Did you know that the first perfect score of 10 in Olympic history took place on July 18, 1976? According to History.com, Nadia Comaneci became the first gymnast to score that perfect 10 at the age of 14. The young Romanian's performance at the Montreal Olympic games pushed her into the international spotlight. Her first event, the uneven bars, required every gymnast to compete with the same routine. She said, "I knew I was good at what I was doing, but I didn't know how good I was compared to others". She executed every element flawlessly. The scoreboards flashed a "1.00", because they could only display three digits – no one imagined they would need four digits.

After her record-breaking score on the uneven bars, Comaneci would notch six more perfect 10s. Her performance earned her three gold medals, and

How to know what is really a nut

Peanuts are neither the nuts of peas, nor peas, and, in fact, they are not even nuts. According to Live Science, the nut category of food has a lot of non-nuts in it. Almonds, pistachios, peanuts, pecans, and cashew are not nuts.

By definition a nut is a dry fruit with a single seed encased in a hard shell, which doesn't open on its own. Walnuts, which are true nuts, are a good example. Peanuts don't fit into the nut category because they have two seeds and easily break open. They grow in a pod and that makes them a legume, plants that produce fruit in a pod, like snow peas.

Meanwhile, almonds, cashews, and pecans are actually drupes, seeds that grow inside a fleshy outer layer surrounding a pit that contains a seed. A peach is a drupe and we eat the juicy outside layer and discard the seed. With almonds, cashews and pecans we remove the outside layer and eat the seed.

she became the youngest all-around gold medalist in the history of the Olympics. She became an instant media darling, being featured on the covers of Time, Newsweek, and Sports Illustrated all in the same week. Her record as the youngest ever Olympic gymnastics all-around champion will remain unbroken, unless they change the eligibility age again. She was 14 when she earned the title in 1976. Since then, the eligibility age was raised to 16 and remains there.

Nadia also won World Championship gold medals in 1978 and 1979 and earned two gold medals in the 1980 Olympics in Moscow. She retired from competition in 1984. The communist Romanian authorities subjected her to intense scrutiny and surveillance by the Securitate secret police after she became a global gymnastic star, and increasing even more after her coach defected to America.

According to Wikipedia, Nadia was born in Onesti, a small town in the Carpathian Mountains, in the historical region of Western Moldavia. Following her Olympic career, her movements were still restricted by the communist Romanian government. Her life took on a bleakness. She was cut off from making the

small amount of extra money that had made a difference in her family's life. She was to do as instructed, but since retirement, they no longer had to make an effort to keep her happy. In November 1989, she defected from Romania with a group of other Romanians, crossing the Hungary-Romania border. Their journey was mostly on foot and at night. They traveled through Hungary and Austria and finally were able to take a plane to the United States. This was just prior to the revolution that occurred in December of that year, when the communist regime fell and Ceausescu was executed.

Nadia moved to Oklahoma in 1991 to help her friend Bart Conner, whom she had met a few different times over the years. After four years, her and Conner became engaged. She returned to Romania for their wedding in 1996, which was held in Bucharest. Since the Communist regime was gone and the democratic Romania was established, the government welcomed her home as a national hero. Her wedding was televised live. Nadia became a naturalized United States citizen in 2001, while retaining her Romanian citizenship. The couple still resides in Oklahoma, where they operate a gymnastics academy.

July is UV Safety Month Find the right shades to protect your eyes



Sunglasses aren't just a fashion statement -- they prevent eye strain, improve vision in bright light, block ultraviolet rays, and help protect the fragile skin around the eyes from skin cancer. They also shield your eyes from floating debris like dust, pollen, and insects. Whether you're scrounging a convenience store rack or browsing in a high-end department store for your next pair of shades, here's what to look for:

- Check the labeling to ensure that the lenses fully block UV rays. The tag may say it offers 100 percent UV protection, UV absorption up to 400nm, or UV400 protection. If the glasses aren't labeled with the protection level, choose something else.
- Choose lenses that block enough (but not too much) light. The amount of light that filters through sunglasses is called visible light transmission, or VLT. Sunglasses with 20 to 40 percent VLT are good for allpurpose use, but lower than 20 percent may only be ap-

propriate for very bright conditions.

