PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Veterans Day is November 11th. It was originally known as Armistice Day. In 1918, on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, was declared between the Allied nations and Germany in World War I. One year later, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the day as the first commemoration of Armistice Day. It became a federal holiday in the U.S. in 1938. In 1954, President Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday to Veterans Day to honor American Veterans of all wars. To all of our Veterans out there – THANK YOU for your service!

Did you know that on November 7, 1944, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt was elected to an unprecedented fourth term in office? According to History. com, Roosevelt rose above personal and political challenges to emerge as one of the nation's most revered and influential presidents. In 1921, at the age of 39, he contracted polio and thereafter was burdened with leg braces and eventually confined to a wheelchair. He was first elected as President in 1932 and served 13 years to mid-1945, when he died while in office. During that time, FDR presided over two of the nation's biggest crises - the Great Depression of the 1930s and World War II. He implemented drastic and often criticized legislation to help boost America out of the Great Depression. He initially tried to avoid direct U.S. involvement in World War II, which began

in 1939, but after the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, America was thrust headlong into the conflict. By the time Roosevelt was elected for his fourth term, the war had taken a turn in favor of the Allies, but FDR's health was already on the decline. In April 1945, four months before the war ended, FDR died of a stroke at his vacation home in Georgia.

FDR was the first, and last, president to win more than two consecutive elections. According to the National Constitution Center, most of the framers of the Constitution were against term limits. Amendments seeking to enforce term limits were proposed some 200 times between 1796 and 1940, without being adopted. Most presidents followed George Washington's precedent in not seeking re-election a third time. Some had tried, such as Ulysses S Grant and Woodrow Wilson, but they did not receive their party's nomination for the ballot. Because World War II was still ongoing, FDR agreed to run for a third and then a fourth term.

In 1947, Congress again proposed a law that would limit presidents to two consecutive terms. In 1951, the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution was ratified, officially limiting a president's tenure in office to two terms of four years each.

Our next monthly Branch Meeting will be held on Monday, November 17 at 7:00 p.m.









SAXON LIFE OF MICHAEL FARR (his story is paraphrased from excerpts of his story)

We take up where we left off with Michael and Rosie making a huge decision. They talked about it and decided that originally, Michael would make some money, and they would go back home, buy some land and live. Rosie was extremely homesick and so was Michael. They sold everything they had and bought tickets to go back and in March 1911 they sailed back on the George Washington ship. In six-days they would be in Bremen, Germany.

Before we go too far, we should tell you a little about Rosie, because this is now her journey, too. Rosie's maiden name was Rosa Promer. Her mother's name was Rosa Promer (Klusch). Rosie had a sister, Anna Promer and a brother that was killed in the first World War.

In the spring of 1911, Michael and Rosie would arrive in Bremen, Germany. They took a train to Szaszregen (Sächsische-Regen). They arrived and needed a place to stay. Mrs. Theil had a restaurant and they ate there. Mike asked for a place to stay, and she gave them a room where they ended up sleeping on the floor that night.

The next day they hitched a ride with a man who had a one-horse buggy. He drove them 15 miles to Weilau. They arrived at 10:30 in the morning. As they drove by people, they did not recognize them because Michael had been gone for a while and no one was expecting them. The driver dropped them off at Michael's parents' house. His parents were totally surprised. They came out, greeted them and were excited.

Michael and Rosie would stay at his parents' house while their house was being built. They had purchased a lot 2 doors down from Michael's parents. In 1912, they started building their house. They worked hard in building their house and family and friends helped and brought materials to help. They worked so hard that they were able to move into their house before Christmas of 1912.

Just when Michael and Rosie were back where they wanted to be, in the Spring of 2013, Michael got a notice that he was getting a call to report for an examination for the Army. So, Michael reported for the examination. He got on the scales and the examiner said "Tauglich 1." (which meant you are good to go number 1), for three years in the army.
