Apparently, a relative of Volvo's CEO had died in a car crash and helped motivate the company to increase its safety measures.

“Free \$1,000”
insurance from
the bank

Your bank or credit union may have already sent you an announcement that you are covered for \$1,000 of accidental death and dismemberment insurance. It's free, but what is it?

It is a real policy, usually through TruStage. The \$1,000 pays out only if you die in an accident or lose a hand, foot, eye, hearing, or speech in an accident. Not illness. Not natural causes. Just accidents.

It does not pay medical bills, stitches, scans, ambulance rides, ER copays, or hospital charges. The \$1,000 is a cash benefit, not health insurance.

If you sign up, expect mailings urging you to add \$50,000, \$100,000, or more in extra AD&D coverage for a monthly fee.

**OSHA heat rule:
Where it stands
for summer 2026**

The federal heat illness prevention rule first proposed in August 2024 has stalled. There is no target date for a final rule. But on April 10, 2026, OSHA renewed its Heat National Emphasis Program for another five years, keeping enforcement active. Best practice remains a written heat plan, water available throughout the shift, paid rest breaks in shade, monitoring for symptoms, and a 14-day acclimatization period for new and returning workers. Several states already require these by law.



Four Famous Dogs: A National Hot Dog Day Tour

Ask for a hot dog in Chicago, Detroit, Seattle, or Tucson, and you may not recognize what arrives. Each region has spent decades perfecting its own version, and locals defend their preferences like sports rivalries. National Hot Dog Day on July 18 is a fine excuse to survey four of the country's most beloved variations.

The Chicago Dog. According to Smithsonian Magazine, this all-beef frankfurter dates to the Great Depression, when street vendors sold a hearty, vegetable-loaded version for a nickel. Today's version sits on a steamed poppy seed bun and is "dragged through the garden," as Chicagoans say: yellow mustard, neon-green relish, chopped onion, tomato wedges, a dill pickle spear, sport peppers, and a dash of celery salt. One rule, according to AOL Food, is non-negotiable. No ketchup. Ever.

The Detroit Coney Island. Despite the name, this one is pure Motor City. According to NPR, Greek immigrants began serving these beanless, chili-topped dogs to autoworkers in the early 1900s, and Detroit now has over 500 Coney Island diners. The formula: a natural-

casing beef frank in a steamed bun, smothered with meaty chili sauce, yellow mustard, and chopped white onions.

The Seattle Dog. According to KING 5 News, vendor Hadley Long invented this one in 1989, smearing cream cheese on hot dogs sold from his Pioneer Square bagel cart. The combination spread to stadium crowds and late-night clubgoers, and today the Seattle Dog means cream cheese plus grilled onions on a toasted bun.

The Sonoran Hot Dog. According to Gastro Obscura, this Mexican-American fusion crossed the border from Hermosillo in the 1980s and put down roots in Tucson. It features a bacon-wrapped frank tucked into a fluffy bolillo roll, then topped with pinto beans, grilled onions, fresh onions, tomatoes, mayonnaise, mustard, and jalapeño salsa.

Bohlin had worked with the more elaborate four-point harness system in airplanes and knew that system would not work for automobiles. He concentrated on providing a more effective method of protecting drivers and passengers against the swift deceleration that occurs when a car crashes. Prior to this time, only two-point lap belts were available in automobiles. The two-point belts strapped across the body, with a buckle placed over the abdomen, and in high-speed crashes had been known to cause serious internal injuries. For the most part, the only people who buckled up regularly were race car drivers.

Within a year, Bohlin had developed the three-point seat belt. He looked for “a solution that was simple, effective, and could be put on conveniently with one

hand”. It was introduced in Volvo cars in 1959. The new belts secured both the upper and lower body; its straps joined at hip level and buckled into what Bohlin called “an immovable anchorage point” below the hip, so that they could hold the body safely in the event of a crash.

In the interest of safety, Volvo made the new seat belt design available to other car manufacturers for free. It was required on all new American vehicles from 1968 onward. Since 1959, engineers have worked to enhance this three-point belt, but the basic design from Nils Bohlin remains the same.

Please, everyone, buckle up! The ATS doesn’t want to pay out your life insurance policy because you didn’t take a couple seconds to “click it”.

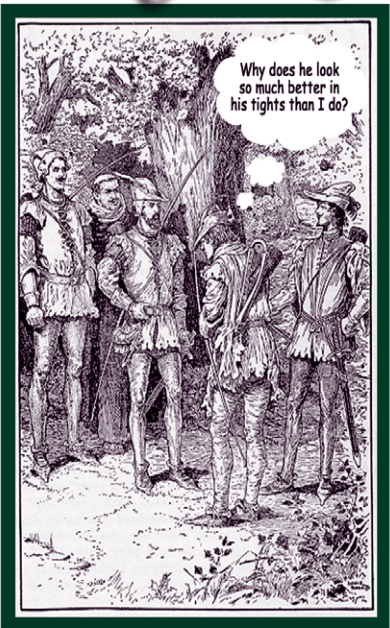

As is the case with many a historic building, time catches up to it and over time maintenance and repairs become costly.

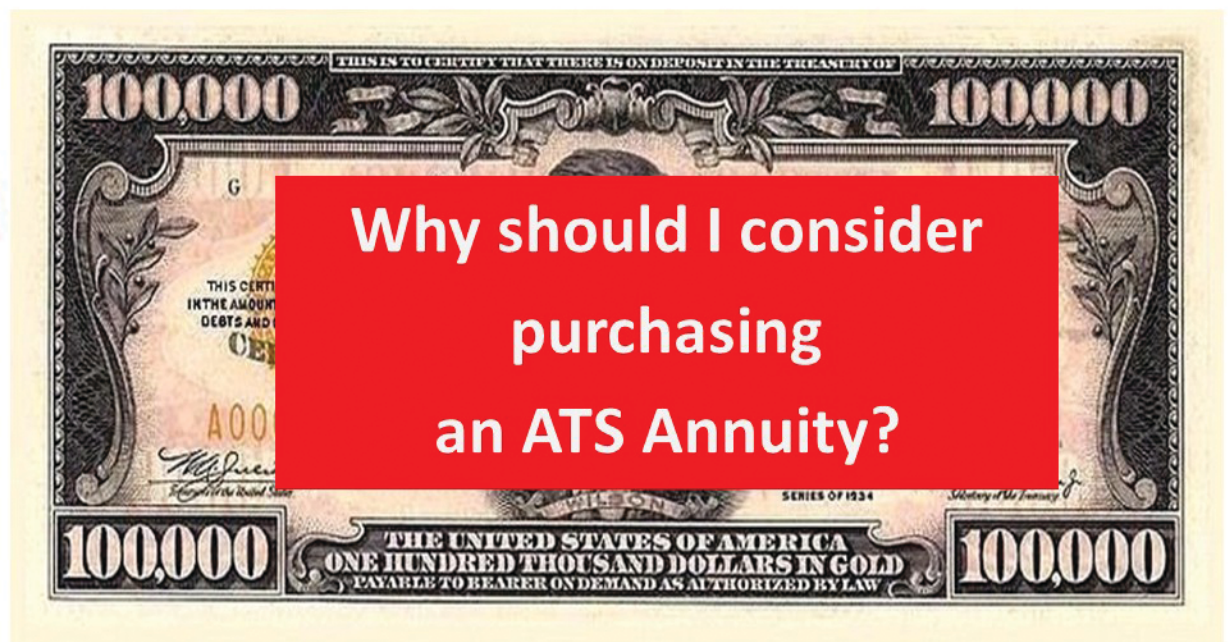