- Check the label to see if the lenses are polarized. This anti-glare coating can reduce eyestrain and make objects appear clearer in bright light, which makes it especially useful for outdoor activities. But polarized objects can also make it difficult to see some screens and car dashboard controls, so they may not be the best choice in every instance. Both polarized and non-polarized lenses can be equally effective at blocking UV rays, so it's good to have both options on hand.
- Look for larger lenses that provide more coverage. Wraparound sunglasses are also a good choice and can block UV light along your temples.
- If you wear glasses, consider investing in a pair of sunglasses with prescription lenses or buy sunglasses that are designed to fit over your regular glasses. Make sure that your prescription sunglasses or over-the-glasses sunglasses provide appropriate UV protection.





Shingles vaccine may stave off dementia

If you needed another compelling reason to get a shingles vaccine, look no further: The two-dose series of shots may also help prevent or delay dementia.

A new study published in April in the journal JAMA examined data from the health records of about 280,000 older adults across Australia, comparing a group of individuals who received a free shingles vaccine with another group that was slightly too old to qualify for the free vaccine program. Researchers found that over a period of 7.4 years, the vaccinated group was about 20 percent less likely to be diagnosed with dementia than the unvaccinated group, showing correlation but not causation.

According to the New York Times, it's the most compelling evidence to date that the shingles vaccine may reduce dementia risk. While researchers have noted the link between the shingles vaccine and dementia in previous studies, they also had to account for healthier lifestyles and other characteristics that are known to lower dementia risk.

Researchers theorize that the shingles vaccine prevents the neuroinflammation that occurs when the varicella-zoster virus, which causes both chicken pox and shingles, reactivates after decades of dormancy. The vaccine may also deliver a protective effect when it activates the immune system.

But even without the antidementia benefits, the shingles vaccine is a good choice for most older adults. Shingles rashes can be excruciatingly painful and if left untreated, can cause complications like postherpetic neuralgia, or intense nerve pain, or permanent eye damage.

Hegt wird gesangen!: "De Biëtklok" by Ernst Thullner

In the poem "De Biëtklok" (The Prayer Bell), Pastor Ernst Thullner (1862-1918) describes the recurring request of the prayer bell (evening bell), which calls on everyone to come home even in different phases of life. All children knew that when the bells ring at 7 p.m., you have to go home again. "Wonn de Nuëchtklok leogt, dro kutt ir hiemen!" At the end of the poem, the longing for the blessed peace is addressed, when at the end of life the bell finally sounds its last call for eternal going home.

The evening bell (Angelusläuten, Ave-Maria-Läuten) is an old Christian tradition. In the past, it was an important signal for people to end their daily work with reflection and prayer (bell). In many villages where Christians live, the evening ringing continues to be cultivated as a cultural and spiritual heritage.

This poem was written both by Hans Mild as well as set to music by Rudolf Lassel. Mild's melody in 4/4 time is more catchy and more widespread. That of Rudolf Lassel is more atmospheric due to the change of minor and major and is still very popularly performed by choirs today.

Rudolf Lassel (*1861 Kronstadt, †1918 Kronstadt) received his first piano lessons from his father and showed an extraordinary musical talent from an early age. As a high school student, Lassel wrote his first compositions. With good musical foundations, Lassel experienced his main musical imprints during his studies at the Royal Conservatory in Leipzig. He directed the Leipziger Akademischer Musikverein and cultivated friendships with well-known conductors and professors. After his return in 1885, he first taught at the Gymnasium and Teacher's Seminary in Bistritz. From 1887 Lassel was organist and cantor at the Protestant city parish church (Black Church) as well as a grammar school and seminar teacher at the Johannes Honterus Gymnasium in Kronstadt. From 1889 he was also choirmaster of the Kronstadter Männergesangverein, an office he handed over in 1902 to his student Paul Richter, the later outstanding composer and conductor. Based on the Leipzig Thomanerchor, he founded the "Kirchenschülerchor" (Honterus-Chor) and also promoted a new choral movement in rural areas.

Rudolf Lassel has had a lasting influence on the Protestant church music in Kronstadt. As one of the most talented and important musicians in Transylvania, he earned lasting merits and was honored many times and awarded by the highest positions. He received the Red Eagle Order IV in recognition from Kaiser Wilhelm II, who was

highly enthusiastic about the Black Church in 1917 during a visit to the Black Church of Lassel's organ play and the school church choir. Class and of Queen Elizabeth of Romania (Carmen Sylva) the Order of Bene merentis 1. Great. Lassel often played the piano and organ at the court in Bucharest and in the residence in Sinaia of the musically educated and poetic queen Carmen Sylva. On January 1, 1918, the musician unexpectedly succumbed to pneumonia, which he had probably contracted in the still unheated Black Church.

