
Instead, use your smart-
phone camera app to pre-
view the attached URL. If
it doesn't match the message
or contains odd misspell-
ings (like Amazan instead
of Amazon), don't scan it.
The digital security compa-
ny Aura also advises smart-
phone users to avoid down-
loading QR code scanner
apps, which can be loaded
with malware themselves
-- instead, use your phone's
native camera app.

A total knee replacement can be a good fix

Total knee replacement
surgery is a clear choice for
some people.

A person who has continu-
ous pain and stiffness that
limits daily activities and
interferes with sleep is prob-
ably a good candidate. If
symptoms don't respond to
drugs or rehabilitation, knee
replacement can be the best
solution.

Today, knee replacement
can relieve your pain and
restore function. Those who
once could not use stairs,
walk or even get out of bed
without pain should find re-
lief with this surgical proce-
dure.

According to the Ameri-
can Academy of Orthopaedic
Surgeons (AAOS), ap-
proximately 850,000 total
knee replacements (TKR)
are performed annually in
the United States as of 2023,
a number that has risen due
to an aging population and
improved surgical tech-
niques. The procedure is
most common among adults
aged 50–80, but younger
patients with severe joint
damage are increasingly
considered, thanks to longer-
lasting implants.

In 2025, robots are get-
ting involved in TKR. Ro-
botic-assisted TKR, used
in 20 percent of procedures
in 2024, enhances preci-
sion in implant placement,
reducing recovery time and
complications, according to
Orthopedics Today. Custom
implants, designed using
Artificial Intelligence and
3D imaging, are also gain-
ing traction for better fit and
function.

Enhanced recovery pro-
tocols, including same-day
discharge for some patients
and virtual physical therapy
via apps like Hinge Health,
have shortened recovery
times. Most patients walk
with assistance within 1–2
days and resume normal ac-
tivities within 6–12 weeks,
per Mayo Clinic 2025 guide-
lines.

New protocols, such as
pre-surgical health optimi-
zation (managing diabetes,
quitting smoking), and ad-
vanced infection prevention
(antibiotic coatings on im-
plants), have lowered com-
plication rates to 1–2 percent
for infections and 2–3 per-
cent for blood clots, accord-
ing to a 2024 Lancet study.

Yellowstone volcano
wears a cap

Researchers have discovered that the supervolcano inside Yellowstone has a helpful cap that holds in heat and pressure, but also vents enough so that the whole system doesn't flip its lid.

The cap is located nearly 3 miles under the surface, according to findings published in the April 2025 journal Nature.

According to Live Science, Yellowstone hasn't had a major eruption for more than 600,000 years. That's a good thing because the Yellowstone caldera measures about 30 by 45 miles, covering more than 1,300 square miles. There is so much magma that it could fill the Grand Canyon 11 times, according to the journal Nature. But, the good news is that only about 15 percent is molten.

Yellowstone is one of the best-monitored volcanos in the world. A supereruption would cover at least two states in three feet of ash, create a volcanic winter, destroy crops, and deplete the ozone layer. Fortunately, scientists think that is unlikely to occur anytime soon and, if the volcano became dangerous, they would know years ahead of an eruption.