At the turn of the 20th century, the first publications appeared with sound recordings of dialect poems by the Mediasche organist Hermann Kirchner, who immigrated from Thuringia, who wrote a whole movement, the Transylvanian Song Spring of art songs in dialect. Many dialect authors such as Viktor Kästner, Martin Kutschis, Josef Lehrer, Georg Meyndt, Otto Piringer, Frida Binder-Radler, Carl Römer, Fritz Schuller, Anna Schuller-Schullerus, Christine Maly-Theil, Lienert-Zultner have partly provided their texts with melodies in the folk tone themselves - or have been set to music by Heinrich Bretz, Hans Mild, Andreas Nikolaus and Carl Reich, among others. They all contributed to the heyday of the dialect song in the following decades. Rudolf Lassel also joined this movement and created catchy settings of High German and Transylvanian-Saxon poems, some of which have passed into the people's heritage: "Mein Sachsenland" (I know a spot in the world) by Franz Oberth (1828-1908); "Kronstadt" (O most trusted city) by Carl Thomas (1844-1913); "Blau und Rot" (When I walk through the fields) by Ernst Kühlbrandt (1857-1933); "Drå Wängsch" (I want, I who wer eje Vijlchen) and "Ech bän deng und ta bäst meng" by Viktor Kästner (1826-1857); "De Biëtklok" (Heren ich de Biëtklok

Time to clean house? Get the documents out of drawers

You might be surprised at how many people have financial documents scattered all over the house -- on the kitchen counter, in the hall closet, a drawer, or a box in the basement. If this describes your "system", you'll have a tough time keeping tabs on your financial life.

Take an hour or two to get your papers in order. Organization will help you, your advisors, and even your heirs.

A home safe or a file cabinet will work. Or you could use storage boxes. Here's what should go inside:

- Investment statements. Organize them by type: IRA statements, 401(k) and mutual fund statements. Annual statements are the ones that really count. Keep 8606s that report nondeductible contributions to traditional IRAs, your Form 5498s, (Fair Market Value Info sent each May), and your 1099-Rs, which report IRA income.
- Be sure to save records of your original investment in a fund or stock, which determines capital gains or losses.
- Bank Statements. Keep the last three years' worth on file. If you anticipate a lawsuit, divorce, or debts, it's wise to keep them longer.
- Credit card statements are less necessary, but keep any detailing tax-related purchases (like a new roof) for up to seven years.
- Mortgage documents, and a



home equity line of credit (HE-LOC) statements should be kept for as long as you own the property, plus seven years after sale, due to tax and ownership disputes.

- Hang onto them until the period of limitations runs out, during which you can claim a credit or refund. The standard IRS audit looks at your past three years of federal tax records and possibly up to seven years. Tax records pertaining to real property or assets should be kept for as long as you own them and for seven years after you sell, exchange or liquidate them.
- Insurance. Life, disability, health, auto, home: keep each policy and policy information on hand for the life of the policy plus three years.
- Medical records and health insurance. Keep documents for five years after the surgery or treatment.

HOLZMENGEN / HOSMAN / HOLCMÁNY



From the first basilica built in the 13th century the western portal is preserved – a most valuable testimony of the Romanesque architectural sculpture in Transylvania – as well as the pillars and arcades that once used to separate the central nave and the aisles. Looking carefully above the western portal, one may observe an immured sculpture representing two figures. Some argue that it is a depiction of the Baptism of Jesus, while others say it represents Adam and Eve. The observer is thus invited to solve this mystery by himself.

Around the year 1500 the bell tower was heightened and provided with a wooden battlement walk on consoles and the church's side aisles were demolished. The two defence walls of the assembly, which were built during the 15th century, are connected by the gate tower and still exhibit remains of the former battlement walk and embrasures, vestiges of a rough past.

Place and surroundings

Amidst the picturesque valley of Hârtibaciu river lays the village of Holzmengen. The fortified church in the center of the settlement is one of the most photographed subjects in Transylvania. In clear weather the church has as background the spectacular view of the often snow-capped mountains Făgărași, which formed once the boundary of the Austrian and respectively Hungarian sphere of influence. As part of the southern Carpathian, the mountains reach heights over 2.500 m.

Today Holzmengen is one of the starting points of the Brukenthal cultural trails, by which one can explore the surroundings in trips up to nine days. On site the Association Hosman Durabil (Sustainable Hosman) supports the development of the settlement.

According to a 2017 Pew Research Center analysis of U.S. Census Bureau data, the number of cohabiting adults ages 50 and older in the U.S. grew by 75 percent from 2007 to 2016, rising from 2.3 million to 4 million.


